Average Total Property Tax Levy Is Higher

BOISE, Nov. 27—This year's average total property tax levy in 68 cities and school districts was 10.54 percent, up from 10.35 percent over that of last year and was more than 35 per cent higher than 1935. That was the report yesterday from the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho. Executive Manager Miss Yost said the figures were based on a study of tax levies throughout the state. The average is \$10.54 for all purposes. The 68 cities including city, school district and assessed value, was \$10.54 per \$100 of assessed value. That was up 80 cents from the 1957 average of about \$2.80 more than in 1947. Twenty of the 68 cities showed tax reductions from 1957. Yost said but the rest showed increases. The rate in 45 cities was more than 10 percent higher than in 1957. There were only 20 cities with levies of more than 10 percent.

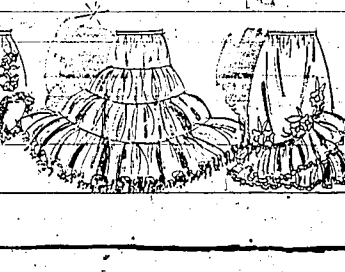

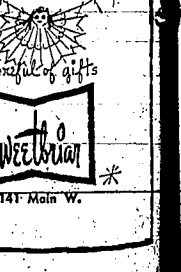

WHEN ANY MORE DELAY? When congress meets in January, not all the decisions will be in the traditional combat zones of defense, foreign aid, and assistance to various part of our domestic economy.

One controversial issue due to be highlighted in new hearings by the house interstate and foreign commerce committee is the question of pay television.

The federal communications commission already has recommended that three cities with four or more TV channels be selected as a testing ground for pay TV over a three-year period.

To the FCC's view, this setup would assure a fair test without interfering with standard network television programming.

Congress, inevitably, feeling the pressures from many sources as the controversy has gone on, has asked the FCC to delay its decision until after the hearings promised for the 1959 congressional session.

Pay TV's adversaries declare it is a plan to compel the American viewing public to pay for all its television entertainment. Some think it would curtail the "freedom of the airwaves."

The networks and motion picture theater operators are among the chief opponents.

Proponents argue in response that pay television might be the last pay TV network. It is no secret the industry has been in difficulties as program costs have mounted and TV audiences have turned away from one kind after another of the standard commercial TV entertainment.

Some TV critics, including TV columnists and critics, noting what they regard as a downward trend in the level of TV shows, are calling for improvement. At least one thinks pay TV deserves its innings.

Looking at the matter from the viewpoint of the American public, it is hard to see why congress in the end should not be receptive to the idea of letting the FCC's recommendations be carried out.

The arguments pro and con are unlikely to be settled without some sort of fair test, and that in fact is all that is being called for at this time. Pay TV, like any other proposal which finds its way to the forefront, deserves to be weighed on its merits. One way we now proceed to find out what they are?

UPHILL PULL. If the sound of train whistles seems more mournful than ever, you can be sure a good part of it echoes the anguish of railroad management over the steady decline in passenger traffic.

The airplane has lured away the long-haul passengers. The rise in the price of gas has lured away the family automobile.

Now comes a new report by the U. S. bureau of roads which shows that 68 per cent of all American breadwinners are expected to meet to work every day. As has been suspected all along, the vanishing railroad commuter is hitting the highway.

It's small wonder that railroads keep asking for boosts in fares to take up the slack. At least some of the extra charges on passenger trains will go the way of the stage-coach within the next couple of decades.

We find it hard to believe that either the higher fares or the voice of doom are on the right track. It seems more likely that the community to step in and give the railroads a helping hand.

The argument in favor of the charmer is that he can attract large numbers of independent voters, and even support from the opposite party. If such a magnetic personality is to be elected, the pugilist's ability, there is potent argument for his selection to lead the ticket.

AMERICAN VOTERS DISTURBED POLITICS IN GENERAL - The idea of loosely defined political philosophy of millions of American voters. They distrust politics in general and are not too close to their own party. They need these voters' projections of their political air.

The students are encouraged to take an active part in the workings of the party of their choice. They are advised to get a job in the party office if they are to be of any use to the party.

There is, perhaps, of the trend was the cancellation of this year's annual Democratic and Republican days of the legislature. Lack of funds and a "slow" political party are the reasons.

The Institute of Practical Politics is nationally known. It received warm support from Dr. Arthur Schlesinger, Jr. and a number of other well-known figures, when he was president of Ohio Wesleyan.

INSTITUTE THEORY IS LAUDATORY - The theory behind the institute is laudatory. But one cannot help but wonder if it is a good idea to have a school for young people like the workings of practical politics when the door of high offices in the face of party workers is so narrow.

There is something dubious in a situation that indicates that party work of a lower level is commendable but that the association with party machinery is reprehensible when seeking high office.

