West to Show More Powers For Congress

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—(AP)—West voters will be in position to exert more political power in the new congress than in recent sessions. Democratic victories in 1958 elections changed a shift in the balance of political power that has been building for years.

They will tighten the Democrats' grip over congress and raise the political over-representation, proportion of western members.

The change probably will be most apparent in the senate where congress with small and large population areas will have next month will have 64 Democrats and 34 Republicans.

Members Listed

Among its members will be two new Democrats from Alaska, Ernest Gruening and E. L. Bartlett; Frank Moss, D. Utah, who succeeded Earl Warren; V. Wadkins, R. Howard Cannon, D. Nev., replacing Sen. George W. Malone, R.; Dan Rostenkowski, D. Ill., who defeated Sen. Dick Barrett, R., and Clair Engle, D. Calif., succeeding Sen. William F. Knowland, R.

Oregon Has Demos

Oregon, represented by two Republicans and a few Democrats, will see Democrats Richard Neuberger and Wayne Mason (to convert) in the senate again next year. Sen. Warren G. Magnuson and Henry M. Jackson, both Democrats, will continue to represent Washington.

Idaho, which had two Republicans in the senate a few sessions ago, will be represented next session by Sen. Frank Church, D., and Henry Prussie, R.

Montana Unchanged

Montana, which once had a split session, again will be represented by two Democrats, Sen. James E. Murray and Mike Mansfield.

Sen. Dennis Chavez and Clinton Anderson, both Democrats, will continue to represent New Mexico and will see no change in Colorado's senatorial delegation consisting of Sen. John A. Carroll, D., and Gordon Allott, R.

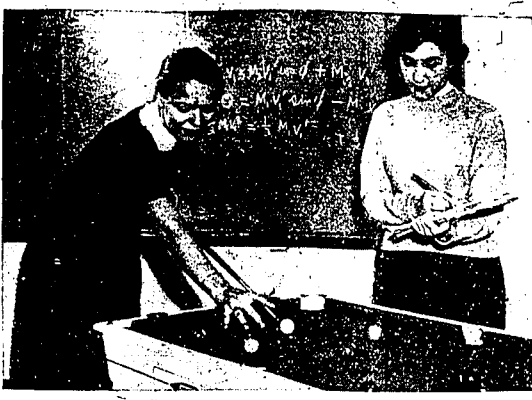
Others Still in Office

Western senators are expected to gain chairmanships of four powerful committees: Hayden, appropriations; Murray, Interior and insular affairs; Chavez, public works, and Magnuson, commerce.

In addition, Hayden, Murray and Mansfield may serve again on the powerful Policy committee. Mansfield was assistant majority leader of the last session.

Survey Shows Penguin Life Is 'No Picnic'

NEW YORK, Dec. 9 (UPI)—Having probed deeply into the life of that dourly majestic bird, the Emperor penguin, polar scientists will show you it can't be much fun to be one.

These scientists made their way to an Antarctic penguin rendezvous where thousands of them gather every winter for what seems to be the principal fun in a penguin's life, which is to become a parent.

And what carnage the scientists found!

About 12,000 birds were still there when the scientists arrived, but it was evident that about 20,000 had set out to become parents on one section of sea ice at the beginning of their breeding season. Of the 12,000 remaining, approximately 8,500 had chicks to shelter, feed and enjoy. The others were bereft, like the 8,000 which had departed.

All this is a fascinating addition to science's scant knowledge of the Emperor. It came from the largest rookery so far discovered by man and it showed that Emperor penguin infant mortality is much higher than had been supposed although it was known to be high.

About 20,000 tried to become par-

ents and only 8,500 succeeded. That's appalling, especially for an animal that ate (or he) will even brook a chunk of ice if there is no egg to brood. The Emperor penguin female lays only one egg a year. This means the unsuccessful must wait for the next breeding season.

