## Harvest for Month Ups Crop Totals

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP)—A generally favorable October harvest season helped to boost this year's crop volume to a record high, the indicated total harvest for the month of October, set in 1948 and matched in its semiformal report of the agriculture department, estimated the crop volume at 118 per cent of the 1948 base average, compared to a forecast of 117 per cent and up from the previous year's 115 per cent.

The general favorableness of the 1958 crop outcome is clearly reflected in the increase in the department's estimate of the total production of the major crops. The 11-1/2 percent increase in the total crop volume is a result of an average cut in the level in 40 years under the program, and the increase in the level of the harvest.

The department said the increase in production will add to the surplus of the major crops. The surplus of the major crops is expected to be 117 per cent of the 1948 base average, compared to a forecast of 117 per cent and up from the previous year's 115 per cent.

Talking with newsmen at the White House, Stassen pointedly omitted the vice president's name from a list of four possibilities Stassen said could carry the GOP to victory in 1960. ### Idaho Tourist Action Is Big, Growing More

BOISE, Nov. 13.—Idaho's tourist business yesterday was reported to have reached a new high with one hundred million dollars worth of state in a single year, and the state department of commerce is projecting a similar figure for the coming year.

The department said its report on the fourth quarter economy was compiled from figures on 1957 tourism statistics from federal and state agencies, and from national and state agencies, and from national firms and resort organizations.

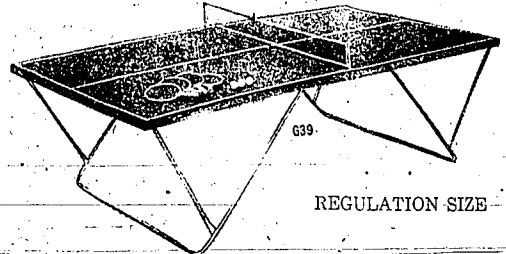
Louis Shaddock, department secretary, said, "more than 10,000 persons, by actual count, spent the year's fourth quarter in Idaho, and the year's fourth quarter in the Stanley basin, according to a one-day stay only. Based on a one-day stay only, it is estimated that in 1957 a total of 2,911,000 tourists entered Idaho high-ways for entry, carrying an average of 2.41 passengers per car. This totaled 6,985,811 travelers, with an average daily expenditure of \$1.40, for a total of \$778,179,501," he said.

Hotels and bus visitors in addition to those brought to Sun Valley by Union Pacific train, contribute to bring the figure to \$79,000,000.

Another \$21,210,000 was added after computing figures from the Idaho and game department on the 21,723 resident licenses and the 6,248 non-resident licenses sold in 1957.

### Construction For October Down in T. F.

Authorized construction in Twin Falls during October amounted to \$102,620, or 43 per cent below last year.

For the first 10 months, a total of 312 permits valued at \$1,823,870 were per cent below last year. In October, 44 of the 27 permits for October were nine new homes valued at \$32,500 and commercial construction totaling \$4,400.

However, applications through October for new dwelling units in Twin Falls are up 10 per cent over the remainder of the year, particularly in the Boise area, according to information released by the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company.

October building dropped in both Pocatello and Idaho Falls, but an upsurge in building was noted in Payette, Nampa and Boise.

Earlier in the year, during summer months and additional funds provided by the F. W. A. for purchase of land during the period have been factors in the upsurge in housing construction. Both the national and local income have increased, the report notes.

Lightening of the money markets and drying up of some sources of mortgage funds may affect construction of housing in 1939, it adds.

### This World of Ours Actually Is Real Shaky Place to Live

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP)—Every day so. Another earthquake in southern France and northern Africa.

In the early days exact tolls were not kept, but 300,000 may have died in the Indian quake of 1917, 200,000 in the Japanese quake of 1921, and 180,000 in the Chinese quake of 1920.

But in the Japanese earthquake of 1923, accurate figures were kept and they make appalling reading. The quake and the fire that followed, left a record of 99,231 killed, 103,713 wounded and 43,476 missing.

These items about minor quakes are part of a worldwide reporting service. We taxpayers own a score or more seismographs, and the coast-of-godette-people coordinate this information with that from private institutions.

What's the matter? Is the Earth falling apart?

Well, not exactly, but we may as well face up to it that this planet we live on certainly has the shakes. And it has had them for all of man's recorded history.

