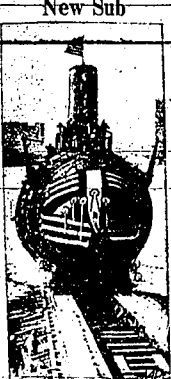

Sharp Pencil, Reasoning Can Show Startling U.S. Debt Fact

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (UPI)—Application of a sharp pencil, simple arithmetic and the facts of life to the U. S. national debt can produce some figures so terrifying as to be almost unbelievable.

For example, if the national debt increases in the next 20 years as it has in the past 20, we all would be bustled by 1978. By that year we all would be earning dollars which wouldn't be worth much, if anything. For a real switch it probably would be earning dollars which would be worth more than \$100 to the dollar.

Who, with real goods or services to trade, would want to exchange that World War III bill just one-half penny, or less? Such a hard decision may never have to be made if American citizens, although it

the rate of hot war outlays. What happened to the national debt in 20 years from 1929 was that it increased about 10-fold. It had increased by 1954 to a mere 310,000,000. It is moving toward 200 billion dollars today. The shocker in the story of the national debt is the annual cost in interest to the holders of government securities.

The treasury must pay out nearly eight billion dollars in interest in the present fiscal year. Interest on the national debt in the past 10 years comes to more than \$60,000,000,000. Perhaps, you might compare to what the national debt will cost 20 years from now if it continues to increase in the future as it has in the past.

Eighteen times more debt would require 18 times more interest for the bond holders.

That would be an interest bill of 144 billion dollars in the 1978 fiscal year and somewhere in that great year would be the dime that breaks the taxpayer's back and broke the back of the American economy. In fact, that much money would run the government for nearly two years at the present level of spending which are not by any means low.

There are alternatives to the steady and very large increase over the years of the national debt. They are either to reduce spending with some or to increase taxes to cover the difference. A combination of both would be doubly effective and probably more acceptable to the U. S. taxpayer.

The alternatives confronting us in 1958—assuming that the debt should by then have increased 10-fold—would be these: Pay the interest or repudiate the debt. There would be another way out, however. 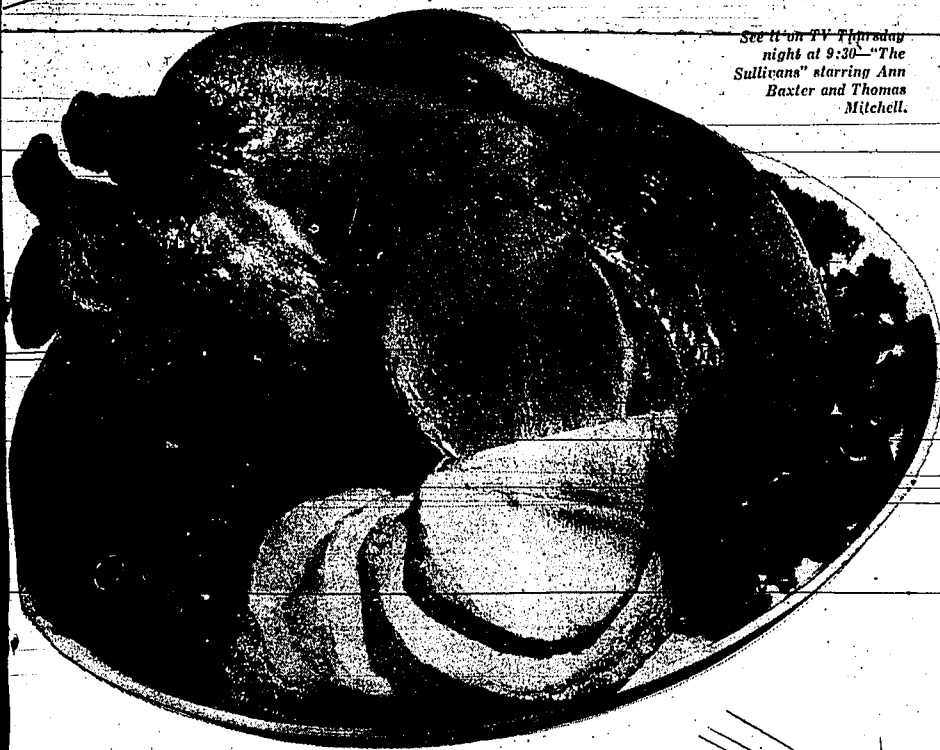

