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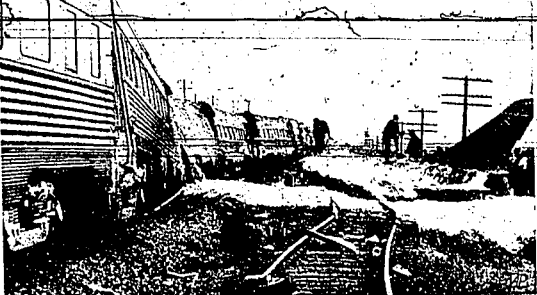

plasma are used when whole blood is not available or in the treatment of certain abnormal conditions. Although most of the blood collected is used as whole blood, a certain portion is used to prepare plasma fractions.

The goal of the Red Cross blood program is to help provide blood and blood derivatives for medical use, without charge for the products to persons across the country.

Through the blood program, blood is available for communities crippled by disasters and other emergencies.

The blood and the blood derivatives are furnished without charge for the Red Cross blood program to physicians and hospitals.

According to the Rev. Robert Keim, Twin Falls, "This simple fact can never be stressed enough. Any charge paid is for the bottle and tube and laboratory procedures."

A statistic received from the Red Cross regional office at Boise shows that Idaho uses more blood derivatives per capita than any other state.

Plasma is the liquid portion of the blood that is separated from whole blood by settling or centrifuging, according to a Red Cross publication. Plasma is dried or frozen and then stored. It is useful in the treatment of burns to replace fluid lost in the blood. Since it is stored so simply, it is frequently used for emergency cases or in remote areas where whole blood isn't available.

The Red Cross also states that plasma can be broken down through a process known as fractionation, into its various components, which are stored easily. Plasma fractions, like





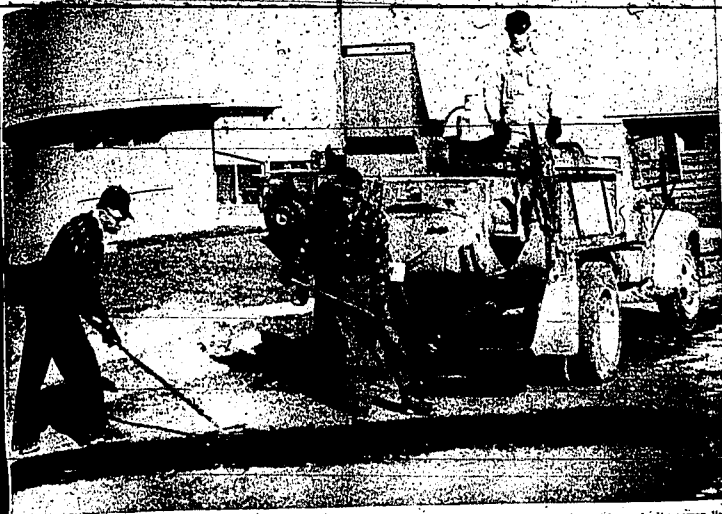

Street repair and construction are constant chores for the Twin Falls Street Department. A great deal of planning is involved in street construction. Engineers must consider land drainage, traffic flow, intersection, and many other details before construction can begin.

Necessary Planning Prevents Paving Of Streets "Right Now" for Residents

As average taxpayers, who would like to see their streets paved, it is not likely to understand the amount of planning and consideration necessary in the annual street construction program.

At the head of the city's street department is the city engineer, who is the prime consideration in the street construction program. According to Joseph H. Latimore, city engineer, money for street construction comes from four sources.

The major source is a 15-mill tax levied on the city and collected by the county. This turned over to the city, Latimore estimates that about \$100,000 will be received from this source during this fiscal year.

Another source of money is the state highway sales tax. The city receives a portion of this tax from the sale of new vehicles. This amounts to two and one-half per cent of the total amount paid. This tax is collected by the county and turned over to the city.

The next major source is money paid to the city by various subdivisions adjacent to the city. This money is used for street construction in the subdivision. This money amounts to 50 per cent of the total cost of the street. The remaining 50 per cent is supplied by the city.

The agreement between the city and the subdivisions is that the city will supply labor and equipment. The subdivisions will supply the money for the street.

The city's physical development is a factor in the street construction program. The city has a lot of residential areas and the city must consider the needs of these areas.

Latimore estimates that \$200,000 will be needed from this source this year.

The remaining budget money is spent from miscellaneous sources such as a portion of parking meter collections and special repair jobs.

Latimore explains that after the usual budget is set, the city then allocates the money into four major construction expense categories: 1. Maintenance of present streets. 2. Reconstruction or construction of new streets. 3. Rehabilitation or resurfacing of the most needed streets in the city. 4. Planning for the future.

