More Democratic than Republican ballots were cast Tuesday in the primary election in the traditional Republican stronghold, Twin Falls county. Returns from the 46 precincts show Democrat Ruth G. Moon, incumbent for state treasurer, was the top Democratic vote getter, receiving 3,565 votes but 10,000 Republican votes cast for his party receiving 3,016 votes in his bid for reelection as representative from Idaho's second congressional district.

Twin Falls county Republicans gave Gov. Robert L. Spittle 2,839 votes but 10,000 Democratic votes cast for the two candidates seeking the nomination in Idaho's second congressional district.

Fairfield Democrat Following in Close Struggle of Ballots

BOISE, Aug. 13 (AP)—A northern Idaho advocate of legalized gambling held a narrow margin Wednesday in a bid for state's Democratic gubernatorial nomination. With 24 precincts still to be heard from in scattered parts of Idaho, State Sen. A. M. Derr of Clark Fork had a 128-vote lead over fellow legislator, State Sen. Max Hanson of Fairfield. Derr, still cautious in his approach to apparent victory on the basis of unofficial returns, had 25,484 votes. Hanson had 25,355 votes in the four-county race for the nomination. Reports from 374 of the state's 898 precincts also showed "John" Glastby, 49-year-old farmer with 268-acre farm and Omar Mize, farmer, 2,002.

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Refrigeration To Play Role In Space Life

BURLINGTON, Vt., Aug. 13 (UPI)—A Vermont physiologist today proposed refrigeration as a protection for space travelers against cosmic radiation.

The scientist, Prof. Jevon M. Radcliffe, said research has shown that hypothermia—the cooling of living things to temperatures far below normal—protects them from many of the hazards of space flight.

These hazards include the regions of intense radiation now known to exist between the Earth and the far reaches of space.

Certainly to protect Radcliffe gave his ideas in a paper prepared for the first international congress of radiation protection at the University of Vermont.

"We may presume with certainty," he wrote, "that in this era of his paper, the role of refrigeration will play a prominent role against living cosmic radiation."

The Yugoslav paper was one of several papers in the congress on the subject of protecting living things from ionizing radiation, whether from atomic bomb X-radiation, power plants, medical X-radiation, or the rays bombarding the Earth from outer space.

Other scientists reported that—A synthetic substance could reduce the amount of radiation a person can receive without dying. A pill as small as a vitamin tablet and could only a few days' treatment and a pill can give a minimum protection for about an hour.

—Reduction of oxygen can reduce a person's sensitivity to radiation damage. This may be accomplished by administration of oxygen-consuming drugs and by lowering the person's state of oxygen by means of alcohol, oxygen derivatives, or drug-induced hypoxia.

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Korean Anniversary Shows Asians, too, Seek to Be Free

SEOUL, Aug. 13 (UPI)—Among the half of the human race living in the Far and Middle East, the great significance of the tenth anniversary of the Republic of Korea, Friday, is its proof that democracy as a way of life can be just as genuine and meaningful for Asians as for Americans and Europeans.

American policy faces no more difficult problem than how to help swing the Oriental masses away from dictatorship and into free democracy. It is precisely on this question that the tenth anniversary of the Republic of Korea takes on its most impressive significance.

On the southern half of this war-torn, tormented peninsula, a beacon of hope has been lighted for all the varied peoples of Asia, who share memories of a long, lost glorious antiquity and a more recent colonial subervience—and who now confront the challenge of how to live in a world of dizzy change and puzzling technology.

The biggest question confronting humanity today is the future of the Far East. Forty years ago Nikolai Lenin was preaching that the com-

unist conquest of the world depends first of all upon the domination of Asia. Countering this Moscow aim, genuine democracy has at last been implanted—in the Republic of Korea—in the vast Asian continent.

What is happening here will affect the climate of life in all the areas around.

Comparisons are invidious. Yet what our American-Korean partnership is accomplishing here can only be fully understood in perspective of the whole Far and Middle East.

From Jakarta to Cairo, human dignity has been crushed for centuries by poverty and its handmaid—insurance and political oppression. In India, Nehru is making a noble effort to build democratic foundations—but democracy cannot take firm root among a people beset by hopeless poverty and intractable illiteracy.

In Japan, many of the forms of democracy have taken—in large part, upbraided by Gen. Douglas MacArthur's benevolent military dictatorship in the postwar years.

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6 Geneticists Say Man Will Not Slay Self

BURLINGTON, Vt., Aug. 13 (UPI)—Six eminent geneticists said today that man probably can't wipe himself out with nuclear war. All he can do is get his race back one thousand years.

The geneticists, from five different countries, are attending the first international radiation research conference at the University of Vermont, reproduction to suffer.

Dr. H. J. Muller, Indiana University, who long ago discovered that radiation causes deleterious changes in the reproductive germ cells, led a discussion with his colleagues.

Some scientists have predicted that all-out nuclear war would wipe out the human race—leaving the earth to animals less sensitive to radiation.

