

Grange Seeks Plans to Give Growers Vote

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Nov. 18.—The National Grange proposes today that producers of each farm commodity be allowed to choose through referendum the type of farm aid program they deem best suited to the commodity.

The farm organization has suggested a referendum resolution that such programs be managed by organized producers, under guidance of the government.

The Grange declared that agriculture faces the prospect of overproduction for years to come. Hence, it said, effective ways must be found to adjust production to markets of farmers who suffer economically.

We reaffirm the Grange position that government programs developed along commodity-by-commodity lines, therein lies the power to meet our production and marketing in such a manner as to provide consumers with an abundance of products at reasonable prices.

This Grange approach to the farm problem has not found favor with Eisenhower administration.

The farm organization called upon the states to help halt a trend toward over-production and over-assuming their full financial and other responsibilities.

Along these same lines, the convention of the U. S. Grange, which has been making decisions which appear to be making the prerogative of the farmer to produce and market, considered as usurping the field of legislative branch of government.

was killed when winds blew over a hill near Olatona. An Oklahoma woman died when a high ceiling struck her chicken house. Heart attacks caused two deaths in the Oklahoma snow.

Tornado winds battered three buildings in the business district of Ekker and more than 12 farms in the Grinnell and Olatona areas. There were no known fatalities and only four persons with minor injuries.

Hopes faded in Arizona for the safety of three Boy Scouts missing since Saturday in the snow-covered mountains near Tucson.

In other parts of Arizona about 10 hunters were trapped but were freed safe in cabins near Flagstaff. Three others were snowbound near Prescott. A dozen hunters and their dogs were trapped in mountain snow near Tucson.

Heavy rains fell ahead of the cold front. Small creeks in southern Iowa flooded after rains of as much as five inches fell.

Rains also posed threats of minor overflows in parts of eastern Kansas and Missouri. Nearly a score of deer hunters barely escaped with their lives after 11 inches of rain fell in an hour near Fremont, Mo., 140 miles south east of St. Louis.

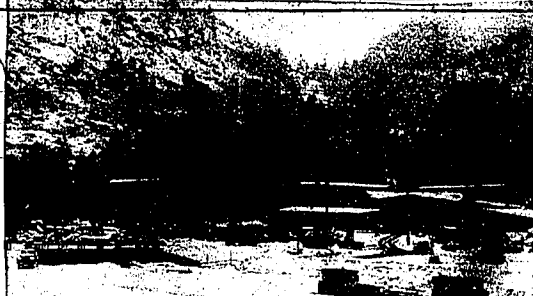

Atomic Scientist Fuchs Will Quit West After He Is Freed

LONDON, Nov. 14 (UPI)—Dr. Klaus Fuchs, the atomic scientist who turned valuable nuclear secrets over to the Russians, says he will go behind the Iron curtain when he is released from prison. The respected, 45-year-old scientist, serving a 14-year term in Wakefield prison for espionage, said in an interview with the London Daily Express, that he would go to Communist East Germany when he is released, probably within a year. His decision to "leave the West" and go behind the Iron curtain was made despite an evident mellowing in his views on communism. Fuchs would not answer directly whether he would do the same thing again if there were set back. "That is a terribly difficult question," he said. "No, I don't hold exactly the same views now. But he did not elaborate. The remainder of the interview was in part as follows: Q—Are you still, today, a convinced communist? A—"I am still a convinced Marxist. But I can't now accept everything they do and say." Q—Did the revolt in Hungary have any effect on your outlook? A—"This was much more complex for the Russians to do what they did was power politics. It is a necessity for them. But I can't accept the... glowing over... that what they did was a counter-revolution. It was put down wasn't it, with the bayonets of the red army?" Q—Where would you like to go when you are freed? A—"I shall go to Germany, to East Germany, to my father (Enlli Fuchs, 84-year-old theologian, who lives in Leipzig). Q—What would you like to do in East Germany? A—"That I have not decided yet. I really don't know yet. Q—Have you any bitterness about your trial and sentence? A—"Bitterness? Oh, no! I am not bitter at all. It had to be done. It had to be like that. It was bound to happen. Q—Would you stay in Britain and work here if you could? A—"I could stay in Britain—I know that. No, I would not stay here. One reason is this. In one way or another, everyone with whom I was friendly has had to suffer because of me. "Not in any way one could put one's hand on. But, for example, if there are two men up for an important job, and my security is involved, then the one making the decision says, 'Oh, we won't take either—we will take the one who had no connection with... me.' "And so, they all suffer. Oh, yes, I believe that this would go on, even afterwards," he stated. Q—"And then I could never get a worthwhile job here." Q—"And in East Germany?" A—"Oh, yes there I could." Q—"Apart from the job, would you stay here?"

