

President and Justice Group In Agreement

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (UPI)—The White House said today that President Eisenhower and the justice department see eye to eye on the government's stand in the Little Rock integration case before the supreme court.

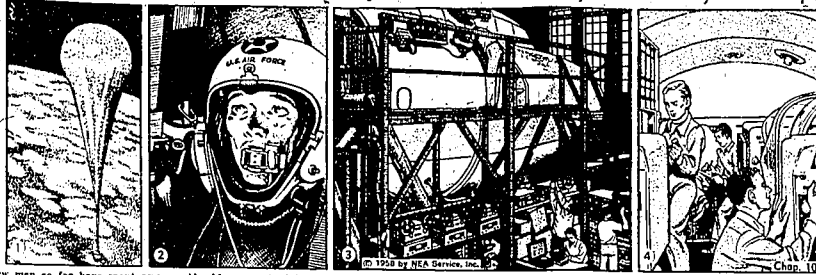
At his news conference yesterday the President said he has never wished to friends that he thought racial integration of public schools should proceed "slowly." But he should define the term or elaborate. And he did not refer to the specific case involving Little Rock's Central high school.

His remarks nevertheless caused segregationists to hope that the government might take a "go slow" attitude at today's court hearing. Instead, it filed a brief denouncing any postponement of integration at Central high.

White House Press Secretary James G. Hargett told reporters that brief did not reflect any divergence of views between the President and the justice department.

Hargett disclosed that the President had conferred with Solicitor General J. Lee Rankin and Deputy Attorney General Lawrence E. Walsh on preparation of the brief before yesterday's news conference. Then at the conference the President told reporters that the brief "would try to reflect the views that all of us . . . have held from the beginning."

OUTWARD TO THE STARS (10)—Loneliness



(1) Few men so far have spent any considerable amount of time in what can be considered space. On Aug. 30, 1957, one man, air force Maj. David G. Simons rode a rocket to a record altitude of 102,000 feet. At that distance 99 per cent of the Earth's atmosphere was below him. He experienced every situation a man in a rocket would have to face, except weightlessness and the initial acceleration—and high-speed re-entry.

(2) A camera inside the balloon capsule took a picture like this of Major Simons. Upon landing the major said that his most striking impression was the feeling of loneliness in space.

(3) To see just how men will be able to live and function inside the confines of a spaceship, the air force has been simulating space voyages for almost four years at a school of aviation medicine at Randolph air force base, Tex. and also at Wright air development center in Dayton, O. Above, at Dayton, a "ground crew" monitors a mock-up spaceship, observing the effects of a five-day isolation test on the "passengers" inside.

(4) In the cramped interior of the cabin, conditions are made to approximate those that will be met in actual space. Tests in one-man chambers have also been conducted. The first space "man" could be a woman, for at least one member of the "weaker" sex has out-performed men in isolation tests at the Wright center.

Achieving fame at Randolph Tech school was Alan Donald G. Farrell, who successfully completed a seven-day "space flight" inside a capsule, breathing an entirely synthetic atmosphere. He was, to all intents and purposes, alone in space.

NOTHING TO BE ASHAMED OF There can be no doubt that the second session of the 85th congress, now concluded, will be put down as one of the most constructive in many years.

This is the congress that voted staidoh for Alaska after others before had dawdled endlessly over the issue.

It voted a record federal budget, fairly constant foreign aid, a 5-billion dollar highway program, a 1.8-billion housing act to spur home building, a 900-million program of student loans and other education aid, a 700-million loan program to aid the troubled railroads, a 7 per cent boost in social security benefits, an extension of the public works program, and a 200-million program to aid the unemployed.

It set up a new single federal agency to rule both civilian and military aircraft in the crowded skies, authorized reciprocal trade agreements, an extension of the public works program, and adopted a farm bill that allows basic crop supports to move to 20-year low levels in an effort to help clear away burdensome surpluses.

It was not without its serious failures. The congress managed to find it necessary to make the 4-cent stamp standard for letter mail, to hike the national debt limit to 288 billion dollars until next June 30, with 283 billion the peak thereafter.

