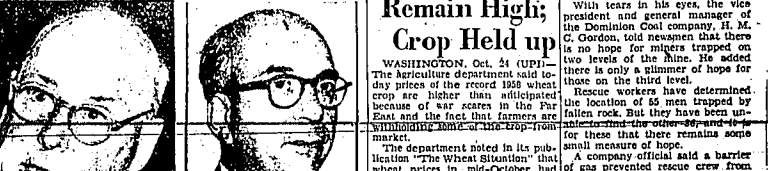

SPRINGHILL, N. S. Oct. 24 (UPI)—A violent rock shift left 91 men trapped deep in a coal mine today with virtually no hope of survival. Three bodies had been recovered, and 78 men had staggered to safety through the debris. Seventeen of the survivors were injured. A company spokesman belatedly announced that six supervisors were with the men still trapped hours after tons of rock and coal broke loose without warning. ## Smoking as Cause Of Cancer Tested

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (UPI)—The Tobacco Institute, Inc., striking back at reports linking smoking with lung cancer, said today five different groups of scientists have subjected experimental animals to cigarette smoke and tars without producing a single case of cancer.

In three of the tests, the animals actually inhaled cigarette smoke, and in another, it said, mice "smoked" the equivalent of 600 to 800 cigarettes a day without developing lung cancer.

The findings were reported in the institute's publication, "Tobacco and Health."

The institute, which is supported by U. S. tobacco companies, has been conducting a campaign to counteract the findings of some lung cancer.

# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The Democrats' belated discovery of President Eisenhower's continuing popularity throughout the country has forced them to introduce a new election strategy. They are running against the more conservative Republican organization and Vice President Nixon instead of against him in the White House.

Opposition leaders, especially candidates for the House and Senate, are distinguishing between the President and the Republican party. They are attacking the GOP instead of the leader who won by a 10 million vote in 1956, while the voters were reflecting a Democratic congress.

They are pointing out that, if a Democratic congress is returned on November 4, it will be the first time in history that a president has been faced with a hostile majority in Congress for six consecutive years. In their opinion, this will prove that Eisenhower is not a representative Republican.

**CHARGE GOP DEFECTION**—In short, the Democrats are trying to create the impression that the President is a general traitor to the party. They are attacking him as a traitor to the party and to the country.

They are also seeking to capitalize on the President's demagogic style. They are attacking him as a demagogue, a man who appeals to the emotions of the masses rather than to the intellect.

**"TRICKLE-DOWN" THEORY**—Readers aiming to develop and dramatize this division, the Democrats are attacking the "trickle-down" theory of economic growth. They are attacking it as a theory that has failed to bring about the prosperity it promises.

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# THE BAMBOO CURTAIN

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# VIEWPOINTS OF OTHERS

**CONCERNING INITIATIVE 202**  
The Spokesman-Review has withheld until this time its declaration of its belief in the "right to work" initiative measure, 202, that will be on the Nov. 4 ballot in Washington.

This newspaper has been concerned with whether or not it would actually accomplish what its sponsors seek to accomplish. It has wanted to explore dispassionately the probable effects on union members of passage of this measure. It has wanted to get as much information as possible on what is happening to the job market in this state in the present business-labor climate.

Taking all known factors into account, the Spokesman-Review believes that union members and the majority of the other citizens of the state will be benefited by the passage of initiative No. 202.

Consequently, the Review has been in effect in most parts of this country for so long a time that it has been led to believe that compulsion is necessary for desirability.

In truth, compulsion is not to be blamed for most of the evils which have plagued organized labor in this country. It has been exposed publicly and dramatically only recently, especially in the findings of the McClellan committee of the United States Senate.

Because compulsory unionism gives legal protection to unworthy, irresponsible and even corrupt union leaders, many rank-and-file members and many unorganized workers have seen the need for a return to voluntary unionism.

