California Fire Destroys 25 Homes; Oregon Blaze Ruins Half of City Block

BAKER, Ore., Dec. 3 (UPI)—Fire wiped out half a downtown block on Main street here last night and heavily damaged other businesses on the block before being controlled about 10:25 p.m.

MALIBU BEACH, Calif., Dec. 3 (AP)—A wind-lashed brush fire raced overnight through miles of mountains behind this resort community and burned to the edge of the famed film colony. More than 15,000 acres have been charred, an estimated 26 homes destroyed and hundreds of families routed.

At dawn, 1,500 men were on fire lines 30 miles long. The blaze was virtually a repeat performance of the disastrous fire in the same area two years ago, starting Dec. 26, 1956. It burned over 4,000 acres, killed 47,000, and 99 homes.

The new fire started west of the old one and last night had burned over some of the same ground, which now is covered with tinder-dry grasses and a forest of 60-million-hour winds.

The flames, which burst out of control around noon yesterday, have cut on eight-mile-wide swath of destruction over the Santa Monica mountains to the west.

At the fire's eastern edge, flames came within a quarter of a mile of the film colony, a strip of homes along the shore of the Pacific. A house owned by a prominent actor was threatened. The flames along the Pacific highway and the threat to the community were averted.

Branches owned by Bob Hope and Ronald Reagan were swept over by the flames. A house owned by a Hollywood actor was threatened. It housed a library stocked with valuable collection of historical and literary books.

Atora Jackie Coogan and William B. Coker, who own the Hollywood homes during the fire, were sprayed then with hoses when the flames were within 100 feet of their property.

The outlook for today was as bad as could be—continuous winds, extremely low humidity and a predicted high temperature of 83.

Firemen raced from house to house along the Pacific highway, spraying them with hoses when the flames were within 100 feet of their property.

The fire spread like lightning as the wind whipped the flames. The pattern of growth was explosive, unpredictable.

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High Blaze Toll Said Due to Open Doorway

CHICAGO, Dec. 3 (UPI)—Fire experts speculated today that an open doorway at the head of a stairs turned the second floor of Our Lady of the Angels school into a furnace of death for 87 children and three Roman Catholic nuns.

But they disagreed as to whether doors actually hung in the doorway Monday when flames poured up and a youngster's carelessly tossed cigarette, shot up the stairwell from the school basement and pushed suffocating hot gases through six classrooms.

Investigators of the National Fire Protection association said they found that there were two heavy wooden doors at the head of the stairs and that they had been wedged or locked open.

But Deputy Fire Commissioner Albert H. Peterson said city fire investigators found no indication that there was a door at the landing.

He said: "If there was a wooden door we would have found evidence of it such as hinges—and had there been a closed door it assumes a fire would have remained."

Peterson agreed with the association investigators that the fire had been closed off, the fire toll might have been considerably less.

Percy Bugbee, general manager of the association, said "a simple lesson could be learned from the major cause of the heavy loss of life—simple precaution of keeping these second floor landing doors closed would have kept the intense fire from spreading out for many precious minutes."

Bugbee said in Boston, "in all likelihood every classroom could have been emptied in time."

California State Fire Marshal Joseph J. Starnes said that the fire in the school was a "textbook case" of a fire that could have been prevented.

Proposed bills in the new congress include: An immediate 20 per cent boost in social security payments to four billion dollars a year; a federal grant to build schools and raise teachers' salaries, and a \$100 million federal grant to attack decay in cities.

At the same time, the organization said the country must have a defense program to meet the needs of underdeveloped nations on an expanded basis.

Goals Said Feasible

All these goals can be met, ADYA contended, without causing inflation. In a memorandum to the House, ADYA's national chairman, Robert Nathan, said the 1958 election "will have a new deal for the 1950's."

"The President," Nathan said, "is not to be held responsible for the economic depression that has been caused by the failure to get on with the program for the solution."

