Nationalist China Planes Battle More Than 600 Red Jets Over Formosa Strait

TAIPEI, Formosa, Sept. 24 (AP)—Nationalist jets clashed with more than 100 red MIG's over Formosa strait today in one of the biggest jet battles in history. The nationalist defense force today said 32 nationalist Sabre jets, flown by American-trained pilots, shot down 600 and possibly six more. It said all nationalist planes returned safely after the furious 45-minute battle. Admiral Liu Hsiang-shan said the nationalists ambushed the communists as they attempted to draw the Chinese K-16 bomber over the red mainland.

PREJUDICE CAN HINDRY VOTE

Racial and religious prejudices are the two issues which U. S. political leaders fear will dirty up the 1958 election campaign.

This came out when Republican National Chairman Mendel Alcorn and Democratic National Chairman Hubert H. Humphrey met with the two major party national chairmen, at the fair campaign practice committee, to sign its clean politics code.

This code was used in the 1954 and 1956 campaigns. It presents seven principles of decency, honesty and fair play which every political candidate is asked to sign.

One of the principles is: "I shall condemn any appeal to prejudice based on race, creed or national origin."

But in the past at the signing of the code by the two major party national chairmen, Tatt declared:

"Some of the primaries over the summer have seemed to confirm our fear that dirty campaigning may occur in a large scale this year. In the past, campaigns, appeals to racial and religious prejudices, deliberate distortion and even forgery are some of the tactics that have been charged against opponents in summer campaigns here and there."

Answers to these questions will be studied by its members who represent the three major faiths. They are the Most Rev. Richard C. Sheil, Bishop of Boise, Rt. Rev. R. R. Henry Knox Sherrill.

The three clergymen's consideration of the replies will be "off the record." But their principal objective is to see if religious prejudice can be minimized during this campaign.

On the subject of racial prejudice in politics and this year's school integration issue, Tatt declared that any city which has urban renewal and housing relocation projects is not limited to the South. He cited Cincinnati experiences as examples.

Democratic chairman Paul Butler took it from there.

"I am sure you can see the pledge (in the fair campaign practice code) as stopping our party from discussing the attitude of the President and the attorney general (William P. Rogers) on the issue of integration. The pledge affects only the manner in which we discuss the racial problem," said Butler.

Republican Chairman Alcorn replied promptly with the comment: "I don't regard the code as limiting our party on making referenda to such statements by the Democrats."

Alcorn declared further that the GOP would not be restricted in discussing the attitudes of Democrats like Gov. Oval Fabus of Arkansas or Sen. James O. Eastland of Mississippi on racial questions.

Chairman Butler said: "It is a matter-a step further when he declared—as he has done before—that anything Governor Fabus said which was not consistent with the attitude of the Democratic party would be reported."

Butler further challenged Alcorn: "If you would deal as straightforwardly with some of the people out of line in your party, we'd all get along better."

Questioning the right of the party chairman to control anything, party campaign headquarters or caucus speeches, Alcorn said he would use moral suasion to get all candidates to tell the truth.

Tatt observed that the racial question was obviously much hotter than it was two years ago.

And so—the first ball or brickbat—was thrown out to open the season for the great American game of politics.

EISENHOWER'S COMPANIONS

Even in little things, the Republicans seem unable to do the things that are appealing, the popular thing, politically.

A President has the right to choose his own friends, of course. But every reaction observers get is that there is a conscious effort to subconsciously present a picture that almost every Eisenhower friend or associate, especially on vacation and at White House entertainments, is a wealthy corporation executive.

And more, this question is discussed wherever people gather. And it is a fact that numerous prominent Republicans wish to avoid invite a symbolic "Joe Doakes" in these outings. The reason is because he does not include them among his circle of friends and confidants.

The Democrats had this same sort of debilitating period. From 1920 to 1932, they made every bill and bipartisan political move. It is, primarily, part of the inevitable cycle of politics.

When the only sympathy you have is for yourself, it doesn't amount to much.

TECKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON — Conservative querulousness concerning President Eisenhower's basic beliefs centers largely and currently on his attitude toward the problem of public ownership, development and distribution.

Unlike FDI and Harry S. Truman, who believed that there is a sinister "power trust," or of the industry managed by "evil forces," Tecker has not a political or ideological question at all.

For a while his policy tended to terminate the political and economic careers of Theodore Roosevelt, Clifford Borchert and George W. Norris. Now, however, certain seemingly inconsistent positions have been adopted, with neither the star nor cons entirely satisfied.

Commerce Department Sees Rise in U. S. Output, Income

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)—The commerce department expects a marked rise in national output and income during the July-September quarter. Without predicting actual figures, the department said yesterday the major economic indicators point upward and show continued recovery from the recession. In its monthly survey of current business, the department emphasized two recent developments: 1. Increased demand for the products of business and industry. 2. A slowdown in inventory liquidation with a simultaneous closing of the recession gap between lagging production and fairly steady consumption. "Output continues below the peak reached about this time last year," the report said, "but the difference is being narrowed."

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Clause Added To Vet Policy For Disability

More than five million World War II and Korean war veterans who hold GI life insurance may now attach a new type of total disability income provision to their policies in return for a small additional premium cost, according to Arnold Helweg, local veterans administration contact representative.

Helweg said Monday that the new type of GI policy rider was authorized by a new law and will be effective Nov. 1.

Under the new law, Helweg explained, policyholders who become totally disabled from any cause between age 60 and while the rider is in effect, will receive an income of \$10 per month for each \$1,000 face amount of the policy. Previous amounts were \$5 per month.

Payments under the clause begin after the total disability has existed for six consecutive months, and continue for the duration of the disability, regardless of its length, Helweg said.

No payment may be made for disabilities incurred after age 60, and no premium charge is made for this benefit after that date.

If the veteran is in good health and under 60, the rider may be added to any national service life insurance (NSLI) policy, except for a limited number sold to service-disabled veterans since April, 1953, Helweg said.

Of the 4,500,000 holders of eligible NSLI policies, the agency estimated that at least five million could qualify for the added rider.

Currently 85,000 veterans have the old \$5 rider attached to their policies. Those who make the rider available may increase their coverage to the new \$10 limit for a very small boost over what they are now paying in added premiums.

Premium cost of the \$10 total disability provision varies according to the policyholder's age, type of policy and the face amount. Payments to the veteran under the rider do not reduce the face amount of the policy.

Premium payments, both on the basic NSLI policy and the income provision, may be waived by VA for any period of total disability longer than six months.

Information about the total disability income provision is available to NSLI policyholders at the VA office at 249 Main avenue east.

The claim was based on the results of a combined survey of the NCAA and the American Association of College Baseball Coaches which showed that less than five per cent of the colleges who signed professional contracts reached the major leagues.