Informants said U. S. Ambassador Raymond Hare had smoothed over the difficulties in meetings with UAR foreign ministry officials. Some spokesmen declined to comment.

Office for School Board Is Bomb

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 24 (UPI)—A mob killed a school board official in a ventilator at the Orleans parish county school board office—no one was hurt.

The building was unoccupied and damage was slight.

Police and FBI agents began running laboratory tests of bomb fragments.

A spokesman at the New Orleans defective bureau said investigation had not proceeded far enough to determine whether there was any connection between the explosion and other dynamite which have occurred in the South during the past year.

Geneva Talks Held up Again By Red Moves

GENEVA, Nov. 24 (UPI)—The conference on prevention of surprise attacks adjourned today until tomorrow with the 10-day talks which achieved no progress toward breaking the East-West deadlock.

A Western spokesman said "possible systems for observation and inspection of long-range aircraft" submitted to the 10-day conference today, drew no response from the communist bloc but a demarcation of U. S. borders was accepted.

The conference met at 10:30 a.m. and adjourned at 11:30 a.m. until 10:30 a.m. tomorrow.

Third Paper Submitted
The paper on long-range aircraft was the third the West had submitted to the conference in a vain effort to stimulate discussion of possible techniques for guarding against surprise attacks.

Previous papers submitted by the United States, Britain, France, France and other western nations included "possible weapons of attack" and "possible means of detection."

The Russians have brushed them aside and insisted on taking up political issues.

West Meets Hammering
The three-week-old, three-power conference on discontinuance of atomic testing meeting at 3 p.m. today was hammering by similar Russian tactics.

The United States, in an all-out try to move forward with discussions of a general, controlled atomic testing pact, have barged past an agenda deadlock and began talking about what Western diplomats termed matters of substance.

Some time Idaho May Produce Oil

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—Experimental work conducted by the Atomic Energy commission may produce Idaho to become an oil producing state, Sen. Henry Clay Dwyer, D-Ida., said last week.

Dwyer said the AEC is experimenting with atomic oil mining to tap petroleum resources in shale beds. The plan involves underground atomic explosions, he said.

At present, it is too expensive to get oil out of shale beds, Dwyer said. He said the shale has to be brought to the surface and heated to 300 degrees Fahrenheit before the oil comes out.

In the proposed new method, a controlled atomic blast would be set off at the bottom of a shaft in the field. The blast will break the shale and release oil. The petroleum shale has to be pumped to the surface.

Nuclear Tests Ban Proposal Gets Support

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (UPI)—A member of the joint congressional atomic committee has urged a Democratic proposal for banning all nuclear tests that produce radioactive fallout. Rep. Craig Hosmer, R., Calif., said today the administration should seriously consider the bill. He said it might also help break the East-West stalemate at Geneva over a plan to halt atomic testing. "I am confident with Eisenhower's return from Geneva, later this month," he said in a letter to the White House, "that you will have a detailed memorandum." He urged that the United States not make tests to underground unless space, which would eliminate the fallout danger, for three years with a promise to make the ban permanent if Russia agrees. The Geneva talks, Russia has fully refused to agree in advance to the detailed inspection machinery demanded by the United States and to refrain from any other testing on a nuclear test ban.

