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## Government Economists See Peak Production in Late '38

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—Government economists predicted yesterday the recovering economy will bring to peak production rate of roughly 450 million dollars annually in this final quarter of 1938. They also forecast another shrinkage of unemployment in October comparable to the drop of nearly 600,000 last month.

Although these predictions are tentative, they are heartening to the administration. If they are borne out, Republican candidates can point to a reduction in the number of jobless to about 7 1/2 per cent by the end of Nov. 3, congressional elections.

This still would be about one million above the level of last fall but would represent much improvement from the average of five million unemployed which prevailed in the first nine months of this recession year.

Secretary of Commerce Weeks was armed with these favorable appraisals as he and other government officials headed yesterday for Hot Springs, Va., for a week-end conference with the Business Advisory council.

Strong optimism that the recovery will continue into 1939 prevailed among Advisory council members arriving yesterday afternoon at Hot Springs for the closed session. At the council's opening meeting about a third of its nearly 100 members told Weeks they favored an emergency reduction in federal interest rates.

# OVERPOPULATION PROBLEMS

Increasing overpopulation throughout the world and also in the United States is causing no little concern. The figures are appalling and threatening according to the experts.

Christ is estimated to have been about 300,000,000. It had increased to only 600,000,000 by 1850, largely due to operation of the Malthusian theory that medieval wars, famines and plagues would reduce the population and the food supply in balance.

Dr. Malthus, however, took a liking with the advance of science and agricultural production methods, improved medicine and fewer scourges from war.

From 1850 to the present time the population jump has been from 600,000,000 to an estimated 2.7 billion. It is estimated that it will reach 7 to 9 billion within 100 years. When DDT was introduced into Ceylon, to give one example of the reasons for population increase, the birth rate fell heavily, but the birth rate kept to previous high levels.

Nor is the United States immune from the overpopulation danger. In the last 25 years, it has increased from 125,000,000 to about 172,000,000. The percentage increase is greater than that for the world as a whole. It is figured that our population will be between 210,000,000 and 230,000,000 by 1975.

Interestingly, when the Anglican Bishops reversed their historic opposition to birth control, as the Vatican has done, the principal reason for the reversal was the threat of overpopulation.

Suggested remedies by the experts are: Birth control, new foods from the seas and chemicals, improvement of desalting of water to irrigate unproductive acres, reduction of spoiling through use of chemicals and radiation. The army is now conducting extensive experiments on new foods and protection against decay at a Chicago center.

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### New Pills for Polio Having Good Results

MONTEAPOLIS, Oct. 17 (AP)—Minnesota researchers report encouraging results from polio pills administered orally.

They said yesterday the vaccine pills give hope that polio soon may become as rare a world disease as is measles today.

Dr. Herman Kleinman, chief of the chronic disease division of the Minnesota health department, said the main advantage of the pills, as against the Salk vaccine, is that doctors or nurses are not required to administer them. He said also that the cost is much less.

The report covered tests of the pills on 148 families—245 adults and 217 children—in University Village, a Minneapolis college housing project.

Of 175 children who had shown no antibodies to type one polio, 163 or 93 per cent showed antibodies after taking the pills. There was 83 per cent success in building type two antibodies and 90 per cent with type three, the researchers said.

Another building in adults showed 43 and 50 per cent success for the three types.

Similar tests on some 250,000 persons in other countries have so far shown no ill effects, said Dr. Robert H. Barr, executive officer for the program. He said it may soon be possible to replace the three pills now used for the differing polio strains with a single capsule.

Dr. Harry Bauer, laboratory director for the department, explained that the pills contain a live but harmless polio virus as compared with the Salk shots, which are made up with killed virus.

The pills more closely approximate the protection a person would gain from having had the disease.

The pills can provide immunity for up to seven years.

### Expert Blasts U. S. Reserve Board Policy

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—A congressional economic expert yesterday criticized the federal reserve board's handling of both the 1958 boom and the 1957 recession.

He said the board's policies may actually have helped to deepen the slump which started in the late summer of 1957.

"The expert, Dr. Asher Achinstein, senior specialist in the legislative reference service of the library of congress, made his comments in a special study for the senate banking committee.

Sen. J. William Fulbright, D., Ark., the committee chairman, said members of his group took no position on the report. But the senator commented it "with the careful attention of the congress and to all who are concerned with the vital issues of monetary policy."

Fulbright said Achinstein not only is a well-known author of economic studies but also is a noted Dr. Arthur F. Burns, former chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, in preparing the first two economic reports submitted to congress by President Eisenhower.

His criticism of federal reserve policy in 1958 centered on what he said was failure to act quickly enough to damp down the boom that gathered steam that year. That boom started an upward trend in living costs after several years of steady prices.

As to the system's actions when a recession was getting under way Achinstein said it was hard to understand why the board slightly raised the interest rate in August 1957, by raising the interest rate at which banks borrow money.

Achinstein said that "if the inadequacies of the federal reserve in 1958 may justifiably be considered an encouraging subsequent inflationary developments, the miscalculations in the summer and fall of 1957 may be said to have contributed to the sharp business decline in the post-war period."

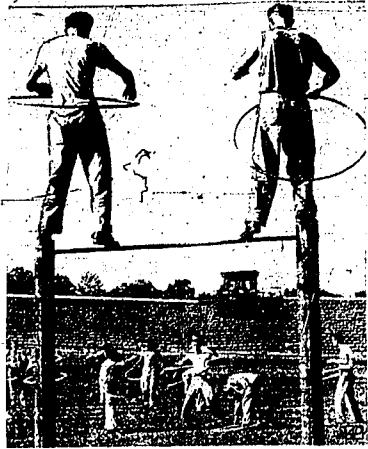
### Names of Wreck Victims Reported

### Television Permit Grant Is Affirmed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—The U. S. court of appeals rejected yesterday a contention that a Jewish educational institution "is ineligible to hold a broadcast license."

The ruling affirmed the award of a license to Loyola university in New Orleans for a channel 4 television station.

The legal right of Loyola to hold a broadcast license was challenged by James A. Noe and company, an unsuccessful applicant, and a predominantly Protestant organization—Protestant and Other American Unions—of Separation of Church and State. The group, not a party to the action itself, filed a friend-of-the-court brief trying the court to overturn the award, made by the federal communications commission.

Of three unions offered workers, United Mine Workers attracted 23 votes. Metal Trades and Steel Workers were other organizations seeking the right to represent uranium miners and maintenance employees here.

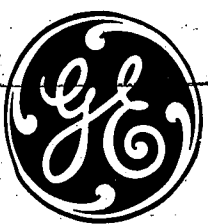

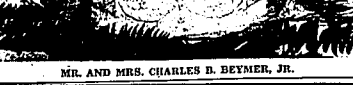

### Device Will Land Airplanes by Self

LONDON, Oct. 17 (AP)—British aviation scientists yesterday announced a new automatic landing system which can bring a plane down safely on the runway through thick fog while the pilot sits back with folded arms.

Landing system now in use guides aircraft down a radio beam to about 150 feet but the pilot has to control the touchdown after sighting the ground.

The new system, developed by scientists of the government supply ministry, utilizes magnetic fields induced by two cables placed each side of the runway. These hold the aircraft to the runway center line.

An instrument known as a radio altimeter provides accurate measurement of height down to zero and automatically adjusts the rate of descent.
