ROAD DEATH TOLL IS RISING; 304 KILLED
American motorists marked the last long week-end of the summer by killing themselves at the rate of more than 47 an hour, and the National Safety Council called for "common sense, vigilance and old fashioned courtesy" to hold down the number of deaths. A United Press International count at 11:30 a.m. EDT showed 304 persons killed in traffic accidents since the start of the three-day Labor day week-end at 6 p.m. Friday. In addition, at least 67 persons drowned, 41 died in plane crashes, and 52 lost their lives in miscellaneous accidents for a total holiday death count of 423.

The new warning came against a background of statements in Moscow that the Soviet Union would give Red China the necessary arms and materiel aid for its invasion of Formosa. The word and expression of the government of the United States, he said, would be to threaten the Soviet Union.

Report Shows U.S. Working Force Change

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (UPI)—The government says the nation's working force now includes 802,642 more men and deck hands and 2,205 male instructors.

Based on this, according to the census bureau, the country counts 2,737 women funeral directors and 4,482 male air conditioning mechanics.

These off-duty data are analyzed in "Occupational Trends in the United States, 1950-1960," which is being published by the Bureau of Economic Analysis.

The commerce department, in making public the study, says it is the first time a "striking change" in the working force's growth from 20,000,000 in 1900 to 50,000,000 in 1950.

But in 1950 there were four million unskilled workers compared to 8 1/2 million skilled and 12 million semi-skilled workers, the report said.

Farm Workers Decrease The total of manual and service workers more than doubled in the 50-year period and the number of white-collar workers quadrupled.

But farm workers decreased by one-third to a total of seven million. As an illustration of changing times, systems and economy, the report noted that the non-farm working force made up 88 per cent of the total in 1950 and 82 per cent in 1920.

Statistics on the 1950 working force showed that 39 per cent of men were unmarried, 25 per cent of the men being single and 48 per cent of the women.

Train Runs Free But It's Stopped Before Disaster

LONDON, Sept. 1 (UPI)—A crowded subway train, bumpered out of control through one station and part way through another last night when the driver slumped unconscious over the controls.

A guard prevented a disaster by operating an emergency brake. Guard John Fackin, at his post in the last car, realized something was wrong when the train went full speed through Kensington station.

Rather than stop it in the tunnel he let it continue to the next station. Four of its cars were through before it came to rest.

Witnesses found Newcomer Herbert Tinsy, 37, slumped unconscious with a head injury. His body was across the "dead man's" handle.

A London transport spokesman said the train would have been stopped by a red-coat if it had passed a signal at red. But there was a little trouble on the line because of Sunday services and all signals were green.

It looks as though a disaster was narrowly averted, an official admitted.

To make matters worse, I am sure only their "mistakes" problems. Take this one, for example, from Mrs. Pat Risby, Bamling, Calif.
"Dear Mr. McLemore: I have been told that a certain kind of my call be made to jump through a hoop. We have quite a few abandoned hoop in our backyard and would jump through them if at all possible. Could you help me? Sincerely, etc."

What should I tell Mrs. Risby? To jump through a hoop, herself, because she is obviously sincere, and the best I can do to help her is to tell her that jumping through a hoop, because I don't know, there is always the possibility that a real smart variety has learned to jump as well as climb.

In my answer to Mrs. Risby I told her, yet, there was a certain species of fly that jumped, but that it was unobtainable in this country right now, as it came from Red China. Thus, I figured, should hold Mrs. Risby until she forgets about the scheme, or the hoops fall apart and were no longer suitable for jumping through.

Another typical query is this one from Tom Tubberly, Hot Springs, Ark.
"Dear Sir: Could you recommend a good ground cover for an old tennis court? The cover has fallen into decay since I broke my ankle chasing a 'lob' shot several years ago, thinking you for your kindness."