It shows the Antarctic winter is tough even for penguins. Yet the bird has to breed then. If it used the Antarctic summer the young wouldn't have enough time to grow a thick outercast before winter came around, and in that case there would be no penguins at all.

The giant rookery was discovered by Australian scientists in Australia's Antarctic territory. It brought to 11 the number of rookeries known to man. The first was discovered in 1901. Between then and 1954 four more were discovered. Since 1954 the Australians have discovered six.

Unit Abolished

BERLIN, Dec. 9.—The East German parliament is abolishing its upper house, the landesparlament.

An abolition law said recent ordinances providing for closer cooperation between parliament and state and local authorities "had unified and centralized the mechanism of state organs in East Germany" and had made the upper house redundant.

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Nip and Tuck Battle on Sales Tax Issue May Hit Legislature

BOISE, Dec. 9.—A nip and tuck battle could break out in the 25th Idaho legislature over something both parties say they are against—a sales tax.

The Associated Press asked legislators whether they favor such a levy. Of those responding, 41 per cent said yes or maybe and 37 per cent said they're against it.

The measure appears to have stronger support among Democrats than Republicans. Forty-four per cent of the Democrats and 36 per cent of the GOP members said they would or might vote for it.

Strongest support of all is found among senate Democrats, who killed the measure two years ago. Fifty-five per cent replied favorably to the issue.

In the last session, a two per cent sales levy passed the Republican-controlled house but was killed in the Democratic-controlled senate. This time the Democrats will control both houses.

The two per cent figure is again the only rate being mentioned. The United Educational Council has proposed such a levy to provide extra state money which the council says Idaho's schools must have.

Comments from legislators vary widely. Sen. Vernon Daniel, R., Fayette, asked what he felt would be the major problem confronting Idaho's lawmakers, listed "killing a sales tax" as first.

On the other hand, Lake Rep. T. F. Terrell, D. Hammett. As a member of the platform committee, he highly opposed the anti-sales tax plank which Democrats adopted at their platform convention this fall. Republicans took a similar stand, also after a fight in the platform committee.

"Neither political party has been realistic," says Terrell. "If the trend continues we can anticipate total federal fund requirements of 7 to possibly \$1 million dollars. We cannot support a program that demands no new taxes and rules out the possibility of a sales tax."

The pre-legislative budget committee has recommended a budget of \$67,400,000. This is based on denial of nine million dollars extra for schools, requested by the DEE.

The committee said its proposed budget could be financed without any new taxes, but it would take a major change to provide the increase asked by educators.

Forty-seven per cent of all Republicans replied and 31 per cent of all Democrats, however, say they're against a sales tax come what may.

Wernher Von Braun Began Rocketry in German Dump

By United Press International—German dictator once had von Braun put behind bars because "the Führer may want to go to the moon." At 27, working at the Peenemünde rocket center in Germany for the Nazis, Von Braun led the V-2 missiles that plagued England in the final days of World War II. His German resistance collapsed. Von Braun and more than 100 of his associates fled to surrender to advancing allied forces rather than to the Russians. The group led by Von Braun were signed to contracts with the U. S. Army Ordnance Corps and came to the United States in 1945. His "workshop" built "Mirrors" of captured V-2 rockets at White Sands, N. M., proving ground. Later he became project director of a guided missile development unit at Ft. Bliss, Tex. In April, 1950, the entire group was transferred to Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, Ala., then designated the development center for army rockets and ballistic missiles. The scientist and 102 of his colleagues and their families received American citizenship in 1955. Some 2,000 scientists and technicians work under Von Braun. When the space engineer goes home at contract's end with his wife, Maria, and two daughters, Margrit, 5, and Ina, 9, he has virtually no time for hobbies but listens to chamber music while he pours over technical publications. His thoughts turn to friends to be always turned toward the stars. He has turned down lucrative offers from private industry because he believes the government space programs give him the greatest outlet for his dream of man conquering space. He once was quoted as saying "there is beauty in space, and it is orderly. There is no weather, and there is regularity. It is predictable. Everything in space obeys the laws of physics. If you know these laws, and obey them, space will treat you kindly."