Muller and his associates doubted that. But they said human reproductive cells would suffer grievous damage from nuclear radiation enough to make it so that it would take the race 1,000 years to become as sound again genetically as it is today.

Forecast Made
What the geneticists forecast, if all-out nuclear war occurs, is roughly this:
—Millions killed by blast, heat and radiation. More millions damaged so that they could not reproduce. Other millions genetically damaged but able to produce defective children.
—Some years after the war, with food and shelter at a premium, men would fight like beasts for the few scraps of life. The fittest only would survive over the long haul.

Fitted Not Good
—But even those "fittest" would not be very fit by present standards. Their genes, or reproductive cells, would have been changed long since for the worse.

But over the ensuing years, if no more genetic disasters occur, the race gradually would pick up its inferior hereditary qualities and, perhaps in ten centuries, arrive back at the state of reproductive health where it is now.

More than four million persons, or 10 per cent of the U.S. working population are engaged in some form of selling.

The Sputnik carrier will be visible twice tonight. The first time it will appear to be at 9:11 p. m. over northeastern Canada. It will be visible over the area northeast of a line from northwest Illinois to northeast North Carolina. It will disappear over the North Atlantic at 8:18 p. m.

The second appearance will take place west of Hudson bay at about 10:54 p. m. The glowing carrier will be visible over the area northeast of a line extending from northwest Utah to Florida. It will pass out of sight over southern New Jersey.

Indians Made Error, Customs Inspection Ordeal Bears Out

By HAL BOYLE

NEW YORK, Aug. 13—One of the greatest mistakes made by the American-Indians was their failure to set up customs posts all along the Atlantic coast shortly after Columbus first landed.

If that they did so they could have checked the mass emigration from Europe to a dribble, and they still own most of the continent. But, no, they chose to fight the white man with weapons instead of the law's disciplines and look what happened to them!

But the custom of customs inspection has spread now throughout the world. If the ordeal of traveling abroad today lies in going through customs — or, rather, in waiting to go through.

The elements of the situation are always the same: (a) The customs inspector tries as long as possible to keep you from entering his country. You try to get past him and into the country as soon as possible.

1. Tell the customs man you are a secret courier from Washington, D. C. sent to expedite a notice to his country. To make it more plausible, offer to lend him a buck.
2. If you are in France, whisper that your wife is enroute. The French, who are crazy about their French, will rush her to a hospital— from which you remove her to a hotel. If you want to attend the

Folies Bergere, you might even leave her in the hospital overnight.

3. Speaking just a few words in his native tongue is often helpful. "I know the customs man; you are really interested in his Britain, however, where they distrust any Americans who speak English.
4. Never bribe a customs agent yourself to speed up his inspection. Let your wife do it. It's cheaper. Women can always get more for their money.
5. Never brag you've got influence. They'll know you're lying. People with real influence don't have to announce it. It goes ahead of them like waves.
6. Faint. When the customs agent picks you up, faint again. After he's glad to stamp your baggage just to get rid of you.
7. After you've outwitted the customs agents of half a dozen foreign countries, cover the red tape on your return home.

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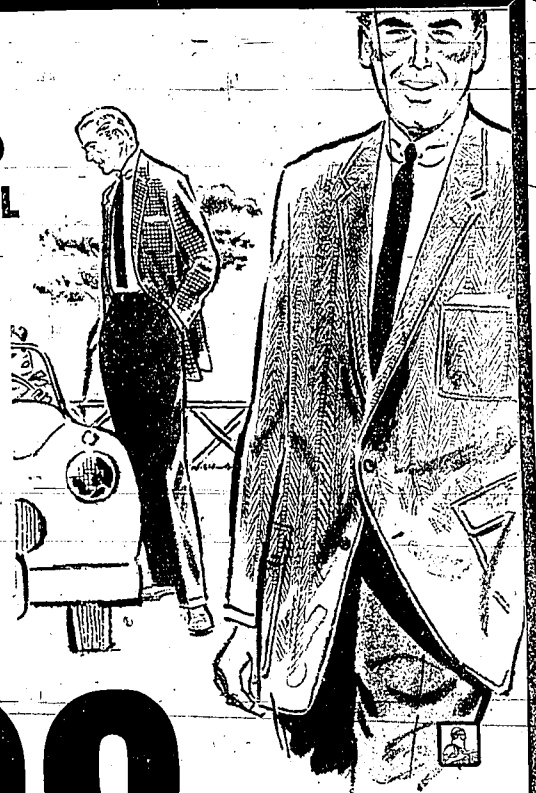

West's Range Grazing Said Best in Years

DENVER, Aug. 12 (U) - Western range and pastures are providing the best summer grazing since 1920, the U. S. agriculture department reported yesterday.

Adequate moisture and cool temperatures during the past month generally improved range feed over the entire plains area from the median line north through the Texas panhandle.

Feed still available

There was a sharp decline, however, in grazing conditions west of the continental divide with the exception of California.