ADYA took issue with the fact that the economy with full employment will yield a surplus of five billion dollars more than the year before. Nathan said the ADA program would call for eight or ten billion dollars a year in extra funds.

Armed Service Reports About Idle Buildings

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—Congress received reports from the armed services yesterday that they own idle industrial plants that would cost several billion dollars to replace.

The annual bill to keep the army, navy and air force plants in stand-by or caretaker status was given as \$30,425,000.

Policy Said Not Wasteful

But spokesmen for the army insisted the policy of keeping the plants available for emergency use is not wasteful. Brig. Gen. Jean E. Engler, army procurement director, said that the army alone would cost more than \$3 billion dollars to replace today.

The army spokesmen were the first to appear for questioning before the house armed services investigations subcommittee, which is looking into military plant management.

Not All Agree

Not all testimony agreed exactly on the value of the idle plants held by the three services. The reports filed by them added up to \$1,740,100,775, mainly on the basis of the original cost of 63 plants now listed as idle.

Some subcommittee members have indicated they favor requiring "the services, before any funds for new industrial facilities for advanced weapons are approved, to show that facilities now on hand could not be adapted for the purpose."

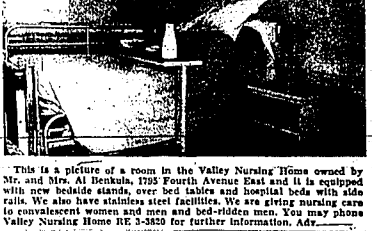

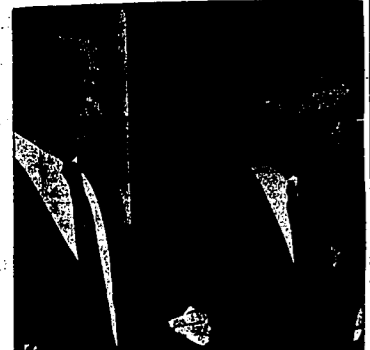

Alert Error Hints That Most Citizens Don't Heed Warning

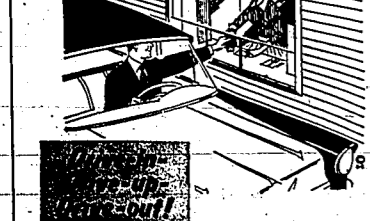

Election Wins In France Are Cause of Fear

Fears for the future of democracy in France are now being more widely expressed than ever because of the number of rightists elected to parliament after bundling themselves in Charles de Gaulle's coalition.

The leader himself, whose election to the presidency is expected to be little more than a formality, is depicted as embarrassed.

His re-arranging of election districts and voting regulations designed to wipe out the communists, but also wiped out many moderate and Socialist who among the political leaders of France.

Jacques Soustelle, propelled into the leading role in parliament through his leadership of a wide variety of rightist elements who voluntarily grouped themselves around him and tried to assume the aura of De Gaulle, was known during the Fourth Republic as a stretcher of parliament.

Many Are Extremists

Soustelle himself is not rightist while no one is expected to offer a frontal challenge to De Gaulle; many of those who wrapped themselves in the Soustelle-De Gaulle banner are extremists.

In particular, many of them stand for imposition of complete information on Algeria as against De Gaulle's own desire to devise a workable association.

Thus the situation here is itself divided, a stability which has become a commonplace in French politics. The question is how much this will affect the stability toward which De Gaulle is directing his efforts. The rightist bloc can hardly be called a party, and any program it may have is yet to develop.

Freedom Loss Feared

Some are expressing the fear that it will be capable of interfering with civil liberties—especially strikes—and with freedom of the press in the name of stability. If a sufficient coalition arises.

De Gaulle, of course, will have the power no other president has had of dissolving parliament under the threat of dissolution. If he did not already have it under the new constitution, his popularity would give it to him.

