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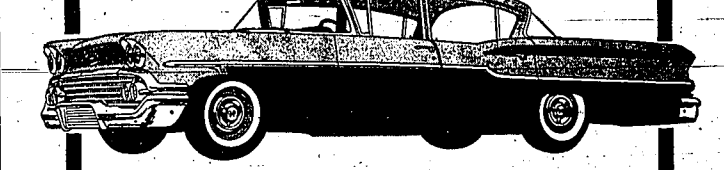

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Adrenal Gland's Chemical—Further Tamed by Science

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (UPI)—Science has further tamed one of the most powerful and subtle glands nature ever invented, and you may live to see the day when that chemical is roused out of science's hand, so to speak.

That chemical is cortisone, which is manufactured by the adrenal glands and those of many other kinds of creatures along with other chemical body regulators called hormones. Without adrenal glands and cortisone you die.

Inject—cortisone—helps rheumatic and rheumatic cripples, thus adding to their personal supply of it they get up and walk with pleasure and ease. That goes for a host of other and less dramatic diseases of muscles, joints and bones.

But it's a wild, uncontrollable power. Doctor or-later the side effect as it is known, may be anything from stomach ulcers to violent mad disturbances, and the doctor has to stop injecting cortisone. The rejuvenated cripple sinks back into helplessness.

That's why progress in scientific efforts to tame cortisone is big and good news: The news is that a man-made cortisone seems to have even more power in reducing inflammations of body tissues than nature's.

It is dexamethasone which was put together by chemists of the Merck Sharp and Dohme research laboratories—the same chemists who were the first to "make" cortisone—chemically, identically with nature's.

Dexamethasone is an experimental drug and is at least nine months away from the market. It is now being tried out by about 1,700 doctors in patients who in the end will total approximately 20,000. Preliminary results from 1200 patients were reported by Dr. Augustus Gibson, who is in charge of these try-outs.

They show dexamethasone on the average is 35 times more powerful than cortisone, drop-for-drop, against inflammatory processes in the body. So far there have been no reports of it causing disturbances in the body's handling of salt and other components of its vital chemistry.

Nor does it seem to increase the patient's susceptibility to diabetes, stomach ulcers, or psychotic "episodes." Dr. Gibson said that of course, this was not the perfect cortisone. Some side effects remain but they are less severe and easier to prevent and control.

The perfect cortisone is nature's. In healthy bodies, the amount manufactured by the adrenal gland performs their functions without a suggestion of side-effects. It is a chemical balance and counter-balance which science does not yet understand. Adding to the supply from the "outside" upset the balance in the long run.

A chemical can be tamed when the molecule is known. You add and subtract atoms here and there around the molecule and each time you do you've changed the nature of the chemical. Chemists have made a number of changes in the cortisone molecule which have reduced side effects. Dexamethasone is the newest and seemingly the most successful.

Treasury Will Put Notes up for Sale

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP)—The government announced yesterday it wants to raise about \$2 billion in new short-term securities.

The treasury said it will sell 15-day Treasury notes in \$100 million lots on Monday about one billion dollars of 30-day Treasury notes to yield 3 1/2 per cent interest.

It also will offer cash subscriptions about \$1 billion dollars of 210-day special treasury bills to be sold at a fixed price which will yield interest of approximately 3 1/2 per cent.

Treasury officials said they were more or less forced to offer shorter-term securities because of the decline in the government bond market.