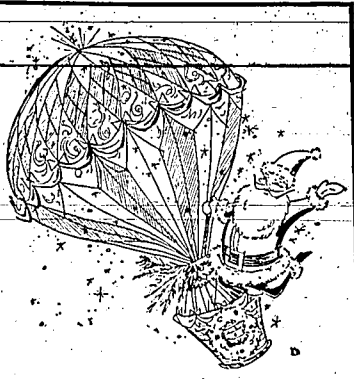

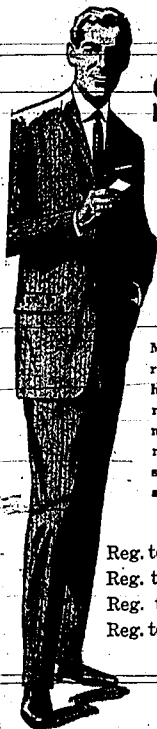

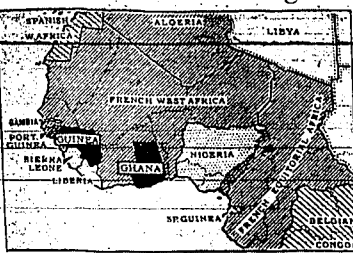

States Are Federating

Africa Union Makes British Ponder Plans

LONDON, Nov. 27 (UPI)—British diplomats are considering whether the projected Guinea-Ghana merger means the commonwealth has gained a Guinea or lost a Ghana.

The joint announcement in which the two nations said they planned to join forces to form the "nucleus of a Union of West African States" made no mention of Ghana's membership in the commonwealth.

British experts said the situation was unprecedented in commonwealth history and raised problems that could be solved only by agreement among all the commonwealth nations.

They wondered whether Ghana's Premier Kwame Nkrumah wanted to leave the commonwealth or planned to bring Guinea in as a new partner.

The joint statement by Nkrumah and Guinea Premier Sekou Toure said the merger was "inspired by the example of the 13 American colonies."

Survivors of Veterans Are Given Advice

Survivors of deceased veterans are offered four suggestions to assist them in filing claims for veterans administration compensation or pension.

Processing of claims will be expedited if the survivors follow the suggestions, says Arnold Helweg, veterans administration representative here.

If the veteran's death certificate does not contain a statement as to cause of death, it should be accompanied by a certificate from the attending physician, showing dates of treatment and cause of death.

A widow filing a claim should furnish the record of her marriage to the veteran. If she or the veteran were married previously she should, if possible, furnish copies of death or divorce certificates to establish that previous marriages were dissolved.

If minor children are among the survivors, birth or baptismal records should be furnished, containing the names of both parents and date of birth. In the case of adopted children, a copy of the court order should be provided.

Dependent persons filing a claim must establish their relationship to the veteran by furnishing VA a certified copy of the veteran's birth or baptismal certificates containing the names of both parents.

Detailed information about compensation and pension claims is available at the VA office in Twin Falls.

Sugar Factory Report Given For Earnings

CODEN, Nov. 27.—The Amalgamated Sugar Company's net income for the fiscal year ending last Sept. 30 was \$1,400,813 after taxes and depreciation, according to H. A. Benning, president of the company. Common stock will receive \$4.21 per share, compared to \$4.24 per share for the preceding year. Dividends of 60 cents per share on preferred stock and \$2 per share on common stock were paid during the year. The total payments amounting to \$1,631,000.

In a letter to stockholders Benning said federal and state taxes amounted to \$3,822,000, equivalent to \$1.58 per share of common stock. The company's sugar production last year was 5,477,289 bags (100 pound basis), compared with the preceding year's figure of 4,927,225. Capital expenditures of \$1,422,989 were made during the year. Major improvements included an electrical air purifying system to dry sugar at the Lewiston and Puna factories, and at the latter additional sugar crystallizing machinery and equipment to reduce steam pollution from factory waste water.

More crystallizing and sugar coating capacity was added at Twin Falls and a new dried pulp pelleting station and gas compressor was installed at Nampa. At the Twin Falls factory a second time kiln and other machinery designed to increase the capacity of molasses processing for further sugar extraction, and equipment increasing the prelin equipment of dried beet pulp, were added.

Supplementing these improvements at the factories, equipment was installed at Nampa and Twin Falls to facilitate the loading of bulk sugar into rail cars. A sixth bulk sugar truck to service the Northwest market was purchased and the two liquid sugar depots established in the Midwest. Beet receiving capacities were increased in the Idaho and Oregon districts.

In commenting on the present year's prospects Benning said "the prospective record yield per acre indicates total tons of beets purchased by the company will exceed the tonnage of a year ago and should result in a total sugar production for the company well above that of last year."

