## Way for 49th State Record Vote Clears

### For GOP; Issue to Be U.S. Economy

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (UP)—President Eisenhower said today he will campaign for a Republican congress this year on the issue of reducing the government deficit. Eisenhower told his news conference he is going to stress in campaign talks the necessity for cutting the deficit and putting the economy on a sound, healthy basis. The president gave no indication of how he expects campaigning he expects to do. He said he had not promised, for instance, to campaign in New York.

As a preliminary to voting his own views on reducing the deficit, Eisenhower said he will study every major item of a forthcoming governmental budget that can be put for the benefit of America.

In response to a question, he said he had no comment at the moment on the possibility of a tax increase.

It is doubtful that he has made any speaking commitments, but in a discussion of the New York campaign, Eisenhower said the New York (Continued on Page 2, Column 3)

### Hanson Aides Are Checking Primary Votes

FATMIDLE, Aug. 27 (UP)—State Sen. Hanson said today he would not make up his mind whether to ask for a recount of votes for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination until his aides finish checking reported "irregularities" in the vote.

Returns as certified by the state board of canvassers yesterday showed that Hanson lost the nomination to State Sen. A. M. Derr of Clark Fork by 122-votes, the closest margin in the state. Hanson's aides present primary laws were adopted in 1957.

Irregularities Required

Hanson had indicated he might ask for a recount under a law passed by the 1957 legislature. The law provides for a test recount in 10 precincts with at least 2,500 votes. The law also provides that, if a state recount is ordered, a state recount is ordered.

Hanson noted in a prepared statement that "there are only about 40 precincts in the state large enough from which you can choose three voters to check under the law."

The Fatmidle farmer said reports indicate that some precincts do not live in Idaho were permitted to vote and that ballots were improperly handled by election officials.

O'Connell, and John Johnson, former mayor of Twin Falls. Babcock obtained a conviction in both cases. When Johnson obtained a second trial after Babcock's term of office expired he was elected as special prosecutor and again obtained a conviction.

"The central committee believes it is fortunate to have an opportunity to support such a qualified candidate for the office of prosecuting attorney," Walker said.

BOISE, Aug. 27 (UPI)—The Idaho attorney general today asked the district court to dismiss an action brought by a labor group to temporarily enjoin the secretary of state from certifying the proposed right-to-work law for the November election ballot.

Assistant Attorney-General Edward Aschenbrenner and William Anderson argued before Judge M. Oliver Koelch that the petitioner, United Labor for Idaho, could not ask for an injunction because it could not show it was injured and that the complaint showed insufficient facts to constitute a cause of action.

George Greenfield, Boise attorney representing United Labor for Idaho, contended that there were facts stated to constitute a basis for action and that the issues raised by the suit were not immaterial and errors were obvious on the face of the right-to-work law.

After hearing arguments by both sides, Judge Koelch recessed the matter until the next day.

To hear the arguments, the court granted two organizations the right to work issue on the ballot, and the Idaho Council for Industry and Commerce is opposed to such legislation.

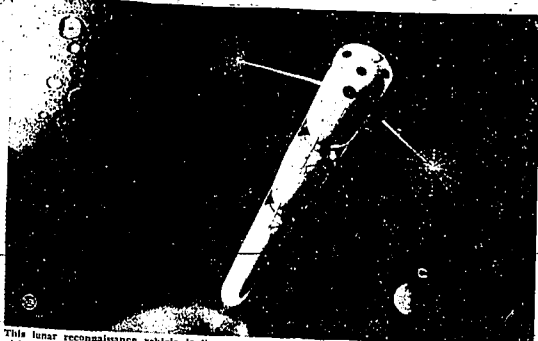

### Next War Might Be for Moon Control, Could Be Fought in Space or on Moon

WASHINGTON (UPI)—For whatever control this may afford, the next war may be fought in space or on the moon.

Top military experts and scientists are working on specific, top secret projects preparing for eventual control of the moon and the possibility that there could be some conflict in achieving that control.

The conviction of defense chiefs that eventual control of the moon means control of the earth is behind the moon exercises of the army and air force to begin plotting "military rockets" to the moon.

Intelligence reports indicate that the Russians place the same premium on getting to the moon with nuclear rockets, and eventually controlling it.