In category one, maintenance of present streets, in the last three years, the department has resurfaced portions of Second and Third streets east and north, and a portion of Third street south.

In category two, subdivision construction, Latimore estimates five

contractors and paid by the subdividers. Gaslines are installed by private companies if there is sufficient demand.

At this point in the construction, subdividers are asked to construct the curbing and gutters also done by private contractors. The street is then covered with a four-inch gravel base.

Then the street is opened and allowed to compact for 12 to 18 months. A two-inch coat of asphalt plant mix, from the city's own plant, is placed on the road some time during the summer months. This coat must "cure" for one season and is then sealed with another coat of asphalt and "chipped" or surfaced with small rock chips. The top coat carries out moisture and the rocks provide a wearing surface.

Latimore says the average street takes five to ten years, depending upon wear. Present asphalt streets have a life span of 40 to 50 years.

Twin Falls uses asphalt, according to Latimore, because it is easier to apply and requires less experienced

workers than does concrete.

The city estimates the cost of the average 36-foot wide street at \$30,000. This includes the two separate grading, graveling and paving operations. This estimate is exclusive of abnormal land characteristics, such as fills, ditches or irrigation structures.

Latimore notes that city is now in the process of setting up a central accounting system that will enable officials to determine accurately the cost of curbing, maintenance and construction work, and better enable them to estimate projected street construction costs.

MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT

Warren Barry Ranks High as Energetic Booster for T. F. and Magic Valley Area

Warren Barry, personable young business man of the Magic Valley, ranks high among the most energetic boosters of Twin Falls and Magic Valley.

In addition to running a busy contractor's outfit in the area, he also finds time to aid and assist potential new industries that are being located in this area, and with two partners, run a cattle ranch.

Barry spent his adolescent years in Utah, then moved to Twin Falls and finished high school here. He entered the College of Idaho shortly before Pearl Harbor. After one and one-half years of college, in late 1942, Barry enlisted as a private in the U. S. marines. He served in the marines for three and one-half years as a crew chief of a communications and night fighter control crew.

After a stint in the southern and central Pacific, Barry returned to finish his year of duty with a training detachment at Deming, Tex. It was there that he met his future wife, Doris Jean Stephens, a resident of Deming. They were married in the spring of 1946 at Deming.

In March, 1946, Barry was mustered out of the marines as a sergeant. During the following summer, he worked for his father-in-law, Harry Barry Lumber yard in Twin Falls.

In the fall he re-entered the College of Idaho, but on resuming his interrupted football career and enjoying in economics. By attending summer school, he was able to graduate in 1948. In his senior year, Barry, a guard, was co-captain of the football team and a varsity weight man on the track and field team. The varsity team also ran with the college a capella choir. He still sings with the Twin Falls Presbyterian church choir.

During college days Barry and his wife like other young couples then, took out an existence on the GI bill, which amounted to \$100 a month, and on a scanty athletic scholarship check.

Upon graduation, Barry started working for the Sago Milk Products company in Bull as the company's office manager.

His resignation from that position a few months later, to join the Clinster Products company, Twin Falls,

Idaho Masonry Products in 1950 and eventually became Volvo Builder's Supply.

Barry says Barry got started on his own in 1948, but he is presently asking the question, "Why have I been doing something to attract industry to this area?" After he explained his ideas to a group of prospective builders around the community and the location of suitable industries in the Twin Falls area.

"The commission feels that anything that will help Magic Valley will help Twin Falls," Barry said. "The overall impact of industry on the area would benefit all of us."

The commission's basic job is to show prospective builders around the community and answer questions they pose concerning this area.

One of the commission's biggest problems is to help prospective industries procure enough local capital to finance construction. According to Barry, most of the prospective industries prefer to have a portion of their building capital come from the community.

Another problem, a problem of business diplomacy, is the difficulty commission members sometimes have in protecting the confidence they share with the prospective builders. Many industries prefer to survey a city's industrial potential quietly and without prior notice.

"There are a lot of hours put in by commission members that no one hears about," Barry said. He stresses that such activities are necessary to create rapport with the industries.

Recently the commission has assisted in the location of the Rogers Brothers Seed company and the Galt Valley Seed company in Twin Falls. The Interstate Freight company was located in the western terminal here in 1957, and the commission worked with the civil air patrol when it moved offices from Boise to Twin Falls.

On top of his already heavy business and civic program, Barry still finds time to dabble in ranching with his brother, David Barry, and Arlo White. He is a part owner of the Niagara Springs Ranching company in Gooding county.

Another hobby, flying, has held Barry's interest for some years. He has managed to crowd 100 hours of flying time into his busy schedule.

