Arab Nations Okay Middle East Peace Proposals for U.N.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Aug. 21 (UP)—The Arab countries, including pro-western Lebanon and Jordan, today gave their final approval to a Middle East peace formula expected to bring a quick end to the emergency session of the U. N. general assembly. The plan, agreed tentatively yesterday in a full demonstration of Arab harmony, appeared headed for unanimous adoption in the 81-nation assembly. The heads of the 10 Arab delegations agreed at a private meeting this morning to submit the four-point resolution on Monday to a U. N. conference in overnight consultations.

The plan was an Arab modification of a Western-backed resolution now pending before the assembly, and both contained key points suggested by Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld and President Eisenhower.

The Arab resolution, shied away from specific endorsement of earlier proposals for either a U. N. police force or more U. N. observers in the Middle East.

Like the previous resolution, the Arab proposal on Hammarskjöld to make arrangements that would permit withdrawal of U. S. troops from Lebanon and British forces from Jordan.

A new feature, a reaffirmation of the Arab nations' previous pledges not to interfere in each other's affairs, pledged which the Lebanese and Jordanian governments had charged President Nasser's United Arab Republic with ignoring commitments.

The plan was called to the Arab capitals for approval. It is expected to be adopted by the assembly on Monday.

M. Derr of Clark Fork captured his party's nomination by a margin of 133 votes over State Sen. I. Max Hanson, Fairfield, who opposed his gambling platform. Official returns from all 44 counties gave Derr 25,000 votes and Hanson 25,000.

The Republican candidate is Gov. Robert E. Smyth, who had no opposition in the Aug. 12 primary.

Living Costs Go Down First Time In Over 2 Years

NEW YORK, Aug. 21 (UPI)—The cost of living fell for the first time in more than two years, the national industrial conference board reported today.

The decline is a slight one-tenth of one percent—marks the first break in the cost-of-living spiral that began in 1955 after almost three years of price stability.

The decline is attributed to a combination of factors, including a decrease in housing and apparel costs.

Another Try for Satellite Halted At Florida Base

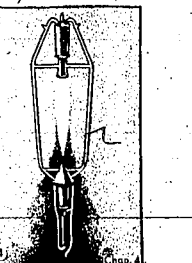

OUTWARD TO THE STARS (4)—Rocket Pioneers

By Don Oakley and Ralph Lane



(1) The story of space now turns to rockets. Known to the Chinese possibly as early as the 13th century, by the 15th they were employed as weapons. In Europe, however, rockets were merely used as fireworks until the late 18th century. Then the Englishman William Congreve developed an artillery rocket. During the Napoleonic wars military rockets reached a high point, then fell into disuse. The "rockets" red again were during the bombardment of St. Mery in 1814 were Congreve rockets.

(2) Space travel was an old dream, and the wisest men knew that rockets offered the only practical form of propulsion. But not until the 1830s was any serious mathematical work done, when the Russian Konstantin Tsiolkovsky first advocated liquid-fueled rockets. He also studied the problems of keeping men alive in space.

(3) In America, Prof. Robert H. Goddard built rockets to probe the upper atmosphere. He was the first to test rockets in the workshop.

(4) Like Tsiolkovsky, Goddard strived for the conclusion that—at that time—liquid rockets were the best source of power. In 1926 he launched the world's first liquid-fueled rocket. Its two-foot-long motor burned for two and a half seconds. The rocket covered a distance of 184 feet at about 60 miles an hour. It has been likened to the Wright brothers' first airplane flight.

In Germany about the same time, the Hungarian-born Hermann Oberth had also hit upon some of the same rocket ideas. His writings sparked the formation of amateur rocket clubs throughout Europe. From one of them, the German Society for Space Travel, was to come the builder of the famous V-2.

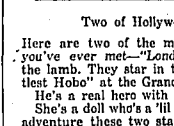

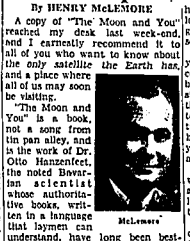

McLemore Suggests Reading Book Explaining About Moon

If you know what complete silence is, for when your head is tucked, there is never a sound in the theater.

The same is true of the moment you clap at the wrong time at a concert. Your ill-timed applause breaks in a silence every bit as still and deep as that which cloaks the moon. The moon silence is better than the silence I have mentioned, because you won't be embarrassed up there. You won't hear the cough, and neither will anyone else.

As for the absence of weather as known to Earth, Dr. Zanzenfeld says anyone who has ever been to England will have no trouble adjusting to the moon's climate.