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TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Congressional confusion and evasion will respect to legislation affecting the federal judiciary have created a spirit of indecisiveness and chaos throughout the courts of the land.

By a 41-40 vote, the senate killed a house bill designed to restrict the hands of the federal judiciary.

By an overwhelming vote, the senate rejected the Douglas bill to remove the Warren decision on school desegregation.

BEWILDERED JURISTS—As a result of these doubts and divisions, federal jurists are bewildered, and their state of mind contributes to the growing confusion in the courts.

JUDGES CONFERENCE CRITICAL OF SUPREME COURT RULINGS—It is doubtful if the federal judiciary has been so confused and so subject to criticism since the Dred Scott decision.

It will be difficult for the supreme court to remain in the confidence of the people, which is obviously shared by congress, the White House and the general public.

CONGRESS HAS ADDED TO CONFUSION—By failing to clarify the major legislation now in dispute before the senate, congress has compounded and confounded this confusion.

When recent union leaders had the courage to bring their action before the public, the government terminated the trial by appointing three "monitors" to police the offending organization and officers.

NO PRIVATE POSSES—The Arlington county board chairman, Ralph Kaui, services of a 500 member public club to help quell any disorders arising when schools open in September.

Stepping Into Supreme Court Is Like Going Into Cathedral

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (AP)—Step into the U. S. supreme court and you are much like entering a cathedral during a moment of quiet prayer.

It is an almost silent marble sanctuary, extending dignity and solemnity.

In this setting the black-robed justices today considered the Little Rock school integration case and its possibly far-reaching effects on racial problems.

What would you see if you were among the few lucky ones to get into the chamber for today's historic special session?

Through partly drawn dark velvet curtains, the visitor's eye finds spots of blue and red and yellow tinted marble, specially cut from a quarry in Italy.

The columns, around the four walls of the chamber, support

marble panels carved with figures depicting such ideas as "Majesty of the Law" and "Defense of Human Rights."

Also depicted are lawgivers down the ages, including Moses, Solomon, King John, Blackstone and America's John Marshall.

A yellow-tinted ceiling, richly decorated with 22-carat gold leaf, reflects gentle light on ivory veined marble walls that are quarried in Spain. More red velvet drapes decorate sections of the walls.

Thick, dark red carpet covers most of the floor, which is of salmon red marble from Africa.

The air-conditioned chamber is 32 ft. 6 in. high from wall to wall, with a 44-foot ceiling.

At noon on court days, attendants part the oak wall drapes in three places and three justices file through each opening. They move to their high-backed chairs back of the great mahogany bench, then stand at attention while the court erler goes through this ancient chant:

"Oyez! Oyez! Oyez! All persons having business before the honorable United States supreme court of the United States are admonished to draw near and give their attention for the court is now sitting. God save the United States and this honorable court."

Then they sit down, with the aid of page boys who push up the black leather chairs.

Chief Justice Earl Warren sits in the center of the 20-foot bench. Four associates on each side of him. The "chief" then is in charge of things and no one makes a move until he calls for it.

In a case such as today's the party who brings the legal battle to the high court is heard first. This would be Thurston Marshall, counsel for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Under usual procedure, opponents counsel their present their arguments, normally followed by counsel for the government.

Thus counsel for the Little Rock school board will follow Marshall and they in turn will be followed by U. S. Solicitor General J. Lee Rankin.

If any of the attorneys ask a few minutes for rebuttal, the court usually grants the request.

After hearing arguments in private, the court usually takes it under consideration at a later meeting in closed conference room. Their vote is taken and one of the justices announced the job of writing the majority opinion. Dissenters can write as they please without assent.

Decisions generally are announced on Mondays when the court is in regular session. However, there is nothing to bar the announcement of a decision at any time, in regular or special terms.

