DeGaulle Plan Wins Vote Test

PARIS, Sept. 29 (UPI)—President de Gaulle has won his first return to power in a referendum in which history today gave a resounding personal triumph and a strong constitutional vote for a new Fifth Republic.

The referendum will be held in the official capital of France and will give voters a choice between the continuation of the Fourth Republic or a new constitution by a vote of almost 4-1.

The referendum was held in 17,668,824 "yes" votes and 4,474,475 "no" votes. There was a turnout of 85.5 percent among registered voters. Counting of those who went to the polls, however, was not complete. The new constitution was approved by 78.3 percent.

The referendum was held in West Africa—the French overseas empire—because the constitution in that area was not yet in effect.

Candidates Starting On Campaign Road

With five weeks to go before the Nov. 4 general election, Republicans and Democrats took to Idaho's roads today. The top Democratic candidates planned to tour one county and the Republicans in three: State Sen. A. M. Derr, Clark Fork, Democratic candidate for governor, was scheduled to join other state and congressional candidates to begin their campaign tour in southern Idaho. Gov. Robert E. Smylie, the incumbent Republican, headed north. He said he would appear in Coeur d'Alene tonight with A. B. Curtis, Orofino, the Republicans' first district congressional hopeful, and Sen. Henry Dworshak, a Republican candidate for the Senate. The senator is not up for re-election.

Smylie said the general GOP plan is to campaign in three units: headed respectively by himself, Curtis and Dworshak. He is seeking re-election in the Second District.

The Democrats planned to open their one-day campaign with rallies in Council, Payette and Weiser. Derr, who advocates a return to legalized gambling, will share the platform in some places with Democratic legislative candidates who oppose his plan.

Some of those are supporting Derr, they say, on grounds that they think he is a good candidate for the job. They believe his plan would not be adopted by the legislature.

Port publisher State Rep. W. Clay Sutton, Middleville, who will be on the platform at the Weiser rally, said he couldn't go for his program, but he doesn't think he has a chance.

Gooding Tax Levy for Air Field Vetoed

BOISE, Sept. 29 (UPI)—The state tax commission cited an attorney general's opinion today in support of its contention that a proposed tax levy in Gooding county is illegal.

Little Rock Board Seases Schools as Court Acts Tough

The U. S. supreme court said firmly today that state legislatures may not, either directly or indirectly, prevent the carrying out of the famous 1954 school desegregation decision. The high court handed down its formal opinion on the school issue within minutes of the hour that the Little Rock, Ark., school board—acting under legislation in that state that would force closed schools to a corporation which plans to open them in Arkansas and other southern states—announced that it would not open the schools.

The high court's decision is a landmark in the history of the struggle for racial equality. It is a clear and unequivocal statement that the federal government has the power to force the states to keep public schools open and to desegregate them.

Middle Income Group's Money Situation, Views Vary in U. S.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29 (AP)—How the man of modest means meets his financial problems during the economy's ups and downs—and what he thinks of the chances of good times or bad—often can be learned in the small loan departments of the banks and finance companies.

Their records of demand for loans, difficulties of collection, and volume of delinquents reflect trends among a large segment of citizens—just as the records of the millions and billions that industry borrows give a clue to the course of business activity and thinking.

Today small loan patterns across the nation show marked regional variations—both as to the financial health of the citizen in the middle and lower income brackets and his confidence or caution in viewing the future.

This is underlined in 15 cities across the nation made on the eve of tomorrow's opening of the National Consumer Finance Association's meeting in Miami beach.

The Eastern seaboard shows less response in consumer attitudes to business recovery than some other sections. Many industrial areas of the Middle West, hard hit by the recession, are feeling much better, but still very cautious. Across the Mississippi a definite upturn is reported.

The Far West is only a little less optimistic and willing to borrow again.

All unite on one thing—money for the finance companies to borrow in order to lend to you. It's getting tighter and interest rates seem

headed back to their 1937 peaks. Across the Mississippi, St. Louis says collections are improving. Des Moines notes a rise in loan volume in recent weeks although many customers are still very careful to avoid over-extension of indebtedness.

