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Just Plain Inattention Causes Most Crashes, Patrolman Says

More accidents are caused by just plain inattention than by any other one factor, including speed, in the opinion of State Police Lt. Earl Hand.

Hand was guest speaker at the Idaho club meeting Wednesday noon. He is now the top state in the nation for traffic fatalities in the year, Hand said. He says that most accidents do not occur when they are speeding and many of them do not even see radar equipment.

"And if they can't see that, they wouldn't see a child or an animal that might dart into the path of the car," Hand added.

A four-mile-an-hour difference in speed means at least eight feet

as lack of or improper signaling. Hand also urged legislators to move specific in drafting traffic laws, so their interpretation is absolutely clear.

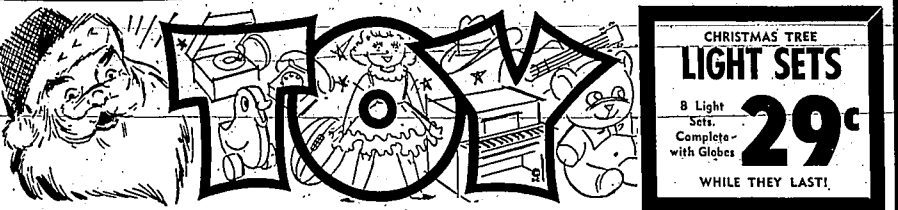

Plans were made Sunday, Monday and Tuesday as part of the U. S. delegation to the inauguration of President Adolfo Lopez Mateos in Mexico City.

Acheson's Washington aide said Mexican police were alerted last night to investigate plans for an anti-Dulles campaign along these lines.

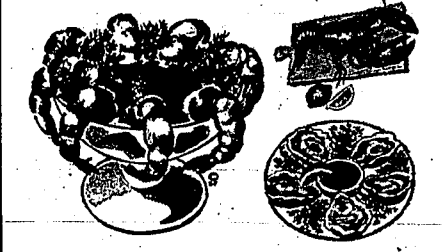

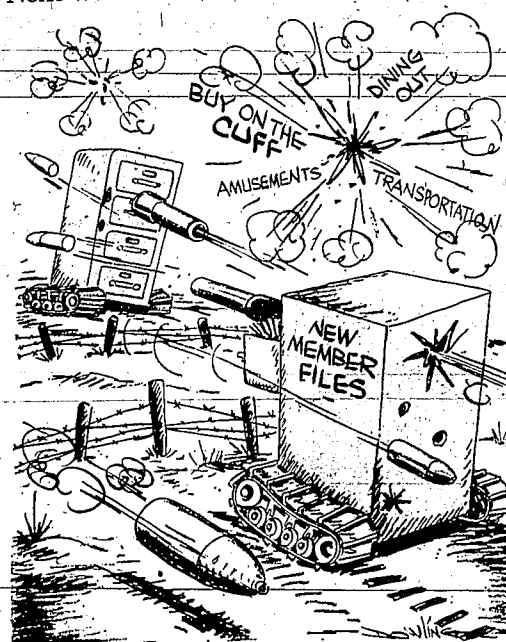
Food Features Include Chuck Roasts, Fryers

Miners' Boost In Pay to Be \$2 Next Year

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—A new coal industry labor contract will give 100,000 miners a two-stage \$2 per day pay boost next year of \$2.50.
 The United Mine Workers, reached agreement on the pact Tuesday with the Bituminous Coal Operators' association, the industry's largest labor bargaining group. It was signed yesterday.
 Details were withheld pending the signing but it was learned the agreement provides for a \$1.20 per day boost for miners Jan. 1 and another 80-cent increase next April 1. The miners' basic wage has been \$22.25 a month, or \$180 to \$200 in annual vacation pay was also provided.

The big news of the industry agreement was that, separate contracts will be signed by owners of commercial mines and captive mines. The captives are mines operated for fuel for steel mills and utility plants. The agreements are to be identical except that the commercial pact will include a new union. The agreement provides that the commercial mines will refuse to buy or handle coal produced by nonunion mines. The captives flatly refused to accept this, fearing possible anti-trust law violation.

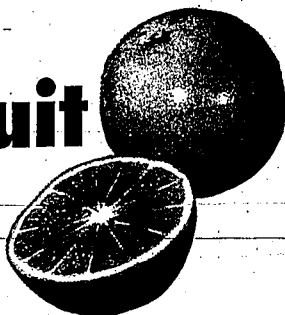

Move Against Child Mishaps Is Paying Off

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Dec. 4.—A health official says he firmly believes that a concerted drive by doctors against the No. 1 killer of children—accidents—is beginning to pay off.