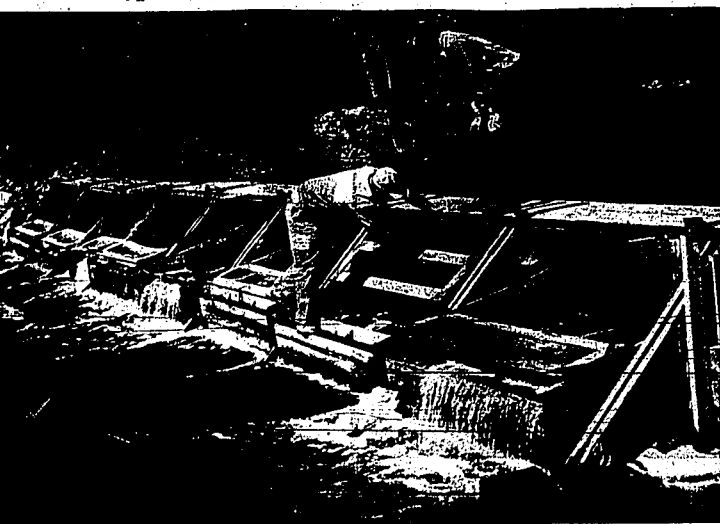

Traps Used to Collect Downstream Migrations

Experiment With Salmon and Steelhead Runs Held in Area of Brownlee, Oxbow

Over near the mouth of Wildhorse river the first season of an experiment to transplant runs of salmon and steelhead has ended. It appears that the project, being conducted by the Idaho fish and game department, has not upset the downstream migration pattern of young chinook salmon or steelhead trout even though it adds about 100 miles to their migration each way.

Wildhorse river emptied into the Snake river between Oxbow and Brownlee dams. It supported small, but important, runs of steelhead trout and spring chinook salmon. Because of the expenses involved in maintaining these runs in the Wildhorse river, it was decided to attempt to transplant them to the Weiler river drainage and to replace their loss to Wildhorse river with annual plantings of cross-race rainbow trout. Accordingly the federal power commission requested the Idaho Power company, the agency building dams, to appropriate trapping facilities and provide for trapping and transplanting salmon and steelhead from Wildhorse river, to the downstream Weiler river, up to 300 cubic feet per second of the river flow is to be diverted through culverts, two feet in diameter and the migrants are strained from the water. Latest Word From Dulles Implies U.S. Indecision and Weakness in East Crisis

Secretary of State Dulles has spoken out against "indecision or weakness" in the Far East crisis. But his address in New York last night seemed to imply American indecision and weakness.

In fact, the secretary may have issued an invitation to the Soviet Union to seize the diplomatic initiative once again in this grim battle for influence over the world's uncommitted millions. There would be a great deal of propaganda credit to be reaped to imply American indecision and weakness.

Secretary Dulles' words seemed to indicate that the key to the solution of the Far East crisis—perhaps the only key—was in the hands of the Russians. He said he believed "the Soviet Union, if it wanted to see a peaceful solution, could make that proposal to any peacemaking efforts in the Far East."

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There are many among America's allies who believe the key to the Far East crisis still lies in the heavy pressure of world opinion.

The bulk of world opinion at the moment appears to see the United States' position in the whole matter of the offshore islands as hopelessly untenable, whatever their fears of communist expansion might be.

Many of these allies view U. S. support of Chiang Kai-shek's pipe dreams of reconquering the mainland as a constant and growing menace to the peace of Asia and the world.

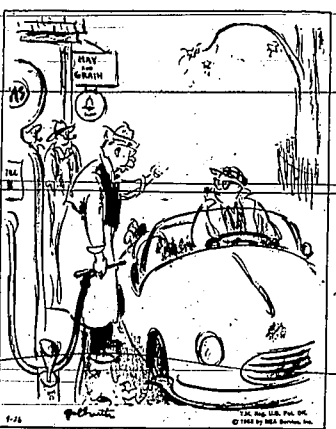

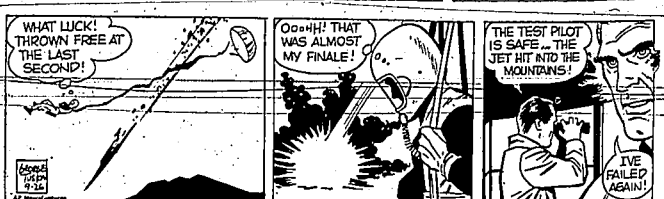
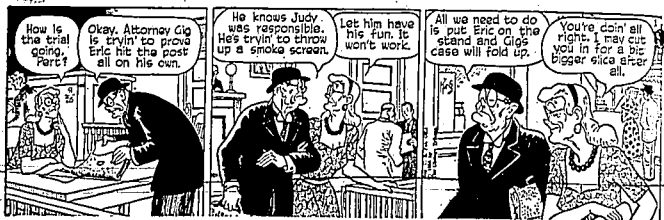
