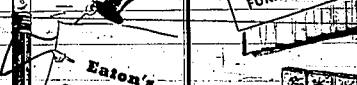

Top 10 herds are: Ralph Martin, Hunt, with 3 registered Holsteins, averaging 32.5 pounds of milk and 4.1 pounds of butterfat; Archie Malone, Jerome, 12 registered and grade Holsteins, averaging 1.47 pounds of milk and 4.77 pounds of butterfat; Veri Hinton, Hazelton, 12 registered and grade Holsteins, averaging 1.19 pounds of milk and 4.19 pounds of butterfat.

F. C. Wentworth, Coeshone, 45 registered and grade Holsteins, averaging 1.47 pounds of milk and 4.14 pounds of butterfat; Lynn Jensen, Jerome, 12 registered and grade Holsteins, averaging 1.390 pounds of milk and 4.22 pounds of butterfat; Dr. F. J. Sipple, Jerome, 12 registered and grade Holsteins, averaging 1.243 pounds of milk and 4.12 pounds of butterfat; Gordon Hunt, 14 registered Holsteins, averaging 1.243 pounds of milk and 4.12 pounds of butterfat.

Russell reported that 65 cows in the top 20 produced more than 60 pounds of milk and 10.0 pounds of butterfat. ### Officials Say Dulles Prepares For U.N. Formosa Showdown

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19 (UPI)—American officials said today Secretary of State John Foster Dulles is considering the grounds for what he considers an "all or nothing" inevitable United Nations showdown on the continued warfare in the Formosa Strait.

The secretary, in effect, intends to demand that members of the United Nations organization stand up and be counted on whether they oppose or condone the Chinese Communist "armed intervention" in Formosa.

Dulles was represented here as being "fed up" with some nations which are quick to invoke U. N. help when they are in danger but critical of the United States when it tries to invoke the same assistance on principles in behalf of areas in which they are less interested.

Preparations by American officials here and at the U. N. reflect their feeling, according to informed sources, that the United States will be forced to take a stand on the Formosa situation in the United Na-

They said the United States would not necessarily wait a breakdown in the talks before going to the United Nations with a resolution demanding condemnation of continued Communist attacks on Quemoy. It will do so as a matter of course with no prospect of progress the United States probably would go ahead and seek U. N. action since Dulles regards the danger as acute as long as the red shelling continues.

Implications here were that the Chinese side have about two weeks in which to display their sincerity at Washington.

Members of the U. N. got their first hint of Dulles' tough new attitude on standing up for principles of the U. N. charter in the general assembly yesterday. He said some U. N. members appeared to be "forgetting the teachings of history" and were becoming less and less prepared to support basic principles.

Officials said Dulles' view, which will be strongly put forward if the United States decides to take the China situation to the United Na-

### Successor for Adenauer Not Aired at Meet

KIEL, Germany, Sept. 19 (UPI)—West Germany's majority political party, the Christian Democratic Union, is holding its annual convention here, but the most important question of all will not be discussed.

The succession to 63-year-old Chancellor Konrad Adenauer is not an explicit item and, in contrast to earlier years, hardly even mentioned by the 515 delegates.

The chancellor's health in recent months has been good, so the question of a successor has no particular immediacy to most CDU members.

This may be especially so since Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano, for years CDU parliamentary leader and Adenauer's obvious successor, is now unpopular with his own party.

A CDU chief explained that he now think we ought to have considerable freedom of choice in the selection. At the time a successor must be selected we might, depending on the state of international affairs, want a man well-known abroad. On the other hand, domestic issues may "overrule" all else at that time, in which case the successor's stature abroad would be less important than his knowledge and ability in the domestic field.

But above all, party leaders seem to fear any heir-apparent named now would sour later.

### Scralls Purchased

NEW YORK, Sept. 19 (AP)—A portion of the Dent act across containing what is believed to be the earliest copy of the Ten Commandments in the United States, has been purchased by the United Nations.

### Unit to Withdraw

LONDON, Sept. 19 (AP)—Britain announced last night it will soon withdraw from Cyprus an infantry brigade stationed there to meet possible emergencies in the Mideast.

A defense ministry spokesman said two of the brigade's three regiments will return to Britain early next week and the third will take over garrison duty in Libya.

The number of troops involved was not disclosed.

### Steelworkers Vote to Oust Rebel Group

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 19 (AP)—The United Steelworkers' convention yesterday recommended expulsion of an insurgent group which has openly opposed the leadership of union President David J. McDonald for two years.

Only two of the 3,500 delegates to the union's ninth constitutional convention voted against the resolution which sets up the machinery for possible expulsion at the local level.

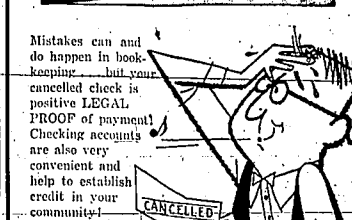

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI "This homework for school children has homework for all his subjects and the audience in the schools can be a vexing problem for the teachers, parents and the scholars. Often I am asked how much homework a pupil should have, and I have to say that the amount depends on what the teacher is depending on in relation to the pupil's growth and development; of the intellectual, physical and moral. The child's attitude toward his subjects and their meaning for him.