Increase Noted

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—The number of families with two or more children living at home has increased nearly 50 per cent in the last 10 years, the census bureau said yesterday. As of last March, the bureau said, 16,400,000 families had two or more children living at home. That was a 46 per cent gain over the 11,200,000 families in this category 10 years ago. 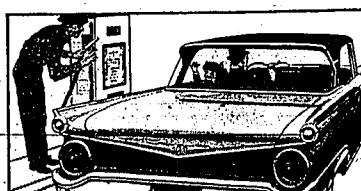

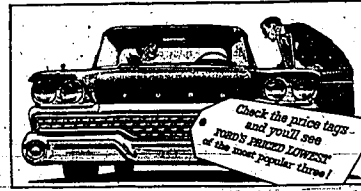

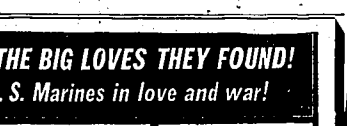

Rugged Time Seen for Man In Space Age

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 (AP)—Space pilots may whip off to Mars or the moon in their shuttlecoaches, scientists said today.

The big hurries of the trip may be only a shave and a change of underclothes from time to time. This was the rugged future of man in space suggested by a panel of space doctors and engineers at the 12th annual meeting of the American Rocket society.

Blat, End Are Worst. Whether the space pilot is allowed to wear his worst moments may come at the beginning and end of his trip.

It is then he must withstand the enormous stresses of blastoff acceleration and the braking of reentry into the Earth's atmosphere.

He is scarcely likely to enjoy either ordeal, said Col. John P. Glavin, head of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's research on the human body in rocket sled work.

A new space capsule, being built at the air force school of aviation medicine at Randolph Air Force Base, Tex., was described by Capt. Willard T. Haury.

Food Means Morale. Food may be one of the biggest morale items of the space pilot.

In simulated space trips, volunteers said baby food and other unglamorous items did their job—boosting morale.

Some of the experimental items served to the space fliers were Johnnys, Norwegian shrimp, quail eggs and honey turkey.

Good Water Is Help. Drinking water should be cool and fresh-tasting, another morale item to men who lived for a week on salt brackish water.

Time is one of the biggest tests in space—and boredom is another.

The job of the space flight attendant, a nurse, becomes monotonous. Time hangs around the space flier. He develops fears and depression and he gets more irritable as his flight wears on.

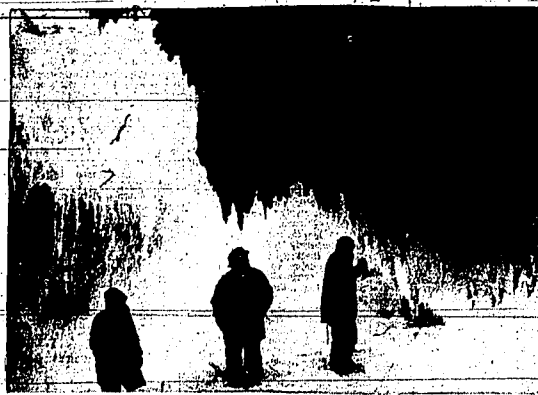
