### Crowded? It Will Get Worse; Today's Best Crop Is Babies

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (AP)—The World's greatest crop right now seems to be babies.

Things get humming along 100 years from now six billion for more people will be milling about in a worldwide traffic jam. Already there are 2,737,000,000 of us, and we're increasing at the rate of 47 million annually. Each year more babies are born than the entire population of France.

Naturally, thinking of crowded 2000 brings up a question: Will there be enough to eat?

The Smithsonian Institution replied to this question yesterday, and it was not a surprising qualification. "The answer is yes," G. Y. Jishi said in an annual report put out by the Smithsonian, "provided most of the six billion persons live in towns and produce enough wealth to pay for the food they need."

"If they offer enough money for their food, the food will be produced," Jishi, one of Europe's leading soil experts, is the director of Britain's chief center for agricultural research.

He contends that not until man moves into town, and starts to produce it, is worthwhile for the farmer to begin proper conservation practices.

"The countries showing the highest average soil fertility," he says, "are the most densely populated and highly industrialized—Britain, Germany, Holland, Belgium, Japan, and agriculture Denmark, the exception that proves the rule."

Well, man long has worried about future population.

In 1789, Thomas Robert Malthus wrote "An Essay on the Principle of Population as it Affects the Future Improvement of Society."

Malthus took the gloomy view that population, if unchecked, tends to increase much faster than the food supply.

### Hearing Tests Conducted at Carey School

CAREY, Nov. 25—Two hundred and sixty-one Carey students were given hearing tests by Kenneth Cook, graduate student of Idaho State college, assisted by Mrs. Everett Cook, county health nurse.

The audiometer is used extensively in the speech and hearing clinic at ISU, where Cook is doing special research work. In the testing program of the Carey school, both grade school and high school students were tested. Results of the test will be given during a special faculty meeting.

Each student was given an individual screening test on 10 of the major sound frequencies. This included very low sounds going up to those heard on hi-fi recording.

Audiograms were made tracing the hearing ability of each ear for those students who had frequent colds during the screening test. Parents of these children were consulted and Cook interpreted the results.

The tests were given free of charge, with the approval of Superintendent Dempsey and Principal Vernon Exner. Prior to the actual testing, lessons which had been prepared by Cook concerning the ear and how it works were given by the various teachers.

Recording clerks were Judith Pratt and Olan Exner.

### Burley Group Hears Report Of River Plan

BURLEY, Nov. 26—The Chamber of Commerce heard a report from the state chamber at the regular membership meeting Monday morning on the proposed Columbia river dam and power project.

The report claims the proposal would give sweeping authority to a five-man board that would directly control all power and water projects in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington.

Hearings on the legislation are to be held in Portland, Dec. 8; Seattle, Dec. 15; Coeur d'Alene, Dec. 16 and Boise, Dec. 17. It is hoped that the state chamber will be able to attend.

There would be no guarantee that any one of the five men would be from Idaho and Idaho residents will have no voice in the selection of the corporation's board of directors, it was pointed out.

The state chamber report further states that the corporation would operate the scheduled operation of all federal power generation in Idaho without any safeguard for the state. It could direct the production of federal power-producing agencies for federal power-producing agencies in Idaho.

In construction, involving power, Idaho could be strapped without approval from the corporation, and also set power rates on federal plants in the state, the chamber report stresses.

### Indians, Eskimos, Aleuts Give Wild Alaska Much of Its Lore

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Nov. 25 (UPI)—Alaska's 34,000 natives—Indians, Eskimos and Aleuts (pronounced all-ee-oo)—comprise only about one-sixth of the vast territory's total population of 220,000 but their epic legends—many of them of the world's oldest—have made them the backbone of the state's lore.

It is the Indians who carve the mammoth Alaskan totem poles and hunt wild game in the interior. The Eskimos and the Aleuts are the intrepid hunters of seal, walrus and great strength and courage.

They have been citizens of the United States since 1924. The three racial strains were dubbed natives because all were in Alaska when the United States bought it from Russia in 1867.

Latest figures indicate there are about 16,000 Eskimos, 14,000 Indians and 4,000 Aleuts. The Alaskan natives are not wards of the government, have no tribal organizations and do not live on reservations.

They reside in scattered villages along Alaska's 25,000-mile coastline and along its big rivers.

The legal voting age is 19 and the literacy test is about on the fourth grade level.

Boundaries of the giant territory extend across four time zones and into the next day on the eastern side of the international dateline at Shemya.

However, the residents of Shemya have put a bubble in the dateline to at least keep all of Alaska in the same day.

All three native groups are descended from primitive people who originally migrated to the new world from Asia by way of the Bering strait. Many of the Indians are descendants of groups that settled in the last two centuries.

The Aleuts live on Alaska's southern coast and in the Aleutian Islands. Their language is remotely related to Eskimo. They are skillful seal hunters. Others are fishermen, boat operators or work in commerce and on fox farms.

The Eskimos, smaller and more oriental looking than the Aleuts, inhabit the western and northern coasts of Alaska. They have unusual strength and endurance.

They are sea and land hunters and fur trappers but often show marked mechanical ability. Like the Aleuts they originally lived in uncovered, partly underground homes but many of their villages now have frame houses.

The Indians live generally in southeastern Alaska or along the Yukon and other large interior rivers. The Eskimos and Aleuts built Alaska's famous totem poles—record monuments in the lives of their families.