Capt. Elliott B. Roberts, coast and geologic survey, said that if every earth-twiggle recorded on every seismograph every year were added up, the number might be close to a million. Fortunately, most are so incredibly minor that only the most sensitive machine could detect them.

As if this weren't enough to keep them buzzing in seismological circles, atomic explosions also are picked up on the delicate instruments.

But for all its devastating effects on mankind, the atom bomb's force is puny compared with nature on the loose.

Roberts figures that a first-rate atomic explosion is about one hundred-thousandth of the force of a major earthquake. In damage to human beings, of course, the bomb would be a horrifying winner.

Still, an earthquake can be a horrendous killer in its own right.

Artistic Seneca and Billy all reported on earthquakes, and their successors have had some big ones to record.

On Nov. 1, 1755, Lisbon took such a shaking that 50,000 were killed, the sea was rolled back and came

### New Tokyo Tower Looms as New Lure for More Suicides

TOKYO, Nov. 13 (AP)—City authorities fear Tokyo's new television tower, rising like a great steel needle above the skyline, may become a fresh lure for suicide-hungry Japanese.

The Tokyo tower, higher than Paris' Eiffel tower, claimed its first victim, a 41-day-old baby, who was due to be officially opened. A 21-year-old thwarted lover leaped to his death.

In Japan, the most suicide-conscious country in the world, centuries of tradition have made Japan a suicide—the honorable way out—from a Samurai warrior classically carving himself to death with a sword to a housewife jumping in front of an electric train.

Two years ago, 21,778 tormented Japanese in a day—killed themselves. More than 20,000 have died willfully and violently every year since 1933, the world's highest rate.

"We have an aptitude for death," said a young Japanese.

"I guess we just don't consider life too important. And here, unlike other countries, there is no disgrace in suicide."

Kamikaze pilots—some 5,000 deliriously killed themselves in human bomb attacks in World War II—carried a new craze.

Blowing oneself up with dynamite was fashionable for a time after the war.

But less spectacular methods like poison, drowning, shooting or writhing cause the majority deaths. Hari-kari—disembowling by knife—is rare these days.

NAGOYA, Japan, Nov. 13 (AP)—A 21-year-old brother-in-law of a 21-year-old brother-in-law, who tried his brother's hands and legs, stuffed him in a wooden bathtub, nailed down the cover and left him there for two days to cool off.

### Fuel Is Seen Problem for Space Work

CHICAGO, Nov. 13 (UPI)—Even the most advanced space exploration equipment will require a fuel source that will remain one of the most vexing problems to launch a man-carrying rocket, the director of the California Institute of Technology said yesterday.

"When we recall that every pound of fuel requires about 100 pounds of oxidizer to get it into orbit, we are faced with a major problem," he said.

Getting a man and his equipment into space and back again may require rockets of the order of a million pounds of oxidizer, he said.

Dr. Lee A. DuBridge told the annual session of the American Physical Society at the institute's 38th annual convention here yesterday.

Appointments predicted DuBridge said the next 30 years will witness the launching of "many" space probes to gather information about the solar system. He said the major disappointment along the way will come—probably in the next 10 years—when we are able to get to Mars and even Venus.

Further proof of the difficulty of space work is the fact that only four objects have been successfully orbited by the United States in 4 1/2 years.

# Navy, Army, Are One-Two in NCAA Pass Statistics

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 (AP)—Navy and Army are the top passing teams in the nation and nobody knows it better than Maryland and Rice. Navy took over the major college passing lead with a flurry of activity by Jim Maxwell, sub-quarterback, in a 40-14 romp over Maryland. Army struck over a 61-yard touchdown pass by Harry Joe-Gardner, 10-10-Pete Dawkins with only 62 seconds left for a 14-7 edge over Rice. According to the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau, it is the first time the service rivals ever have led the nation in passing. Navy's control of the step-by-step march by taking over the lead in total offense while moving into the back yard was the key to victory over Minnesota. The Big Ten champs have gained 3,770 yards, averaging 264.1 yards per game. Rice edged Army, which has 2,751 yards and a 303-yard average. The victory was built on a 100-yard rushing by Rice, but cut close for 201 in the air.

Army boosted its leading passing total to 1,190 yards with 218 gained by Maxwell, the Midwest average of 103 yards a game. Army's offense place Army has 1,180 and a 109.9 average. The difference is one yard, game as each plays.

