### New Columbia Bridge Is Now In Preparation

OLYMPIA, Nov. 6 (AP)—Construction is expected to begin next year on a \$2,300,000 toll bridge across the Columbia river at Biggs Rapids near Marshfield, state Highways Director W. A. Bugge said yesterday.

He said plans call for the span to be completed by the summer of 1961.

Project Said Feasible Bugge's statement followed submission of a report by a Chicago financial consultant, Paul Speer, which said the project would be financially feasible.

The report was made to Oregon and Washington highway officials and representatives of the Washington toll bridge authority as closed meetings in Vancouver Monday, Bugge disclosed.

After receiving the report the officials gave the go-ahead for designing the structure, which will take about six months.

The report was based on a proposed \$1 toll for a car and driver and truck tolls up to \$3.50.

Bonds Authorized The 1957 legislature authorized the issuance of bonds to finance the project.

Under an agreement between Oregon and Washington, the financing, construction and toll collection will be handled by Washington, Sherman county, Ore., will construct approach roads to the south end of the bridge, while Klickitat county will build the approach roads in the Washington side of the river.

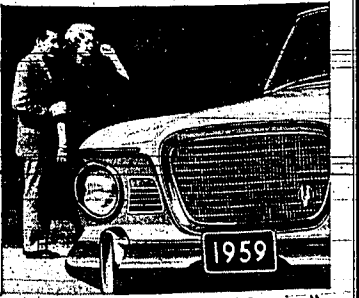

### Even Shoeshine Has Tradition In England, Writer Discovers

**BY HAL E. COOPER**

LONDON Nov. 5—Tradition of shoe shine has been traced to the days when the sun never set on the British empire. Londoners were usually clean as the get repaired. Some of them still have the tradition.

It is therefore fitting that the shoe shine pitch on the Shaftesbury Avenue side should be held by Dave Pearce, 75. He is one of two survivors of the original shoeshine society, which goes back 100 years.

In those days there were a lot of orphans and deserted children about the streets. They were oftenly described as waifs and strays.

They had no fixed abode and they made a living the best they could. A lot of them picked pockets and sold drunks.

In 1851 a group of public-spirited citizens persuaded police to designate 1,000 corners as "busy streets" as shoeshine pitches for the waifs and strays.

In order to qualify for a pitch, the waifs and strays had to enroll in the Central Feds Shoe Blacking society.

They were called "reds" because of their jackets.

"I shared the pitch at the Claridge Cross railway station with Alfred Harvey for 58 years," Pearce recalls.

"We're the last two members of the society. Waifs and strays became a get-secure-about-the-tummy society about the time of the first World war. So in 1917 the society's functions were taken over by the police."

The fellow who had the piece of ground pitch died about six months ago. There wasn't enough business for all and he both at Chrismas Cross, so I applied for the piece of ground pitch and got it."

"Occasionally is one of the few pitches where you can make a living blacking shoes. Fact is, the policeman only have 12 occupied pitches on their rolls these days."

"People who used to black shoes now sell newspapers. That guarantees them 3 pounds 10 shillings—\$2.50 a week. Shoe blacking is a chance because of the weather."

Dave has no fixed price for a shine. People give him anything from seven to 35 cents—depending on how they feel. Occasionally some high tip for a 10p note—\$1.40. This happens rarely.

The reported fall crop running 12 per cent ahead of last year's. Cauliflower, cabbage, brussels sprouts, and lettuce also are outstanding bargains.

#### Other Goods Told

Other good buys are iceberg lettuce, southern squash, nearby spinach, peppers from a variety of sources, sweet potatoes, radishes, cauliflower, endive and escarole. Tomatoes are in good supply and moderately priced.  
Sweet corn is a bit lower. Still on the edge of a good buy, with those who buy radishes and scallions will find them cheap.  
Apples abound in the fruit department. Western grapes and pears also are bargains. California oranges and lemons are fairly good buys. Grapefruit from Florida are in the same category.

### Demos' Names Increased for Ike Successor

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6 (UPI)—A refreshed crop of Democratic presidential prospects came out of Tuesday's elections, and their chances may be determined by the record of the 48th congress.