Such a return is possible, on a state basis, under the provisions of present national labor relations law. In Washington state, initiative No. 202, on the November ballot, is a simple declaration that would be enacted into state law upon approval of a majority of voters. It would provide individual freedom of choice for the man or woman who works for a living. It does this by making null and void any future agreement which requires membership or financial support of a labor organization as a condition for securing or holding a job.

Initiative No. 202 does not do away with collective bargaining, which is guaranteed by federal law. It does not effect wage or hours of work. It does not force a "return" to voluntary unionism, when union leaders would be encouraged to conduct regular, honest, free elections and when understandable financial reports to the members who pay the dues.

Because it would create an atmosphere in which voluntary unionism would be the norm, initiative No. 202 would tend to end the control and domination which have prevented honest union members from becoming dictatorial, corrupt or otherwise unworthy to the membership.

Because of the present coercive political power which a relatively small number of union leaders could exert in this state—at the expense of many union members and the many more voters not affiliated with any union—this measure would have a long and significant effect of passage by the voters.

Hence those who believe in the necessity for enactment of legislation to restore voluntary unionism have resorted to the initiative process of lawmaking. The terms and probable effects of initiative No. 202 are clearly and thoroughly understandable, in spite of the distortions and misinterpretations advanced by those who enjoy the protections and privileges of compulsory unionism.

## Local Churches Set Drive to Provide Clothing for Homeless Through World

Bundles of clean clothing for shipment around the world to disaster-stricken people and homeless refugees will be collected by Twin Falls churches beginning Nov. 2.

The Twin Falls Ministerial association voted to start collecting the clothing bundles on Nov. 2 and continue through the end of the year. The bundles will be sent to refugees in every corner of the world through Church World Service clothing center, Modesto, Calif.

The church world service has asked congregations across the country to raise 50 million pounds of clothing during the next four years with an immediate goal of 10 million pounds during 1958. It is estimated that the Twin Falls goal should be 100,000 pounds.

Church members in Twin Falls have been asked to help contribute to the program. Local pastors encourage everyone, that everyone, to contribute, whether, affiliated with a church or not, is urged to help in the clothing drive.

"After the broadest possible participation in this program can secure," says the Rev. Dr. B. Blackstone, Presbyterian church pastor and publicity chairman for the drive.

"Everyone should be able to participate in the clothing drive," the Rev. Dr. Blackstone continued, adding, "We really want to go all out and obtain broad participation."

Bundles will be placed in church basements and elsewhere to receive the clothing. An accompanying donation of eight cents a pound should be obtained, drive officials noted. The money collected will pay the costs of packing the clothing at the center in California.

What kind of clothing is needed? The Rev. Dr. Blackstone lists: coats, clothing, especially trousers and work clothing; teen-ager's clothing, for both boys and girls; children's clothing, of all varieties; men's clothing, suits, dresses, sweaters and undergarments; blankets and bedding; a "major" item needed in disaster strikes.

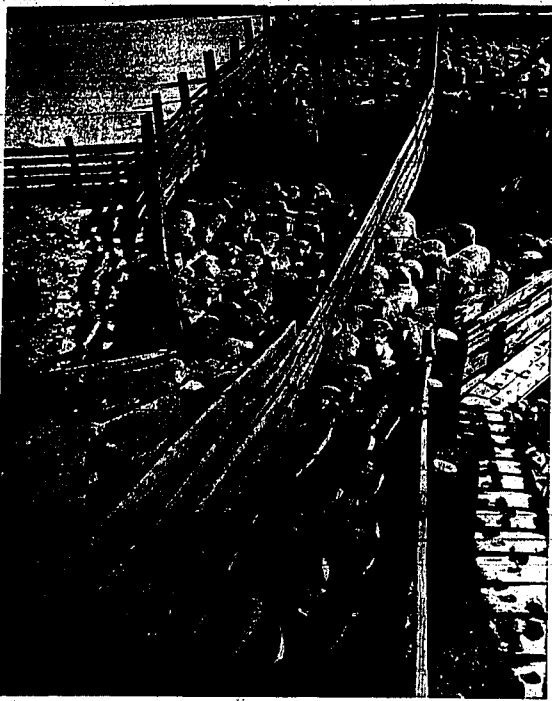

## Sheep Ranch Transferring Its Winter Quarters From Jerome to Washington

SUN VALLEY, Oct. 24.—Ten double-decked sheep cars and an empty car carrying three sheep wagons left Ketchum Tuesday as the vanguard of a flock that will move winter headquarters of the Box 1 ranch, from Jerome to Sunnyside, Wash.