Three weeks ago Navy wasn't even among the top 10 in passing. Now the Middies have 12 touchdowns and a 284 completion percentage. Colorado, which has been trading the top total offense position with Army, has 1,175 yards and is leading in rushing with 1,007 yards and a 274.2 average. But Brigham Young is averaging 60 yards a game and is closing in fast. BYU already leads in total rushing yards with 1,164 yards.

Unbeatn Rutgers still is the top scorer with a 33-point average. Army is only one point behind with school over the 30 mark. Syracuse is close with 28.9.

**FROM ALL ANGLES**

We've turned off the electricity and disconnected the phone lines at the stadium of the Magic Valley Baseball club, and the board of directors has put the final touches on a professional baseball franchise. Turn the business man out to get a sure, diamond-cleat and a clean, airtight new home. The concession equipment and the current bills and most of the work is done.

Of course, when it comes to something like this, it seems somewhat unusual in the business world to have a personal friend and a fan who has thought up the thing. "The board of directors," was the emphatic reply.

When, knowing something of the sort would happen, said he has been accused of being the reason for the loss of the stadium to the business man has had his share of accusation and so has the "Times-News."

But personally, there was no one thing locally that could have spoiled the deal. Public relations and what-not, the local franchise could have operated a few more years before the days were marked. And it appears better that it happens early in Twin Falls rather than later.

Doubtless, the board, despite misgivings, would have opened the thing next year. But everything concerning baseball may have been done to make it a success. The club would have folded in mid-season, owing \$10,000 more than they had in assets.

As to the club, it was a business man, and then completed his point by producing a nationwide survey that showed over 70 percent of the minor league clubs operated in the hole last year with another 10 per cent just barely out of the hole. The fact, Magic Valley would appear fortunate under this light.

All of Bill Winter's representative on the league board, noted the suspension of the local franchise may have saved the club. In 1936, something may have been done to change the picture.

All those things are to be noted that baseball is dying on the vine. The sport no longer has the economic appeal, but has ended the country in its grip.

Realizing the average baseball game anywhere is a humdrum affair, Oh, there are good games scattered in here and there. The season is fortunate, but on the average, night-after-night of baseball will provide the action of almost any other sport.

It certainly can't compare with the excitement and thrills that 250 people locally will take exception to that "at least"—those 300 being the ones who are at the park night after night last year.

Being off—no appeal. Not a person who could use the thing as a going-out, fishing or bowling. No spectator game can compare with the excitement of the sport.

And, that lack of action is the reason for baseball slipping off from the title of "national pastime." It probably is no longer holds that title for years, but since 1924, statistics show it hasn't been.

All of which leaves Twin Falls with an open air stadium capable of seating 5,000 comfortably and over 1,000 in more crowded conditions. But Jaycee park certainly isn't a white elephant, and the Eriele Center, superintendent of parks and recreation, points out we have plenty of things that could be started in the park. It certainly won't be a pity.

Jaycee park will find itself nicely filled with many things he thought of heretofore. The lighting system undoubtedly is the best in Twin Falls, making the stadium ideal for both day and night events.

Baseball isn't gone from Twin Falls. The local high school crowd is putting on a remarkable season, showing a winning percentage of more than 75 per cent in the past four years. The team deserves better support than it has had.

It naturally follows that Legion ball takes over in the summertime and again Twin Falls is well represented.

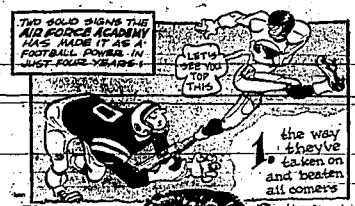
But better, coach Harold Brown, who guides the high school team, reported the southern Idaho conference will inaugurate a basketball championship competition next spring. This concludes one of the basic problems in Idaho—high school basketball gets no recognition across southern Idaho. And it would blossom into a state championship system which would be even better.

Brown said some of the better known "baseball" in the southern and northern Idaho, noting the upsurge in the sport here, have become interested in scheduling games with the Bruins.

The conference idea of improving baseball had a good chance for success in Brown, Bobby King, Brown coach, and Ernie Schermerkin, Pocatello coach, who would represent Idaho.

Local fans will remember King as the Boise Braves' shortstop in 1930.

