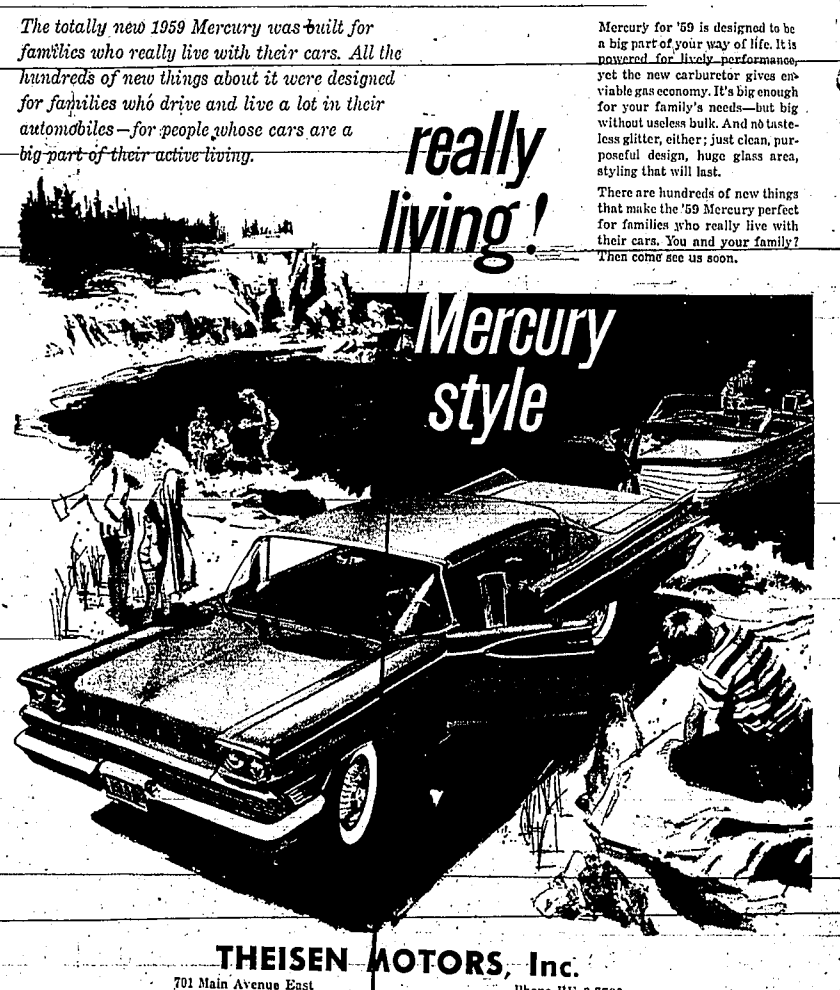

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—The AFL-CIO has a problem of backing up its anticorruption drive by getting the support of the labor federation's major unions, the Carpenters.

Second Thought Due
Having already tossed out the 1 1/2 million Teamsters' dues on an anticorruption charge, AFL-CIO leaders may think twice about further pushing a federal statute, now pending in the 810,000-member union, from the merged labor organization.

At the AFL-CIO Executive Council meeting two weeks ago Walter Reuther, head of the Auto Workers, and James B. Carey, president of the Electrical Workers, urged the AFL-CIO to drop a council action right then and there.

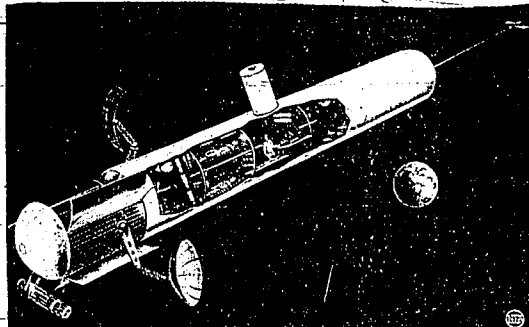
But the council decided to try to get Reuther more time to explain his refusal to answer questions by the Senate subcommittee on the highway scandal.