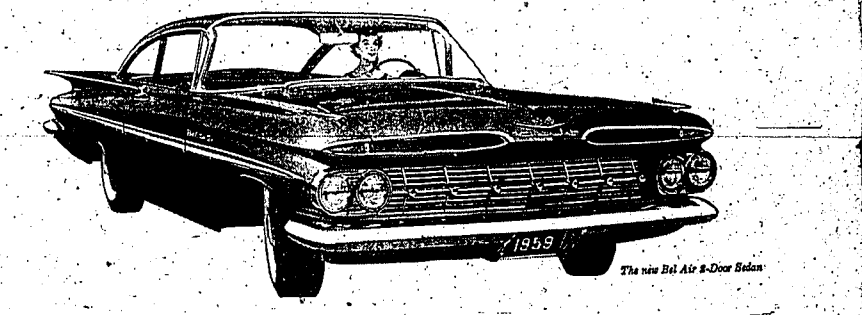

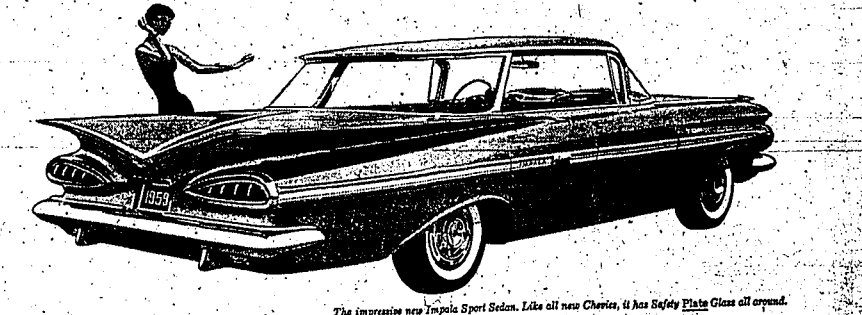

Altrusa Club Campaign Is Designed to Eliminate "Invitation" for Auto Theft

If you are a thoughtless person who leaves the keys in your car, you'll soon be reminded of your forgetfulness by the Twin Falls Altrusa club's new safety campaign.

The Altrusa club has started a reminder campaign that will last until Christmas. The object of the campaign is to alert the public to the danger of the almost act of leaving car keys in the ignition of unattended cars.

The reminder will be hammered home by club members in an unusual manner. Teams of club members will travel about the city placing paper reminder keys on parked cars in the business district, parking lots, supermarkets and other areas where there is a concentration of cars.

It is in the next few weeks, 5,000 paper keys will be placed under the windshield wiper of parked cars in Twin Falls. The paper key bears a printed reminder to remove the car keys and urges the driver to remember that a vast majority of stolen cars have been "open invitations" to thieves.

According to National Safety Council records, 50 per cent of juvenile crimes involve car theft. The club hopes through its campaign to avoid such crimes in Twin Falls by removing the temptation.

The post office box number of the Southern Idaho division of the National Safety Council is printed at the base of the key. Anyone desiring further information concerning traffic safety and crime can drop a postcard to that address, requesting information.

Mrs. B. Harper, originator of the idea, said, "We feel it can save one bundle of crooked money that isn't looked, we have so-called something."

Mrs. Harper said she got the idea of the paper key reminder from a book she saw following a rash of thefts in Twin Falls. She felt if some method could be devised to warn the public to remove keys from cars, the possibility that such crimes could be avoided.

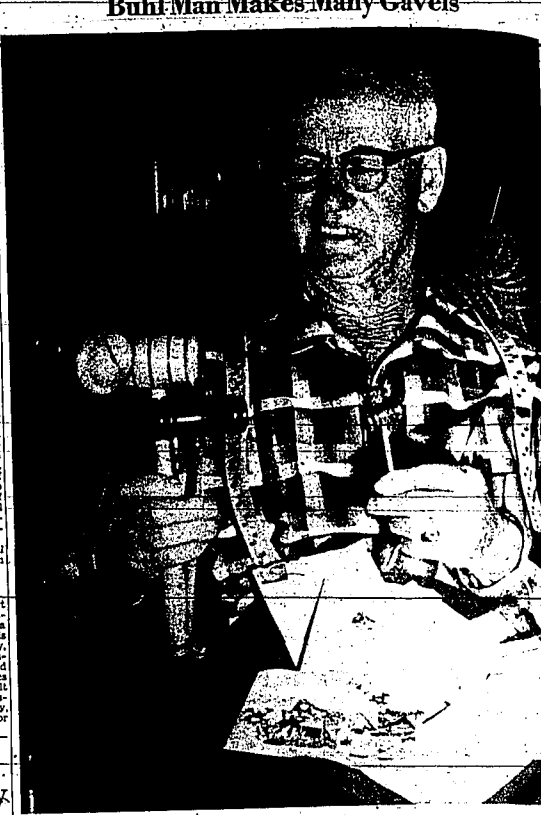
