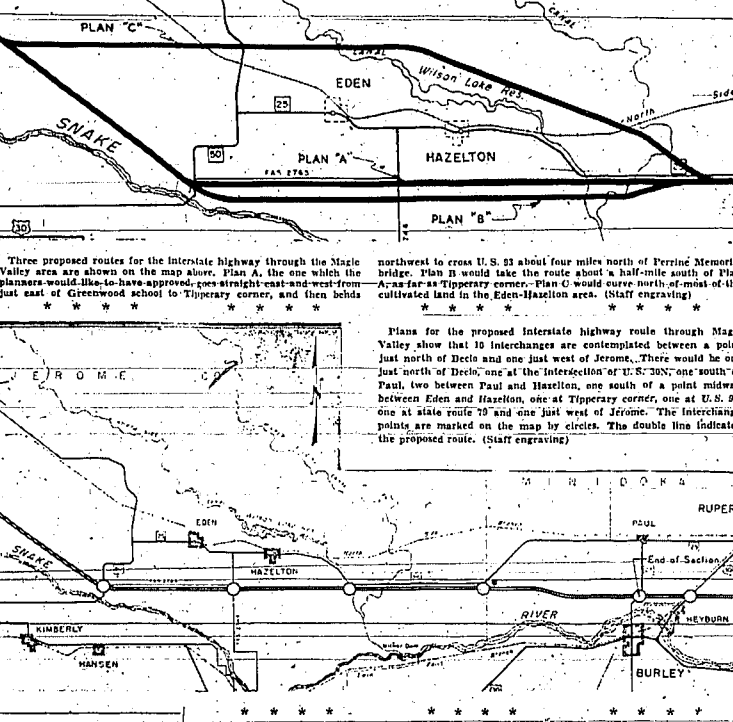
Church Dedication Is Set Here Sunday

Air Force Ready to 'Shoot Moon' Again

CAPETOWN, Fla., Nov. 7 (UPI)—The air force is launching its third moon rocket today and began preparing the 88-foot vehicle for another blastoff attempt early tomorrow. Officials declined to pinpoint the exact date of the launch, but military sources said the trouble was in the "Thor missile section of the four-stage rocket." These sources said the trouble was not major, but it could not be corrected in time to fire the rocket within the 18 to 20 minute period during which the launching attempt had to be made. In that period the moon is lined up in just the right position in relation to the Earth.

Red A-Tests Heard; U. S. Ban Still on

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—The United States announced today that Russia has fired two nuclear weapons tests since this country halted testing. President Eisenhower said, however, that the American suspension will continue for the time being. In a statement, Eisenhower appealed to the Soviet government to join in a temporary ban on experimental nuclear explosions. At the same time he warned that "if there is not shortly a corresponding renunciation by the Soviet Union (of testing), the United States will be obliged to reconsider its position." Announcement of the new nuclear explosion in the Soviet Union was made by the atomic energy commission. There was an implication in the AEC statement that the Soviet might have sought the United States' approval, although this was merely a speculation. The statement said that "the atomic energy commission today announced detection of two nuclear weapons tests which took place in the USSR on Nov. 1 and Nov. 3, respectively." 'We Will Meet Ike Half Way' Johnson Says

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (UPI)—Sen. Charles McNary, Republican of Idaho, pledged today that the new Democratic congress will meet Roosevelt's challenge "half way" in making the next two years a period of "constructive" achievement. He outlined a 12-point program of "major issues" facing the 80th congress, which will convene in January. McNary said the program would be a "half-way" meeting of the responsibilities that go with victory.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Public opinion: Is the supreme court to make a more severe and searching examination by the senate judiciary committee and the senate itself as a result of the court's recent conclusion that the chief justice's resignation was not a resignation?

Judge Potter Stewart, sixth justice on the bench, will be the first to be subjected to the more exhaustive questioning of the senate judiciary committee. He was given a recess appointment by President Eisenhower in 1957. The resignation was granted by the resignation of Justice Harold H. Burton, Ohio.

The senate judiciary committee does not yet have a name before it. Since the official record of the resignation was not until congress convenes next January, he is reported to have participated in several decisions too "liberal" for certain committee members.

CONSTITUTION ON PRESIDENTIAL APPOINTMENTS—The senate judiciary committee chairman is Sen. James O. Eastland, a Mississippi Democrat and an ardent segregationist. He was referred to by Harry S. Truman as "the only Democrat in the room." The president's opinion should be read out of the party.

The other was Sen. Harry P. Byrd, Virginia, conservative Democrat. He has a long record of alliance with the supreme court's desegregation decision.

The election results and subsequent senate committee hearings may mean the end of Eastland's belief, on judiciary. They will undoubtedly join him in questioning Judge Stewart's public resignation.