Student Numbers Higher in Europe
GERMANY (UPI)—More than 50,000 American children—almost as many as go to grade school in Cleveland, O.—are attending classes run by the U. S. State Dept. in Europe this fall. An increase of 18 per cent over last year, the State Dept. says.

The schools, scattered throughout West Germany, France and other countries where American military forces are based, are manned by about 2,100 teachers, of whom 400 are serving abroad for the first time.

One-fourth of the teachers are to be replaced annually, because they make only a one-year term of service from their regular jobs at home.

Manned Space Ships Coming Closer



Development of a million-pound-thrust rocket is bringing manned space flight in vehicles such as this million-pound "space station-closer" to reality. New Engine Is Developed for Propelling Rockets in Space

NEW YORK, Nov. 19 (AP)—A new engine to reach toward Mars—just operates something like a feather pushing an elephant—was described Monday by space scientists.

The model engine, shown to the public for the first time, is an ion propulsion chamber developed by scientists at Rocketdyne division, North American Aviation, Inc. It was described at a meeting of the American Rocket society.

It would be an excellent engine as long as it could be boosted into space by more powerful chemical rockets, the scientists said.

Some 100 miles above the Earth, where the engine's small thrust could counteract the lessened attraction of gravity, the engine would be useful.

Rocketdyne also said it had just started a new test laboratory for the ion rocket engine at Rocketdyne headquarters in Canoga Park, Calif.

An ion engine, developing only a pound of thrust could put a 10,000-pound vehicle in the neighborhood of Mars in nine months, or near the moon in three months.

In the vacuum environment of space, away from the great gravitation that holds us to Earth, the ion engine would take over with its gentle push that it can produce for months at a time.

The engine first vaporizes its fuel—for instance cesium, a soft, white metal, which becomes cesium vapor or gas.

Then the moltable vapor is fed into a chamber where an electric arc heats the heat to 1,400 to 1,500 degrees centigrade—roughly 100 times as hot as a big electric stove.

This knocks loose an electron from each molecule of the vaporized fuel—leaving the molecule with a positive charge.

Illinois Farm Has Hot Well Puzzles Now

MONMOUTH, Ill., Nov. 19 (AP)—Farmer Lovdahl has a hot well on his farm, and he's in a little fever about it.

The 30-foot well, Lovdahl said, had furnished water, and cold water for his household for 26 years until last August.

The water was far colder and better for use than water from a nearby well—125 feet deep—that I use for my stock, Lovdahl said.

But the water in the smaller well began warming up last August. It became progressively warmer and recently it leveled off at 101 degrees, where it has remained.

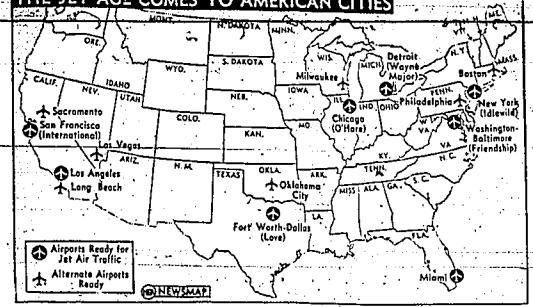
DETROIT (AP)—U. S. lead and zinc policies are being defended by the U. S. Trade Commission before the Senate subcommittee on international trade and commerce today.

BOISE, Nov. 19 (AP)—The Railway Express agency yesterday started formal action to obtain Idaho permission for a 15-per cent increase in current rates within the state.