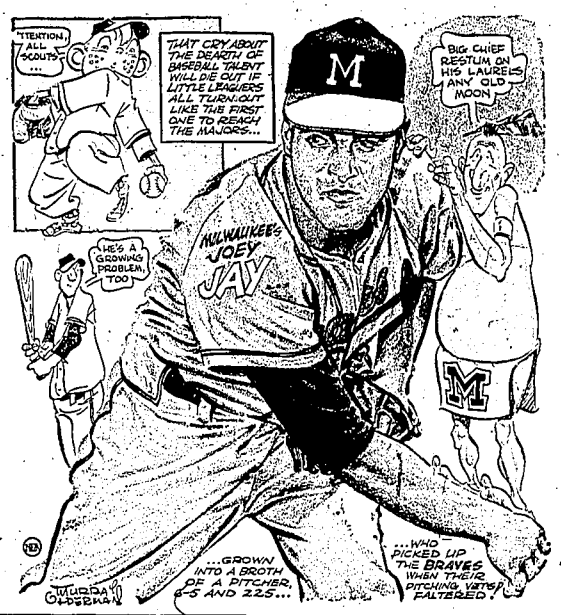

U. S. Schools Enrollment to Hit New Peak

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (UP)—Enrollment in the nation's schools and colleges will reach a record peak of nearly 45 million when the new school year opens next month.

The office of education, reporting the estimate yesterday, said the total would be about 1,750,000 higher than for the 1957-58 school year. It marks the 14th straight year of increase.

The figures include both public and private school enrollment. It is expected to total about 31,700,000—more than one million pupils. High school enrollment will increase about half a million to an expected total of 8,800,000. The new figures for colleges and universities is 2,820,000—an increase of about 173,000 over last year.

This booming school population means the classroom and teacher shortage will still be with us, the office of education said. The shortage of education staff will increase about 132,000. No figures are yet available on the classroom shortage for colleges and universities. However, it is expected to be somewhat smaller than last year's total of 142,000.

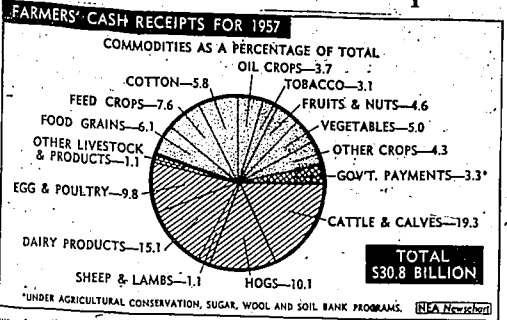

British Sea Roaming 'Sputnik' Tells Secret of Deep Currents

WORMLEY, England, Aug. 28 (AP)—Britain has a Sputnik that goes to the deep.

It goes along under water, discharging earth satellites but they will probably do mankind as much good, says Dr. George E. R. Deacon, director of the National Institute of Oceanography located here in the quiet green hills of Surrey, south of London.

Deep-sea currents affect surface waters much like the high atmosphere and jet stream affect the air and weather over your head, he explains. The deep and surface currents, and waves, too, profoundly affect climate, storms, fish life, harbors, erosion and beaches and coasts.

But little has been known about the deep currents. It's been difficult to track them.

You don't worry about recovering the sea-going Sputnik, Dr. Deacon adds. Each one costs only about \$40. When its radio dies, it just keeps floating along silently.

Man Has Always Wanted Trip To Moon for Close-up Search

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (UPI)—Man probably has wanted to go to the moon, or for a close-up look, ever since he first gazed toward the heavens and saw it shining there. Certainly he has been dreaming and writing about it down through the ages.

Lucian, author of record to send a man on a lunar trip was the Greek, Lucian of Samos. The hero of Lucian's "true history" was sailing his ship beyond the Mediterranean sea when a gleaming water-spout caught it up and carried him to the moon.

Later Lucian set another of his heroes, important by simply equipping him with a pair of wings and letting him take off from Mount Olympus.

But Lucian was a little ahead of his time. After his moon travel he lived for some 1500 years until Johannes Kepler discovered the laws that govern the movement of the planets.

Then in 1628, Bishop Goodwin, an English author, described a celestial voyage in his work, "Man in the Moon." Goodwin's hero, Domingo Gonsales, made the trip on a raft towed by swans.