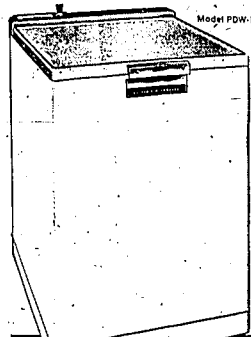

McCALL, Dec. 9 (UP)—The veterans administration will be asked by a survey team from Washington to study the expansion needs of the veterans hospital, Boise State.

The executive committee of the Idaho department of the American Legion has approved the request following the recommendation of the Legion's state rehabilitation commission.

The team will be asked to decide whether it would be more economical to build a new administration building or turn the present hospital into an administration building and build a new hospital.

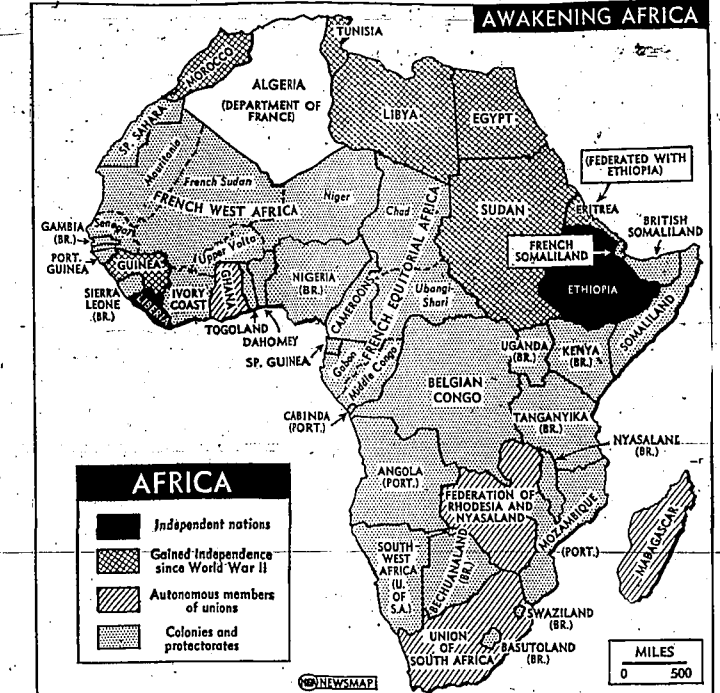

Warning Now Is Don't Allow Rosy Guesses to Mislead You

NEW YORK, Dec. 9 (AP)—A warning against letting the crush of rosy predictions for 1954 lead you into trouble is sounded today. It comes from those who hold that the danger signs are there even though they are not yet fully apparent.

For the individual business the danger lies mostly in how its top men react to the predictions—whether they base their plans on their hopes rather than on their reasoned expectations.

The research institute of America states some of the dangers it sees gathering force. It says it gets much of its data from confidential reports of 30,000 firms it serves, as well as from official statistics and indicators.

The institute says its general prediction for 1954 is definitely on the bright side, but here are the dangers that could cause trouble before the middle of next year:

1. In many of its reporting companies production has jumped faster than demand. This is natural in the early months of the slump output was cut back more slowly than sales fell.
2. The danger is that unless demand rises more than is now indicated, there will be a glut of property that 1954 or later.

