**Most Nations Paying Debts Owed to U.S.**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—President Eisenhower said yesterday most of America's World War II allies are making scheduled payments on their multibillion dollar lend-lease accounts.

Settlement agreements remain to be made, however, with Soviet Russia, China, Saudi Arabia, and Greece for lend-lease aid prior to the surrender of Japan.

Agreements with other countries provide for eventual payment of \$1,075,510,255 plus interest. As of Dec. 31, 1957, payments and credits on principal amounted to \$445,248,613.

Interest remittances totaled \$103,281,065. Grand total payments thus amounted to \$548,539,678.

Among the larger European nations, France owes \$250,472,252 of a debt of \$353,000,000, and the United Kingdom still owes \$510,181,672 of its account of \$562,446,211. In Britain's case, various adjustments have been made to meet new economic problems.

Russia's account totaled \$222,494,574. It has paid \$53,768,281 in interest but nothing on principal.

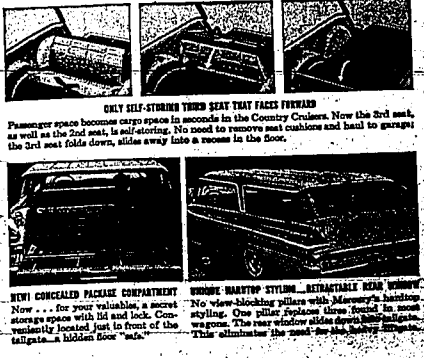

MONMOUTH, N. J., Nov. 25 (AP)—Something even more bothersome than a warm-water well has begun to plague farmer Glimmer Lovdahl and his wife, it's people.

People by the carloads, out for a drive on a fine autumn day, are eager to come and look and feel as he puts it.

The Visitors Counted

Lovdahl counted at least 150 visitors Sunday, he said. His wife counted a dozen cars at one time parked along the gravel road which skirts the house.

The object of the curiosity is a 30-foot well which used to give the Lovdahls plenty of sparkling cold water. But recently it turned tepid, then warm and, finally, downright hot. A reading Friday placed the water's temperature at 110 degrees Fahrenheit.

No one knows why—not even the state water survey chemist—but the well gets warmer as the days grow colder.

Lovdahl told a reporter that he gets lots of free advice and opinion. Mail from Colorado and California suggests he might have uranium or zinc or other minerals on his farm.

It also was suggested that an underground coal vein near the well might be the cause, but then why doesn't another well 40 yards away turn hot, too?

About the heavy traffic to and from the farm, Lovdahl sighed, "It's just a little bit alarming. Makes me kind of nervous."

Mrs. Lovdahl said they toyed with the idea of charging admission.

### Court's Ruling

#### Tries to Keep Peace of Home

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—The supreme court ruled yesterday that a wife, even though she is willing, may not testify against her husband in a criminal case in federal court.

Justice Black, noting that the act in 1932 wiped out the rule forbidding testimony of one spouse in behalf of the other, commented that "we are not prepared to say the same about the rule barring testimony of one spouse against the other."

**Public Is Back of Rule**

"The basic reason the law has refused to pit wife against husband or husband against wife... was a belief that such a policy is necessary to foster family peace, not only for the benefit of husband, wife and children, but for the benefit of the public as well."

The court's eight other justices voted with Black in striking down the white slavery (Kidd) act provision of James H. Hawkins, a dance hall operator of Despatch, Okla.

**Man Convicted**

Hawkins was convicted in federal court at Tulsa of transporting a 17-year-old girl from Arkansas to Oklahoma for immoral purposes.

Over defense objections, Hawkins' wife, known as Jean White, testified for the prosecution. He received a five-year sentence. Presumably the government can bring Hawkins to trial again on the same charge, but without his wife as a witness.

### Civil Action Filed In Auto Accident

A civil action was filed Monday in Twin Falls probate court seeking \$253.45 in damages for a 1936 Chrysler, owned by Donald Solt, which was involved in an accident with a 1939 Buick owned and driven by Guy Wilbourn.

The suit is filed jointly against the Wilbourns. The accident is claimed to have occurred on the highway east of Twin Falls. Solt claims David Wilbourn was driving in a negligent and careless manner causing damage to the Solt vehicle.

Solt is represented by Murphy and Schwartz, Twin Falls law firm.

### Time Is Asked on Hearing Decision

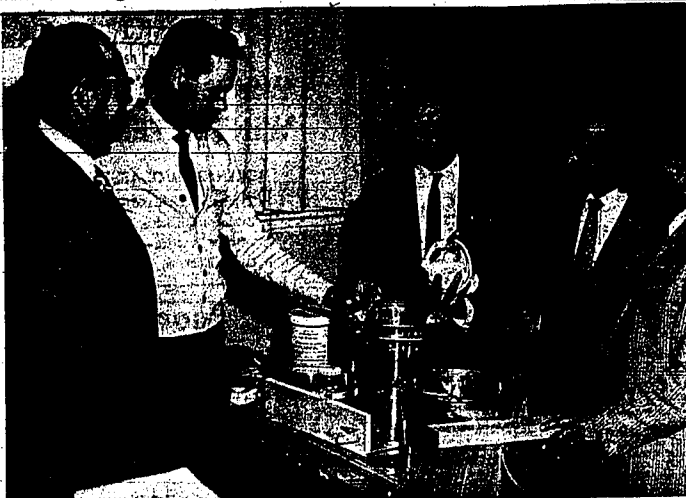

The fate of democracy is occupying a large part of the attention of the world's political philosophers as well as of Western diplomats these days.

There has been a rise of military governments recently in a number of newly independent countries. Despite the moderate actions of Charles de Gaulle, there is still much worry about the future of France.

British and American publications are full of explanations as to the reasons—economic pressures, lack of administrative experience, political immaturity and the like.

India, Pakistan, Burma, Sudan, Egypt, Iran and Thailand are among those falling under military dictatorship in the last few years, and the military is on the ascendant in Indonesia. The pendulum always swings in Latin America.

Yet much of the mourning following the setbacks of these countries still are in their periods following feudal or colonial patterns can yet be considered definite, if Latin America has been unable to establish permanent democratic systems in all its years of independence, shall we cry or rejoice that definite progress has been made?

The African and Asian nations are being born in a far more trying period, and have had far less time.

Also, to strike a balance, it can be argued that democracy has won an overwhelming victory since World War II.

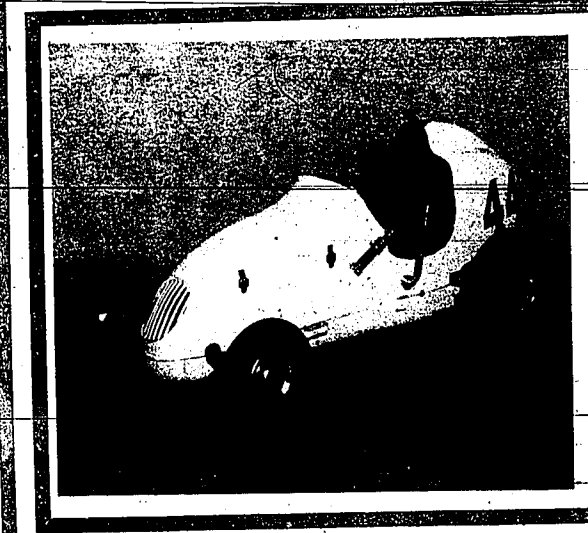