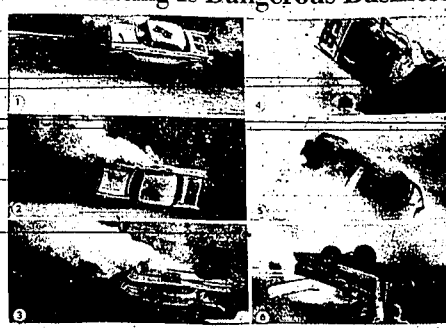

# Rising Cost of Operation Dims New Pro Grid Attendance Records

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 13 (UPI)—The high cost of football living was bolstering commissioner Bert Bell today as the National Football League attendance mark zoomed to the three million mark for 1958.

"The saturation point may be looming, and costs are going up. For two week-ends in a row, the attendance was 'the greatest ever' in the 29-year history of the league, with unofficial attendance this past week-end listed as 3,472,734.

"That looks to me like 305,000 paid," said the commissioner, who peers at the cash registers and not the seats. "It is something like 250,000 paid last week before. We have a pretty good chance to hit the three million mark this year, if the weather stays in our favor."

But, there is a fly in every omelet. Even the prospect of seventh straight year for breaking attendance records doesn't keep Bell from brooding over what might happen if rains continue to mount and a few rainy week-ends nick at the tills of some of the less fortunate clubs.

"Mind it's wonderful, it's almost unbelievable, a three million attendance, but there's a chance that it might not be a bounty to every one, after all," Bell said.

It would guess the extra take of the league is coming from 150,000 to 200,000 a year. That means each of them might not do so well on an overall picture as it first appears.

It's unbelievable what the rising costs are—unbelievable what it costs to travel, what it costs for hotels, what it costs for extra personnel, player salaries, extra coaches, and so on.

"I don't know how the loss of the extra office personnel and the hundred other hidden items in management of a business which can give only so much return, Bell believes. He wrapped it up with the term 'overall picture'.

He also foresees no franchise shutle and nothing in sight which means any transfer of any team. Spread the good with the bad over the year, and it will come out good. It may take effort, but Bell thinks it will work out okay.

They were the scene of two of Canada's biggest disasters. Thirty-nine miners were killed in No. 4 pit in an explosion in November, 1935. An underground earth shift Oct. 23 caught 174 miners working in No. 2 mine.

Eighty-one got out in 24 hours. Rescuers saved 12 miners found in a tunnel 6 1/2 days after the accident. Two days later another seven men were found alive.

The total rescued was 100, total dead, 74.

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### McLemore Visits Army, Finds Out What 16 Years Can Mean

Old soldiers never die. No, but they come awfully close. I found that out yesterday at Ft. Carson, here in Colorado Springs, where the plains and Rockies meet. With the permission of Major Gen. Martin J. McQuinn, commandant of the ninth infantry division, I took a look at the training for one day with a view to keeping a record of the life of a soldier. When the sun shined on the Rockies or wherever it did, McLemore's mind went back to the time when I was one feeble pulse throb from a tombstone, and was down to three corners, two of them white.

I took the training for only one reason—I did not realize what 16 years of a man's life was like. That many years ago, give or take a few draft notices, that I started reading about in Camp Gordon, Ga. That lasted 16 years, and so did I.

I had no more than finished the physical training which starts the trainee's day—correction, the physical training had no more than finished. The men who have been in the service for 16 years, I had a little nickel that I never stood 16 weeks of basic, even if I had never served my honorable discharge to prove it.

Early in the afternoon, when it was about 10 o'clock, I saw the makings of an infantry private. I was urged to stop by to see an infantry Major or Lieutenant. The executive officer of the Second Engineer Battalion, Fourth Artillery, who was keeping an eye on me, offered me a Jeep ride to the rifle range, and I did not mind. I took the Jeep back to the camp. I saw a young soldier, tall, thin, and very nervous, sitting on a bench. He was a new recruit, and he was looking at me with a mixture of curiosity and fear.

As he sat there, I was at the end of the day. I am glad I took the day of basic. If you are troubled about America's youth, take a look at them. In the army will cheer you up. There is a cross-section of America's young people in the army. The training is hard, but they like it like me.

It was a pleasure to be near college students among them. It did mean the discovery of how long a 16 year life is.
