Kierdorf Says He's Innocent

PONTIAC, Mich., Aug. 18 (AP)—Herman Kierdorf, former Teamster Union official, said today he has no recollection of the death of his unionist nephew, George, who was killed last night and said: "I have nothing to hide."

Other than that his most frequent contact in interviews with police and newspaper today was "no contact."

The 47-year-old ex-convict and business agent for a Pontiac, Mich., drive-in restaurant was arrested last night.

"I'm happy to have it over, but I don't like to cooperate, but I don't think I could be convicted," he said.

Kierdorf, who vanished Aug. 4, was last seen when he had hired a car to go to a woman's home.

He was sought on a warrant charging him with possession of a gun and a check for \$2,000.

He was arrested at a Pontiac hospital with a bullet wound in the body. Frank died four days later.

Initial sponsors were Norway, Canada, Colombia and Denmark. Others were expected to join later. The United States and Britain, although not formal sponsors, had a leading part in drafting the proposal and were expected to give U. N. support.