The constitution says that certain presidential appointments, including supreme court justices, shall be made only after the consent of the senate. In the past, the appropriate senate committees and the senate itself have not been asked for "advice." There has been general agreement that this is not a resignation.

FEAR OF SENATE AUTHORITY—Thus, the proposed resignation of the chief justice is a precedent and a test of the senate's authority in these matters—it may be the first challenge of the president's power to appoint and remove judges, and the first major battle between the White House and Capitol Hill.

Sen. James Eastland, Miss., who is a member of the senate judiciary committee, was rejected by a single vote, due to opposition from the labor unions and the National Association of Manufacturers.

It was a rejection which many of his opponents subsequently regretted, for they got an even more conservative member on the committee.

But Judge Parker's nomination had been reported favorably by the senate judiciary committee, mainly fear of the labor and the colored vote, detached him.

SCRUINY OF JUDGE STEWART'S BACK-GROUND—The senate judiciary committee chairman, Chief Justice Warren, and by reason of the voice of such prominent appointees as Justice Harlan.

In their preliminary scrutiny of Judge Stewart's background, his critics will be fortified by the fact that the chief justice's resignation was a resignation of a man who had been a member of the Ku Klux Klan.

First of all is the question: Who decides when the states have failed to satisfy the requirements of the constitution? Or the federal government acting through its legislative branch? Or the executive branch? Or a combination of the three?

Or should the people themselves by a referendum amend or even a constitutional convention, have the opportunity to decide if their needs are satisfied?

Second and strongest question is: Why did the chief justice fail to mention the constitutional provision that "powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people?"—Salt Lake Tribune.

VIEW OF OTHERS

ABOUT STATES RIGHTS

Recent expressions of concern about a federal attack on states rights were acknowledged by Chief Justice Warren at a news conference at the University of California medical research institute.

Some who were disturbed by the erosion of states rights—in which they believe the supreme court has played a significant role—may be reassured by Justice Warren's statement that the American people have a role can best provide for their own welfare through local governments.

In his opinion, he then went on to say, the only time local governmental power has been superseded was when the state government failed to satisfy the needs of the people.

Now this is not an unreasonable answer as to how states rights are protected by the fact that the federal government—except for two things.

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NEW DIRECTIONS

This was the year political campaigning took some new turns. It may make the pattern for quite some time.

Emphasis dwindled sharply on the once standard political rallies wherein candidates try to steam up the party faithful.

The approach to the election was regarded with skepticism in some quarters. Admittedly it hops the morale of the party workers. But many felt it wasn't enough simply to have a candidate enchain those who already were with him.

In recent years, of course, television has given the campaigners vastly wider popular exposure than they ever had before. But TV is costly and there are limits for even the best-bested aspirants. Besides, what candidate can assure himself of a fat rating?

So, since the ordinary voter doesn't come into the hall, and you can't be sure he'll listen to a political harangue on TV, the new thing is to chase him down where you know he's actually listening.

There's always been some of this among the more tireless campaigners. But never so much as in 1958.

This fall probably set an all-time high for bandwagon voters with the campaign for the supermarket shelf, speeding a bowling ball on its way across the street, scribbling at a desk, operating a factory machine, going to or leaving any one of a dozen places.

One candidate with an easy style and a ready wit summed it up when he frequently sold surprised citizens: "This is the season when nobody's safe."

That is as good a watchword for the 1958 political carnival as could be found. If this is an age when voting citizens are preoccupied with their personal affairs, of whatever sort, then the alert campaigner figures he has no choice but to move in on them and shake hands or plant a campaign card.

From now on, therefore, the premium is going to be not just on the attractive TV faces but on the way they play it at the shopping centers, the busy corners, the eating haunts and the like and draw a really friendly response. The fellow who can only poll in a hall is going the way of the buffalo.

Dworshak said the department of agriculture reported production is two million pounds less this year than last, when 9,000,000 pounds of the seed were used in the United States. He expects to be the largest producer of clover seed in the nation this year.

Dworshak said he has investigated Idaho growers' requests for information on the effects of the import duty law which he and other western senators put through the senate in 1956. The law levies two cents a pound duty on up to three million pounds and six cents a pound on any more seed imported.

Up to September 1, the total imports were only 1,437,000 pounds, and agriculture department spokesmen estimated that the three million mark would not be reached until the end of the year.

Imports from Canada were only 25,000 pounds.

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Gain Made on State Control By Democrats

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—The Democratic election this week flooded congress and swept Democrats into control of 13 state legislatures, bodies formerly Republican-dominated.

The trouble most widely reported was in the family. Money is a problem. Money—how to raise state revenues with least pain to state voters. At least in the new legislatures, big state deficits to contend with. Others face demands for ready money. Many of them have some sort of budgetary veto.

