

Man of South Heads Legion For Next Year

CHICAGO, Sept. 5.—The American Legion ended its 46th annual convention yesterday, electing James J. Sullivan, of Boston, its national commander and affirming its traditional condemnation of communism.

The endus of thousands of delegates left the Loop with the comparative quiet of "everyday business." Quadruped parades, antics and whoopsies had been held but the atmosphere had been lost. Last "10 days" is the city's slogan.

M., a lawyer and World War II army air force pilot, was selected by a majority of nearly 5-1 to succeed him. The group now claims 600,000 members.

Before the election, the delegates pledged themselves "not to recruit anyone" from them, the legion called U.S. military strength account "pro-condemnation of aggression" in the Middle East; the PRC, India, Indonesia and Latin America.

President U.S. leadership as administration against communism in the world, was cast by "lack of a firm foreign policy," implied failure of U.S. policy-makers to consider general Latin American problems and rejected assertion by Secretary of Defense Neil H. McElroy that America still leads the world in military strength.

First Quantities Of Element Seen

BERKELEY, Calif., Sept. 5 (UPI)—Scientists at the University of California announced here yesterday that the first visible quantities of the synthetic element plutonium were isolated at the national reactor testing station near Arco, Idaho.

The element was isolated by a special aluminum-concentrator-infrared stars and hydrogen bomb known as element-93. It is the heaviest concentrate in the largest enough quantity to be available for scientific study according to a report issued yesterday.

The isolation of plutonium is especially important because it is believed to be the most useful element heavier than uranium, with the exception of the rocket-fuel plutonium.

Alcohol taxes for the second quarter amounted to \$41,000 compared with \$17,144,000 for the 1957 period.

Tobacco tax revenues were up the same number of this year, the IRS said, indicating that cancer experts were not having much of an effect.

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

Rubber Chain Uses Urged to Improve Spud

Potato quality can get a bounce out of spuds if a rubber chain is used. G. V. Daigh, a potato spud specialist at the University of Idaho extension service potato specialist, estimates that 18 per cent of the hard potatoes are lost because of damage from the chain. Rubber chain reduces that hazard to two per cent.

Reduction of hard knocks pays the producer because greater bruising accounts for about 40 per cent of storage rots.

Two types of chain-rubber are used. One is saying when the other is being used. The other is interlocked with the bunched chain. If the tubing is to be reused, it should be one thirty-second of an inch larger than the original size. It is used as a lubricant and fasten the ends to the links with rubber cement to prevent slippage, Daigh advises.

If the tubing is to be used again, it should be the same size as the chain. It is worked onto the chain with soap as for the larger sizes. In some cases, though, sizes of eight-eighth inch sidewalls is recommended.

Warm the tubing before putting it on. It will reach operating temperature in the hot sun after a short time. Cut it into lengths slightly shorter than the distance between the drive supports.

One company has a spring rubber pad for the plow piler. It is wise, he says, to start the job a month before harvest to allow time for drying and joining.

Soaking the chain can be done directly to the iron by cleaning the surface thoroughly and applying rubber cement. Three inches of chain make a good pad for the truck.

Measure the speed of chains on the digger, bulkier, combiner and planter. If the speed is less than 180 feet per minute, all other chains less than 70 feet. If the speed is too fast, it can be reduced by changing size of gear. If the fall is more than six inches, changes of more than six inches changes in speed are indicated. A potato that falls further is headed for trouble.





OUTWARD TO THE STARS (17)-Building the Space Station By Don Oakley and Ralph Lane



(1) Economic difficulties must be overcome before the building of a permanent manned space station is feasible. But the construction will be easy in one respect, if only one: The absence of gravity (actually, Earth's gravity canceled by centrifugal force in orbit), will enable men to maneuver huge girders and plates about like feathers. On the other hand, human problems must still be faced. The lack of gravity makes it difficult to be self-contained, etc. The need for eating and sleeping quarters will limit the number of men able to work at one time. Sudden movements from shadow into unfettered sunlight will be a real danger to a worker's eyes. Spacecraft failure will mean death. Other factors, some as yet unknown, may cut actual working time to a few months.

(2) A strange-looking craft is this cargo ferry or space taxi. Platforms like this will scurry about on orbit, gathering materials and supplies from cargo rockets.

(3) Economic discovery by means of the tiny Vanguard satellite of a band of lithium-managed meteors in space travel. Some sort of protective "wall" such as this may be required for any prolonged stay in space. A thick, lead-lined cylinder, it's a tiny spaceship in its basic design. Explorer IV now in orbit is probing the nature and extent of this strange wall.

(4) Months will be required to construct the shell of the space station. Then more months to finish the interior, install instruments and equipment. Here, the completed ship is ready to be placed in orbit. Zero gravity enables the hub facilitates the loading of supplies. The central hub, however, can be removed. Tubes lead to the main sections of the station in the rim.

**Many Firms Keep up Work
On Research During Season**

NEW YORK, Sept. 8 (UPI)—The re-opening of business activity will find many companies in a position to continue their spending in search of new markets to lure customers or to cut costs.

Marked increases in budgeting for new or better products even while the economy was taking a turn for the worse have inspired others to increase their spending in search of new markets to lure customers or to cut costs.

Three out of four companies, according to a study of budgets of 823 companies, the American Management Association reported today that they have increased their research for research, 218 have maintained last year's pace, and 168 have cut their spending.
