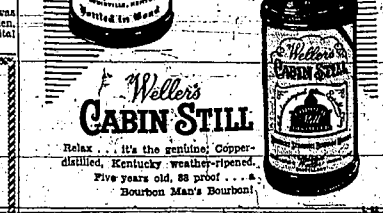

Experiment Shows Music Can Affect Humans as Tranquilizer

NEW YORK, Nov. 4 (UPI)—An extraordinary scientific experiment which used little children as guinea pigs has shown that human beings can be given tranquility in a way other than through alcoholic drink or such drugs as "happy pills" and sleeping tablets.

The tranquilizing method used on the kiddies hardly was a new one. It consisted merely of exposing them to music. Countless adults tranquilize themselves that way, and they would be amazed to learn why they ask themselves, why they are countless adults on whom music seems to have no effect.

By the time human beings become adults they're loaded with prejudices which color their responses to anything. So Prof. Charles H. Patterson, Jr., Longwood college, Danville, Va., chose to experiment with children—too young to have strong pro, anti, or neutral views about music.

They were 8-year-olds in the third grade. As a first step, he learned over a period of time all the things they did in the classroom which indicated their tension or lack of tranquility. These items included giggling, whispering, quarreling, incessant talkativeness, general "non-sensical" noise-making, thumb-sucking, twitching, pencil-biting and tongue-sticking-out.

Then soothing music was made a soft background in their classrooms on alternate days. This was continued for weeks. Frequency of tense, untroubled behavior on music days was compared with the frequency on non-music days. It was done by statistical techniques designed to rule out all questions but the prime one, did music work?

Classical recordings of an unobtrusive nature were chosen for the experiment. The purpose was to make the music felt in the children's unconscious but yet not let it intrude on their conscious thinking.

The simple result was that the children were less-tense and more tranquil on music days than on non-music days. Those who came from well-to-do, "cultured" families responded differently than those who didn't. Nor was there any statistically significant difference between those with high intelligence and those with low ones.

Patterson's experiment was sponsored by the Music Research foundation, which itself is extraordinary as a scientific foundation. It was founded by Francis Pappete, once a famous mezzo-soprano star of the Chicago opera, who now is its president.

"When a girl she accompanied a celebrated operatic baritone who was singing 'Mardi' was a wounded toward the end of this conflict. These men had had it. Yet the baritone believed "Over there" through their individual ward. He never understood why some of his audience were thrown into an anguished hysteria.

It occurred to Miss Pappete that music was medicine (aside from its entertainment value), which could be good or bad for the ill, like any other medicine. She started the foundation in 1944 and since then has been working with leading scientists of all kinds.

People have known for centuries that music bath charms to soothe the savage breast. The aim of the foundation sponsored scientific study to find out how and why it soothes, and what music soothes which most.

It wants to acquire so much knowledge that "any doctor can prescribe music with the same confidence that he prescribes any chemical tranquilizer, say, a prescription reading such as 'Brahms' Lullaby at bedtime—and when you feel on the verge of blowing your top."

New Federal 'Air Controls' Agency Born

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (UPI)—A new government unit with vast powers over civil and military air traffic—the federal aviation agency—will be born Tuesday.

Its first action, by order of President Eisenhower, was to take over the Airway Transportation Board and its employees.

—To Absorb CAA—

Before Jan. 1 it also will absorb an agency worldwide in scope and long familiar to the air-minded public, the civil aeronautics administration with its 27,000 employees.

Also by that date the FAA will acquire some 50 employees of the civil aeronautics board and, with them, all the safety rule-making authority of C.A.B.

By bill, airport by airport, for long months or even years ahead, FAA furthermore will take over more than 15,000 military communications and traffic control personnel. Eventually FAA expects to have 40,000 employees and a value, in equipment and facilities, of about \$1 billion dollars.

Groups Combined

For the first time aviation and air traffic control powers now vested loosely in half a dozen agencies will be combined in one body under an administrator with unprecedented authority to keep the nation's air commerce facilities abreast of aviation's swift advance into the jet age.

Officially FAA came into being Nov. 1. Since then was a Saturday, PAA Administrator Elwood R. (Pete) Quesada didn't actually take-over until yesterday.

Pope's Reign Starts in Time Of Quiet but Problems Exist

VATICAN CITY, Nov. 4 (AP)—Popeable distribution of the world's riches. John XXIII starts his reign at a time of relative peace, but he faces problems just as burdensome as those of his predecessor, who ruled through hot and cold world war. To a large extent they are the same problems that Pope Pius XII carried for 19 years. Foremost among them:

1. The Roman Catholic church's continuing struggle against atheistic communism.
2. The church's efforts in behalf of social improvements and equi-

ty, the problems, the new pope could add another more immediate one—the hinned ranks of the College of Cardinals, the church's highest governing body. Its 83 members average 73 years of age. Many of them are bent and weighted with more than the 70 years that the pope himself carries. Pope John, it is generally believed, will lose no time in filling the thin ranks of cardinals. More than any other single act, the new pope's attitude in the naming of new cardinals will indicate whether he plans to continue Pius XII's rather intensive efforts to stress the international aspects of the Roman Catholic church.

Some press comment already has referred to the new pope as a "European" pope. But while the pope's experience have been chiefly confined to Europe and the Middle East, his appeal must be worldwide. In his first message to the world, delivered a day after his election, he appealed to the rulers of all nations to strive for peace. He had a special thought for those in communist-dominated lands, where, he said, "the sacred rights of the church are rashly trod upon." And he invited a "return to the church of all those who had separated from it." He touched, too, on social ills. The human family, he said, does not want universal slaughter, but peace, "It is dolorous for me to point