In 1865 came Jules Verne, the French science fiction writer, with his book, "From the Earth to the Moon." It was based on sound scientific theory of space flight, and astronomical calculations. Verne's propulsion mechanism was a gigantic cannon. The idea was conceived

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Report Shows Why States in West Are Arid

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (AP)—The water is lost every year by evaporation in the 17 western states to supply all the towns and cities of the nation, the interior department reported yesterday.

The department made public a report by the ecological survey estimating that more than 21 million acre feet of water is evaporated annually in an area four of water is the amount required to cover one acre to the depth of one foot.

"This is more water than is now used for all the cities and communities served by public supplies in the entire nation," the department said.

An earlier report estimated the evaporation loss at 11 1/2 million acre feet annually in 11 of the 17 states.

As a part of its program for water conservation, the department is co-sponsoring a test at Lake Hefner, near Oklahoma City, of the feasibility of using hexachlorocyclopentadiene to reduce evaporation on large reservoirs.

Secretary Stanton has said it has been demonstrated to be scientifically and economically feasible to reduce evaporation on small ponds by use of the chemical.

Victim Is Found

KOOSKIA, Aug. 28 (AP)—Searchers found the body of Wayne Rauch, 50, in Fish lake 45 miles east of here but were unable to bring it out because high winds in the Idaho primitive area made a takeoff unsafe.

The body will be brought out today if the weather permits, Rauch and Dale Brownson, 35, both of Troy, were killed when their light plane crashed into the lake Sunday.

More and More French Feel de Gaulle Intends to Keep Power in Government

PARIS, Aug. 28 (AP)—Does General de Gaulle seek personal power and intend to keep it, or will he settle France on the tracks with a new constitution?

That is the question many Frenchmen are asking themselves today. And more and more seem to be coming around to the view that the general intends to stay.

Three points may that in the new constitution is his proposal, the post of president of the republic is identical with the one held by the president of the United States. The next president will have stronger powers than any French head of state since Napoleon. Many Frenchmen think he could be virtually a dictator if he wished.

De Gaulle has laughed off the very idea of wanting such personal power. "What, me a dictator? I'd like to be one, but I'd like to be one before he became a dictator. He implied the idea was absurd.

When De Gaulle formed his government after the military-civil revolt in Algiers brought France to the verge of civil war last May, he said he would stay in the job six months. His avowed aim was to restore the nation's shattered unity, give Algeria a new deal and France a new constitution.

The constitution, now being studied by an advisory group of 30 experts headed by wartime Premier Paul Reynaud, is based on De Gaulle's cherished aim of strengthening the executive at the expense of parliament. Until now French sovereignty has rested in the hands of the turbulent and factional national assembly.

Because the deputies never could agree on a common policy in the face of daily mounting problems, French governments formed and fell like ninny-pins. There have been

25 already since World war II.

The constitution, if adopted by a national referendum next Sept. 28, would start France out under its fifth republic with the kind of strong president De Gaulle has always wanted.

Instead of being just a ceremonial figurehead, whose only really important duty lay in naming the next premier, he will have a strong political role to play.

Among his prerogatives during seven years of office are:

- To name the premier and, on the premier's advice, the members of his cabinet;
- To provide cabinet meetings;
- To call referendums on important national issues;
- To dissolve the national assembly and call new elections within 40 days;
- To sign governmental decrees;
- To address messages to parliament, which may not be debated;
- To be supreme commander of the armed forces.

Finally—and this is what disturbs many by its lack of preciseness—the president may "take the measures required by circumstances" in cases where the institutions of the republic, national independence or the integrity of French authority are threatened. That, the critics point out, could be a blank check for almost anything.

Such a president conjures up for many Frenchmen their old nightmare of "the man on horseback"—a military dictator who would give the republic its marching orders and rule alone.

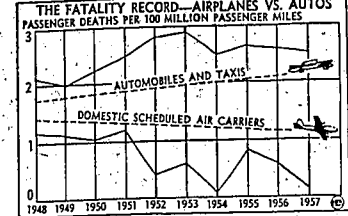