In Denver demand for consumer loans in August and September showed a definite increase and collections have improved greatly. The average customer is buying more freely and able to make larger down payments.

In the Far West: Los Angeles thinks the worst of delinquency and losses is passed and confidence seems to be improving.

A Bellevue, Wash. finance company reports employment improving and customers showing willingness to spend but definitely demanding more value, particularly in autos.

In the East: Albany, N. Y. reports no increase in demand for loans except for vacations, although the average customer isn't as pessimistic now about job security or an imminent third world war. An Ithaca, N. Y. finance company has added to its staff to cope with increasing collection problems. Its potential customers are still very cautious and adding to savings rather than borrowing.

In Upper Derby, Pa. the high cost of living is blamed for collection troubles—and heavier than usual net losses. The average customer there shows further resistance to high prices and large debt, with

loan demand mostly for emergency needs. Portsmouth, Va., hopes loan demand will brighten in the latter part of the year.

It's already there in Washington, D. C., with the consumer showing more confidence and willingness to incur debt.

Tampa, Fla., says consumer confidence lags behind stock market activity, with borrowers still taking a wait-and-see attitude.

In the Middle West: Jackson, Mich., reports collections in West state still a serious problem, but customers more optimistic now. In Columbus, Ohio, delinquencies are higher, following the pattern of 1930 and 1934, but loan demand is rising, now—though more to buy services than usual.

Evanville, Ind., sees some measure of loan volume upturn but little improvement in collections. It reports some customers worrying about coming inflation and talking of borrowing to buy now to beat price hikes.

Chicago reports improvement in the credit worthiness of applicants, and it steady if moderate improvement in cash collections.

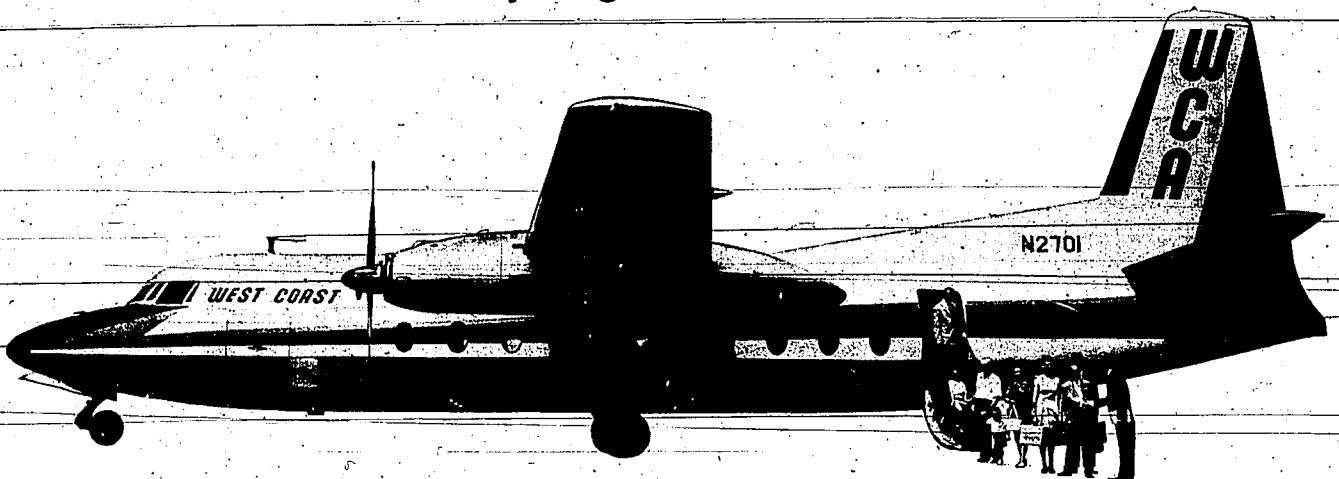