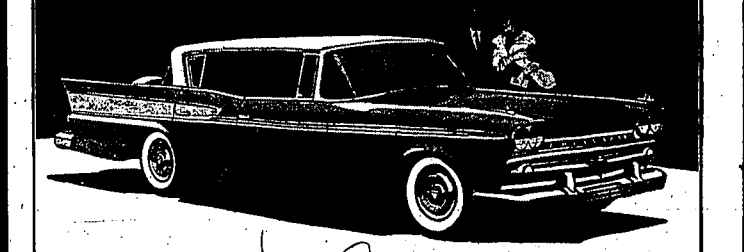

Les Paul and Mary Ford, "Over the Rainbow-Cha-Cha." Xavier Cugat, no stranger to this kind of rhythm, matched to the recording studio and came out with "Gesu-ndheit-Cha-Cha," sometimes called "The Ah-Choo-Cha-Cha."

Ogdie also recorded "Billy's Cha-Cha," his competitor, Al Martino, called his "Cha-Cha-Change in with the Cha-Cha-Change." Even the hillbilly music field is in the cha-cha-cha. Willie "Black-Sheep" Williams recorded "Cha-Cha-Cha-Cha-Cha."

"I know life is very intricate and it is not easy to pass judgement in such situations. There exist, however, certain moral obligations which are binding on everyone."

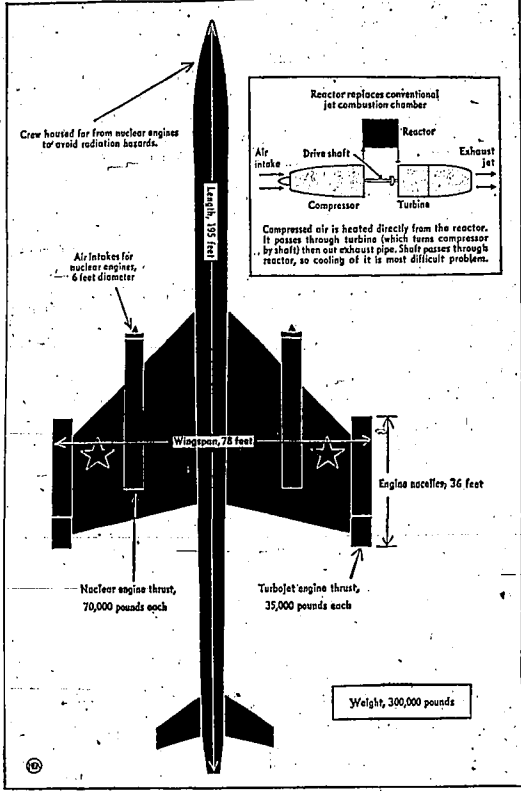

'58 Car Sales Totals Listed; Termed 'Flop'

DETROIT, Dec. 9 (AP)—The auto industry's new car sales have missed the four-million-mark for 1958. By the year-end total retail deliveries should amount to approximately 4 1/2 million units.

In the years immediately preceding and immediately following World War II that would have been considered a good year for the car industry. But for the present year it adds up to what many industry sources are calling a flop.

A major factor in that appraisal is the inclusion in the total of nearly 378,000 imported vehicles. Immediately before and following World War II imported car sales were wholly negligible.

Last year slightly more than 8,000,000 new cars were sold in the United States. Only 200,000 of that total were foreign-built vehicles.

It is so recent that new car sales in the new model year so far have fallen below anticipation. Industry sources generally attribute this to depleted inventories and the inability, because of work stoppages, of the industry to get production into full swing.

But dealer stocks are being built up. Most dealers now have on hand all the competitive models that were lacking in the first five or six weeks of the new model year. If the demand for new cars really exists, it should make itself felt before the year-end.

Automotive News, commenting on

Liberal Demo Winners Urge More Powers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—Democratic liberals, claiming added strength among newly elected congressmen, pushed plans today to demand a stronger voice in house Democratic councils.

Spending up their organization, they tentatively scheduled for next Monday a meeting to plan a series of public hearings to demand a stronger voice in house Democratic councils.

They originally had planned to caucus early in January, but a few days before congress convenes.

Strong Congress Pledged

Another would require more party caucuses. Now there normally is only one binding caucus for the party and it is limited to organization matters.

Still another proposal is to bring to life the dormant Democratic policy committee of the house.

