## Balloon Test Will Be in New Mexico

CROSBY, N.M., Oct. 2 (UPI)—The air force and last night it will launch its "man high" balloon flight to the stratosphere from a site in New Mexico due to continued adverse weather conditions in Minnesota.

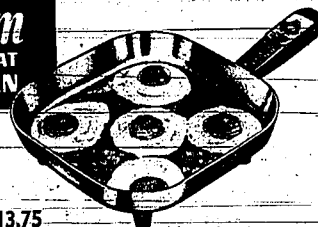

# Truman Picks Nixon; Thinks He's Beatable

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Oct. 2 (UP)—Former President Harry S. Truman today said he would support the Republican nominee for President in 1940 is Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

"We can lick him," the Democratic candidate said in remarks at a luncheon here.

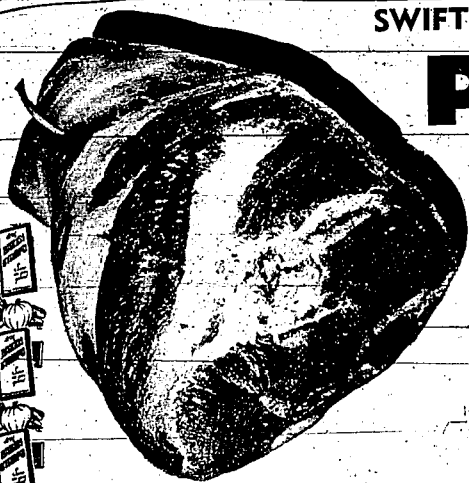

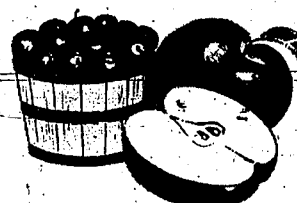

## Conversion of Policies OK'd For Korea Vet

More than 65,000 Korean war veterans will soon be able to convert their previously non-convertible term of insurance to permanent policies, it was announced Wednesday by Arnold H. Jones, local veterans administration representative.

The affected term of policies, he said, are identification by the letters "R" which precede the policy numbers.

Beginning next January "R" from shareholders will have three options, H. Jones explains. The options are to convert "R" term policies to permanent policies of 15, 20, 25 or 30 years, or to exchange "R" term policies for a "limited convertible" term policy carrying a lower premium rate, but which, after Sept. 1, 1960, cannot be renewed by persons who have passed their 30th birthday anniversary, and to keep "R" term policies at the currently established premium rates, which increase every five years.

H. Jones says the type of permanent insurance to be available under the new law is ordinary life, 20-pay life, 20-pay life, 20-year endowment, endowment at age 60 and endowment at age 65.

The new type policies, like the "R" policies, will not yield dividends.

"R" policiesholders will be affected by the new law, it does not re-open OI insurance.

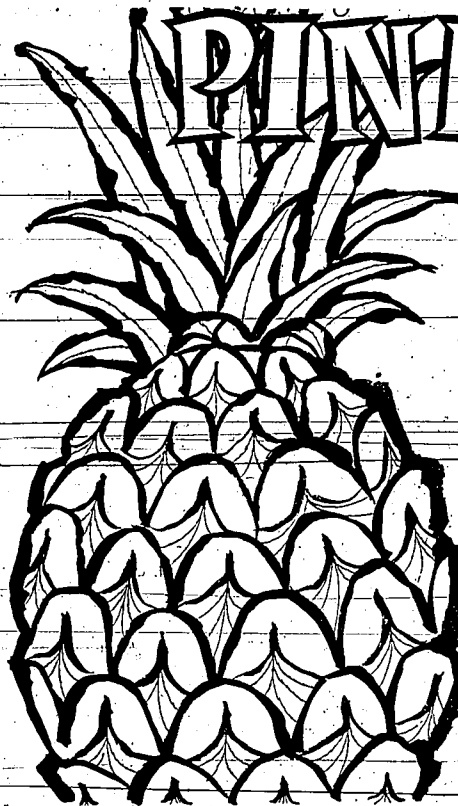

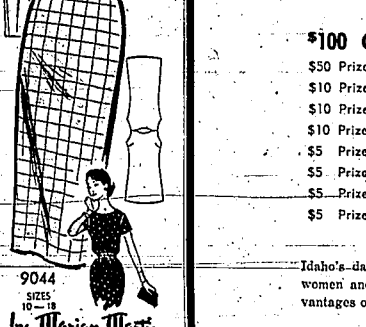

# U. S., Formosa Policy Split Threatens Crisis Solution

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—A policy split between the United States and national China yesterday threatens U. S. efforts to find a compromise way out of the Formosa crisis.

The split became dramatically evident in divergent statements made by Secretary of State Dulles here and by President Chiang Kai-shek on Formosa, the Chinese nationalist chief spoke out in an ex-

clusive interview with The Associated Press after Dulles' news conference Tuesday.

The issue on which they focused attention is the future of the national-held coastal islands, Quemoy and Matsu.

