West Is Confronted With Russian and Chinese Switch That Hints of Stalinism

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (AP)—The West is confronted with a massive change in Russian and Chinese tactics that looks like a return to Stalinism.

What is happening at Berlin and Quemoy may be only the first in many aggressive communist moves which from now on could keep the Western allies busy and off-balance. This would require a long-range re-plan.

Or it may be an effort by the communist world to regain some of the ground it lost during the American troops' retreat into Lebanon and British troops' withdrawal from Jordan.

Stalin's policy was to give the West no rest, to keep it off balance, test its willingness to resist; grab what he could. He pressured Turkey and Iran, and Greek communist supporters tried to take over their country's government.

In all three cases the United States resisted—and Stalin backed down. He made his way to Czechoslovakia, Berlin and France. Then Castro tried to get direct help. The communists look over from within.

In 1958 he tried to force the United States, Britain and France out of their occupation of West Berlin—which is the miles high red-rain East Germany—by completely blocking any overland supplies for West Berlin.

The United States ended this blockade with its airlift and airlift gave up on that one. Then, with Russian help, the Korean communists began their war. The United States had to go to war to block them.

But this proved Stalin's worst blunder. His terror tactics drove the Western countries into active military alliance and stimulated the United States into an arm program that has never ceased.

It was he—Stalin—who started the Soviet war. When Stalin died, the new Soviet boss, Nikita Khrushchev, not only denounced him as a murderer but called a halt to uncontrolled terror tactics.

The Soviet Union continued to push, but now it was by persuasion, not by force. He called for peaceful coexistence and the more Russia increased its military power, the more it threatened to become even more overbearing.

Then last summer, when the Lebanese government feared overthrow and called for American help, President Eisenhower sent in American troops. At the same time the British went into Jordan to save King Hussein's throne.

Suddenly Western troops were in the Middle East, right under Russian guns. Russia growled but did nothing.

THE BERLIN GAMBIT

For under 24 hours, the East-German communist puppets showed better sense than their Kremlin overlords.

In pulling away from Russian threats to make trouble over allied-held West Berlin, the East Germans recognized the cold facts of life in the West.

But East German Premier Grotewohl wisely made plain that Khrushchev could not have meant what the West said he meant. He backed off.

He seems to understand what Khrushchev may have forgotten, that of all the beleaguered spots on earth, West Berlin is the only one and our allies are most staunchly committed to defend.

We did it once under extremely hazardous conditions in the ingenious Berlin blockade of 1948-49. There cannot be the slightest shred of doubt that we and our friends would fight to preserve West Berlin's freedom and the safety of its lines to the West.

We are in Berlin by right. And both the Berliners and the West German government want us there.

When we mounted the Berlin blockade, West Germany still was weakened and harassed by war. But in the decade that has passed, the West Germans have grown strong and today they are armed again.

In any showdown over Berlin, the communists would have to contend with the German in strength, as well as the forces of America, Britain and France.

Whatever Khrushchev's motives in making his irresponsible declaration—a wish to impress his Polish friends and force Western recognition of East Germany or to force a new conference on German unity—he chose a dangerous course.

And, whether it was bluff or real threat, it was bound to fail. All that has been gained is that once more the world has had pointed up the absurdity of this West Berlin island of freedom living surrounded by the dark waters of communism.

The history of this country reflects with stirring force our devotion to the ideals and practice of peace.

Thus there is painful irony in the well-remembered fact that today no man has been in the world think of us as a country holding a gun.

It would be some comfort if we could ascribe to communist propaganda full blame for this twisted image of American character and purpose. But the fact is that we are no more warlike than we ever were, do things which sometimes allow other peoples to draw the wrong impression.

To put heavy arms upon defense pacts in relations with some of our foreign friends. Though the conviction grows that Russia banks most heavily upon economic and political warfare to conquer the world, we find little interest in the U. S. congress in fighting such a war.