Proof of intense Soviet interest in moon exploration and moon control has been revealed by Lieut. Gen. D. L. Putt, air force chief of development. He told legislators:

"In February, 1956, an extraordinary and extensive conference on the problems of physics of the moon was held at Lexington State University. One of the principal topics was that of the size of the moon's surface. From 1953 to 1955 scientists did a prodigious amount of data analysis on the dynamics of flight to the moon. This is probably somewhat more work in this area than the U. S. has done."

Public announcements and other intelligence on Russian space-missile progress also reveal their preoccupation with the moon.

Putt, air force chief, said that it could get to the moon with some kind of marking device this year. Air force experts have said that an intermediate range "Tos missile with a Vanguard second stage would do the trick."

The army says that some arrangement of Jupiter IRBM's, the missile which put Explorer I into space, could get to the moon.

In addition to these specific projects in the hardware since there are dozens of other lunar programs in various degrees of progress.

There is a reliable report that the army has let specific contracts for "moon jeeps," small surface vehicles for travel on the moon, and on the planets, perhaps. Obviously this is a top-secret effort. Advance studies are now being made on the possibility of adapting conventional weapons to some type of combat in space. This is to determine how they would be affected by the extremes of temperature and weightlessness, for example.

Speaking of the need to get to the moon and control it, air force chief of staff, Gen. Thomas White says:

"If we don't do it, it's obvious that someone else will. Control of the moon and other space reconnaissance satellites will certainly be a means of getting warning of hostile activity toward the U. S. We must not only be able to move in space but be able to stay in space for long periods."

General Putt is more specific about the need to control the moon:

"The moon appears to be of such significance that we should not let another nation establish a military

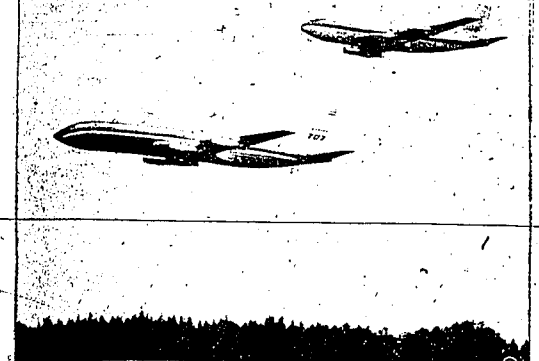

## Launching of Commercial Jet Airline Service Marks Man's New Flight Era

WASHINGTON (NEA)—The launching of commercial jet airline service in the U. S. within a few months will mark a startling victory in man's fight against the natural hazards of travel through the air. The victory will be furnished, however, by the lagging flight against man-made hazard of the air. And its recent crash of an air force jetliner in which six newsmen were killed demonstrates that aeronautical science is still short of building a crash-proof flyer machine.

### Separation of Politics From Judges Asked

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 27 (UPI)—A resolution approved by the American Bar Association today called for removal of appointment of federal judges from politics. The body debated the issue was held last and approved yesterday by members of the house of delegates at the ABA's 81st annual convention.

As approved, the proposal called for appointment of federal judges by the President according to qualifications and not because of political favoritism.

Proposals for nomination should originate in an independent commission established as an agency of the President to advise with the President on appointments, and to receive from outside sources and from all segments of the organization suggestions of names of persons deemed highly qualified for appointment as judges in their respective jurisdictions, the resolution stated.

The modern jet airliner. In spite of this, it still regarded by the experts as the most successful defiance of the law of gravity yet achieved. The jet passenger plane will employ the most sophisticated navigation techniques ever created for conquering the winds, darkness, icing and storm clouds—the prime dangers of the atmosphere.

Thus, this jet passenger age will permit American travelers to explore the naturally inhospitable environment of the air to their destinations faster and more comfortably than ever before.

But while the American traveler begins enjoying this partial triumph over nature, the bitter struggle goes on to solve the problems created by the obstacles that man himself places in the sky. They include not only an incredible array of military and civilian aircraft, but such things as missiles, target drones, rockets, bombers, helicopters, sky-scrapers and gigantic TV towers.

All of these are part of today's crisis in air traffic, a crisis which will be aggravated as jet airliners pour into the skyways.

Man crashing into man in the air because of this clutter has already killed about 150 persons over the U. S. this year. Military figures included in this total are approximately 200 persons.