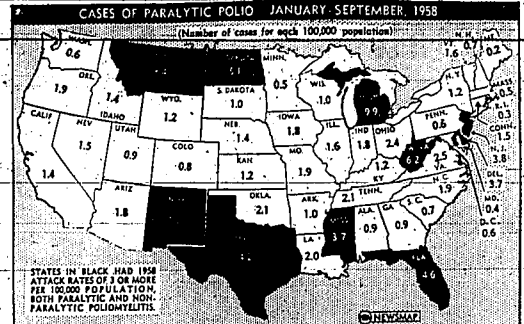

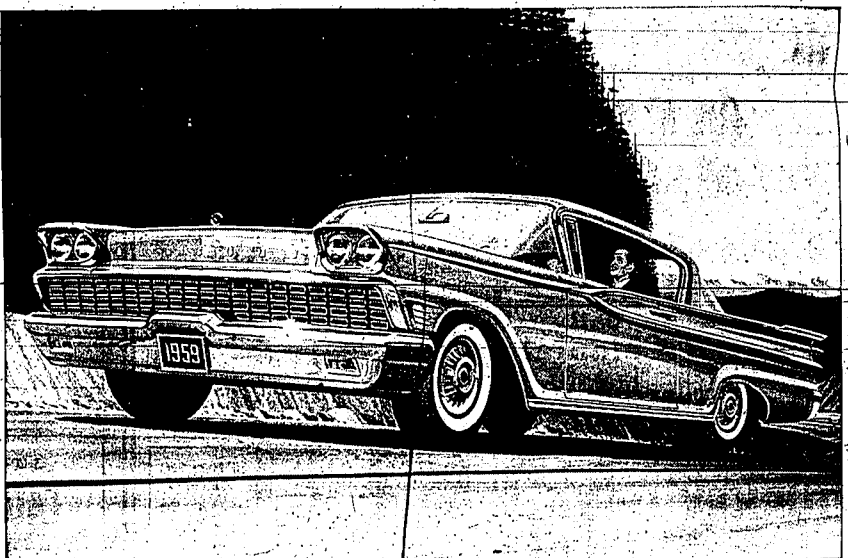

Vertical Farm Trend Is Seen As Dangerous

BOISE, Nov. 19 (AP)—A National bureau official yesterday said that a rapidly developing agricultural trend could endanger the freedom of economic life of the world.

The official, said Donald K. Hirsch, assistant director of the American community division of the State Department, said that the original idea was to have the final distribution of foodstuffs under government management.

"Vertical integration" assures the farmer a fixed, additional availability of capital, helpful management, and a steady market and price.

"Often a farmer who has a central figure to deliver his entire production," Hirsch said, "is not free to sell his produce in the open market. The end result is a farmer who is not free to integrate and possibly to lose his independence."

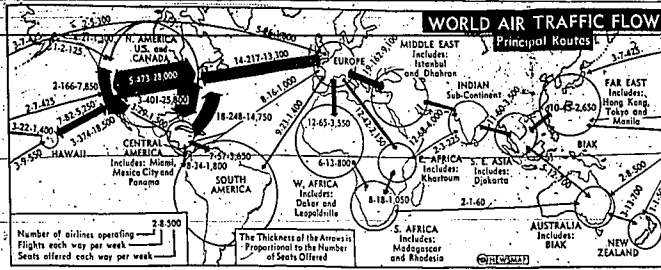

Matsu's Nationalist Soldiers Live Alert on Island Fortress

MATSU, Nov. 19 (AP)—They live here inside their bunkers, these newly forgotten men of the offshore war.

They are the 20,000 nationalist soldiers on the Matsu Islands, all but ignored while World attention focuses on the communist shelling of the Quemoy, 150 miles to the south.

But, they maintain a 24-hour standby alert—sleeping underground a few feet from their artillery pieces and machine guns.

They live in an intricate system of tunnels, pillboxes and bunkers. Fortress Matsu is a four-square-mile beach of submarine fortifications carved largely by hand and chiseled out of rock. The four other nationalist outpost islands of the Matsu group are the same.

They are strung from three to 10 miles from the communist mainland. By nationalist estimate, 300 red gun emplacements face them.

Visitors invariably consider Matsu's maze of tunnels incredible.

Heart of the Matsu complex is an underground cluster of concrete bunkers making up the nationalist operations headquarters. Air, sea and naval reports funnel into the operations center, which directs the minutest gun emplacements and reports to nationalist headquarters on Formosa.

Soldiers spend much of their day either underground at a battle station outside digging more fortifications and carving more roads.

Reds Promise

TOKYO, Nov. 19 (AP)—Red China yesterday promised a better life for the aged, widowed, childless and feeble. Peking radio said 6,417 red homes for the aged "to provide a happy life" have been established in 12 provinces to accommodate 64,223 old people.