Jack Lane, who has wintered his Box 1 and UP sheep near Jerome since 1928, plans to move 1,500 sheep from Idaho to the 21,856-acre ranch he has purchased 37 miles southeast of Yakima. The well-known Idaho sheepman put the blame for the move from Idaho on the bureau of land management, whom he said is crowding the sheep off the desert. He said the bureau has permitted cattle with no rights on the desert to crowd the sheep into one narrow section where the feed is depleted and sheepherders are unable to move camp from place to place in search of grass for their bands.

"No number one lambs were shipped from Ketchum this year," he said, "although there were good lambs at the lambing sheds near Jerome when the various Idaho outfits went onto the desert in the spring. More important than the cost of buying feed is the fact that nothing in the world beats great grass for lambs."

Pete Lane went ahead to receive the sheep for his father and supervise the building of lambing sheds and other buildings needed for the operation. Two Box 1 herders, Rafael Equihua and Gregorio Ayarza, are already there and Leon Arguello, Permin Olanilla and Marcus Ayarza went with the present shipment of 1,653 sheep.

The outfit expects to move its lambs, which will be started on the pastures of the Washington ranch, back to its reserves in the Sawtooth mountains north of Ketchum between April 15 and May 1.

Later this fall Jack Lane will leave for Brawley, Calif., where he operates a winter feeder lamb operation of 3,000 to 4,000 head. Pasture in the Imperial valley has risen this year from 2½ cents to 2 cents a head a day, he said, but he expects the market in Los Angeles, which buys 25,000 lambs a week, to be good.

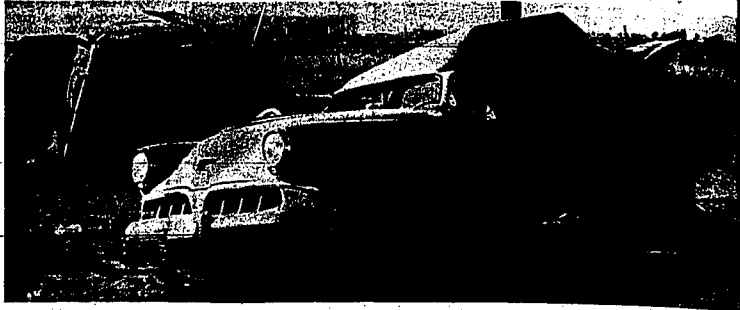

## 'Rights' Unit Sets Hearing In Vote Case

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—(AP)—The federal civil rights commission yesterday ordered a hearing on alleged denial of vote rights in the state.

The hearing, opening in Montgomery Dec. 8, will be the first held by the commission since it was created by Congress in 1957.

Vote Denial to the Board Chairman John A. Hannah told a news conference the hearing would be confined to allegations of denial of the right to vote in Alabama.

He had been asked whether it also would be concerned with the refusal of the Macon county voter registration board to show its records to commission agents.

Vice Chairman Robert G. Storey said it had not been decided whether the Montgomery hearing would be open to the public, but added that as far as he could see now it probably would be. The commission's decision to hold the hearing was unanimous.

Other Probes OK'd  
The commission also announced after a closed session that it had authorized further investigations of alleged denial of voting rights in Mississippi and Florida. The first investigations in those states were authorized in September.

There have been additional complaints since then.

## Railroad Blasts Hit in Colorado

RIFLE, Colo., Oct. 24.—A freight car filled with deadly eight-inch howitzer shells blew up in DeBeque canyon several miles west of here yesterday. The explosion was heard for miles.

A Denver and Rio Grande Western railroad spokesman said the blast was caused by sparks from a broken journal.