One of the liberals said his group estimated its own minimum strength at 85, but that soundings among some of the newly elected Democrats indicated it could count on a higher active membership.

The "hard-core Southerner," he said, total about 95, leaving about 100 Democrats in the new heavily Democratic House, with 238 Democrats and 153 Republicans.

Total for Tax Collections Is Hiked in State

BOISE, Dec. 9 (AP)—Idaho's tax collections gained by more than one million dollars in the five months ended Nov. 30 as compared with those a year earlier. Tax Collector P. G. Neill reported yesterday.

He listed total general fund revenue at \$7,930,881 compared with \$7,338,680 in the corresponding period of 1957. The bulk of the increase was in income tax collections. They totaled \$4,908,408, a gain of \$309,989. Other increases included \$122,112 in cigarette taxes, to a total of \$1,080,252; \$22,548 in the beer stamp tax, to \$51,724; and \$10,922 in the inheritance tax, to \$200,268.

The kilowatt hour tax produced \$197,147, a gain of \$6,843.

Reductions were reported in earnings of the oligomargarine tax, down \$10,884 to \$404,318, and in the mine license tax, down \$1,183 to \$13,820. Collections of motor fuel taxes amounted to \$6,892,488. Neill reported a gain of \$271,988 over collections a year earlier.

Power's Eyes Willed but It Isn't Possible

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 8 (UPI)—The Tyrone Power willed his eyes to the living, but his gift was not fulfilled.

Power was taken to a hospital in New York where he died on Dec. 7. There the actor's body was prepared for burial and a heart attack last night resulted in a heart attack last night, a spokesman said his eyes were not removed.

The Eye Bank for Sight Restoration in New York said it had received within 24 to 48 hours of Power's death. There are few eyes available in the United States which can be utilized in a special transplant operation which is known to some persons, Eye Bank officials said.

The Eye Bank spokesman said Power's eyes would not be removed from his body if he had been notified when it was noted at his home that the gift was made in a special deed and a person so that eyes may be removed within the short time.

The handsome brown-eyed film star is remembered as given to the Eye Bank Eye foundation for the transplanting of eyes.

The last congress was held in 1954. Agricultural matters have been causing some worry among Hungary's rulers. Leaders differ on how to push the collectivization farms.

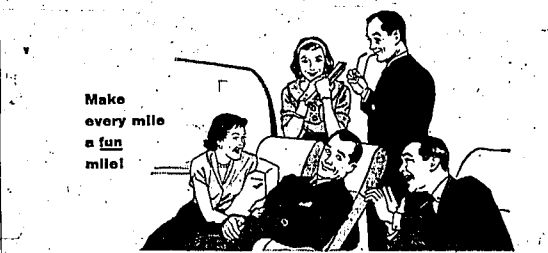

"Last Stand" Described at Jerome Meet

JEROME, Dec. 9—Gen. George Armstrong Custer's famous "last stand" battle with Sioux Indians on the Little Bighorn river was described for members of the Jerome Historical society.

John Emerson, local Toastmasters club president, spoke to the group and showed colored slides of the battle.

George Armstrong Custer, a showman with long yellow hair that he wore shoulder length, had been commissioned a major general during the last year of the Civil War. Custer was assigned to the Black Hills to study the country and the report of gold. The Black Hills country of South Dakota, the holy ground of the Sioux nation, had been given to them in the treaty of 1868.

Troops were sent to keep miners out and representatives of government were sent to buy the land. The Indians refused to sell that which was theirs. Like a church, the troops withdrew and the white miners rushed into the Indian country.

The enraged Indians sent couriers to all of the tribes of the Sioux nation and they gathered at one camp on the Rosebud river, probably 3,000 strong. They were led by medicine man named Sitting Bull, and Two Moons, an Indian politician. To lead the attack, General Custer and his men were appointed. Emerson outlined the battle.