Among other things popping up in the new legislatures were reapportionment of legislatures—especially in states where Democrats complained of party gerrymanders at their expense; attempts to enact or repeal right-to-work laws; state prohibition repeal. In the South, some of the legislators were looking for ways to curb the legal effects of segregation.

Both Houses captured a victory in the House of Representatives in 35 states which held elections for legislatures concurrently with those in the United States. In 10 states—Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Massachusetts, Oregon, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Utah, Wisconsin and Wyoming—Democrats captured the House. In one, Michigan, they achieved a tie in a former Republican stronghold. There was no shift of control that favored the Republicans.

Everywhere outside the already 100 per cent Democratic stateshouseshold in the South, the new legislatures, whether or not they gave them numerical control.

They took control of the Democratic legislature in Alabama, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Maryland, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Washington, West Virginia.

The Republicans held control in four—Towa, Kansas, New York and North Dakota.

Probers Push For Checkups Of Giant GM

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7—In Congress the first of a series of bills to check up on the spending of the giant General Motors Corp. will be introduced today by Sen. William A. McClellan, president of the Senate Finance Committee.

McClellan said that the bills are necessary to check up on the company's spending because of its size and the fact that it is a public corporation.

The bills are expected to be passed by the Senate in the next few days and will be sent to the House for passage.

Court Decides Hungarians to Get Protection

NEW YORK, Nov. 7 (AP)—The U. S. court of appeals ruled yesterday that Hungarians are entitled to the full protection of the constitution even if they entered the country without visas.

The ruling was in the case of Gyula Paktovich, 34, a Hungarian newspaper editor who fled Hungary with his wife and two daughters.

The family was among the 30,000 Hungarians who came here after the revolution in their country was crushed by the Russians in 1956.

The government said Paktovich had been a member of the communist party after his release from a concentration camp in 1952, and had concealed that membership when he entered the United States on a parole. He just denied the charges.

The appeals court ruled two to one that the government could not deport the family without a hearing. It returned the case to the immigration service for a full hearing.

Previously, aliens living here in violation of law were deported in general could be deported by revoking their parole.

In a dissenting opinion, written by Judge Harold H. Medina, held that the Hungarians had been invited here under the foreign policy of the United States as announced by President Eisenhower.

In a dissenting opinion, Judge Leonard P. Moore said the finding overruled a long line of consistent decisions of the U. S. supreme court.

Foreign Trade Figures Show Russians Competing With U.S.

Foreign trade figures released in Moscow show that the Soviet Union is on the way to becoming one of the most important exporters of basic commodities and raw materials.

Some of these are new. Others are traditional Russian exports now being sent abroad in larger quantities.

Most complete with exports of the United States.

Among them are oil, oil products, coal, including anthracite, iron and chrome ores, pig iron, steel, ferrous metal products, lumber, cotton, flax and grain.

Earlier this year the Soviet Union

exporter of oil, coal, ferrous metals, cotton and grain. Thus the Soviet Union is competing with America in these materials.

The reason the competition has not been felt more acutely as yet is that the largest part of the Soviet exports have been going to communist-dominated countries.

In all cases except that of tin, where heavy exports reflect results of Chinese communist exports to Russia, the increased Soviet exports reflect heavily increased output. Thus it can be expected that the exports will continue to increase together with production in coming years.

This may lead in some cases to difficult situations for American producers, and also perhaps to price wars. And foreign trade often has political significance in the cold war.

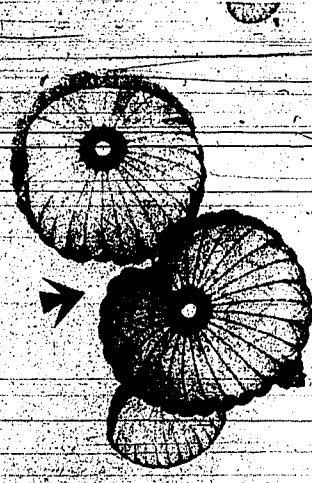

Controls Over U.S. Spending Said Problem

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7—Senate investigators announced yesterday that the justice department considers court action to break up the giant General Motors corporation.

The majority report, the Democratic members of the antitrust and monopoly subcommittee said "the heart core of the monopoly problem in the automobile industry is in the concentration of production and power held by GM."

"This concentration appears neither compatible with nor conducive to a free market in which the public must buy automobiles."

The report also criticized what it called the disappearance of price competition in the industry, over-emphasis on high-priced styling changes and advertising expenditures, and misleading automobile financing practices.

The report was based on extensive hearings earlier this year at which top executives of the automotive Big Three—GM, Ford and Chrysler—were among witnesses.

A Republican member, Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, Illinois, filed a dissenting report in which he said that "the majority report, while finding no evidence of wrongdoing, adopts a critical attitude towards an industry merely because of its success and good earnings."