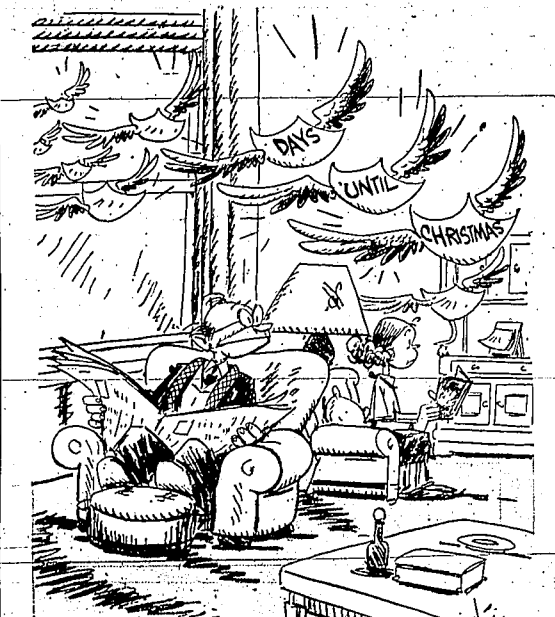
But there is wonderment as to how many of the new rightist deputies, having proclaimed their loyalty to De Gaulle in order to be elected, will now live up to it.

There also is wonderment as to the undercover pressures which may be built up by the fact that a fifth of the nation's voters—some communists and the rest protest voters who choose the communist ticket as their means of expression—will have only one fifty-fourth of the seats in parliament.

Adlai Says No To Talk He Is '60 Candidate

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (UPI)—Adlai Stevenson says "I am not and I will not be a candidate for a third presidential nomination in 1960."

Stevenson's latest views were expressed in a letter to this newspaper who had inquired as to his reaction to this talk.

"As for 1960, my position is what it has always been and that is that I am not and will not be a candidate," Stevenson wrote.

He did not say, however, what he would do if the nomination was again offered to him.

On June 16, prior to his visit to the Soviet Union, Stevenson told newsmen in London who had asked him thinking about 1960 "I have not been, I am not, and I will not be nominated as Democratic presidential candidate."

Some political experts, however, believe his chances have been strengthened by the results of the New York election in which many liberal-type Democratic candidates won senate and house seats to swell the party's control of both branches of congress.

They reason that Stevenson would be more acceptable to the South than some possible candidates with more extreme views on such matters as integration and the role of the federal government in domestic affairs.

Spry Solon Plans Ranching, Book
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (UPI)—Spry Solon Burdick, R., N.D., a bridegroom at 79, disclosed yesterday he will devote his retirement to ranching, riding and writing a book about the old West.

"I'll be doing a little political thing, but the big, crazy matter is adjusting his hat as he sat behind his desk. "I don't plan to run myself but I know lots of people who do."

Burdick said he planned to put the finishing touches on a book he has been writing for 30 years about cattle ranching on the western range.

The book will be jammed mostly with interviews between Burdick and old timers who recall the old West when the old West was really the old West. An aide described the press as ranging from "hooney to gamey."

Atomic Plane Of U. S. to Be Regular Size

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (UP)—The first U. S. atomic aircraft is expected to be no bigger than the B32 jet bomber.

That bit of information about the super-secret program to develop a nuclear powered airplane came yesterday when air force installation specialist John M. Ferry testified before the house armed services investigations subcommittee.

The investigators are looking into use of materials for runways. Chairman F. Edward Heber, D., La., asked Ferry, a special assistant to the air force secretary, whether the atomic plane would cause unforeseen problems because of its weight.

Ferry replied the plane is not far enough along to fix its weight positively, but that under present plans it would be no heavier than the B32.

That Boeing-made big bomber has a wing span of 185 feet, is 150 1/2 feet long and 46 1/2 feet high and weighs over 30,000 pounds.

The magazine Aviation Week said Sunday the Soviet Union has been flying an aircraft with atomic engines for the last two months. It was described as longer than a B32 but with a smaller wing spread.