Providing radio said since 1958 five

guarantees were provided the aged, widowed, childless or feeble in the rural areas. They are food, clothing, fuel, the care of any children and burial costs.

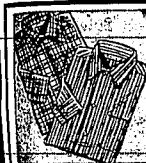

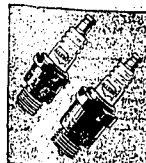

Trading With Russians Isn't So Profitable

Nations trying to do business with the Soviet Union under recently revised trade restrictions are finding the profits they had expected.

They are finding the Soviet purchase pattern spotty.

There is evidence that the Reds are more interested in purchasing production models which can be copied than in buying to meet consumer consumption directly.

This is an old Soviet habit. Long before World War II the Reds were already more interested in blueprints even than in production models.

They bought blueprints for machines and for tanks and, incidentally, made more from the latter than did the United States.

In those days, the Soviet spy was more likely to be interested in an American industrial process or a German chemical process than in military secrets.

This effort to compress the world's industrial revolution into a brief period for Soviet purposes has now become a major factor in the cold war.

Stevenson reports from his latest visit that Soviet engineers are doing a real job of copying American designs and other Western machinery acquired years ago with modern models of their own.

There is much to be learned between what the Reds are doing now and what the Japanese did after realizing their industrial backwardness.

They copied the West, raced toward industrialization, and began to compete with the countries which were ahead of them in the industrial revolution.

They finally tried to take over a bit of Asia with a mixture of their private trading preserve, and got themselves into a disastrous war.

The Soviet "spy" buying is an additional clue to the methods by which she intends to prosecute the cold war.

She already is selling at a loss and buying at a billion people as it suits her political purposes. To do so, her dictatorship can withhold food and products from the internal economy almost at will in order to establish an exchange of trade relations abroad.

In addition, she is producing actual surplus—such as wheat, iron, which soon will be the same way. She can dump surpluses to distant markets—distances always being one of her chief stocks in trade. Or she can start supplying undeveloped countries and then cut them off if they refuse to swallow her political program.

All this enhances the problems of an already unstable world, in which the transition from colonialism to the independence of underdeveloped nations would be a sufficient problem in itself.

It faces both governments and private enterprise with problems which have no solution in the type of warfare in which neither old-fashioned saboteurs or new-fangled bombs are of value.

Delinquents Are Aggressive

Expert Says Poor Grades Are Often Delinquency Symptom

WASHINGTON (NEA)—You'd probably have more cause for alarm than you think if your child is flunking his school work.

A new report card may indicate a child is in an even worse way than you realize.

Dr. William C. Kvaraceus, one of the country's top youth crime authorities and head of a new National Education association study of juvenile delinquency, believes that there is a close relation between a child's grade along in school and his chances of becoming a teen-age lawbreaker.

"That's why he warns parents to be on the look-out for several delinquency danger signals in their children's attitude toward school."

He says that only one or two of these traits occasionally show up. It may be several and become a definite part of a youth's personality that trouble usually can be predicted.

First, Dr. Kvaraceus believes that a child who is consistently poor in school is a delinquent in the making.

The Boston university sociologist emphasizes he's not referring to the usual complaints kids make when they would rather play than study. "I mean white heat hate for school and for persons connected with it," he explains.

"Disinterest in school work is another indication of potential delinquency," Dr. Kvaraceus explains that it's practically impossible to trace the true delinquency and type of classroom work.

A desire to quit school before the end of the year is another danger signal. And that's the pupil's report card which shows nothing but failing marks.

"The lack of interest and his intent to leave school early frequently can be traced to his similar lack of success in the academic program of the school," the sociologist says. "As might be expected, he frequently is held back and is over-age for his grade."

This in turn may lead to the fifth delinquency symptom, which is truancy.

Dr. Kvaraceus says "the view of the negative school picture, the delinquent tries to solve his school

97 Pounds Is U.S. Average Use of Sugar

WASHINGTON (UPD)—The agriculture department estimates sugar consumption in the United States this year will average out at the rate of 97 pounds of sugar per person.

That means the average person will consume slightly more than a quarter of a pound of sugar every day.

