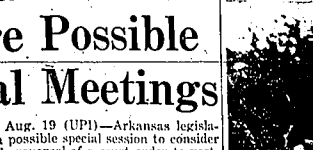

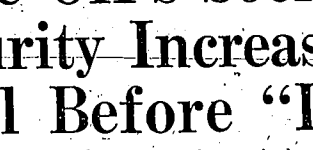

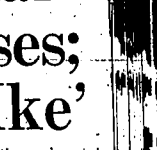

U. S. Rejects Charge Over Air Violation

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (UPI)—The United States has quickly rejected a Russian charge that an American jet plane deliberately violated Soviet air-space, it was learned today.

The rejection was dispatched to Moscow during the past few days. The state department had not made a public and apparently did not intend to do so.

It was not clear why the American government had not made a public statement. It was reported that the United States did not want to ruffle Soviet feelings, but that the United States was working to settle the matter in working order.

The Soviet Union delivered its protest July 20. It charged that an American jet plane violated Soviet air-space on July 17. The reconnaissance version of the four-turbine jet engine was reported to have been in the air over the Caspian sea area.

Man's knowledge of the universe moved ahead with the years.

(1) Nicolaus Copernicus (1473-1543), of Poland, was repelled by the complicated, earth-centered Ptolemaic universe which had been accepted as truth for centuries. From his observations, Copernicus came to the conclusion that Earth was just another planet, rotating on its axis and revolving about the sun. The sun, and not Earth, was the center of the universe.

(2) The Italian Giordano Bruno (1548-1600) was not an astronomer, but a philosopher. Herald of the modern age of science, he extended the Copernican system. He proclaimed that not only Earth, but the sun and all its planets were only a tiny part of the universe. For such heresy he was burned at the stake.

(3) Tycho Brahe (1546-1601) built the first observatory in the western world, on an island off his native Denmark. Brahe was a great observer and contributed much to astronomy. But he was never able to accept Copernicus' theory.

(4) Brahe's assistant, Johannes Kepler (1571-1630) of Austria, demolished the old Greek astronomy of perfect circular orbits for planets. His mathematics laid the groundwork for Newton's law of gravitation (1666-1687) which built the first astronomical telescope and was amazed when he turned it toward the moon. He was the first man to see a heavenly body as it really was. And he declared that Copernicus was right—the Earth did indeed move about the sun. But as an old man he was forced to recant his theories. It was for a later age to recognize his genius.

Sleepy Sickness Strikes in East

TOKYO, Aug. 18 (AP)—Deadly sleeping sickness—encephalitis—on the rise again in Japan and Korea, and health officials say it may reach epidemic proportions in the next few months.

Authority Thinks Law Will Cut Out Quickie Divorces

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 19 (AP)—An authority predicted yesterday that a new state divorce law will become a thing of the past as more and more states adopt the uniform divorce recognition act.

The prediction was made by James C. Dendard, Portland, Ore., president of the national conference of commissioners on uniform state laws.

Dendard named Nevada, Idaho and Florida as the states where quickie divorces are most prevalent.

General Norstad Reports Progress Is Being Made in NATO Talk on Missiles

PARIS, Aug. 19 (UPI)—General Lauris Norstad, supreme allied commander for Europe, said today that "satisfactory progress" is being made in discussions with the NATO countries concerning the establishment in Europe of intermediate range ballistic missiles.

In an exclusive interview the youthful looking war-time air force commander also said he is confident that when the new weapons are available, satisfactory sites will be ready for their reception.

"Furthermore," he added, "in the case of IRBM's, because their range, great latitude is available to us in their siting."

He was convinced that, as the heads of government, as their December meeting, discuss the establishment of IRBM sites in NATO territory, because they are necessary for the defense of NATO, each country in the list analysis will do what is necessary in its own defense, and to contribute to NATO defense.

"This confidence is based on my recognition that these new weapons will make a significant contribution to the deterrent, and therefore to our first task the preservation of peace, and also will make a contribution to our second task, the defense of the people and territories of NATO."

Establishment in Europe of the IRBM's, which, in case of a Russian attack would be equipped with nuclear warheads, are considered by SHIAPE planners necessary to the modern evolution of the NATO "shield."

Some of the European countries including France, Denmark and Norway, objected to the establishment of IRBM sites on their territory when the proposal to strengthen the SHIAPE's defensive power with these weapons was made at the Atlantic council meeting last December.

The French did not want the bases established in France unless they had some measure of control over use of the missiles. This would involve congressional modification of the law restricting to the President alone the right to determine when American nuclear weapons would be used.

Chick Production Is Above Average During July, 1958

BOISE, Aug. 19 (UPI)—Chick production in Idaho's commercial hatcheries last month was more than one-third above the 1957 average for July, the U. S. department of agriculture reported today.

