WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—The highly charged Little Rock school integration issue was suspended today after a supreme court decision to delay for at least two weeks. After hearing more than three hours of arguments in extraordinary session yesterday, the nine justices went behind closed doors and decided to hold another hearing Sept. 1. At that time, the high court will consider the basic question of whether there should be a 2½-year delay in the Little Rock's central high school.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29 (AP)—Thomas P. Finletter has declined the Liberal party's nomination for U. S. senator and urged the party to support the Democratic nominee, Manhattan Democratic Congressman Frank S. Hogan.

The Liberal plan, to decide next week whether to endorse Hogan as the candidate of their own in place of Finletter, or make no nomination.

Refusal Made at Meet
A three-way race would jeopardize the Democratic ticket's chances at the Nov. 4 election. In many elections in this state, Democratic candidates need the big batch of votes they get on the liberal party ticket.

Finletter, former secretary of the Democratic Party, declined the nomination at a special session of the party's convention last night.

Liberal Back Harriman
Finletter said he could not "have a part in adding to the confusion now" in the senate. U. S. Rep. Kenneth Keating, Rochester, is the Republican nominee for the senate.

The Liberal party is supporting Gov. Averell Harriman for reelection and also two of his three Democratic running mates for state of Idaho.

Harriman won the governorship in 1954 by only 11,000 votes. He had 294,000 Liberal party votes to augment his Democratic vote.

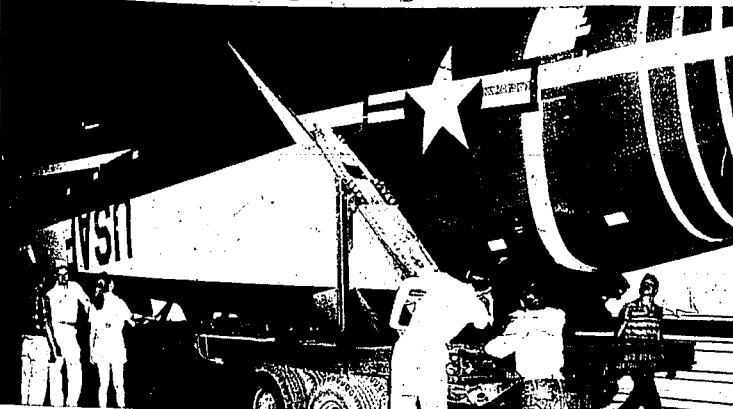

A large air force Snark missile landed in Twin Falls Wednesday night aboard a semi-truck which was taking it back to Hill air base, Ogden, Utah, from an air show at Portland, Ore.

Three civilians from the Utah air base reached Twin Falls late Wednesday afternoon and parked the 62-foot missile at a service station at Five Points east.

The long, slender, ground-to-ground weapon was at one time used in experiments at Cape Canaveral, Fla., but has been rebuilt, without instruments, for display purposes.

Total cost of such a missile is approximately three million dollars when totally equipped, one of the men traveling with it said. With a wing spread of 42 feet it is a pilotless bomber which can carry a nuclear or atomic warhead.

It left Twin Falls early Thursday morning.

Gary Cooper's Saying 'Whoa' Is the Secret of His Durability

NEW YORK, Aug. 29 (AP)—Gary Cooper still rides tall in the saddle of fame.

After 39 years of stardom the veteran actor still seems as alert as the ageless hero he has ridden through so often in making more than 100 major films.

What is the secret of his durability? Cooper said it was very simple. He just had to learn when to stop saying "whoa" and "whoa."

Two bouts of illness, he said, taught him this lesson. One came in 1931, when a sleep of 48 hours after years of overwork, almost ended his career. The other was an ulcer attack in 1939. The two experiences taught him the value of relaxing.

In 1931, a doctor warned him he had to quit for a while if he wanted to stay alive. Gary had been working on pictures night and day, and his weight had dropped from 180 to 147.

"I dropped everything, broke my contract, went to Africa and did nothing but loaf and hunt for six months," he recalled. "It was one of the happiest times of my life."

Here's his two-point program for mental and physical health: "Try to keep from making boneheads. Then you won't have so much to worry about."

Today Cooper is one of the most relaxed men in the motion picture industry, or at least he gives that impression.

He sees acting as a satisfying career in itself, and has no deep urge to become an active director, producer, although he picks his own roles.

Plan to Boost World Trade Backs British

By The Associated Press
President Eisenhower's proposal to aid underdeveloped countries and increase world trade through expanded lending programs by the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund represent direct opposition to British fiscal policy. Months ago the British decided that increased lending was the only way to stop import curtailments by the sterling bloc and provide new markets in countries short of dollars.

Prime Minister Macmillan presented the idea during a visit to Washington some weeks ago. The United States took it under advisement, being primarily interested at that time in working out some sort of program for the Middle East.

Western Europe is vitally interested also, since some easing of its balance of payments problem is needed necessary if its common market program is to get off to a promising start next year.