The overwhelming bulk of foreign aid must have either a direct or indirect military stamp to win approval. And even that assistance is usually for the most part for the junkies who have been deliberately started into believing that a war threat of great or small degree exists somewhere on earth.

At home, when we contemplate our links with the rest of the world, we frequently talk in terms of weapons, weapons, weapons.

It is a wonderful thing that we are alert to the peril from a tyrannical aggressor, as we were not in the years of the two world wars.

But our very alertness has led the new aggressor to shift his offensive to the economic and political front.

If we do not match him, we magnify the risk of losing the long-range struggle. Any leave ourselves exposed as the great nation seemingly insistent on giving the East-West conflict a narrowly military character.

LOOK WHAT'S COMING. If you think we have problems now, look ahead 25 years. In 1980, the government predicts, our nation is going to have to accommodate another 100 million in population.

You think things are crowded with 175,000,000 population? We'll have 272,000,000 then.

This is a real test for our planners and our political and business leaders. It is not enough to compromise on the long-range struggle, we must win on a day-to-day basis when we know what's coming.

It is also a test for our citizens. With the snowball gaining speed, our battalions—particularly on bond issues—must be wise enough not to let us be crushed as the snowball gets bigger.

The figures bear a different light on every municipal and national decision which must be made.

Some of the nation's supermarkets and neighborhood grocery stores are jumping the gun on Thanksgiving day by offering turkey at special prices this week-end.

Other stores—held-back—apparently intending to feature turkey early next week. Some of these stores offer bargains in chuck roast and fryers on the theory that the household who purchases a turkey next week wants something cheap this week.

Hams Also Offered

Some stores offer hams as well as turkeys, giving the shopper a chance to diversify this Thanksgiving day. Turkey prices vary widely but one leading chain is offering the birds at around 39 cents a pound for 18 pounds and over, about 43 cents a pound for right to 16 pounds in metropolitan New York.

Meat prices are about unchanged on the week, although loin pork chops are up four to six cents a pound in some areas. Fryers are off a bit, while eggs are narrowly higher in some places.

Vegetable Buys Listed

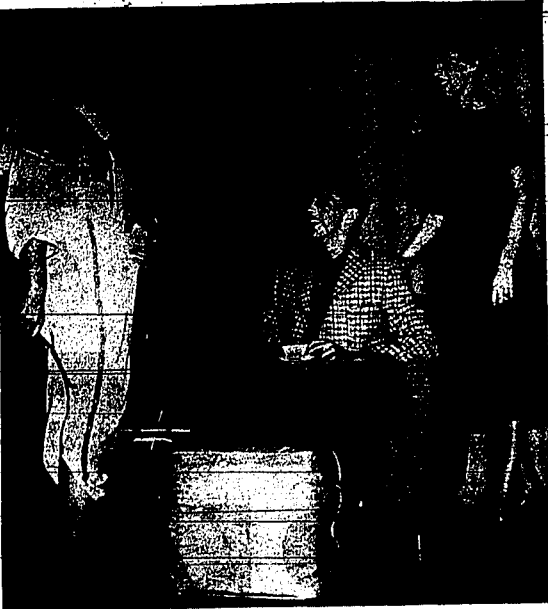
The bargain list in vegetable departments includes potatoes, spinach, mushrooms, rutabagas, cabbage and a host of so-called cooking greens—collard, kale, mustard and dandelion. Broccoli, yellow or green squash, cucumbers, celery, onions, rutabagas, sweet potatoes and beans are good buys.

Peppers and tomatoes are only moderately priced—and lettuce is expected to head higher because of poor weather in California growing areas.

Florida citrus is slowly becoming more reasonable, produce men say, as shipments of oranges and grapefruit continue to increase. California oranges are in light supply.

Apples remain the best fruit buy.