"No weather is just the opposite of England's, which is all weather," Dr. Zanzenfeld's book fills a spot that needed filling. If your neighborhood bookstore doesn't have it, look for a book dealer outside of your neighborhood. Some non-neighborhood dealers are friendly, too, and don't snap and growl at customers.

It's difficult for the average man, for example, to grasp the great distance that the moon is from Earth, but Dr. Zanzenfeld tells it down to understandable terms.

"The moon is about as far away as you can get from Earth, but from the bottleneck of the tunnel, or bridge, late of a Sunday afternoon, and after you have been driving all day or the railroad station is when you have five minutes to catch a train and your cab is caught in a traffic jam. Maybe not quite as far as the last named, but almost."

The moon is a mirror, but few of us visualize a place completely without air. Not so the Bavarian author-scientist.

"If you have ever attended a high noon wedding in a south Georgia church in July or August when you have been to the moon, you will write, 'The moon is bluish, and so is the church, especially if the bride and groom are popular young folk, and every seat is taken.'"

It's pretty hard for us laymen to grasp a soundless world, but that's what we must have to get used to when we spend our vacations on the moon, for there is no sound on it. Not even a TV commercial can reach you which, come to think of it, may be the prime reason so many people are going to the moon on reservations on the first scheduled rocket.

"Have you ever had to cough at a very dramatic moment in the theater?" asks the doctor. "If you do, you know what it's like."

Russia Throws Out Hints She Would Like Higher Gold Price

LONDON, Aug. 21 (UP)—Soviet hints that she would favor a higher price for gold.

Moscow has refrained from making a definite proposal so far as to what the gold price should be, but merely termed the present level "artificially low."

First Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan was reported as saying that he would make the ruble

a change of the price of gold at this stage for fear that it might unleash inflationary trends.

On the other hand, the non-American gold-producing countries are in favor of a change.

Soviet propaganda has rarely lost time in exploiting any element of conflict in the Western world.

The fact is that Russia has become one of the world's leading gold producers and that she holds quantities of gold second only to the United States. This gives her a special position.

The growing importance of Russia as a gold power was spotlighted in the progressive-appearance in the last two years of large quantities of hammer-and-sickle gold. Considerable gold cargoes were flown from Russia to the West—and sold in London and on European markets.

Latest estimates said that the Soviet has increased her gold output from a mere 5,000,000 ounces pre-war to well over 17,000,000 ounces today. This equals roughly the production of South Africa, one of the world's leading gold producers.

At the same time, Russia has become a large scale gold exporter. Last year she was said to have exported little less than half her

output (7,000,000 ounces); that was twice the amount she exported the year before (1956).

Moscow's gold reserves are a well-guarded secret—best available estimates put them at about one-third of the U. S. reserves and nearly as high as the combined reserves of the rest of the world.

The appearance recently of Soviet gold in European markets has been ascribed to large-scale purchases of Western goods and the replenishment of communist propaganda funds abroad.

Some experts believe the Kremlin now holds sufficient gold to be able to throw world markets into

confusion if its propaganda strategy were to call for it.

But so far its gold transactions have been marked by caution rather than speculative action.

Filipino and U. S. Confab To Linger on

MANILA, Aug. 21 (UPI)—The Manila situation and new tension in Asia have postponed indefinitely formal negotiations between the Philippines and the United States over U. S. military bases in this island republic.

Reliable sources told United Press International that President Carlos P. Garcia has informed Filipino congressional leaders of the reluctance of the United States to formally bring up the matter of the bases at this time.

Agreement Hinted—There were indications here that officials were ready to go along with U. S. desire to avoid a new bases agreement at a time when vital importance to U. S. defense plans.

The U. S. maintains three major bases in the Philippines, which in time of war would be vital to the defense of the western Pacific. They are:

Bases Listed—The main base is Clark field, headquarters of the U. S. 12th air force, as well as an important communication center between the southeast Asia and the Indian ocean.

The naval air bases at Banley and Subic points. The sprawling naval supply and repair installation at Sulu bay, major base for the U. S. seventh fleet.

The past, Philippine-American friction has arisen over these bases mainly due to Filipino demands for more freedom over certain personnel committed by U. S. personnel on and off these bases.

Facies Tabled—Formal talks on the bases broke down in Manila in December, 1956, as the U. S. and Filipino panels failed to reach agreement. There has been congressional pressure here recently for the resumption of these base talks on the same basis.

House Both—However, both President Garcia and U. S. officials here and in Washington were reported to favor "diplomatic level" settlement of outstanding issues on a one-by-one piecemeal basis.

The feeling among American and Filipino officials here was that controversies could best be settled on the spot as they arose and could avoid the chances of stirring up "Oirard type" incidents.

Sack Dresses Causing Stir Within Egypt

CAIRO, Aug. 21 (AP)—You wouldn't have expected the sack dress to kick up any commotion in Egypt, would you?