The first thing I had to do about this one was find out what "ground cover" was. As none of it admitted very attractive to me, I suggested

to Tubberly that he use a good about tarpaulin.
Tarpaulins are hardy and stand heat as well as cold. Much more sensible, in my way of thinking, than sweet peas, lilacs of the valley, or any of the usual around cover. Many of the letters I answer simply by using the two words "cut back." I am not sure what that means, but when I was trying to grow flowers almost everywhere, I looked at my garden said, "You should cut them back," and walked away.

Senator Says Parts of U. S. Defenses Bad

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (UPI)—Sen. Stuart Symington, D., Mo., has said that the administration of a defense system between \$500,000,000 and \$700,000,000 on a defense system he called "totally unnecessary."

Symington leveled the charge yesterday without giving details of the "defenses" involved. But he later said "we are spending a great many billions of dollars against missiles, as against the threat of a nuclear war."

The senator, a former military leader who is now a member of the senate and armed services committee, said it was unrealistic to rely on missiles to shoot down something with 450, 80 or 100-mile range when a bomber 200 miles off "could shoot an air-to-ground missile."

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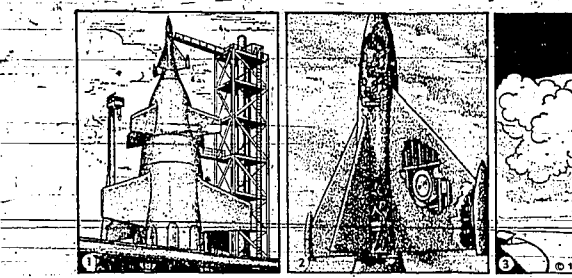
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OUTWARD TO THE STARS (13)—Man Into Space



The date could be in the 1960s. For years now, unmanned satellites of varying sizes and types have been circling the Earth. Instrument rockets to and around the Moon now are being planned. Improved rocket planes like the X-15 have pushed rockets into the fringes of space, achieving near orbital flight. By this time, a man in the nose cone of a missile has possibly been shot into space for a few minutes and landed safely.

By the late 1950s, it is set for the first manned satellite to be launched. (1) It will probably be a three-stage vehicle; towering some 20 stories in height. (2) This two-man third stage is essentially a high-performance rocket plane, capable of both atmospheric and space flight. Its wings have outer layers of heat-resistant material and inner layers of insulating and refrigerant fuel. Their large size will provide lift in rarefied atmosphere when craft returns to Earth and help dissipate heat by friction. Rockets at wing tips swing 300 degrees. They will be used to correct for drift and acceleration, if necessary, upon landing. Small compressed air or rocket nozzles in nose, wings and rudder also will be used for minor corrections in direction.

Throughout the day and early evening hours of ground crew personnel have labored to ready the ship. Finally all fuel tanks have been topped off. Each of the hundreds of instruments and parts has been tested and retested. All items check out. The countdown reaches 0 3 2 1. The first-stage motor thunders and a great blue light from the launching area as the first rocket to carry men on a sustained flight into space begins its journey.

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Russ Disclose Data on Dog's Trip in Space

MOSCOW, Sept. 1 (UPI)—Specialists designed all aspects of a flying parrot, helped bring back to Earth a dog, and a satellite, the Russians disclosed today.

The trade union organ "Trud," printing hundreds of thousands of copies of the latest dog-baiting rocket, those enabled "the main part of the rocket containing instruments and animals to descend successfully."

"Trud," in an interview with space scientist A. M. Krasnik, supplied details on the rocket launch which Wednesday soared two dogs by an altitude of 200 miles. It brought them down safely.

The main part of the rocket was a hermetically sealed cabin containing the two dogs.

Forward was a compartment of scientific apparatus. The rocket's tail carried a solar spectrometer measuring ultraviolet radiation.

When the rocket reached its maximum planned altitude it began falling, the segment containing the dogs and apparatus split, and the special air brakes went into effect.

These cut the part rockets speed through heavy layers of the stratosphere.

Parachutes Opened Then, when the dogs and apparatus had fallen to a height of some one mile above ground, the parachutes opened and further eased the rest of the downward journey.