The department said that last month the output was 200,000 chicks, which was 10 per cent higher than July of 1957 and 34 per cent higher than the 5-year average for the month.

Chicks hatched for broiler production accounted for about 87 per cent of the total hatch compared to 79 per cent in July of 1957. Broiler chicks hatched in the first seven months this year amounted to 1,350,000 chicks, compared to 1,292,000 in the same period last year.

The USDA said that egg-type chicks hatched through July of 1958 totaled 1,204,000 chicks, which was an increase of five per cent over last year.

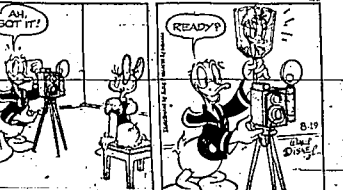

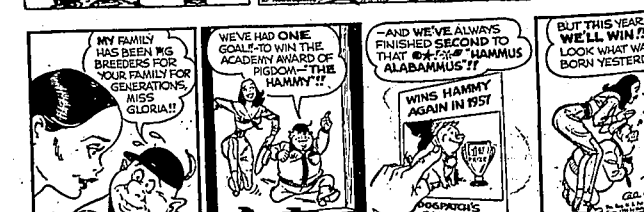
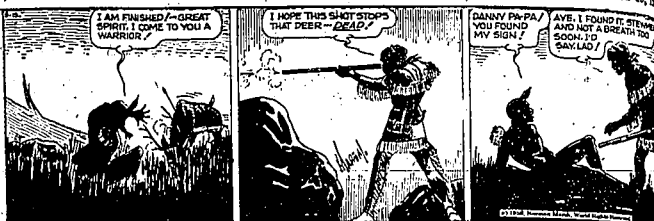

General Election Talk in Air For Britain; Fall Vote Likely

LONDON, Aug. 10 (UPI)—General election talk is in the air in Britain. The opposition is becoming more and more convinced that Prime Minister Harold Macmillan will probably call an election in October. Macmillan is riding high in the polls at the moment. His personal prestige is at its peak. The Labour party is sending the nation to the polls. The result, they fear, would be another victory for Macmillan's ruling Conservatives.

The prime minister has done nothing to back the general election. On the contrary, he has said repeatedly he is not even thinking of a general election. It is clear he would not consider them before October or 1959-60. The Labour Party Secretary Morgan Phillips refused to take the government's denials at their face value.

Labour party headquarters has been warned that the Conservatives will launch a public battle and billboards throughout the country for mid-September. Labour already has recorded a "roll call" for victory, 1959-60 message for districts throughout the country.

Conservative spokesmen do not deny the preparations for a big party membership drive scheduled to get underway Sept. 10.

It is generally agreed that the political tide has also shifted in Macmillan's favor if he does appear to the country in the next few weeks.

When Macmillan took over from Sir Anthony Eden, the debate, the Conservative party's fortunes had

plummeted to rock bottom. As a result he was regarded as only a stop-gap premier at best.

An economic crisis in the fall of 1957, which culminated in the verge of bankruptcy and resulted in a series of by-election disasters for the Conservatives.

But in recent months the situation has changed abruptly. The nation's finances are back on the rails. The bank rate—upped to 10 percent in the summer—has brought the price—back to four-and-a-half percent and may be slashed still further.

Federal Appeal Judges' Ruling Slams South's Delay in Schools' Integration

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (AP)—Federal appeal judges have dealt a shattering blow to attempts in the South to delay or prevent public school integration by mob protests or violence. Last June a federal district judge in Arkansas, Harry J. Lumley, ordered the integration of Little Rock's Central high school to be delayed 2 1/2 years. Yesterday he was overruled by the 8th U.S. circuit court of appeals in St. Louis.

This circuit court not only ordered the integration of Negroes in Central high to continue, but issued a binding writ to the state that mob violence could block a federal court order. The Little Rock school board which had sought the delay of integration, and got it from Lumley...

using his national guardmen to keep Negro children out of the high school. By this time there was mob violence. He could have used the guardmen to back up the court order. Since he did the opposite, it became plain that—if he got away with it—any Southern governor could do the same and nullify federal court orders. So, to preserve the authority of the courts, President Eisenhower ordered in federal troops. Negro children then got into Central high. But the troops were kept there until the end of the school year.

But if mob violence and tension in Little Rock could force a delay in a federal court's integration order, then it could be assumed mob violence and tension could be employed anywhere in the South to get the same result. But the circuit court, in overruling Lumley, refused to recognize mob violence as an excuse for delaying a court order to integrate a public school. Judge Martin C. Mathias, writing the majority opinion, said: "The issue plainly comes down to the question of whether over public resistance, including mob protest, constitutes sufficient cause to nullify an order of the federal court directing the school board to proceed with its integration."

The answer given at the justice department was such prosecutions involved the question of whether federal law had been violated and, further, the department was deferring to Rock authorities to take such action.