Old Shed-Covered Bridge Is Vanishing In Nation; Less Than 1,200 Still Left

The old shed-covered bridge, once a picturesque landmark on excursions into the open countryside, is rapidly vanishing from the American scene. Long known as "kissing bridges," the wooden structures have dwindled to a few scattered hundreds—probably less than 1,200 all over the United States. Formerly they numbered high in the thousands. At least 600 have accounted to the march of scientific steel-and-concrete progress in the nation's highway system during the past five years alone. "Not at all," alarmed by the trend, nostalgic-minded citizens, historical societies and others are rising in embattled wrath in an attempt to preserve the surviving relics. In New Hampshire, which once boasted more than 200 sheltered bridges, the Covered Bridge Association of New Hampshire has appointed vigilante committees to keep watch over each of the 55 still left standing. And in Wisconsin, the Daughters of the American Revolution have erected a plaque marking the state's lone surviving structure, in Ozaukee county. "1878-1955 Bridge in Wisconsin." The Ozaukee county board had hoped to preserve the bridge "forever." A survey conducted by the American Automobile association embracing 31 states where covered bridges have been abundant, disclosed that 301 are still in use. This compares with a one-time peak of more than 6,574 in 15 states where some kind of past records have been kept. Many states have no such records. Virginia has operation only four covered bridges of the hundreds of a century ago. Many were destroyed in the Civil war, but Bridge Engineer J. N. Clark of the Virginia highway department says 50 were still standing as late as 1936. Vermont has 103 left out of more than 1,000—after a steady decline since New York 23 out of 400, Tennessee 10 out of 300, and New Jersey has just one remaining out of its original 75. The AAA survey shows that Ohio, which once had more than 2,500 covered bridges, leads the nation with the greatest number still in existence—251. Twenty years ago it had 600.

Pope John Is Busy Man as He Turns 77

VATICAN CITY, Nov. 24 (UP)—Pope John XXIII is 77 tomorrow—and will have to be reminded by his birthday anniversary, Vatican aides say.

He has been too busy in his first month as pontiff to make any personal plans for the day. He may, at the last minute, catch one or two friends for a quiet meal.

Dec. 8 Data Set

Has three brothers and one sister, but of a family of 17 children, he will not be here. They, and hundreds of townsmen from his native village of Soana in Monte and his province of Bergamo, are coming down by special train Dec. 6, intended to give him a golden crown.

John XXIII was older, at the time of his election Oct. 25, than any other newly elected pope since Clement XII in 1730. Clement was 78 when he became pontiff.

But with an energy that belies his years, sturdy Pope John has held to a work schedule that allows only six hours sleep a night and already has set several precedents.

23 Cardinals Named

A week ago he called a consistory for Dec. 15 to create 23 new cardinals and increase the size of the Sacred College to 76. It had been fixed at 70 for nearly 700 centuries.

He left his tiny Vatican state last Friday to drive to Castel Gandolfo for a private visit to the papal summer palace. Yesterday he drove through the streets of Rome again, this time in formal procession, to take possession of the Basilica of St. John Lateran, his see as bishop of Rome. UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 24 (UPI)—Two United Nations diplomats yesterday topped off a television debate on Cyprus with some decidedly undiplomatic behavior.

Officials of the Columbia Broadcasting system show "U. N. in Action" had to separate the two men, who started some scolding of their own after the show was off the air.

The main participants in the debate were Rauf Denktaş, a Turk, and Zouren Rozdas, a Greek, both advisers to their respective delegates to the U. N.

While on camera the diplomats managed to limit their threats to words-but after the program Rozdas accused Denktaş of telling "a pack of lies."

Denktaş grabbed Rozdas by the lapels.

Secretary of Labor Mitchell to Seek Tougher Law on Funds

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (UPI)—Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell is far from happy about the new law providing for disclosure of company welfare and pension fund operations. It takes effect next year.

He doesn't think it's tough enough or gives him adequate power to crack down on violators who hold back or provide phony accounts of their welfare plans.