One of their number, senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson, will be a key figure in shaping the political destinies of all—as well as the record on which they must stand in 1960.

Johnson has been a consistent advocate of "constructive, responsible, moderate" liberalism. But he has shown he can interpret that philosophy to include vigorous spending like that of his new deal days as well as middle-ground compromising on such issues as civil rights.

Friends concede Johnson may have more trouble keeping party harmony in a senate which has 62 Democrats instead of 40. But he is reported ready to cooperate with a strong program of legislative action covering most of the political liberal Democratic colleagues will be demanding.

Because of the Democrats' split on civil rights Johnson's chances of getting his party's presidential nomination—assuming he wants it—are tied to his appeal as a "compromise" candidate plus his record as a "can do" leader in congress.

But the presidential aspirations of others will come a lot closer to the surface in the hectic and various state capitals in the next two years.

Some on the list are Democratic Sen. John F. Kennedy, Massachusetts and Illinois' former U. S. senator, both of whom won smashing victories on Tuesday.

Others include Democratic Sen. Albert Gore and Estes Rutherford, both Tennessee; Rep. Effect Edmund B. Muskie, Maine, a newcomer, also must be counted as a potential candidate for the future.

**Brown Is Possibility**

California's governor-elect, Democrat Edmund G. Brown, Jr., may not be the new prospect into the presidential arena. Brown, like Michigan's Gov. G. Mennen Williams, who won his sixth term this week, may find the political horizon altered by what Johnson has done through the new congress.

**Gov. Jerry's Gov. Robert G. Meyner, a strong presidential possibility in a state which grabbed 10 electoral votes from the Democrats last year, is another in the same boat.**

Republican presidential contenders must run against, rather than for, any Democratic legislative program. This may prevent them from "in-lining" on many proposals there is little real difference between President Eisenhower and what the Democratic 85th congress gave him.

### GOP Senator Sees Change In Farm Plan

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6 (UPI)—A Republican farm bill senator predicted today the new congressional session will halt Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson's drive for further reductions in federal farm price supports.

The Democratic victories, cutting heavily into Republican strength in farm belt states, will mean "as far as congress is concerned, a change in attitude toward farmers is at hand," said Milton R. Young, R., N. D.

Young, frequent critic of administration farm policy, who became second-ranking GOP member of the senate agriculture committee after the defeat Tuesday Sen. Edward J. Thye, R., Minn., told Young, "I see a possibility that there will be no further reductions in farm price supports."

Rep. W. R. Foster, D., Tex., senior Democratic member of the house agriculture committee, said the election results should mean the next congress "more inclined" to bolster farm prices.

Foster, reached at his home in Waco, Tex., said he believes Democratic farm leaders will push their program of farm price stabilization, next year instead of merely resisting Benson's proposed changes in present law.

Reviews of the results in Tuesday's balloting in congressional districts where the farm population amounts to five per cent or more of the total indicated rising Democratic strength in rural areas.

A check of 55 usually closely-contested house districts with five per cent or more farm population showed Democrats winning 23 seats in the 1954 elections, 32 in 1956, and 44 Tuesday.

Benson insisted in a post-election statement yesterday Agriculture has lost 47 prime lands in the balloting and said he saw no evidence of a vote against the administration farm program.

But Young said in an interview the returns clearly indicate dissatisfaction with Republican farm policies.

"The farm belt senator said that GOP strength in the past has been the support of farmers and small businessmen and we can't exist without that support."

"We have pretty well lost it from farmers," he added.

Benson's statement indicated he would go ahead with plans to ask congress for authority to lower price support floors for three major crops—wheat, corn and cotton.

Some earlier this year authorized reduced federal price for cotton, rice and rice byproducts in 1959.

**Hungarians Jailed**

BUDAPEST, Nov. 6 (AP)—The Budapest municipal court has sentenced 40 Hungarians to jail for obstructing the communist government on repairing damage from the 1956 revolt. The sentences are subject to appeal.

The judge said the defendants billed the government for \$100,000 in repairs to underground basements and sometimes collected twice for work they did. Their total take was put at the equivalent of about \$100,000.
