Benson's Corn Price Policies Talk Due Soon

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9 (UPI)—Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson is expected to announce soon that for the third successive year he will support the price of corn grown by farmers who ignored federal planting allotments.

Benson has made no public commitment yet on the subject. But he has indicated a decision would probably be announced before the end of September.

Under the expected Benson would extend the price supports for so-called "non-compliance" corn.

Near Same Rate

The rate was expected to be close to \$1.00 per bushel for a 107-cent "non-compliance" corn.

One factor in Benson's decision, it is believed, may be the recent congressional action—sinking corn growers a check to pay for a referendum out of existence in a referendum which must be held by December 15.

Observers also recalled that last winter agriculture department spokesmen had said that there would be support for corn grown in violation of allotments if it were necessary to prevent a break in market.

Korean Vets Renew Study

Several thousand Idaho Korean war veterans will be given renewed opportunity to pursue their GI studies because of a recent liberalization of the GI bill regulations, the Twin Falls veterans administration representative announced Tuesday.

Previously, veterans who had interrupted their training for a period of 12 months or more after their cut-off date found it difficult to get back into training. There was only one way to get back—and that was to prove that the interruption was due to conditions beyond their control, noted Arnold Heiwese, local VA representative.

The liberalization results from a re-defining of the conditions which are considered to be beyond the control of the veteran. Heiwese listed the new conditions that are now acceptable as family or financial obligations that made it necessary for a veteran to suspend training to get a job personal or family illness, or death in the family, which forced him to drop out of training to find work; unavoidable conditions in connection with his job that resulted in his discontinuing his training; and a 12-month period of suspended training that comes to an end during vacation or some other time when it isn't possible to return.

Veterans affected by this change are being sent a letter giving them an opportunity to reapply for training, Heiwese said.

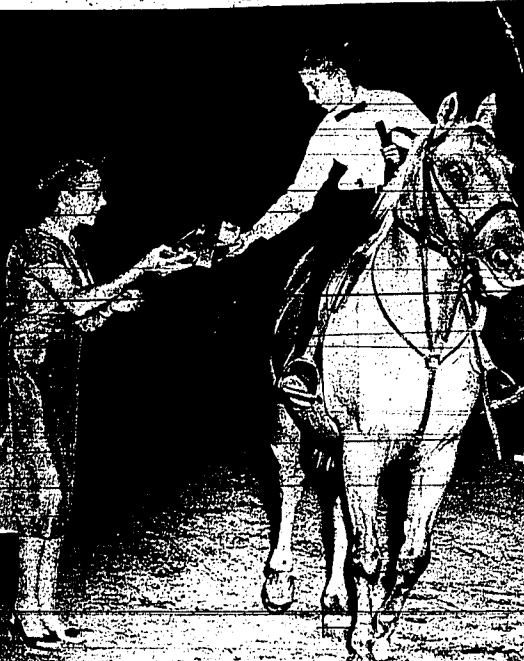

Military's Jet Flies 4 Times Sound Speed

BUNNYVALE, Calif., Sept. 9 (UPI)—The air force disclosed today that a Lockheed X-7 Ramjet missile has been flown in excess of four times the speed of sound to become the fastest air-breathing missile in the free world.

The 47-foot-long X-7 designed and built by the Lockheed missile systems division.

The record speed flight was so fast that the heat generated by the supersonic velocity caused part of the ramjet to burn away.

The X-7 was air-dropped from the desert test range at the air force's missile development center at Holloman air force base.

A large booster rocketed the missile to a faster-than-sound speed, where the Ramjet took over. Within seconds the bird was screeching to the fantastic speed, with its flame-tailed engine blasting it far out of human sight.

Radar Tracks Missile
Lockheed engineers and technicians in the missile range control center put the missile through pre-planned maneuvers to full test the capabilities of the X-7.

Radar and optical tracers followed the intricate flight path, and the missile itself emitted a stream of smoke from its engine and missile performance.

Special Aged Health Units Said Danger

NEW YORK, Sept. 8 (UPI)—A professor of medicine with all-out resistance by medical science to public pressure for a special "compartment" of old-age medicine.