Scientists said the "interesting feature" of the rocket was its "automation on all three axes."

Krasnik said this permitted scientists to "install some equipment outside the sun and others on the rainy side."

According to a radio Moscow report, the entire flight took 30 minutes and the rocket landed exactly where it was supposed to land.

Educator Has Plan to Assist Church Units

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (UPI)—A prominent Catholic educator today endorsed a plan under which state governments would subsidize parochial schools and supervise their curricula.

Dr. Charles J. Donohue, professor of English at Fordham University, said state education officials should be given the right to review religious courses would be most religiously in accord with the American pluralistic pattern.

Donohue delivered his endorsement in a speech prepared for a symposium of the American Psychological Association which is holding its summer conference here. The plan was offered by another speaker, Prof. Robert F. Gregory, teachers college director of state university, New York-Albany.

An authority on religious pluralism said the plan would be an arrangement under which religious groups receive little or no public financing, but the state would "inter-ject" its influence in "equities and frictions."

He noted that supporters of parochial schools must "pay their full share" in taxes to support a state education which they sincerely feel is incompletely suited to the particular needs of their children.

Such taxpayers recognize that state education is the core of our national educational effort. Donohue said, "and that the common good demands that it be disposed of in a way wholly adequate to the task."

But he naturally was troubled, he went on, because "nothing, or very little" of the taxes they pay for state education goes to support a state education which they sincerely feel is incompletely suited to the particular needs of their children.

Donohue added that "the religious and the common state schools are not rivals. They are partners in the effort to educate the American people."

High-ranking labor leaders joined Mitchell today and buried their congressional colleagues at the sixth annual Labor Day Massacre in St. Louis, Mo., at 10 a.m. EDT.

Besides Mitchell, the guest list of more than 1,000 included AFL-CIO President George Meany, Labor Undersecretary James T. O'Connell and International Union of Electrical Workers.

The Mass was celebrated by the Most Rev. Patrick A. O'Boyle, archbishop, Washington, D.C., presided over by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph P. Donnelly, Hartford, Conn., a noted labor-management arbitrator.

Reuther Speaks

Walter P. Reuther, president of the United Auto Workers and vice president of the AFL-CIO, said the American labor movement will continue to carry on the task of cleaning up its ranks those who have violated the high ethical and moral standards which men in their posts must observe.

In a labor day message prepared for the occasion, Reuther charged that the senate-approved Kennedy-Tyler labor reform legislation, which he said was defeated in the house by an unholy alliance of big business, as reported by the National Association of Manufacturers, reactionary anti-labor politicians and a few corrupt labor leaders.

Mitchell Renews Charge

Mitchell meantime renewed his charge that speaker of the house Democratic leadership were to blame for the demise of the Kennedy-Tyler bill, which he said was "defeated in the unions. He rejected Democratic charges that he was at fault in the defeat of the bill, saying that the public and workers must be guarded against corruption which lead to "lawlessness and harmful abuse of power."

In his third consecutive speech for reform legislation, Eisenhower said unions must be "administered according to the rules will of the members." At the same time, he said the public must be protected against unfair labor-management practices.

He said unfair and undemocratic procedures "make a mockery of the collective bargaining relationship."