Dr. George W. Wheeler, vice president of the American Life Insurance company, said the accident death rate among children 1 to 14 years old has declined 17 percent in less than a decade.

Biggest Drop Told

The greatest drop was in deaths from burning and poisoning in the 1 to 4 years age group. In these areas, doctors have fought hard for legislation banning the use of inflammable materials in clothing and limiting the amount of poisonous material in paint on articles children might chew.

Dr. Wheeler said education of parents in accident prevention is one of the major tasks ahead.

He spoke yesterday at the annual clinical conference of the American Medical association.

Responsibility Cited

"All physicians who care for children have a tremendous responsibility to alert parents to specific accident hazards at various stages of child growth and development," he told the doctors.

Interest Was Lacking

Dr. Wheeler said child accidents were not regarded as a subject of general interest to the medical profession until barely a decade ago.

Between 1918 and 1926, the latest figures available, the overall accident death rate among children 1 to 14 years old had dropped from 28.4 per 10,000 children to 23.5.

He said, his snowballing into many fields of accident prevention.

Doctors were enlisted in the safety campaign when the American Academy of Pediatricians met at various times on accident prevention in 1920.

European Trade Organization Makes Progress, Faces Issues

Immediately after World War II lines of "Europe's" countries, now west-shot-up nations, launched a movement which has been spreading over the continent in ever-widening circles.

"Belgium," the Netherlands and Luxembourg formed an organization designed to eliminate economic frontiers and substitute cooperation for competition. They wanted their economic relationship to be much the same as those between the states of the American union.

They called the new organization Benelux, and set out for what they knew would be a long haul.

They established a common tariff system toward outsiders, and virtually free trade between themselves.

Early next year two big melons will be cut from what was once a sticky little vine.

The three small nations will become virtually a single economic state. The borders between them will be almost meaningless. Their relations with traditional trade partners such as Britain and the United States.

Britain has fought a determined but losing battle for establishment of a broader free trade area so that she would not be faced by a continent-wide tariff setup. She cannot submit her own economy to the European community because of her preferential tariff obligations to the commonwealth.

There is a danger, especially during the long years of adjustment which are to come, that the European community may take repressive measures to protect itself in crisis. They are now trying to compromise their position with Britain and other countries.

The United States has balanced these and other dangers against the need for a unified Europe and proffered constant cooperation in international citizenship cards to workers in that field.

It also operates joint schools for the children of members of its staff. An important term in the growth of internationalism.

Business and industry are setting the pace, but the more intricate problems of internationalized agricultural practice are already being attacked.

Pilot Study Reveals Facts on Drivers; More Tests Expected

NEW YORK, Dec. 4. (UPI)—According to a "pilot" study, the automobile driver who doesn't have accidents is a more self-reliant and independent than the driver who does.

He is better natured, more ready to cooperate with other people, and more attentive to them. And he is more generous in his personal relationships and less afraid of criticism.

But the driver who does have accidents "tends to be more stiff, cool, aloof" than the driver who doesn't, and he is "more inhibited with unexpressed feelings of inferiority."

He likes things more than he likes people. He is more rigid in his ways and in his personal standards, and more self-centered and less concerned with the needs and wants of others than the accidentless driver.

The "pilot" study was made by Drs. Gerard G. Neuman and William F. E. Schrank, and James M. Howell, University of Utah, Salt Lake City. They grant readily that their findings may not apply to automobile drivers as a whole.

But that wasn't the idea of their study. The idea was to find out if psychological science was sufficiently advanced to distinguish different characteristics in drivers who had been involved in accidents and drivers who hadn't been.

They felt their "pilot" study had shown that the science was sufficiently advanced. This could be mightily useful, they said in reporting to the American Public Health association, since all authorities agree that the real answer to the highway safety question lies in the drivers of motor vehicles.

Their "pilot" study results call for really large-scale psychological investigations of drivers, they said. If enough are studied by the most advanced psychological and statistical techniques, then you could know in advance which drivers were more likely to have accidents than other drivers.

How this knowledge could be applied, they did not say. That's a matter for law-makers rather than scientists. Conceivably, a driver who tested out badly might find it hard to get a driver's license or liability insurance for his car.

Their "pilot" study went this far: They took 17 Salt Lake City policemen who had had no accidents in eight policemen who had had accidents in that year. All 25 were put through nine psychological tests. The score of the 17 policemen was then averaged and compared.

Needless to say, so many tests look many hours to give. The scientists thought that with the aid of test which would take so long to administer, it would be possible to give such a test to a limited number of drivers.

Russian Close To Moon Shot, Scientist Says

HUNTSVILLE, Ala., Dec. 4 (AP)—The Soviet Union is reported to be close to launching a moon probe, a scientist writes in the magazine Space Journal.