This pressure as "a very undesirable if not a dangerous trend," said Dr. Austin B. Chalmers, Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Oct. 14 at a recent meeting of the Interstate Postgraduate Medical Association.

Sore Point Disputed
If unchecked it will lead to "the separation of medical care into a separate compartment-of-medicine-and-in-turn, specialization."

I believe that of all the many aspects of health-care which should be managed by the family physician, none is more vitally necessary than the care of the older person.

Chalmers touched on a sore point inside medical science and also the general public. It is a simple fact that the proportion of elderly people in the total population is increasing steadily.

This has led to a mushrooming of problems and many of them are not strictly medical. Yet the intimate medical specialty of old-age medicine—"geriatrics"—is struggling to establish itself firmly.

Some Urge Specialty
Needless to say, other respected medical authority believes there is a place for such a specialty. Chalmers took issue by denying that the "so-called geriatrics" has as much reason for being as the pediatrics.

"In the case of infants and children there are many techniques and a few diseases which are peculiar to children and which may require specialized knowledge and training," he said. "On the other hand, there are no known techniques or diseases which are peculiar to old people."

"If the word geriatrics is necessary in our language, let us speak of geriatric medicine," he said. "Let us be led into the notion that study of illnesses in the elderly person should in any way be separated from the great common body of knowledge of general medicine of which it is so important a part."

400,000 Negroes Are in School at Integrated Spots
NASHVILLE, Tenn., Sept. 8 (UPI)—Southern School News said today that about 400,000 Negroes were in "integrated situations" when schools opened in Southern and border states this fall.

The News, published monthly by the Southern Education Reporting Service, says that a Southern Education survey showed about 13 million youngsters going back to school with new pictures little changed from last year.

The News said 702 school districts have started or completed integration, 12 more than last year. In 10 of the 702 districts there are plans for this year to start or complete desegregation programs.

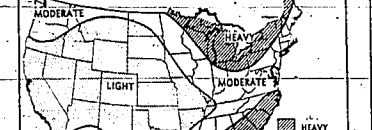
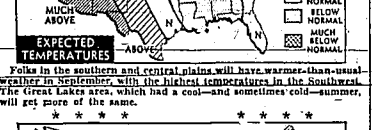

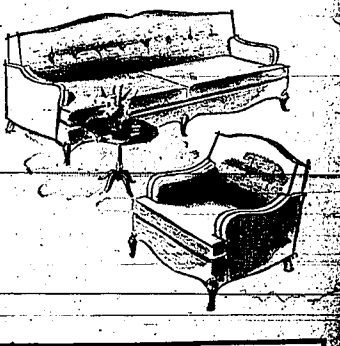

This, with no dominant issue and with both men conducting typically restrained Yankee campaigns, has the result of making the election a referendum on the Eisenhower administration and the popular reaction to the Reagan and Nixon races with Russia, the school segregation crisis and to the Sherman Adams-Bernard Goldfine affair.

City's Taxpayers Will Pay More Despite Lower Levy

A lower city and county assessment as compared to \$12,235 for 1957, will pay about 15% more than last year's \$10.50 assessment, according to figures released Monday by the Twin Falls county commissioners.

The city's 1958 assessment is due primarily to the \$100 assessment increase for the year for the Twin Falls highway district assessment, which will be the highest in the state.

According to J. D. Simons, Twin Falls city manager, the assessment is necessary because "experience has shown that the city had spent more funds in connection with the highway district than it had and it is anticipated that some money will be spent on the new bridge on Blue Lake highway."

This year the Twin Falls city taxpayers will pay \$12,371 per \$100 as compared to \$10,500 for 1957.

The total county levy as set by the county commissioners Monday will be \$14.14 this year compared to \$14.44 per hundred in 1957. Cause for the slight decrease is a one-cent reduction in the hospital bond redemption and interest fund and the general fund.