This seemingly impossible amount includes a spoonful of sugar in each of three cups of coffee, a little for breakfast cereal, and a little for cooking. A lot of "invisible" sugar also will be consumed.

"Invisible" sugar is in bakery goods, confections, preserves, ice cream, soft drinks, canned foods, frozen foods, and frozen juice concentrates. It accounts for about half the sugar an average person uses.

Total U. S. sugar consumption annually amounts to about 16,000,000,000 pounds.

A department specialist estimated that a enough sugar to fill a one-mile square section of land 4 1/2 feet deep by 11-foot feet. If a drain pipe were connected to the bottom of the pile, he figured, it could be drained out the rate of 100 pounds a second and would disappear in five years, two months, and 10 days.

The United States gets its sugar from these sources: 24 per cent from Cuba and sugar beets grown in the United States, 12 per cent from Hawaii, almost 31 per cent from Puerto Rico, 34 per cent from Cuba, 11 per cent from the Philippines, and almost 2 per cent from other foreign countries, primarily Peru, the Dominican Republic, and Mexico.

Railroad Men Ponder Futures; Young Blood Being Sought to Take up Slack

CHICAGO (UPI)—The railroad men who watched the roundhouse disappear, are now wondering what their future holds. He's witnessed the consolidation of small-town rail depots that have even the trainees a link to the outside world.

So, the railroad worker naturally wonders when his time is coming. Engineers, conductors and brakemen interviewed by United Press International said that as far as they are concerned the rail industry is a dying business.

They gave their names but asked that they not be published. A 65-year-old veteran engineer said, "the railroads of today and the railroads of yesterday are completely different."

Trucks and planes have taken over from the trains, said this railroad man of 42 years' service. "The railroads are hanging on by their teeth. Now we are just waiting to see what happens to us."

He said the industry no longer offers the opportunity to young men that once did.

"If I had a son that wanted to go into railroading I'd do everything I could to dissuade him from it. The hours are irregular, the promotion slow and the pay too low for the responsibility."

A conductor for a leading rail line said he also felt that the modern day railroad offers young men little opportunity.

"Years ago," he said, "there were more jobs to shoot for. Sure, the seniority was there, but at least the jobs were, too. Now, with the automation and consolidation, they don't have half the jobs available."

A 38-year-old brakeman for another large line said that if he had it to do over again he would not go into railroading, "and if I had a son who wanted to go into the industry at any level I'd give him a good paddling."

Management, on the other hand, wants young men. At the executive level railroad men think one of the things wrong with the industry is the lack of young blood, and they've begun to invade the college campuses for bright young prospects.

Willard Dinella, employment supervisor for the New York Central railroad, said it's high time the industry started to compete for its

Concentrate Use Is Light In This Area

Members of Idaho Dairy Herd Improvement associations feed less concentrates to their cows and also less concentrates per 100 pounds of milk produced than any of the other states where feed records are kept, according to a recent USDA report, according to the National Cooperative Herd Improvement Program. County Agent Warren Dalich reports.

A study of this report in the county agent's office gives an Idaho figure of 2,100 pounds of concentrates per cow per year. The high was Florida with 4,600 and the average was 3,000. Other feed consumed by Idaho cows included 2,000 pounds of dry roughage, 3,200 pounds of siccant roughage plus 144 days on pasture.

These and other records were obtained on 673 Idaho herds out of 21,110 herds in the country. The average butterfat production was 384 pounds per cow as compared to the national average of 350.

During October production records were obtained on 50 herds in Teton Falls county. The average butterfat production per cow was just about a pound per day, 31.8 in one herd in the west and in the county and 29.2 in the unit, two, the east end of the county. Fifty-seven of the 50 herds had one or more dry cows. Of the 1,762 cows 329 were dry, or 18.7 per cent.

