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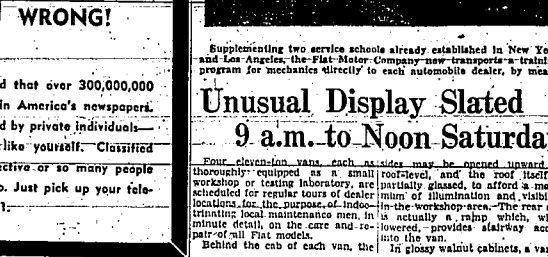

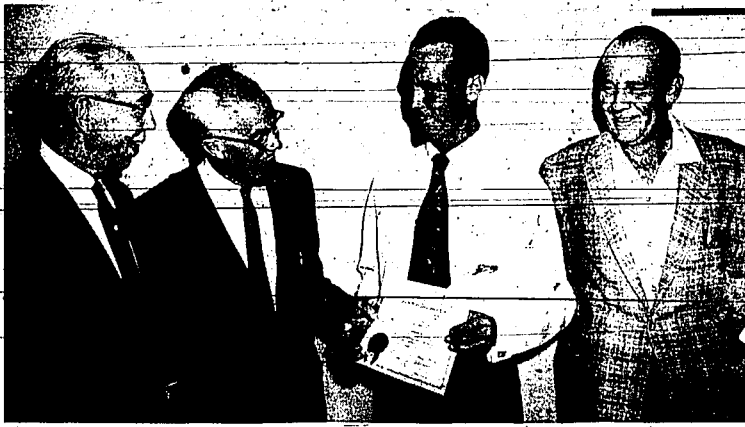

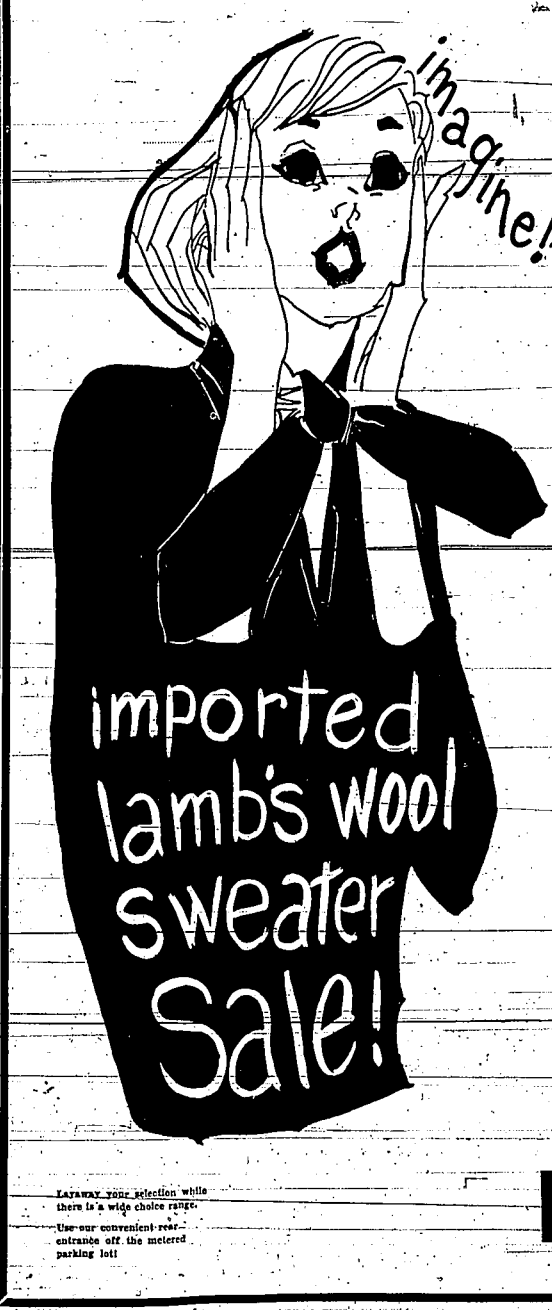

Expert Ways Hint Smokers Need No Frats

TORONTO, Sept. 11 (UPI)—Heavy cigarette smokers who worry about getting lung cancer should attend one session of the fifth international congress on diseases of the chest. The chain smoker would breathe a sigh of relief, and continue puffing away.