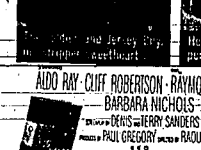

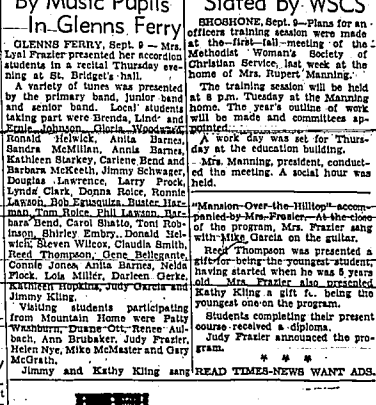

He will, though—if we give him a little attention."

Many children get that attention at home without any thought about it. Their mothers tell them stories, sing to them, read to them, talk to them as the intelligent children they are. Those little ones are ready to learn to read when they get to school.

But, there being differences in children, in their abilities, in the rate of growth and the like, some children arrive in school without that readiness. If they are forced to begin reading they learn with great difficulty what they would learn swiftly and easily later on, after they developed the background that is needed for reading. They now have to be "readied" by the teacher.

The teacher asks what most mothers do. She tells him stories, short, colorful ones to which he can listen happily and without fear.

Newsmen Sees War He's Been Chasing After

By CHARLES SMITH
HIG QUENNOY, Sept. 9 (UPI)—I arrived on big Quennoy island today and promptly saw the war I'd been chasing through the Foros circuit.

Our Nationalist Chinese air force transport plane was turned back by communist fighters today, but was successfully landed through artillery fire on the second try.

I flew to big Quennoy from Taipei with Charles Lowe, United Press International, Motion-News, Fred Winters and Gene Kramer of Associated Press, and Tso Chih-yueh, Nationalist Central News agency.

Nobody is ill.

Our plane landed on an emergency strip along a sandy beach amid a flurry of artillery fire from Red guns. The shells sent up puffs of sand.

Nobody is ill.

Shells landed a few hundred yards down the beach from where our plane stopped. When the plane taxied to a stop we hit the beach running and headed for the cover of some sand hills 200 yards inland. With us were 20 high ranking officials including three Nationalist army generals.

City is Now Bombed

We were panting when we reached the comparative safety of the sand hills a few minutes later we moved into a concrete underground shelter. Soldiers live in the shelter. A Chinese woman, the wife of a soldier, tucked her child beside us and looked curiously at the visitors, rare in this area of crisis.

An army officer said the communists had fired more than 100 high explosive shells into Quennoy city yesterday. He warned us to be careful.

Last week they told me the Reds seldom bombarded the city except by accident—they fire a Nationalist bombardment of Army, but it is different now, the officer told us.

See Real Stage

During our stopover in Makung I talked with an American naval officer aboard a National ship visiting yesterday's \$5,000,000 ship bombardment of Quennoy.

"It was damn heavy, I tell you," he said. Several shell fragments ripped into his ship.

Last week there was difficulty finding the war. We could hear it but were unable to see it. We could see the results and know it was the real thing. Today we flew right into it.

Military's Jet Flies 4 Times Sound Speed

SUNNYVALE, Calif., Sept. 9 (UPI)—The air force disclosed today that a Lockheed X-7 Ramjet missile has been flown in excess of four times the speed of sound to become the fastest air-breathing missile in the free world.

The 37-foot-long X-7 designed and built by the Lockheed missile systems division, Van Nuys, Calif., also holds the altitude record for Ramjet-borne. Although the exact altitude has not been revealed, it can be said the X-7 has flown to the edge of the upper atmosphere.

Frank Fark Hahn was so fast that the heat generated by the supersonic velocity coupled with normal engine heat caused part of the engine to burn away.

The X-7 was air-dropped from a specially-modified B-59 high over the desert test range, at the air force's missile development center at Holloman air force base.

A large booster rocketed the missile to a faster-than-sound speed, where the Ramjet took over. Within seconds the engine was accelerated to the fantastic speed, with its flame-fueled engine blasting it far out of human sight.

Radar Tracks Missile

Lockheed engineers and technicians in the missile range control center put the missile through pre-planned maneuvers to full test the capabilities of the Ramjet.

Radar and optical tracers followed the intricate flight path, and the missile's track radiated back a stream of information on engine and missile performance.