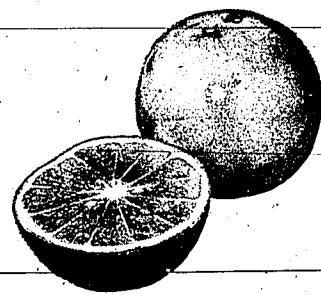

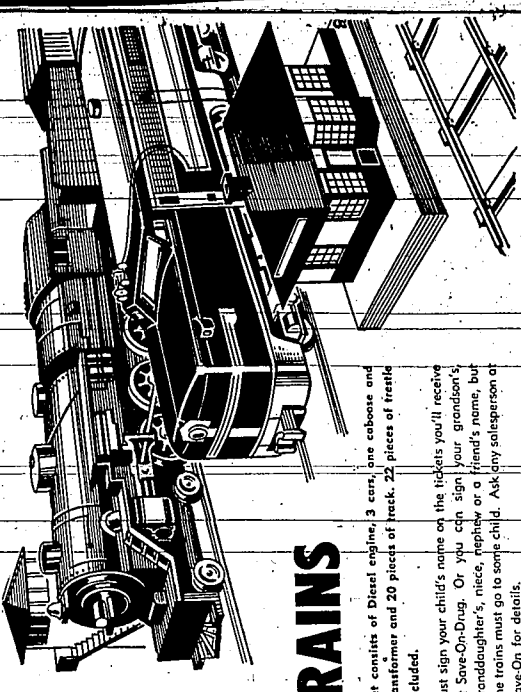

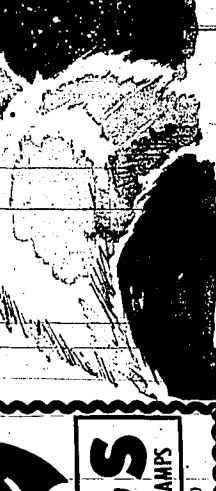

Pittman Disappears
Then last Halloween Pittman disappeared. He never showed up at his apartment after leaving a party at the home of Norma Maclean, former wife of actor Keefe Brasserie.

Pittman's father, TV-radio actor Frank Allen, filed a missing person report with the sheriff's office. Allen said his son, whose real name was Jerry Allen, liked to drive fast around mountain grades and might have gone off a road.

Check Is Mailed
Officer Roy Herd decided to check the grades in the Hollywood hills yesterday. At about 11 a. m. he found a Buick Wildcat in the 100-foot ravine was the nearly hidden wreckage. Pittman's sports car. Expert Views Rocket Flight In About '68

NEW YORK, Nov. 20 (AP)—The wings and roar of the rocket is enormous.

An invisible force presses you back into your seat and you feel your weight has suddenly doubled or tripled.

You are riding a rocket plane that will power you and perhaps 500 other passengers more than 4,000 miles to Moscow in less than two hours.

Society Hoars Report
This picture of flight along the fringes of space was reported by Dr. Robert Currier, space technician, laboratory, to the meeting of the American Rocket Society.

For five full minutes the battle between rocket and gravity will push you back with an acceleration faster than you've ever felt before.

At the end of five minutes you'll be hurtling along at about 5,000 miles an hour—more than 100 miles over the world. The rocket plane has already covered 100 to 150 miles. Suddenly the noise is gone, the acceleration slackens. The rocket plane booster breaks away and returns to its base—and now you and your fellow passengers are gliding toward your destination.

Islands Don't Fancify
The inside of the passenger compartment is less luxurious than the big jet planes that open the globe—but the time you spend flying is small.

Currier said that such a plane could be commercially in operation in 10 years or so. The passenger fare would be half as much as comparable trips by jet—and would be faster too, he said.

- 1 teaspoon cream
- 1/2 cup (about 1/2 medium) sifted marshmallows
- 1/2 cup (1 1/2 ounce package) semi-sweet chocolate pieces
- 1 cup vanilla
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Combine butter, Morning Milk, sugar and salt in aseptic oven medium heat. Bring to a boil, and cook 4 to 5 minutes, stirring constantly.