Though cancer experts here warn about the possible link between smoking and lung cancer, it doesn't appear to affect their smoking habits.

Smoke Clouds Hang
The "fog" of the congress on diseases of the chest is filled with a blue cloud of cigarette, cigar and pipe smoke after each session in the large hall of a downtown building.

In an unofficial survey it appeared that American doctors preferred cigarettes by far and large without filter tips. European doctors puffed away on cigars while the Americans smoked a variety of cigarettes, pipes and cigars.

One at a panel Tuesday among four of the most eminent lung cancer specialists in the world, three of the doctors smoked while relating their opinions on the connection between cigarettes and lung cancer. One smoked a filter tip cigarette, another a regular cigarette and the third a cigar.

Young Group Smokeless
The only abstainer was Dr. Carlo Gattuso, Milan, Italy. He quit smoking five years ago.

All smokers in the lobby were filled with hints.

The only noticeable non-smoker group were the young girls and men who offered information and programs to the 1,000 doctors and observers attending the congress on diseases of the chest.

Report's Best Aspect Shows Jobless Total Not Any Worse

NEW YORK, Sept. 11 (AP)—For the more than 4½ million Americans out of work, the business recovery can't come too soon.

The best thing about the government's latest report on unemployment is that it shows the situation isn't getting any worse.

The official figures indicate a drop in unemployment between mid-July and mid-August. But that drop seems to be more apparent than real. It was confined largely to the removal of job-seeking students from the labor force. For the mature worker, the situation was little changed.

The influx of students into the labor force in June sent that month's total unemployment to a recession peak of 6½ million.

There are still two million more persons "out of work" than a year ago. While increased industrial output has called some back to jobs, most of the gain in production has been accomplished either by greater productivity through the use of better equipment or by lengthening of the work week.

The real test of the employment trend will show up this month and next.

If the auto industry comes to terms with its workers and there is no strike, employment figures should rise seasonally and the recovery should get up enough momentum to wipe out the disheartening total of the jobless.

Speeding up work on the new models this month and next—bringing a labor stoppage—should send employment sharply upward.

For factory workers—with jobs, the summer has seen a slow increase in the number of hours worked. The average factory work week is still below last year's figure but is gradually pulling up toward 40 hours again.

This coupled-with wage increases in some industries, has increased their take-home pay and has helped keep the total of consumer spending at a fairly high level.

If You're Going to Ethiopia, Better Take Along 2 Watches

By MICHAEL POWNE

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia, Sept. 11 (UPI)—Ask a European in this city what today is and he'll say it is Thursday—Sept. 11th. Ask an Ethiopian and he'll tell you it is Tuesday—Sept. 11th.

Ask the same European what the time is at midday and he'll say it is twelve. Ask the Ethiopian and he'll tell you it is six.

That is the sort of time confusion one has to suffer when one comes to Ethiopia.

Ethiopia has its own unique calendar. Nowhere else in the world is New Year's day being celebrated today, but there is a logical explanation for it.

September brings the end of the Ethiopian winter, which lasts from early June and by Sept. 11th Ethiopians can look forward to the rebirth of sunshine, to the beginning of the farming year. The Ethiopian does not bury his New Year in the midst of a succession of identical dreary mid-winter days like the European does—he waits till winter is over.

Twelve months of 30 days each from Sept. 11th, and then comes the Ethiopian's unique thirteenth month, called Meskrem. This has 5 days in it, or 6 in a leap year.

The Ethiopian has his victims. One can easily calculate the fall of the first of each month; and from the semicircular pattern of the sun's rays over a city that largely uses Ethiopian time. As if to emphasize this error, its changes are modelled on those of London's Big Ben—except that they are in jumbled order. At a quarter past the hour, for instance, it sounds the first part of Big Ben's half-hour chime.

The well-educated Ethiopian normally carries a watch that shows European time, too, to proclaim his western outlook. But he automatically reads it as if it showed 10 hours earlier. If you ask him the time he like as not will tell you not what the watch says but what he mentally adjusts it to.

Ethiopia is north of the Equator. So you expect Ethiopian summer and winter to coincide roughly with that of a vain European.

Winter, damp but never really cold, begins in early June and lasts till September. Summer then follows, bringing with it the coldest nights of the year—frosts in December.

