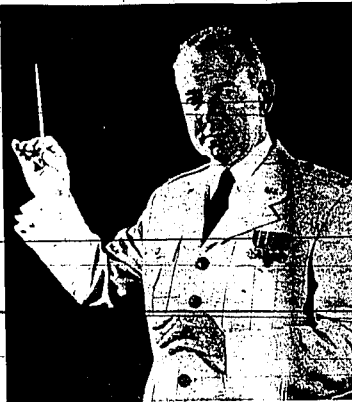

WASHINGTON—Uncle Sam's financial condition has reached "a point of complete exhaustion," according to the report of the committee on the part of the House of Representatives which is studying the situation.

The report, which is the first of a series of reports to be published in the next few days, says that the government is "in a state of financial collapse."

The next meeting of the library board will be held Thursday evening to formulate by-laws for the local library and determine the time and day for the library to be open and any charges for patron's use.

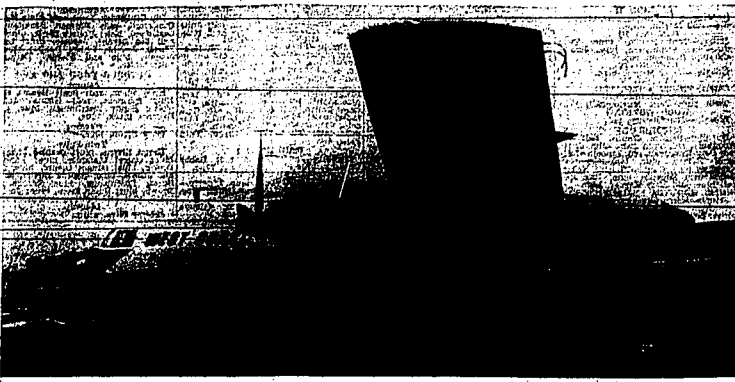
Divorce Granted In Lincoln Court

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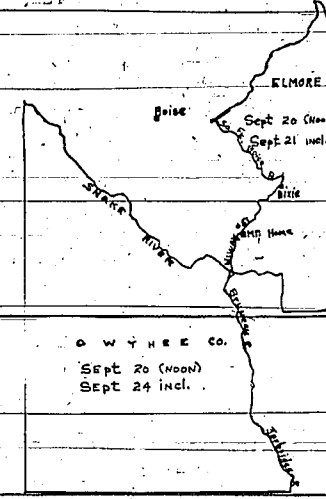
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Sagehen Hunting Map
