## Truckers Discuss Freight Rate Schedules Here

Truckers in southern Idaho probably will be discussing informally among themselves during the next few weeks a move by Twin Falls shippers and the Chamber of Commerce to revise intrastate truck freight rates on commodities moving into and out of Twin Falls. Letters will be sent from the chamber office during the week advising area truck carriers that relief is being sought from rates deemed inequitable by chamber officials and local shippers. Trucking officials and shippers met early Tuesday at the chamber office to discuss what steps can be taken to adjust rates into and out of Twin Falls. A chamber committee headed by Jack Smith, Twin Falls, began gathering information on the local truck freight rate situation weeks ago. Last week Smith and other local shippers met at a chamber office with Richard L. Anderson, director of transportation for the state public utilities commission. The meeting also called upon local shippers to sit-down with trucking officials in an attempt to get started on a rate adjustment. Truck freight rates into and out of Twin Falls are based for the most part on rates set by the Interstate Railroad rates into and out of Twin Falls were based originally on the fact that freight for Twin Falls from the west went first to Minidoka or Pocatello and then was shipped back to Twin Falls. Similarly, freight moving out of Twin Falls was based on the fact that it was shipped to Pocatello or Minidoka and then to the coast.

## Reports, Driving Training Law Discussion Close Safety Session

Committee reports and a discussion of a proposed state driving training law wound up the annual fall meeting here Tuesday morning of the Idaho chapter of the National Safety Council. The group opened sessions with an informal meeting of officers Sunday evening. Meetings Monday and Tuesday were held in the Rogerson hotel Roundup room. Jerome County Probate Judge Theron Ward, who spoke to the group Monday night, advocated early training of young drivers, stricter law enforcement and greater civic concern as methods of coping with the highway safety problem. The speaker was "Future Safety Depends Upon Today's Actions." He stressed three points, education, enforcement and change of attitude. He said it was better to educate the youth while they were young than when they are 20 or 21 years of age. He advocated stronger law enforcement, both on the part of police and the courts. He said he believed a driver's license should be taken for one year on the first offense and for life after conviction for drunken driving, repetition of offense. Judge Ward stated there is too much complacency in the part of citizens. He said it is unpopular to stress safety. He pointed out that this includes the safety training, but it is those staying away from such things who should become interested in safety. State Police Lt. Clark Hand, Twin Falls, in opening the afternoon program by discussing traffic safety, said anything traffic safety groups can do to bring about driving is welcome. "However," Hand said, "you'll never get better and safer driving until you convince people that traffic laws are just as important as other laws." Lieutenant Hand said that national safety organizations sponsor applications carefully, making certain they are not harmful, criminal, violative or un-American. ### New Nuclear Soil Moisture Measuring Gadget Shown

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 30 (UP)—A nuclear gadget to determine soil moisture content was described to the Society of American Foresters last night.

It operates on the same principle as that used in the atomic bomb, nuclear devices discover water underground or trace underground flows.

When a fast-moving atomic particle enters a neutron into a hydrogen atom it bounces back, slowed down, and can be picked up and counted by a nuclear counter, such as a Geiger counter.

The hydrogen atom in this case is contained in water, popularly and chemically called H<sub>2</sub>O.

Richard H. Marston, U. S. forest service, Columbia, O.—formerly at Gaden, Utah—demonstrated the gadget he used in experiments on determining soil moisture.

The neutron is emitted by a radioactively-enriched bunch of boron fluoride. The count of the neutrons bounced back by hydrogen atoms determines the amount of moisture in the soil.

Marston took samples of soil and determined the moisture content by using the customary gravimetric method. In that method, the patch of soil is taken out, weighed, baked and weighed again. The difference in weight shows how much water was there before it was evaporated by the baking process.