The air force jet-United crash over Las Vegas and the Capital Air force jet crash over Brunswick, Md., swell both the civilian and military totals close to the record set in 1956. That year there were 128 deaths in the Grand canyon mid-air crash of two commercial airliners. It made the total military-civilian air collision death total about 200 persons.

For the past several years there has been a growing number of near misses in the air, which now average close to 1,000 per year.

Thus, in recent years about three-quarters of all air deaths reported by the civil aeronautics board resulted from air collisions. Ten years ago, CAB reports, less than one per cent of air deaths were from this cause.

The Grand canyon tragedy told the safety officials in realizing that the need for better air traffic control was paramount. Less than half of all military-civilian flights was then controlled by specific rules, enforced from the ground.

The first unit spinning into production. Final phases of construction continued at top speed during the simple, history-making ceremony. "In spite of all the roadblocks put in our path by public-opposed or nothing advocates, we have reached our first goal," Roach said. "We have made good our promise to efficiently and economically harness the Snake at Brownlee and provide a new source of power so urgent it needed not only by our own but by service area but the entire Pacific Northwest as well."  
With Brownlee's three other units on the line by December, the utility president said, "we will throw our entire effort into completing Oxbow dam by 1940."  
Construction of Oxbow, a 180,000-kilowatt hydro project, is under way 12 miles downstream from Brownlee. The company's Hells canyon dam, which will have an initial capacity of 272,000 kilowatts, will be built an additional 23 miles downstream on completion of Oxbow.  
Brownlee, one of the Northwest's biggest hydro projects, was started in November, 1935. It includes unique and original, multimillion-dollar right-of-way facilities designed to protect downstream runs of salmon and steelhead fingerlings and feature a plastic and wire-mesh dam, 2,800 feet long and 120 feet deep, as well as elaborate trapping installations. Some 2,400 men were employed at the peak of Brownlee construction, which has been accomplished in a shorter time than is usually required for a project of its magnitude.

### Labor Day Thoughts Causing Auto Insurance Firm Shivers

NEW YORK, Aug. 27 (AP)—The returning vacationer, miking with millions taking to the roads for the King Labor day week-end is sending anticipatory shivers today down the spines of the companies that write auto and personal injury insurance.

Because after the shock and grief at the death and injury that claims every holiday, comes the day of reckoning.

Americans spent three billion dollars last year for auto liability insurance. But the settlements are mounting so high that many no longer are breaking even. The rate is on for even higher insurance rates—just another phase of the inflation story.

Part of the rise in settlement claims comes from the increased cost of patching up injured bodies

and repairing damaged property. These reflect increases in medical, hospital and rehabilitation care, and higher compensation to make up for lost earnings under current wage scales.

Property damage mounts because of such features as wrap around windshields, elaborate fender sections with multiple lighting units, more ornamental and expensive bumpers, and dashboard gadgets galore.

The auto liability companies charge that on top of these rising costs there is a growing tendency to demand higher settlements. They contend that juries grow more liberal

each year, if the matter goes to court instead of being settled by direct negotiation. Higher court awards encourage higher out-of-court settlements.

Insurance firms dislike going to court, not only because of the liberality with insurance company money they charge to today's juries, but also because drawn out court actions tie up their reserves.

A spokesman for the 287-member National Association of Independent Insurers notes that auto insurance men suspect this could be a subconscious factor in making drivers a

little more careless and in making complaints a little more demanding.

The Association of Casualty and Surety companies complains that "very exemplary citizens are under continuous heavy pressure by their friends to exaggerate claims in auto accident cases."

The National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters says its 114 members collectively lost 147 million dollars last year on auto accident settlements. This boiled down to \$116.70 in liability claim costs for each \$100 of premiums earned.

The bureau reports that so far 21 states have granted rate increases on private passenger cars. The bonds range from 1.8 per cent to 33.1 per cent.

At three polling places, 4,178 of the 4,587 persons voting in the special election marked the "yes" item. There were 408 votes cast against the issue.

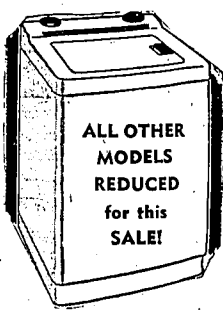

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (UPI)—The position Richard M. Nixon will play in the 1958 GOP campaign is being shown off today by his intervention in the New York state convention.