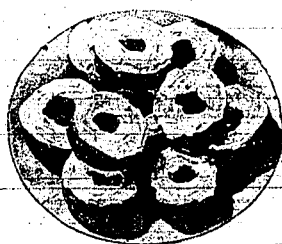

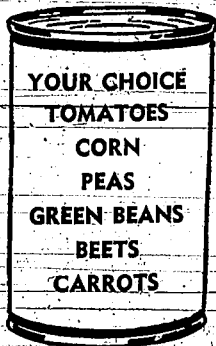

'Car of Future' Features New Control System, Other Gadgets, Writer Finds

BY JACK VANDENBERG DETROIT, Sept. 11 (UPI)—I had a look at and experienced what may be the ride of the future. Today, for the first time, I can tell the story of an experimental car which I saw two weeks ago at the General Motors proving grounds at Warren and "wave cool" as they called it.

General Motors President John Edson permitted 45 newsmen who saw the car in Arizona to talk about it for the first time after it had been successfully tested. The major feature of the experimental car is a new control system which uses an airplane-type stick to eliminate the conventional steering wheel, brake pedal, accelerator and gear shift.

Newsmen who view the experimental car called the Firebird III "the car of the future." It was installed on a Chevrolet Impala as a precautionary measure to avoid any possible damage to the costly experimental car.

It also was taken for a ride in the Firebird III with an experienced test driver at the controls.

3 Protestants Note Catholic President OK CHICAGO, Sept. 11 (UPI)—Three Protestants, all Protestants, have agreed that the nation would have nothing to fear from a Roman Catholic president if, as a man, he means to do the job of a president.

Speaking for the panel at the National Council of Churches, the Rev. Dr. Joseph Fletcher said Tuesday: "I see no intrinsic or essential objection in principle to a Roman Catholic president. As people are much more culturally mature today than when the Roman Catholicist Alfred Smith ran for the highest office in the United States, we do not have a lot of loving up since then."

Fletcher is professor of social ethics at the Episcopal theological seminary, Cambridge, Mass. He and fellow panelist Judge Morris C. J. J. Kennedy, a Democrat from their home state and a Roman Catholic, also get their vote. Both are Republicans and both Episcopalian.

Character Said Important The third member of the panel, Assistant U. S. Attorney William S. Gills, New York City, stressed a practical candidate's record, experience and his personal character were the important issues, not his religion.

More than 150 jurists, lawyers, clergymen and students are attending the four-day conference, first of its kind sponsored by U. S. Protestant churches.

I waited on the GM test track with the desert baked by 110 degrees for my turn to ride. With the whine, the gas turbine propelled vehicle rolled to a stop in front of me. The sun-baked door in the canopy covering the passenger's seat swung diagonally upward and "wave cool" air rushed out of the car to greet me. I climbed into a lounge-type chair which engulfed me from head to toe and sat back comfortably.

As the door closed around me the whole of the engine was dimly seen and the driver pressed forward on a four-inch lever located between us. The car began to move. As he pressed the lever further forward and we began to pick up speed, we came to a curve in the track. The driver merely tilted the lever in the direction of the curve and we rounded it smoothly.

The driver pointed out that it took more tilt of the stick to turn the car by the same amount, as the speed of the car increased. He said this was a built-in safety factor to prevent drivers from turning too sharply at high speeds. Still around the curve, the driver pulled back on the stick and the car began to halt. He told me to look backward and I saw two large airscopes extending from the body of the car.

He explained these airscopes (there were two more under the car out of sight) helped slow down the car which is capable of speeds up to 240 miles an hour. They also cooled the braking surfaces at the same time.

When we were stopped, he twisted the knob on the end of the stick and the car began to move in reverse. He stopped the car further again and twisted the knob further. He explained a 20-degree twist put the car in reverse and a 90-degree twist put it in parking rear.

When we returned, GM engineers told me that the car is not a bus or a truck but a car. I had seen only a part of the wonders of the car.

He pointed out all panels of the car are removable electronically to facilitate repairs. He pointed out equipment which is packed close under the bin shell from the end of the motor to the rear and dominated by a high dorsal fin.

He explained the doors were opened by a solenoid which resembles a fountain pen.