Terry Sawchuk of Detroit has the best record among the goalies. He has yielded an average of 2.30 goals a game.

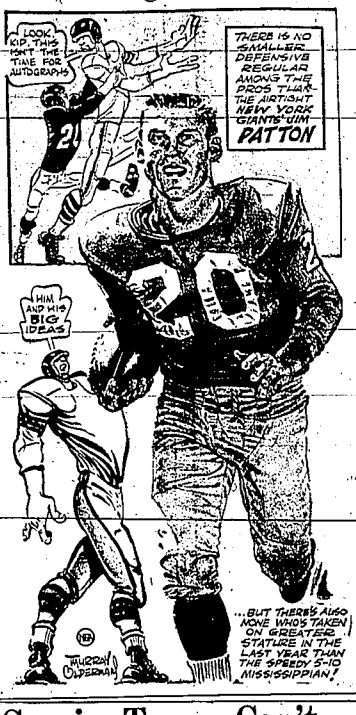

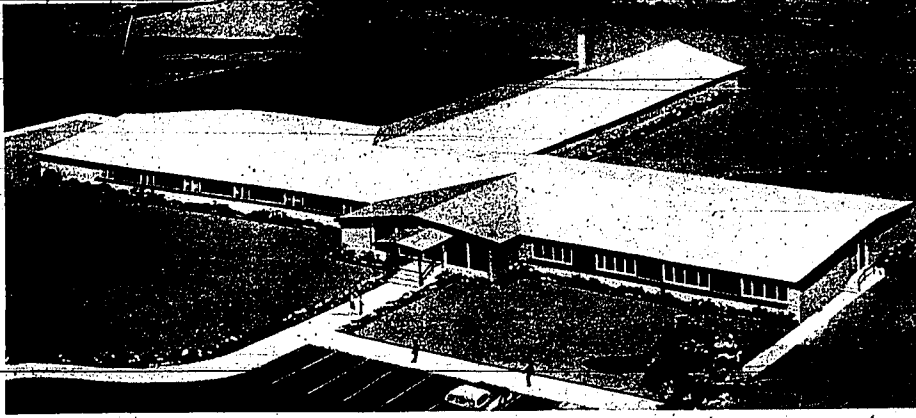

### Commerce Group Reports U.S. Business Recovery Continues

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (AP)—The commerce department said yesterday the business recovery is being sustained. Production, employment and income continue strong, it reported.

The department said rising demand is being reflected in an expansion of new orders booked by businessmen. It also noted the economic upturn in recent months has been accompanied by relative price stability. The report illustrates the recovery pattern, the department's monthly survey of current business-related production rates for 18 different products. Plants producing all but three of these are operating at a high percentage of capacity than last spring. The report noted that capacities have been raised in the meantime. Copper, retining, wood pulp production and cotton spindle activity have returned to the production levels of September, 1937, the report said.

The only production drop shown was for sulphuric acid, down to 73 per cent of capacity from 76 per cent in April. Production of aluminum and men's suits remained at April levels. The department said consumer demand has drawn strong support from a continued large flow of personal income, which in October was at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$27 1/2 billion dollars, that was down 300 million dollars from the record September rate, reflecting work stoppages in several durable goods industries. Most merchants, except auto dealers, reported their sales exceeded levels of September and October last year. The report said total output in the early part of the fourth quarter has shown some advance from the third-quarter level. The department announced last week that output—goods and services—produced increased to an annual rate of 439 billion dollars in the third quarter, record August and September figures for the total value of new construction put in place were nearly equalled by the October record, the survey said.

### Enough Bombs, Scientists Decide

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (AP)—There are now enough nuclear bombs stockpiled to destroy the entire human race, the Council of the Federation of American Scientists reported Monday. It added that there is not, and probably never will be, any defense against massive atomic attack.

Therefore the council urged the United States to agree to a permanent cessation of atomic weapons tests in the current negotiations with Russia at Geneva. The agreement, the scientific group said in a statement, should be subject only to the condition that a test detection system be put into operation within an agreed period.

### Q Fever Discussed

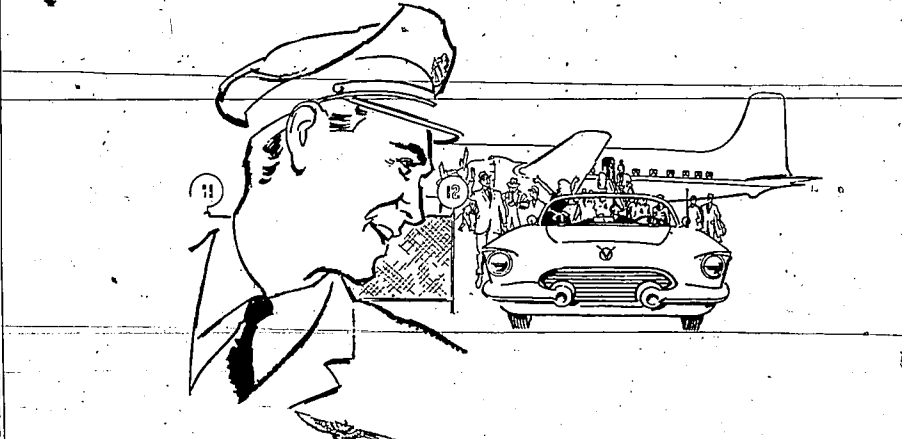