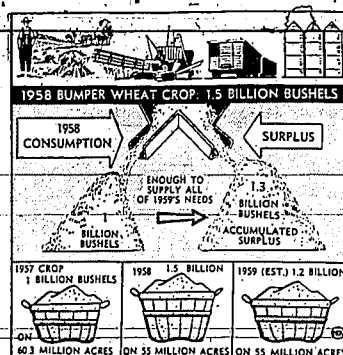

Wheat Crop Record Looming



Despite determined government cutbacks on wheat acreage, this year's harvest looms as the largest on record, 500 million bushels more than can be consumed at home or by export. This means that America's mountain of surplus wheat will be biked up to 1.3 billion bushels. This is enough to fill the department of agriculture, to fill all our needs for 1959 and still have 300 million bushels for 1960. But already another bumper crop is being predicted for next year. The government at present holds \$2.5 billion worth of wheat for storage bins worth \$250 million, costing \$450,000 a day to maintain.

\$9,238 Is Paid for Sports Violators

BOISE, Nov. 19 (UPI)—Fishing and fishing law violators were clipped to the tune of \$9,238 in fines during October, the state fish and game department, revealed today.

J. P. McDermott, jr., chief of conservation enforcement, said the heavy increase in arrest reports reflected the heavy outdoor activity in Idaho during October.

Included among the violations were 80 cases based on big game charges, 48 infractions of upland bird regulations, 36 for wrong class of license, 34 for miscellaneous hunting violations, 23 for unlawful fishing and 20 for waterfowl illegalities.

McDermott said the heaviest fine paid was \$200 for an overlimit of game in Caribou county. The smallest fine was \$10.

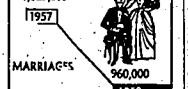

PITTSBURGH (NEA) — If you have trouble making up your mind, take heart. Scientists are now developing a machine that could make your decisions for you.

In some dream future, you might ask one of these electronic devices to settle an argument between you and your wife. The question, "Should we go to the mountains or the seashore?"

You could ask, "How can I become more popular?" or "What career should I follow?" The machine would come up with a recommended course of action.

Within the next two years the computer will be usable for industrial problems such as, "How should I vary my factory production from hour to hour to make the biggest profit?"

Many years hence it could be used by the state department in recommending solutions to, "What should the U. S. do about Quemoy and Matsu?"

There's no guarantee, of course, that anyone will pay any attention to its answers.

The gadget has one weakness. To give you the right answer, it first must guide you into some failures. The machine uses these failures to lead you to bigger successes. "If you can't afford a mistake, don't ask it," should I take a swing at that cop?"

At present, this electronic machine works in the same way as an old-fashioned cook. She puts in a pinch of this and a pinch of that. She sees what it works out.

Then she adds a dab of this and a little more of that. She observes how this affects the taste. She continues this trial and error operation until she's satisfied with the result.

Scientists say this is the way most persons reason, whether it's thinking about personal problems—huskiness or foreign affairs.

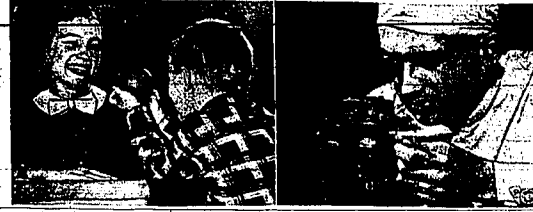

Mice Survive Space Flight; Drown in Sea

NEW YORK, Nov. 19 (AP)—Two mice—probably the highest flying space travelers to date—turned to Earth alive—only to die in the Atlantic ocean, a woman scientist said yesterday.

The mice—named Laska and Benji—rode the force rockets up through the Earth's atmosphere to a height of some 7,400 miles.

6,000 Miles Traveled

Both spanned some 6,000 miles of the Earth's surface in about 45 minutes. Both traveled better than 35,000 miles an hour.

And both survived the "red hot" re-entry into the Earth's atmosphere again and the parachute drop down to the ocean.

"There is every reason to believe that both Laska and Benji would have been recovered alive after their flights if the nose cones had been retrieved," said Miss Frankl L. van der Wal.

A design engineer at Space Technology laboratories, Los Angeles, it was his idea to use the little bit of leftover space in the nose cone to put a small animal into space.

Less than two weeks after she asked for permission from the air force, she had the mice ready a month later the first mouse, supplied with oxygen and food, was riding a Project Able rocket.