U. S. Party's Leaders Differ On Loss Cause

NEW YORK, Dec. 3 (UP)—The chairman of the Republican and Democratic national committees today gave the nation's business leaders their explanations of the Democratic sweep in the Nov. 4 elections. Needless to say, they disagreed.

GOP National Chairman Meade Alexander said the party's poor showing on a combination of factors, mainly on the downturn in employment and general business activity. He contended the Republicans still have the "better product to sell," but "we lack the sales force."

Butler Blaines Leadership, His Democratic counterpart, Paul M. Butler, said the Nov. 4 results were a "ringing repudiation of the Eisenhower administration and its failure to provide an aggressive, full-time and forward-looking leadership in the areas of economic growth, employment, cost of living, labor, legislation, education, defense, human rights and foreign policy."

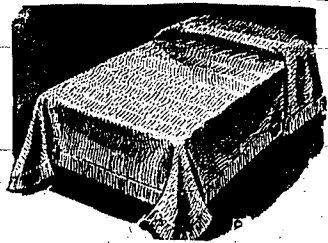

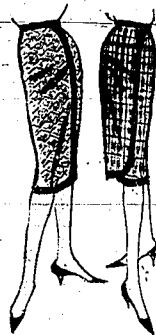

New Records Expected for Holiday Mail

Postmaster W. W. Pratts, Twin Falls, believes Christmas mail this year will set another record, exceeding mail handled in the preholiday season of 1957.

The postmaster expressed his thanks for the excellent response to his "mail early" appeal, but warns that only by stepping up all mailing of Christmas packages and greeting cards immediately can this year's record mail load be processed and delivered before Christmas.

"He went on to say, 'It's later than you think! We all have a tendency to wait until mid-December before giving our Christmas mailing plans much attention; whereas, by taking a little extra care with Christmas mailings right now, you'll avoid disappointing friends and loved ones at Christmas time.'

The postmaster asks special cooperation to be sure that your return address and the recipient's address is plainly typed or written on all labels and Christmas cards. Use some extra care and include an extra label inside your packages and to place it on the outside portion of the label on your packages to prevent defacing in transit.

Parcel post size and weight limitations vary according to destination. Be sure to ask them when you go to the postoffice to buy stamps, Pratts adds.

Beginning Dec. 8, service windows at the postoffice will be open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. People can avoid standing in line by mailing packages and buying stamps before 10 a.m. or between 10 and 12:30 a.m. or between 12:30 and 2 p.m. Mail gift packages for distant destinations by Dec. 10 and those for nearby points should be mailed by Dec. 14, Pratts adds.

U.S. Jewelers Expect to Set Sales Records for Christmas

NEW YORK, Dec. 3—The nation's jewelers say they expect to set sales records this Christmas.

The Jewelry Industry council reports today its members anticipate a seven per cent sales increase in holiday business, which would pull the year's total to a new high.

The Thanksgiving-to-Christmas period is all important to the retail jeweler. In this period he normally chalks up 58 per cent of his sales for the year. Any letdown in Christmas spirit by consumers could spell disaster as far as the year's profits go.

But this year Albert E. Hines, president of the council, says most of the nation's 24,000 retail jewelers are solidly optimistic.

Business reasons usually spell trouble for the merchants of decoration and tableware. But the most recent one saw scarcely a hobby.

The low point of the depression, 1933, saw sales slide to 575 million dollars. Since the war they have never fallen below one billion a year, but the postwar low was the recession year of 1940, when they stood at 1 1/2 billion.

The council also has figured sales per capita as the nation's population has grown. In 1929 it was \$4.99; last year it was \$11.00—up of \$6.00.

These points out other factors. One is the growing pre-marriage market. Teen-agers and those in their early 20s have been urged to dress up with jewelry and to try in a store of silverware.

The steady growth in the school population has had two effects. Buying of graduation watches and other gifts helped swell jewelers' profits. And the council holds that the rise of the education level in the country has produced a proportionate rise in the taste level.