Plenty of dry, cured feed still is available in that region, but it is necessary to stop deterioration on high level ranges, replenish stock water and reduce the loss of livestock in anticipation of fall marketing of calves and lambs from the interior and Pacific northwest regions may be earlier than expected.

Best condition for range

The agriculture department rated the condition of range feed Aug. 12 at 84 per cent of normal, compared with 80 last month, 83 last year and an average of 79 per cent.

The department said there was considerable improvement for fall delivery of calves during the past month. Prices were strong on calves and light yearlings, but late deals on 2-year-olds generally carried lower quotations.

Drugs cure or prevent mental illness, by correcting chemical faults within the brain or body. Brain research has fathomed mysteries of the chemical-electrical workings of the brain and its faculties.

Cancer no longer holds any terror. Some drugs kill or weaken cancerous cells. Other drugs halt cancerous growth, preventing them from ever getting worse or dangerous.

So people live out healthy normal lives. Average lifespan now is 100 years. Some oldtimers are still having a ball at nearly 150.

Heart disease is conquered. Medical scientists can tell you how to eat and live to prevent coronary heart attacks.

Biological breakthroughs also make it possible for you to get a new heart, glands, skin, kidneys or lungs when your own organs become damaged or worn out. Living tissue from healthy persons killed in accidents can be transplanted to repair your own body.

Some people are born with a defect in their hearts, placed in their chests, operating in perfect harmony.

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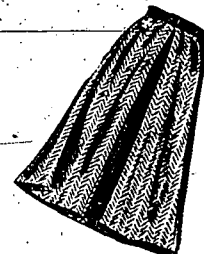
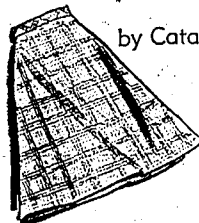
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Japanese Expect Population of Tokyo To Be 14 Million by 1975; Plans Made

TOKYO, Aug. 13 (UPI)—Two Japanese planning experts said today Tokyo's population will number 14,000,000 persons by 1975. They described a scheme to resettle 2,700,000 residents in selected areas 15 to 50 miles beyond the center of Tokyo, but this would still leave the Japanese capital with 11,300,000 inhabitants.

The planners, Prof. Eichi Isomura, Tokyo Metropolitan Institute of Planning, and Genji Okumura, an official of the national capital region redevelopment commission, described the United Nations seminar on regional planning in Tokyo. Isomura and Okumura pointed out that at the end of World War II Tokyo had only 2,500,000 residents. They estimated that in the space of 30 years—by 1975—the city will have absorbed a dispiriting 11,000,000 new inhabitants. The plan calls for more apartment houses and multi-story office buildings to open up space in approved areas of the horizontal Tokyo area of farmlands and parks to serve as a haven outside Tokyo and beyond that a series of independent industrial towns.

The plan establishes a capital region extending for 60 miles from Tokyo station. By way of comparison greater London stretches 90 miles from Charing cross.

The region would be alloted into three rings, the first with a 10-mile radius from Tokyo station. This is the greater Tokyo area, core of the capital region, with industrial and residential sections.

The planners figure the population will soar from 8,700,000 today to 14,000,000 by 1975. But if they are accurate in predicting a couple of million inhabitants in the outer reaches of the capital region, greater Tokyo would then have 11,000,000 inhabitants.

The second ring, six miles wide, would be a "green belt" area. Its purpose would be to prevent further urban sprawl and give Tokyo citizens a sort of rural refuge.

The third ring, approximately 40 miles wide, would be another industrial-residential area. But this would include independent industrial towns with sources of employment within their area, not dormitory towns for Tokyo business and industrialists.

The planners estimate that the outer two rings will have 12,300,000 to 15,000,000 inhabitants by 1975, depending on the success of their redevelopment program.

The planning commission is now programming a more precise redevelopment plan for Tokyo. Isomura and Okumura said it has already budgeted, in its first two-year operation, more than 113 million dollars for roads, parks, housing, flood prevention, subways, water supply and other projects.

But as any resident of Tokyo can tell you, a lot more work is required. At the beginning of July, the city was gripped by the worst drought since the 19th century and its water supply proved pitifully inadequate. By the end of July, large sections of Tokyo were mopping up after typhoons which flooded a mournful commentary of flood prevention work.

In addition, the planners said white sections of Tokyo are still blighted by "clouds of small wooden barracks" that sprang up after the war. They added that redevelopment of many damaged areas still is only the half-way effective, 13 years after the half-way effective, 13 years after the war.

Only one-fifth of the city has sewage disposal facilities. The roads are in "an aggravated condition," in the words of Isomura and Okumura. Public and private transport lines, choked beyond their capacities with 10,000,000 to 12,000,000 cars a day, are inadequate.

To cope with this, the planners said, a five-man national capital region redevelopment commission with a state minister as its chairman is trying to put into effect a short-range 10-year program and a "master plan" that would require at least a quarter-century to execute.