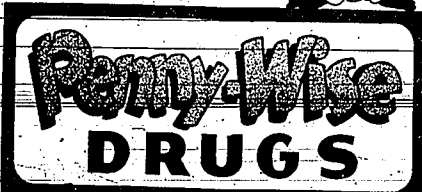

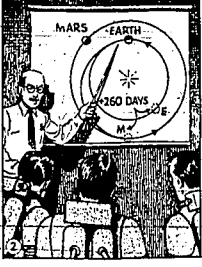
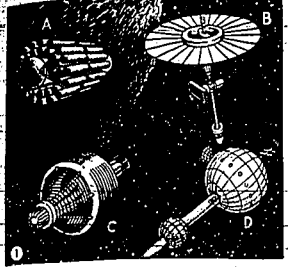

SEWELL, Calif., Sept. 11 (UPI)—An average of about seven earthquakes a day has been registered over the past six weeks in this town, 37 miles south of the Chignai capital of Santiago.

The worst of the quakes killed four persons in nearby Las Melguenas, but no casualties have been reported so far among the 100 foreign residents of Sewell, about half of whom are from the United States.

(B) Some eight or nine months out from Earth, which is now but a bright dot among the stars, the Mars ship (or more probably, fleet of ships) goes into orbit beside Mars' tiny (five-mile diameter) outer moon, Deimos. A rocket plane, carried by the spacecraft, begins a descent into the thin atmosphere of the red planet. In the distance can be seen the speedy inner moon, Phobos (10-mile diameter), which makes three circuits of the planet each Martian day. The old mystery of the "canals" and the question of life on Mars may be solved from one of these moons before man actually lands on the planet.

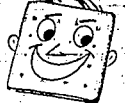
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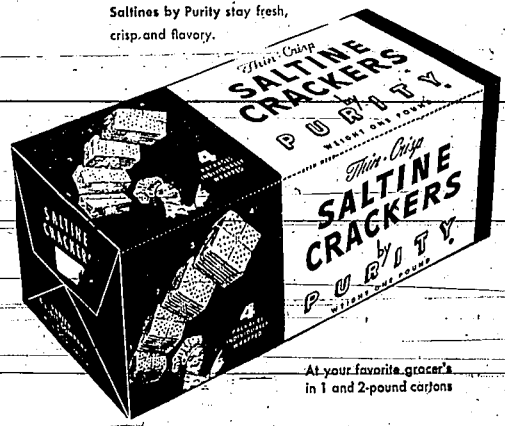

Another good tip is never, never select a "back" as "the best player on the field, even if he scores a touch-down every time he gets his hands on the ball. Kicks field goals from all over the place, and makes better punts."

To be a critic of football, you must be able to act (whether it is true or not) what lineman is making the back's sensational play possible. Choose an obscure guard and say, "well, to my way of thinking, that right guard was a stand-out. He was on the bottom of every play, diagnosed the offense perfectly, and didn't miss a blocking assignment."

As 90 percent of the spectators never see what happens in the line, your selection of some poor guard is like here will set you up as a man who, like a coach, knows that is where games are won and lost.

When you do speak of a back, always mention that he has "a fine knee action. Good and high." I am not sure what that means, either, but I have been around long enough to know that great backs have it, and the detection of it is a tribute to your keenness.

Other useful phrases are "that

thinker drifts too far," "those guards ought to submarine more," "what suckers those tackles are for the 'mouse-trap'" and "for short-power play me a single wing team."

"Try talking this way this fall. You're likely to be asked to pick an All-American."

Good Vegetable Buys
 Right now egg prices are four to eight cents a dozen higher. Pork prices also are up this week, while beef and lamb are a bit more expensive in scattered areas.

Vegetable bins still offer many bargains, although produce from nearby fields is wanting in some areas. Meat bins this week are rich with beans, cabbage, onions, potatoes, radishes and sweet potatoes. Potatoes are especially attractive.

Peaches Are Bargain
 You can get good buys, too, among carrots, cucumbers, squash and sweet corn. Elements of corn are getting lighter, but condition generally is not quite up to earlier standards, so the price stays low. Celery, tomatoes and peppers are fairly good buys.

Fruit bins reflect the onset of autumn. Peaches still are a bargain, but watermelons are starting to show signs of poor condition. Cantaloupes are higher.

Meanwhile, apples and grapes are getting more and more plentiful. Limes, pears and apples also are good buys.