The labor department, charged with enforcing the law, is circulating advance copies of forms to be filled by administrators of such plans.

Officials at the department estimate there are more than 250,000 plans in existence with assets totaling \$9 billion dollars.

Two copies of a form describing each plan must be filed with the department by next April 1. Annual reports are due within 120 days after the end of the fund's fiscal year.

Testimony before congressional investigating committees disclosed that racketeers had phoned off some checks and for medical care into the pockets. They did this by "kickback" deals with insurance brokers who were paid commissions for administering the plans.

The law aims to discourage such activities by disclosing all transactions to the public and to workers who benefit by the plan.

The department's questionnaire contains a dozen questions with many sub-questions under each heading. It will be made public about mid-December. The department wants to know who selects the insurance firm in each case and who determines how to invest the money accumulated in the welfare funds.

It also wants to know who keeps records and authorizes payment of benefits to workers covered by the plans.

Mitchell's aides said he is displeased with the disclosure law because it is vague about who has to answer to the truth of the description. The law says the "administrator" should do this but the definition of administrator seems ambiguous. It could be more than one person.

The AFL-CIO also backed a law with more teeth in it. But officials of the labor federation generally believe it would not be possible to get the law amended at the next session of congress. They believe the lawmakers would demand a waiting period to see how it works.

Nevertheless, Mitchell has said he intends to seek a tightening-up of alleged loopholes in the measure when congress reconvenes.

Major Crimes Jump In U. S. Noted by FBI

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (UPI)—Major crimes in the United States increased 11 per cent in the first nine months this year over the same period last year, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reported today.

Robbery, burglary, forcible rape and larceny led the mounting crime wave.

The figures were given in the first of a series of FBI quarterly "crime index" reports aimed at showing the nationwide crime picture more frequently. The FBI's regular "uniform crime reports" will henceforth be published yearly instead of semi-annually.

Today's first "crime index," based on preliminary reports for January through September, 1958, showed an overall rate of 11 per cent in major crimes and the following rise in the seven major classifications:

Crimes Index Listed

Robbery, 18 per cent; burglary, 14 per cent; forcible rape, 13 per cent; larceny over \$50, 13 per cent; auto theft, five per cent; murder, three per cent, and aggravated assault, two per cent.

The report noted that the former classes of negligent manslaughter, (usually "traffic" deaths) and larceny under \$50 have been dropped from previous categories for purposes of the quarterly index. It added that police reports of "naps" since Jan. 1, 1955, have been limited to forcible rape instead of the former category which included statutory rape (no force used-victim under age).

Crimes Broken Down

In a breakdown for groups of cities of various sizes, the "crime index" shows the largest percentage increase in total crimes for the first nine months of this year occurred in cities of 500,000-750,000, 250,000-500,000 and 25,000-50,000—all up 14 per cent, and the smallest overall rise in cities 100,000-1,000,000 showed no change as a whole in their murder rates and cities of 25,000-50,000 showed a decline of four per cent in aggravated assaults. (Cities under 25,000 are not included in the report.)

Radium Kept In House but Owner Is OK

WHEELING, W. Va., Nov. 24 (UPI)—A widow who lived in a house where 10 milligrams of deadly radium had been lying for a year and a half admitted only by a Friday was assured of a healthy future today.

The widow, Mrs. Anita Belgrade, said during the week-end she was given a clean bill of health by physicians who told her she apparently had no ill effects from the dangerous rays.

Last Thursday, Mrs. Belgrade asked Professor Robert W. Simmons, West Liberty college if he wanted to purchase the radium.

The scientist, during the telephone call, found that Mrs. Belgrade had taken no precautionary measures with the element.

A hurried visit to her home by the professor revealed that the radium—about as big as a shotgun pellet—was in a leather-covered box.

Simmons said exposure to the substance for several consecutive hours could be fatal. He said his geiger counter "went wild" in every room of the house.

Costly Vote