A U. S. Army shot for the moon is expected this week-end.

The Soviet attempt could be a French one — to put a 110-to-220 pound probe into orbit around the moon, taking movies and TV pictures.

Plan outlined
A Soviet scientist was back in February, 1957, outlined just such a plan, calling it "cosmic boomerang."

He says the Russians are particularly interested in seeing whether the moon has earthquakes, why some moon craters seem to glow and disappear, and the meaning of some white clouds which seem to be found in certain areas of the moon.

Bovlet astronomer recently said he had taken photographs of supposed volcanic activity on the moon. The Soviets are pushing ahead in guided missiles, and surely have rockets capable of reaching the moon, Waford notes.

'59 Legislators Agree Overwhelmingly Increase in State Spending Is Necessary

BOISE, Dec. 4 (AP)—Members of the 1959 legislature agree overwhelmingly that they will have to increase state spending.

Eighty per cent of Republicans and 73 per cent of Democrats replying to an Associated Press poll said that state expenditures will have to be boosted.

Only five per cent of Republicans and seven per cent of Democrats said they feel the lawmakers can hold the line without any increase.

A number in both parties, however, indicate they feel the increase should be held as low as possible.

The question was "Do you feel that state expenditures will have to be increased?"

"Possibly," said Sen. J. Ray Cox, D., Kootenai, and Fred M. Cooper, R., Caribou.

"Some," said Sen. Evert Johnston, D., Idaho, and George Blinn, R., Twin Falls.

"Somewhat," said Rep. Sam Kaufman, R., Ada, "Very little," said Rep. Fred Wallen, D., Camas.

Asked what was the most likely source of revenue, most declined to answer but many listed a sales tax by that they will have to increase state spending.

Also listed were increased income taxes, severance taxes of natural resources and elimination of the credit for federal income tax in figuring state income tax.

Rep. William J. Laning, R., Twin Falls, said he favors a sales tax, but added, "I fear it will be an increase in the present iniquitous form of taxation."

Increased power revenues and better economic conditions will bring in some additional money," commented Rep. Robert L. Yost, R., Canyon.

"Nobody speculated on how much the general fund budget will be increased from the \$47,700,000 appropriated two years ago.

The pre-legislative budget committee has recommended \$74,000,000. This is four per cent more than the current budget. It is also 11 per cent less than the minimum amount which state agencies said they needed just to get by.

Any major increase over the budget, the committee will call for more money from the state's share of federal grants and 45 per cent of federal aid. Figures requested for the fiscal year averaged an increase of 400,000 over the current year. The average increase requested by Republicans averaged 125,000.

Twenty-five per cent of those who said they oppose any increase in the \$1,500,000 required by the present school formula. This increase is all the budget committee proposed for.

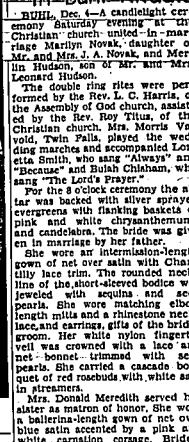

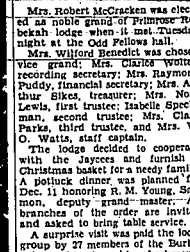

Seals Mailed To Residents Of This Area

Residents of Twin Falls received letters Wednesday containing 1958 tuberculosis seals, marking the opening of the drive to seal all of Christmas seals for this area.

Residents of the east end and west end of the county have already received seals with an earlier drive started by chairman in those areas.

Directed by Mrs. C. J. Slinger, Twin Falls county chairman, who points out that this is the only source of funds to carry out the program for the Twin Falls County Tuberculosis association.

Tuberculosis is still a health problem in Idaho and across the nation, she says. During the first six months of 1958, 43 new cases were reported to the state department of health, six deaths from the disease were reported during the same period.

Mrs. Slinger pointed out that a yearly program of mobile chest X-rays is carried on in Twin Falls county. The X-ray unit is being purchased in cooperation with five other counties in the district.

While the survey is costly, we feel it is invaluable to the community, in that it provides information for early diagnosis of other diseases of the chest in addition to finding tuberculosis. It has served to find early heart disease conditions and lung cancer in our past surveys.

"We also assist in rehabilitation of patients who are well enough to leave the hospital after becoming an inactive case but still not well enough to return to job and community living," Mrs. Slinger said.

Keeping patients free of emotional strain is an important part of their care. When financial problems of the association makes contributions to the occupational therapy department of the state hospital in Coeur d'Alene, since this phase of a patient's care is not included in the budget of the hospital, it is important that it be supported by funds from the tuberculosis association.

Mrs. Slinger emphasized that all of these services are made possible only through the sale of Christmas seals, she points out.