"Factories are operating satisfactorily and are reflecting in their performance, the results of the improvement programs of this and the previous years," Benning stated. "The figures for individual factories and all factories as a unit have been attained. On many days during the current operating campaign, production in excess of 80,000 bags has been attained, a figure heretofore never reached.

"Dried pulp usage appears to have improved over that of a year ago. This is the result not only of an increase in the number of livestock being fed, but of a broader acceptance of dried pulp in the company's marketing areas. The increased pelleting of dried pulp also appears to have contributed to its improved acceptance among feeders," he added.

Arkansas Vote Called Victory Of Prejudice

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Vice President Nixon says Rep. Brooks Hays, D. Ark., defeated by a strong segregationist, was a "victim of demagoguery and prejudice."

Nixon expressed his regret in a letter to Hays, saying, "I can say without qualification that there was no more tragic result of this last election, from the standpoint of the nation, than your defeat in Arkansas."

Hays, who says he is a moderate on the segregation issue, was beaten for reelection Nov. 4 by Earl Dale Alford, an avowed strong foe of the supreme court's decision against school segregation. Alford ran a write-in candidate in winning the Little Rock district Hays has represented for 16 years.

The vice president said in part that the segregation issue, of the type you represent in such an exemplary way, becomes the victim of demagoguery and prejudice. It is time for men of good will in both of our major parties in all sections of the country to exert more positive leadership in developing the public

Dedication Set For Atomic Energy

IDAHO FALLS, Nov. 27.—The atomic energy commission will dedicate its Argonne Low Power Reactor Dec. 2 at the AEC's eastern district office.

The date was announced by the Argonne National Laboratory. It will mark the 18th anniversary of the birth of atomic energy, and newsmen and AEC officials attending will be taken on a tour of other test site reactors.

Mansfield Has Forecast For Curb For Filibuster

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (UPI)—Assistant senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., has forecast that the senate will reach a compromise over proposals for curbing filibuster.

Mansfield predicted that the senate would hammer out an agreement after two or three weeks of debate at the beginning of the new session in January. He said it

would differ from the "extreme views on both sides."

A group of liberal Republican and Democratic senators has served notice it will try to modify the chamber's rules to permit a majority of senators to cut off a talker after 10 days.

This proposal is violently opposed by southern Democrats who have served notice they will fight any change in the current rule which requires the vote of 64 senators—two-thirds of all the lawmakers—to end a debate.

Senate Democratic Leader Johnson, Tex., has proposed a compromise which would give a vote of two-thirds of the senate present and voting to limit a filibuster.




Conservative Would Share GOP Offices

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—Sen. John J. Williams, Delaware, a Republican conservative, has said he would like to see the party's offices divided to share in leadership of the sharply reduced GOP contingent in the Senate.

Williams was one of the few Republican conservatives who breathed the election's life into the new Democratic senators into office.

Rep. Fair Representation "I think everybody is going to be represented in the leadership," he said in an interview.

"We will pick men of quality and soundness who can help us get a solid, unified party ready for the job that is to be done."

Williams spoke out after Sen. John Sherman Cooper, R., Ky., served notice in a statement he intends to demand "more vigorous representation of the progressive view of our party."

Cooper's statement was interpreted as indicating he is receptive to a proposal by Sen. Everett Dirksen, R., Conn., that Cooper be given one of the GOP leadership posts when the new congress convenes in January.

Spill May Develop This pointed to the possibility of a split among the Republican liberals beyond their own ranks, as they are understood to be committed to Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel, California, as their representative in the Senate.

The GOP liberals in the Senate are still outmaneuvered by their more conservative Republican colleagues. Thus they are unlikely to challenge the election of Sen. Everett Dirksen, Illinois, from whip to floor leader. Dirksen would succeed Sen. William F. Knowland, who retired to run for governor of California and lost.

Second Post Bought If Dirksen gets the top post, the liberals would only be in command in a new job of assistant leader which may be established.

Some of the conservatives would like to keep these two places within their own ranks and give the third position to the liberals.

Whether the liberals are to be such an arrangement, however, seems to depend partly on the kind of committee assignments they receive. There is keen competition for seats on the more important committees.

PORTLAND, Nov. 27 (AP)—An Oregon senator says there is still a chance that a federal dam can be built in the Hells canyon area of the Snake river.

Democrat Wayne Morse told the National Hells-Canyon association here that if a sound plan is developed, four canyons—Ara, Heller, Hells and Snake—can be dammed.

Idaho Power company has a federal power commission license to build three dams in the canyon area. Two are being built.

Morse said that the three-dam costs must be determined to compare with those of the construction and public condemnation costs of a high federal dam.

He told his audience that if the federal dam benefits ratio is favorable, then efforts to get it authorized be renewed.

The senator said the single government dam is superior to the three-dam plan in storage, flood control and downstream power.