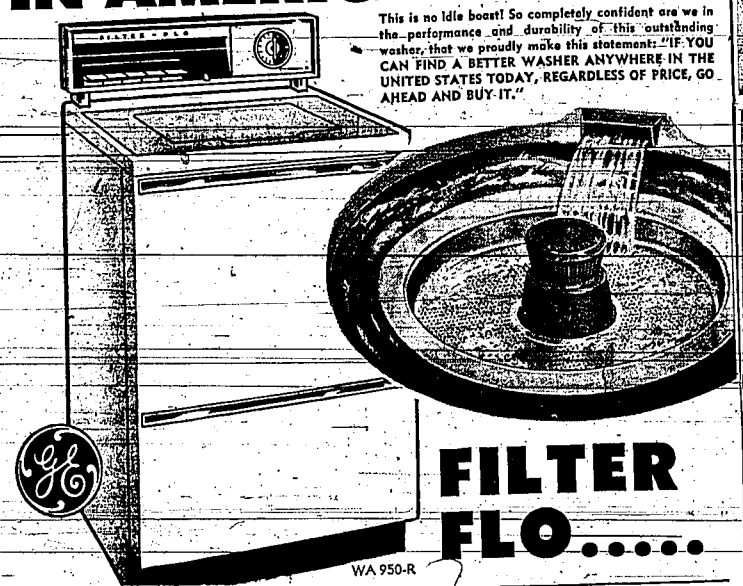

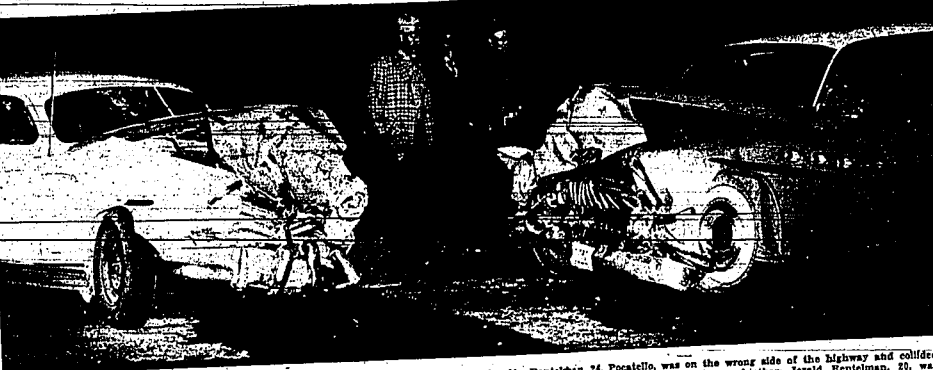

Both Parties Boast About Water Plans

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP)—Republicans and Democrats both boast about their reclamation legislation passed by the recent congress and for reclamation work now in progress.

Sen. William F. Knowland, Calif., senate Republican leader, issued a report in which he said the Eisenhower administration began a huge five-year water resource development program in 1954.

Projects costing \$3,725,000,000 are being carried forward under the program, he said. In addition there have been 424 new starts in projects and 27 reclamation projects which will be built at a total cost of \$5,020,187,000.

On the other hand, Sen. Clinton Anderson, D., N.M., chairman of the senate interior committee's reclamation subcommittee, put out a report saying congress was "backing, in what might be termed eye-catching reclamation, construction due to the fact that it encountered in the administration several eye-catching failures."

Ready Progress Claimed

But he said "the record of the past congress and particularly the senate in the area of steady and comprehensive progress toward the goal of greater speed and more reclamation needs of the 17 western states."

Negro Leader Avers 'Ike' Is 'Ill-Advised'

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (UPI)—The top lawyer of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) has criticized President Eisenhower since he advised in favoring a slower approach to school integration.

Chief counsel, Marshall, NAACP, said that "I do not believe that the slow-down approach is the best way to improve race relations, but he said the president is not fully informed of the situation."

"His advisers—let me tell you the slower you go the more chance you'll have for peace," Marshall said yesterday on a television program. He added that he thought the President should have used his influence to promote peaceful school integration "in 1957-1958."

The attorney, who argued the case of Negro students before the supreme court's special session last week, returned to the president's smokes at a news conference last Wednesday that he might have told friends he favors a "slower" approach to integration.

Marshall said he would like to see the Republican and Democratic parties "live with each other" to reach integration policies but denied that Negroes vote as a bloc.

The NAACP attorney also rejected arguments that educational levels are lower than school integration. "It is much easier to finance one school system than it is to integrate two," he said.

He said he did not expect school-as-a-school over this fall, but said the NAACP would "call on the government to end" any anti-integration violence.