In essence, Dulles made clear the United States would be willing to stop their attacks on Quemoy and

thus establish a cease-fire in the region. The reds have had Quemoy under bombardment since Aug. 23. The status of Quemoy and Matsu thus became a bargaining point in Dulles' efforts to quell the danger of a general war in the Far East.

The question sharply posed by Chiang's response is how Dulles can bargain at all without the cooperation and support of nationalistic Chinese cooperation and support which the generalissimo, on the basis of yesterday's interview, apparently intends to deny.

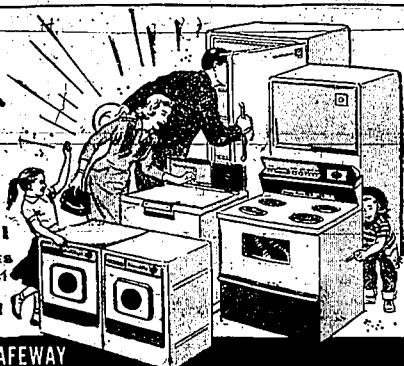

# Big Hog Crop Threatens to Lower Prices

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (UPI)—The agriculture department warned hog-risers Wednesday that sharply rising production threatens to tumble prices in the fall of 1959 to half the 1958 average.

Department economists said if pig production in the next spring season (December-May) tops last year's level by close to the 20 per cent recently forecast for the December-January period, there is "grave danger" prices next autumn will fall to \$10.60 per hundredweight, (that is the level reached in the fall of 1955. Pigs born in the spring season normally go to slaughter in the fall and winter of the same year.

Prices for all of 1958 will probably average close to \$20 per hundredweight, the economist predicted.

Writing in a livestock and meat situation report, government livestock experts said hog prices next fall are almost certain to drop to the lowest point since the fall of 1955.

How close prices come to the 1955 low depends on how far farmers push the expansion in production that got under way with the fall pig crop this year, the economists said.

A "moderate" increase of less than 20 per cent for the spring crop would probably keep next fall's prices above the 1955 floor by an "appreciable margin," they said.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 2—The maine Fielding's plan to show off a U. S. laundry at a Moscow fair went down the drain. But he cleaned up in the Soviet Union anyway.

Fielding, a 38-year-old dealer in laundry equipment, flew home to Los Angeles to await arrival of \$30,137.

Where's the money coming from? The Russians.

It all started as a potential tax-free junket to Russia, Fielding said. "I heard there was to be an American trade fair there and signed up for a laundry exhibit. Then I gathered together four accounts to supply machinery and put everything aboard a ship bound for Helsinki, Finland."

# Land Reform Is Started for Iraq

CAIRO, Oct. 2 (AP)—The Middle East News Agency has reported that a five-year land reform program has been instituted in Iraq. Land redistribution has been a key part of the Egyptian revolution and is being introduced in Syria by the United Arab Republic.

The semi-official agency under government control also said Brig. Gen. Abdul Salam Arif has been relieved of his job as deputy premier in the young republic and named ambassador to Germany.

The land reform plan was announced by Premier Abdel Karim Kassem, in a broadcast, the agency reported from Baghdad.

It said he appealed to the people for cooperation in implementing the plan and asserted it was aimed at freeing them from feudal domination and at securing justice.

# Adlai Favors U.S. Leaving Quemoy Isles

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 2 (UPI)—Adlai Stevenson issued a broadcast statement Wednesday, declaring in effect, "Let's give the islands of Quemoy and Matsu up and concentrate on the defense of Formosa."

"I think that we, the United States, should not be defending these islands right on China's doorstep," said the former Democratic presidential candidate as he appeared on television for the first time since his personal appearance in California of Republican vice president Richard M. Nixon.

"I think Chiang (nationalist leader Chiang Kai-shek) wants to shut his business," Stevenson said in a 100-word statement. "I don't want to see him last night in Beverly Hills. I respect his (Chiang's) feelings about them, but I also know I would feel if the enemy had a foot in my front door during a war. I would try to pinch it off as soon as I could."

Stevenson, titular chairman of the nation's Democratic Party, threw his weight into an effort to unseat Republican nominees in the November election, by appearing, across town, while Nixon spoke on television from Hollywood in behalf of GOP candidate Sen. William F. Knowland, running for governor, and Gov. Goodwin J. Knight, aspirant to succeed Eisenhower in Congress.

Although his campaign path did not cross Stevenson's at international airport, Nixon was told of Stevenson's foreign policy remarks. Nixon said, "I think you've thought. But it is unrealistic and unworkable."

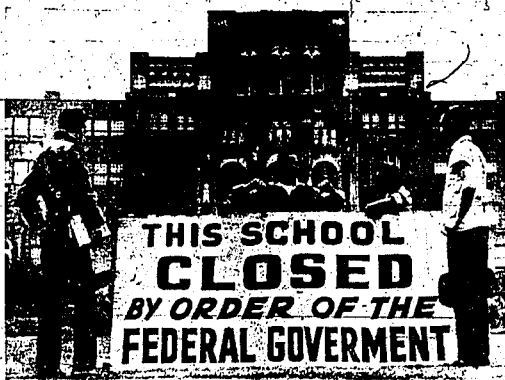
## Support Claimed