An enlarged Monetary Fund would be especially helpful in providing the liquidity of currencies which the Europeans will need. It will also ease pressure on them to establish quotas on dollar-area imports while they are getting started.

The Monetary Fund is provided through deposits by the countries using it of one-fourth dollars and three-fourths in their own currencies. It is drawn upon for the currencies needed in trade, with the available dollars being most important.

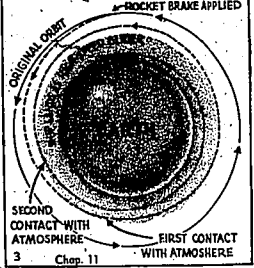
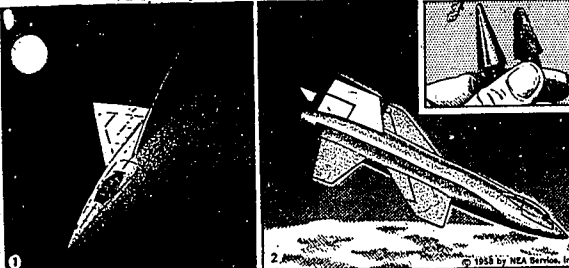
Dollar Deposits to Be Upped
The President proposes to increase the American dollar deposits within the next few years.

The World Bank borrows capital in the public markets and makes repayable loans for development. A new project, the International Development association, will be designed to make loans where repayment is less sure and credit must be for longer terms than can be obtained under the bank's strict business principles.

The United States is taking chances of financing competition with her own foreign trade in the belief that long-run results will provide a balance favoring the common good.

OUTWARD TO THE STARS (II)—Re-entry

(1) As the spacecraft did not already have enough to contend with, the absence of a protective blanket of air in space will pose yet another problem—that of intense heat and cold. In orbit about the Earth, the side of a ship toward the sun will be heated to hundreds of degrees; the side in shadow will feel intense subzero cold.

Permanent space stations may solve this problem by rotating, thus presenting each side briefly to the sun, or by a system of light shutters, or by strips of light reflecting and/or absorbing paint. Adequate insulation and temperature controls in the interior will be a necessity. Information gained from the first satellites, the Vanguard and Explorer, show that livable interior temperatures were successfully maintained.

(2) Perhaps even more difficult than escaping Earth is the task of returning to it. Traveling at an orbital velocity of some 18,000 miles per hour, a spacecraft would burn up from friction upon entering the atmosphere. Ships like the X-15, due to be flown next year, will investigate, among other things, ways of safely returning to Earth.

The ship would "skip glide" around Earth on top of the atmosphere, alternately gliding into it at a shallow angle, pulling out into space to cool off, then entering it again. It would finally land as a high-speed glider.

Although the first manned satellite need not necessarily be a winged rocket, but possibly a nose cone capsule equipped with braking rockets and metal mesh parachutes, advanced satellites will probably employ the method shown above.

FILER, Aug. 29—Clowns are expected to a rodeo as bucking horses and cowboys and this year's rodeo is a "zany" affair, and one of the "zany" acts in the business at the Filer fair this year is a topical rodeo clown and bullfighter, according to Tom Parks, Filer manager.

McKay will be the act in other rodeos before signing it for the Filer rodeo.

McKay, who now lives at Bristow, started his career at age 18. During one of his many appearances, Charley Shultz, a well-known clown at the time, asked McKay why he didn't make rodeo his profession.

At the next rodeo, held at Waco, Tex., the two were working together. McKay secured a job fighting bulls in a barrel and trick riding. From then on his fame grew as a clown, trick rider and bull and bareback rider.

He has clowned at the world's largest rodeo in the world such as the Calgary stampee, Calgary, Canada; Chicago International and the Pendleton Days rodeo, Grandwood, S. D.

He has had several narrow escapes while in the business. Once, as a clown during the Pioneer days when a Brahmin bull got him down breaking some ribs and cutting in part of his chest. He has broken his leg twice, but outside of this he has been lucky.

With him as part of his acts are two well trained mules, a pet skunk and a little chimp named "Denise the meanie."

During the winter months, McKay and his family live on his farm at Bristow where he owns and operates several acres of land, some of which is under irrigation.

Students at Georgetown Study Methods To Prevent Future Anti-U.S. Violence

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29—Future diplomats training at Georgetown university's school of foreign service have a very specific reason for their study.

"Of course it doesn't make sense," said one of the students.

The American diploma under the fire ardent school are studying of anti-U.S. violence such as erupted recently in South America, Cuba, Paris, Algiers and Formosa.

Some of the students say they will have a hand in shaping this "new" getting in world events.

Learning the diplomatic ropes is rugged: A stiff, four-year course comprised almost every phase in the complicated realm of international affairs.

Summer school is in session right now, attended by students who are working their way through and carry the full academic load during the regular year.

Subjects range from a study of Southern American dictators to the history of Russia, the Communists and the communists. A typical schedule calls for 5 1/2 hours of study a day for 19 1/2 classes, 38 outside the classroom. In addition, most students take six hours of study during training weeks.