But this mouse was only an afterthought. The real purpose of Project Able was to test force-measuring cones. The mice had to hitchhike into space.

Electric Exercise Studied for Space

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—Electrically induced muscle contractions as a substitute for normal exercise may solve one of the political problems of space navigators.

The medical officer of the atomic submarine, Rear Adm. Keith Condit John H. Ebersole, said yesterday the idea already is being studied as a possible aid to submariners.

"This may have even further application for the spaceman whose lack of exercise is compounded by the gravity-free state," he added.

Ebersole told the annual convention of the Assoc. of Military Surgeons of the United States that "lack of normal exercise, markedly obvious in the soldier, may cause cat. sleep, bath, recreate, and work within a distance of 30-50 feet, will place the spaceman in a far-reaching general metabolic and cardiovascular effects."

Hungarian Reds "Win" Solid Vote

BUDAPEST, Nov. 19 (AP)—Communist-backed candidates in Hungary's election—the only set on the ballot—won a majority of 92.6 per cent, it was announced yesterday.

It was the first vote since the 1955 anti-Soviet pact, the official news agency MTI said, 6,492,500.

There were only 28,651 votes officially counted against the 233 official candidates for parliament, and 32,010 voters spoiled their ballots.

The only choice they had was to approve the single tickets—99.99 per cent of them communists—or mark their dissent in a tiny circle.

Lodge Warned

WASHINGTON, N. Y., Nov. 19 (UPI)—Romania has threatened to start calling the United States names if U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge continues to refer to east European nations as Soviet satellites.

Silvan Brucan, Romanian ambassador to Washington, told the U. S. political committee yesterday, "if he continues to use this language then he should be bear in mind that we can do likewise and that the conquest by force in the last century of Texas and California, or Hawaii, or Cuba, or Puerto Rico and the Philippines, and the much reality in Lebanon and the Formosa straits, fully abundantly provides us with a historic background to call the United States names."

Russian Gets Booted From Another Post

MOSCOW, Nov. 18 (UPI)—Diplomatic sources reported yesterday that former Premier Nikolai Bulganin, linked that week for the first time with the so-called "anti-party clique," has been removed from his post as chairman of the economic council in faraway Sverdlovsk.

Bulganin was dispatched to the north Caucasus last summer after his quiet demotion from ministerial rank as chairman of the state bank, the post he had been given after giving up the premiership to Nikhruchev.

The ex-leader had been privately criticized for failing to support Khrushchev in the latter's showdown with the anti-party group of former Premier Georgi Malenkov, former Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, former First Deputy Premier Leonid Brezhnev, and former Foreign Minister Bulganin himself.

That was when Khrushchev met with the Soviet cabinet and the central committee to discuss the new seven-year plan for Soviet economic development and reform of the Soviet educational system.

Bulganin's Name Appears Reactionary Decried by the central committee that day and published the next evening in Bulganin's name alongside those of Molotov, Malenkov and the others.

'Ike' Asks for Favor of U.S. Leader in '72

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—President Eisenhower yesterday asked a favor of the man who will occupy the White House from 1973 until 1975.

The favor was a possible appointment to the U.S. air force academy for the 19-month-old son of Capt. Iven C. Kincheloe, Jr., killed last July while testing an experimental F-105 near Edwards air force base, California.

Preparations Made
Kincheloe was flying that more nearly conventional plane during an interval in his preparations to pilot the X-15 space-traveling aircraft. The request recalled a similar gesture by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who proposed a West Point appointment for the young son of Capt. Colin P. Kelly, who was killed when his plane dove into a Japanese warship early in World War II. The appointment is reserved for young Kelly.

Deaths Was Loss to U.S.
Kincheloe's only known successor in a letter that the death of Kincheloe, a Korean war veteran credited with downing five communist planes, "brought a real sense of loss to our nation."

Kincheloe, who was 30 at the time of his death, also is survived by a 6-month-old daughter, Jeanne.

Kincheloe had been selected shortly before his death to pilot the X-15, a jet-propelled rocket plane. On Sept. 7, 1956, he had flown the X-1, forerunner of the X-15, to an altitude of 125,000 feet. That is the highest man has ever flown.