Heavily Unaware

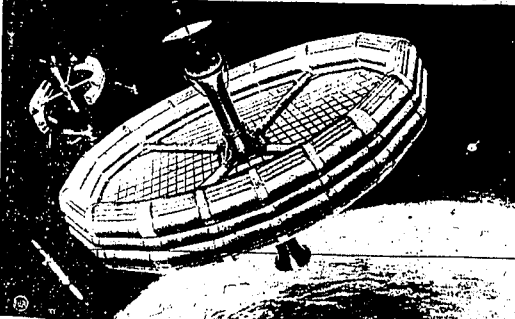
Apparently, not even Presidential Secretary James C. Hagerly fully aware originally of the significance of the quick decision by Nixon—Eisenhower—Keating.

### Payoff Race Involves Reconnaissance Space Satellite in Orbit Around Earth

LOS ANGELES (NEA)—The payoff race into space between the U. S. and Russia in the effort to get out of the space race is being fought in the form of reconnaissance satellite launching, or on other military intelligence of the whole globe.

Each satellite development is far ahead of tremendous psychological and propaganda repercussions around the world, military rocket men admit.

But the next space advance that will count in terms of national security is the launching of a successful reconnaissance satellite, they insist. And they believe the Russians think that this is true, too.

American's front runner in this race is an air force project called Pled Piper, it is being built by the Lockheed missile division in the Palo Alto plant under supervision of Pled Piper.

Work has been pushed on this reconnaissance satellite for close to three years. It has priority for materials and scientific brains higher than the Thor, Atlas or Titan ballistic missiles.

The project is being directed by a group of officers in the air force ballistic missile division here, also under rigid security rules.

The only public reference to it was the admission by Lockheed's missile boss, Eugene Root, to the senate preparedness subcommittee that his firm was working on a "reconnaissance satellite which will orbit and be able to return to earth."

A top air force officer has also referred to Pled Piper as a "fighting satellite." He implied that it has obvious great military value and could be developed into a missile-shooting platform.

### Returning to Earth May Be Space Danger

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 27 (AP)—Commander to earth could hold the commander of blundering space shuttle spacemen, a U. S. air force spokesman reported to the international astronomical federation today.

The danger would result from the spin from the eastward rotation of gravity after the weightlessness of outer space.

This change is apparently tougher on the human system than going on the dragging weight of rocket lift into weightlessness when a ship is flying in space, said Dr. Paul J. von Beckh, Holloman air force base, at Alamogordo, N. M.

Volunteers were photographed and studied as they rode in the rear cockpit of fighters. The planes did out of dives—stimulating the micro-gravity pull of rocket take-off—then arched in weightless flight, then sped up again.

With heavy gravity pulls, the passengers' faces became distorted as by sudden age. The men became confused. Their chests hurt. They felt sick and blocked out. The pilots were protected by gravity suits.

The volunteers said they felt the very effects more keenly after the weightless. Von Beckh, 37, said. Some were experienced jet pilots. Some had never flown before. Defects in circulation, in muscular, and vision, and judgment likely to occur at lower accelerations probably continue longer in space flight than in normal flight.

Beckh added. The astronauts could be fatal, with the uncontrolled space ship turning into burning meteor.

They add that there is a chance it might lead to one nation trying to shoot down an unfriendly reconnaissance satellite as it passes over, which could be the opening shot of space war.

There is conflicting scientific opinion on the difficulty of shooting down a recon satellite.

The full implications of the launching of such reconnaissance space vehicles have not been thought through completely by the country's leaders, it is claimed. For example, countries other than Russia might object to being spied on from space, too, it is pointed out.

Details of Pled Piper's space-age gear and rocket components are top secret, but much information on them has leaked out.

It is said that the satellite will weigh a ton or more and be boosted into space with multi-stage engines having up to one million pounds of thrust.

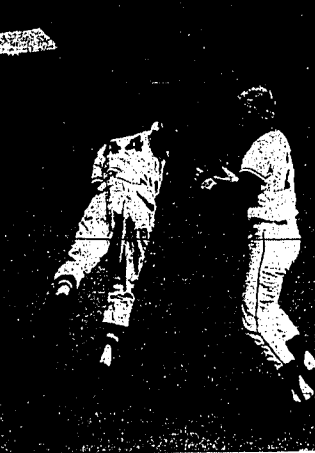
