## Two Face Charge in TV's Case

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25 (AP)—A federal grand jury today indicted Richard E. Mack, former member of the federal communications commission, and Mrs. M. J. Whitelaw, a former television news anchor, on charges of conspiring to defraud the United States.

The indictment, returned after a two-month investigation, charged Mack and Whitelaw had falsified financial records for a four-year period in order to obtain a \$1 million loan from the Federal Reserve Bank.

Mack resigned from the commission in March 1967 after a two-month investigation developed that he had falsified financial records for the commission.

Mack had done no wrong, Mack and Whitelaw both insisted the falsified records were entirely Mack's work.

The grand jury indictment consisted of three counts.

The first count charged Mack and Whitelaw conspired to obstruct and impede the administration of the Federal Reserve Bank in order to obtain a \$1 million loan from the Federal Reserve Bank.

The second count of the indictment charged that Whitelaw, in falsified financial records, to vote in the election of Public Service Television.

## Sugar Beet Harvest To Start on Monday

Receiving stations of the Amalgamated Sugar company in the Burley-Rupert and Twin Falls areas will begin receiving beets Monday, according to district supervisors Ernest Blauer, Burley-Rupert supervisor, says the company expects to process 300,000 tons of beets at Paul during the 100-day run. Robert Day, Twin Falls supervisor, estimated a 300,000-ton or better processing load for Twin Falls during the 100-day run. Blauer expects to cut beets by Oct. 1 and Day says the Twin Falls plant will cut by Oct. 4.

There will be little change in manual beet cutting machines, the supervisors stated. Approximately 300 persons will be employed at the Paul plant.

A new machine has been installed on Paul which removes the tops from beets as they enter through a flume and transfers them to a silo where they are sold for feed. It is the first of its kind in Idaho.

This year's crop of beets looks good, or equal to last year's, Blauer said.

# Bookmobile Is Fast Becoming Familiar in U. S. Rural Scene

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25 (Special) — Large numbers of bookmobiles are being used in the country filling station, pull a large open top and carry a small group of children, housewives and farmers — clamor board, say hello to the librarian and begin searching for a book.

The bookmobile has come to be known as "becoming-familiar." This service is becoming-familiar to country people all over Idaho as the federally supported rural book program swings into its second busy year.

The object: More and better books for the rural population.

This year's contract doubled the President's request and totaled an even 6 million dollars for the program, thus increasing total federal expenditures to \$15,500,000 since the first fiscal year in 1956.

But Idaho, because its state library system was barely organized

received no money in the first year. Since then, however, the Gem state has been granted \$128,330; matched by \$87,787 from state grants.

What has the federal-state library program accomplished? Idaho has a trained librarian, Eugene D. Hart, who's busy strengthening and improving the overall system. In the first year's operation, \$30,000 was spent for books and a 25 per cent overall increase was noted in circulation. Also, the state purchased its bookmobile.

The program, however, has not run into "a uniformly enthusiastic reception. Four of 10 library districts have voted against the program.

At present, there are three participating district libraries. Typical of these districts is Boundary county. This system has tripled the number of hours it stays open and doubled the book budget.

Says John Lorenz, director of the overall federal library program: "It does pay—heart good. We can't keep up with the demand. These people are almost too eager."

Fifty states and territories are now matching the federal library grants. Only Indiana, Wisconsin and Delaware are left out—the last two tied up in legal and fiscal problems—can't take the money—while the Hoosiers, indicating a profound

distrust of Washington motives, won't take the money.

Indiana Governor Harold Handley has been quoted as fearing a brain-washing blitzkrieg from the nation's capitol. His fears are apparently baseless. For as library director Lorenz quietly points out, "The states have complete control over how the money is spent."

Lorenz says that the demands for different types of books follow the news and that during the last apocalyptic year there has been a heavy swing to "edible reading."

"None of the states are going heavy on the 'romance,' 'mystery' and 'western,'" he comments. "They apparently having a healthy ef-



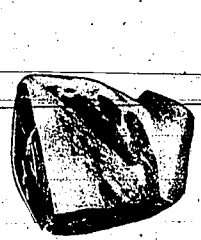

Chatterton found the first specimens of the species in 1932 in the hills near Adrian, Ore., and the first was later verified by the Smithsonian institute.

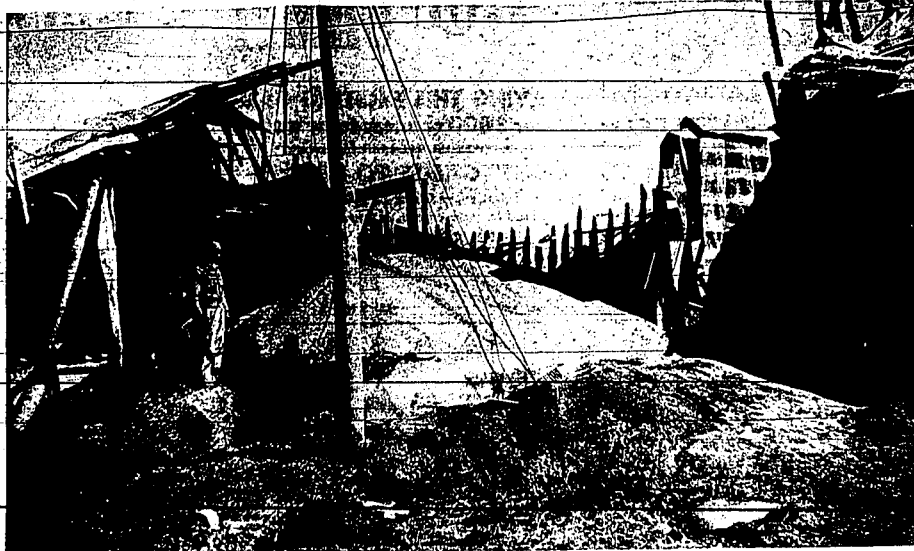