After all, it has been hanging around, so to speak, for thousands of years. You might even find murals in the oldest tombs forecast the shapelessness of things to come.

But not even Egypt has been able to take the sack. Divorce Asked—A man came into court the other day demanding a divorce and custody of a 11-year-old daughter. He said his wife is a bed influence on the child.

The evidence? "She wears these sack." The case is pending. The venerable interpreters of religious law in the oldest Moslem university in the world, Al Azhar, have been drafted into the argument. They disagree.

One called the sack a calamity. Degree Is Granted—Another noted that religious law expressly forbids tight clothing. On that score, he observed sagely, there could be no complaint against the new garment.

Some of the savants had difficulty picturing a Ph. D. in a chemise. The young lady argued that the sack is only a throwback to the calibane, an equally ambiguous garment that Egyptians have been wearing for centuries.

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Meade Alcorn and Paul Butler Meet in South Dakota Debate

ABERDEEN, S. D., Aug. 21 (UPI)—National Republican committee chairman Meade Alcorn, unleashed a barrage of corruption charges against the Democrats in an unusual face-to-face debate with his Democratic opposite, Paul Butler, last night.

The party leaders met in limited debate before the South Dakota Bar association's annual banquet here. Butler won the flip of a coin and spoke first. Alcorn followed, and then each speaker was allowed five minutes for rebuttal.

Butler opened the debate with a blast at the Eisenhower administration for failure to carry through on campaign promises.

"Perhaps the most brazenly broken promise of all was the famous Eisenhower pledge to reduce crop surpluses to raise farm income and farm prices, and to obtain for the farmer his full parity, 100 per cent parity with a guarantee in price supports of 90 per cent," Butler said.

He said the administration farm policy the biggest national calamity suffered by any one economic group within our population.

Alcorn, in his opening remarks, defended the integrity of the Eisenhower administration and said 220 separate scandals were uncovered during the administration of Harry Truman.

"There has not been a single indictment, trial or conviction of even one official of the Eisenhower administration," Alcorn said.

He said the internal revenue service in particular was "shot-through with graft and corruption at the very top" during the Truman administration.

Butler replied that the issue of morality in government has been "routinely, ruthlessly and hypocritically exploited by Eisenhower and his coterie."

"And of course," Butler said, "the chief moraler of them all was Ike's assistant and Bernard J. Goldfine's helper, Sherman Adams."

Alcorn replied to Butler's charges of broken promises by saying that "U. S. agriculture faced more serious difficulties than any other sector of the economy in making the transition from war to peace."

He said that despite the difficulties, "agriculture in the nation and in South Dakota particularly has staged a tremendous comeback in the past year."

He charged the Democratic 85th congress with allowing the farm is voted before adjournment, the damage had already been done.

Butler said the record of the 85th congress was "one of the most corruptive of any congress in the nation's history."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—Labor reform—and what congress failed to do about it—is now a full-blown campaign issue in the 1958 congressional elections.

Democrats and Republicans will blame each other for what didn't come to pass. But the fact is neither side looks pretty in this one.

President Eisenhower has already called to the defense of his Republicans with a statement. This is how it started and ended:

"Last January Eisenhower proposed a result of disclosures by the senate racketeering committee—a 12-point labor reform program.

'Slits' Urged As Protection For Students

Children about to enter the first grade probably should receive booster shots for diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, advises Mrs. Knight, supervising nurse of the southcentral district health department.

In addition, she notes, school children should be protected against all ages diseases by vaccination from scarlet fever, measles, mumps, diphtheria and tetanus.

"Most children have had diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus shots when babies, but the effects of booster shots are necessary for the protection gradually wears off," Mrs. Knight said.

Parents are urged to check with their family doctors before their children start to school.

Smallpox vaccinations should be completed.

"When protection against preventable diseases is established, there are still diseases such as the common cold, fevers and others which should keep a child out of school," Mrs. Knight adds.

"Keeping a child out of school when he's really sick is the best way to help him, but these little diseases stay little and are not passed around," she notes.

Mrs. Knight points out that first grade is not the only children for whom immunization is necessary.

Booster shots for diphtheria and tetanus and vaccination against smallpox should be repeated every five years or given at about age 10 and repeated at about age 15.

Polio vaccine can be given at any age, Mrs. Knight says anyone who has not previously had three shots should have them now.

She notes that doctors advise that an entire series of three shots be completed.

The southcentral district health department, with headquarters in Boise, serves all residents within city limits and residents in the following areas: Cassia, Lincoln, Blaine and Minidoka counties.

Twin Falls county residents outside of the city are not served by the district.
