Record 1958 Harvest Due Despite Control

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (AP)—Farmers apparently will produce record crops this year, the government predicted yesterday. Despite cutbacks in planting, government controls and retirement of land under soil bank payments, the volume of all crops is expected to be 113 per cent of the 1947-49 average. The previous record of 106 per cent above the 1947-49 average was first set in 1948 and matched in 1956 and 1957. The mid-growing season report issued yesterday by the agriculture department indicated new surpluses may be accumulated. Striking increases in the outlook for food grains and other crops contributed greatly to the picture.

Truck Strike Takes Effect For 11 States

SEAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12 (UPI)—Trucks and trailers hauling freight from western states began pulling out of highways today in an employer-ordered lockout that may include as many as 100,000 trucks. The lockout was announced by the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, which is representing drivers in 11 states including California, Oregon, Nevada, Colorado, Arizona, New Mexico, Idaho, Utah, Idaho, Washington, and Wyoming. The employers ordered the lockout yesterday in retaliation for a strike of 2,500 teamsters in central California and western Nevada. The teamsters are seeking higher pay.