The "flunk-out" rate, as might be expected, is high.

"Two officials of the Soviet embassy here once applied for admission but never showed up. School officials said the Soviets would have been accepted, but Father Daniel Power commented:

"Teaching the Russians about American diplomatic ideals would be like watering a picket fence and expecting roses to grow."

Founded in 1919 by the late Father Edmund A. Walsh, the Georgetown school is dedicated to the goal of achieving "international peace through education."

Only one other college-American university, also in Washington, D. C.—that an undergraduate foreign service schools. Other universities offering such courses are either graduate schools or chiefly interested in the broad field of international relations rather than training future career diplomats.

Dr. John F. Parr, 43, newly appointed dean of the school, who served as a naval intelligence officer in World War II, says he believes many U.S. diplomatic troubles stem from failure to understand the deep roots of foreign problems.

Parr says that by and large the state departments career diplomats are well versed in foreign affairs, but he adds:

"We're doing what might be called 'reverse Little Rock' diplomacy too much. Hostile foreigners taunt us by saying that about Little Rock." They don't know all the background of that civil rights controversy, and sometimes we don't know all the background of foreign controversies.

"I act as leaders of the free world and we have an enormous responsibility for what we say and do in other lands."

Parr says new students at the Georgetown school often have fantastic ideas on what a diplomat does.

"They come to us all starry-eyed. They think of a diplomat in terms of... foreign intrigue... beautiful women... local and counterespionage... secret code messages and cocktails..."

"The student picture the diplomat as a glamorous figure engaged in foreign machinations day and night."

Eventually, they find out he's a hardworking guy who stamps passports in a consulate all day.

"They learn, too, that a diplomat never speaks his own mind, except to the public eye 24 hours a day, with no private life."

Illusions of glamor are quickly banished at Georgetown.

"There's very little striped-trousers stuff. We stick to the hard realities of life."

He cites the case of Paul du Viver, who won his degree in diplomacy at Georgetown in 1940, as a typical example of the long, hard road of a budding diplomat must expect before attaining even modest success.

A graduate of Georgetown, Du Viver went from Georgetown to his first post as an \$1,800-a-year vice consul in Newfoundland, then in France during the German invasion; he was interned until the end of World War II.

Thereafter he served successfully as consul on the British Gold Coast, now Ghana, as second secretary at the U.S. embassies in Ottawa, Stockholm, and Berlin, and for the last three years has been engaged in North Atlantic Treaty organization affairs in Washington.

Now 45, Du Viver left June 10 on a \$12,000-a-year assignment as first secretary at the American embassy in Paris, 18 years after he began his diplomatic career.

Dean Parr says graduates of the school of foreign service are serving the United States in 74 countries.

Traffic Death Total Is Down For July 1953

CHICAGO, Aug. 25 (AP)—The National Safety Council said yesterday the country's traffic death toll dropped 3 per cent in July compared to the same month last year, representing a saving of 100 lives.

The council said 3,140 deaths were reported across the nation against 3,240 in a July 1952. It was the 11th month in a row and the 19th in the past 20 to show a drop in traffic fatalities from the same month and preceding year.

The toll so far this year is 7 per cent below last year at the 7-month point—19,330 against 20,720 in 1952.

The council estimated 650,000 persons have been disabled by accidents this year, compared with 700,000 for the same period last year.

Travel was up about one per cent in the first five months of this year, the council said, while deaths dropped 7 per cent. This yielded a record low death rate of 8.1 for every 100 million miles of vehicle travel.

The council said 27 states had fewer traffic deaths this July than last, with 21 showing increases. A 4 per cent decrease was reported by 661 cities of more than 10,000 population.

The three states with the greatest decreases were West Virginia, 32 per cent; Connecticut, 29 per cent; and South Carolina, 26 per cent.

The three cities in each population group with the best track record so far this year ranked according to the number of deaths for every 10,000 registered vehicles, were:

Y., 1.0; Toledo, O., 1.0; 100,000-200,000: Hartford, Conn., 0.9; Evansville, Ind., 0.9; Montgomery, Ala., 0.6.

50,000-100,000: Orlando, Fla., Santa Ana, Calif., Jackson, Mich., all 0.6.

25,000-50,000: Boise, Ida., Birmingham, Ala., Palo Alto, Calif., all 0.6.

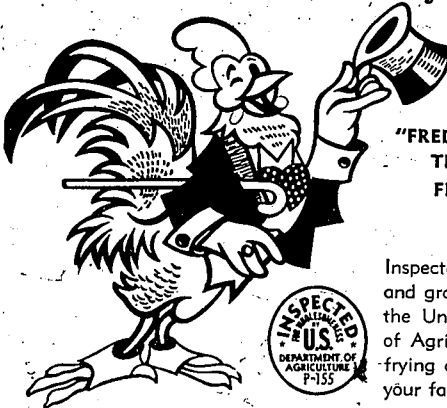