Dirksen said he was convinced that the industry is "free of those anticompetitive factors and influences which limit production, create artificial high prices and restrict consumer choice."

The two other GOP members, Sen. William Langer, N. D., and Alexander Wiley, Wis., filed individual statements without joining in either the majority or the minority report.

Mother of 4, On Fast, Dies

GLENDALE, Calif., Nov. 7—A mother of four collapsed and died on the 14th day of a religious fast, police reported yesterday.

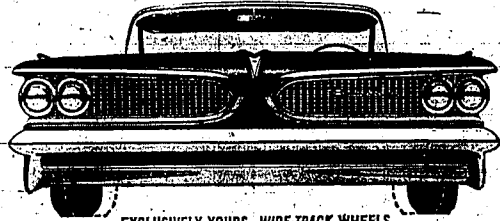

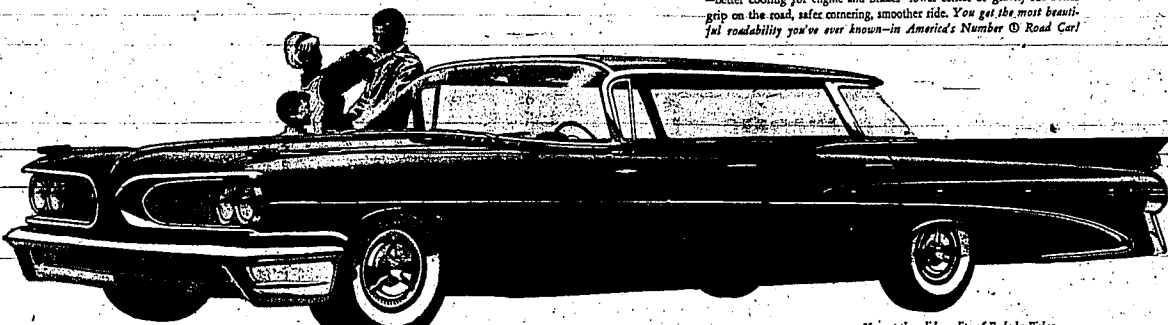

Progress of Automation Has Become Secret in Auto City

DETROIT (NEA) — Automation progress in this car town has become a bigger secret than the styles of next year's models. The public eventually sees the new cars, but the full details of how machine tools are replacing workers' hands will never be told.

Automation was a central issue in the recent labor negotiations. It has been a hot topic at Chrysler during the past couple of years. It is also being discussed with having saved Chrysler from a financial disaster this past year.

Automation is still turning up hidden sources of profits in the industry, and the experts claim that it will be the hope of some day ending the long-standing claim in the industry that auto labor contracts call for a seven-cent-per-hour increase each year to compensate for productivity resulting from automation. But the industry is not so sure of that. It is also not so sure of the way of more efficient automation.

A recent business magazine survey reports that industry generally increased productivity three per cent in the new contracts. Auto industry productivity usually leads the rest of the economy. But if this figure would be used for the auto industry it would mean that productivity is increasing about four times as fast as in the rest of the economy.

Chrysler built Ford and General Motors an automation. Thus, in 1958 Chrysler ended with a profit of \$18 per vehicle. That year Ford and GM made between \$32 and \$34 profit on each vehicle.

In 1951 Chrysler eliminated about 200 jobs out of 140,000 and wound up with a profit of about \$48 per vehicle. This inspired the rest of wild-cat strikes. But industry experts say that automation saved Chrysler from the brink of disaster in this bad year of 1958.

"Ford engineers coined the word 'automation' and the firm led in this development with engine production lines that eliminated all but a handful of workers. This past year Ford found a way to save many millions of dollars with a unique adaptation of automation technique. This softened the recession blow for Ford, too.

In 1957 Ford discovered that the cost of assuming 100 per cent of all warranty work was running into tens of millions of dollars. So when production lines were set up for the '58 cars an effort was made to improve quality control through automation techniques. Faulty engines and parts were automatically jacked off the lines.

This effort has had great success. The number of "bugs" has been drastically reduced. The "lemon" virtually eliminated. GM used automation for this purpose, too, especially on automobiles.

Automation of production lines turning out car transmissions is one of the big developments this year. Ford has a new line turning out front-end suspension systems that drastically reduces manpower.

The assembly operation has stubbornly resisted the encroachments of multi-replicating machines. But the hint of radical new approaches to auto building might be the answer to solving this problem, experts are predicting.

One of the big problems of automation is the way it has tended to depress product design, production experts admit. Automation machinery is expensive, complex and difficult to install. This tends to dictate fewer changes in models each year.

Car makers have tried to overcome this difficulty with flashy but superficial changes in body style. But it accounts for the fact that there have been relatively few basic engineering changes on cars during the past several years.
