Iron Finds in Montana Site Make Interest

HELENA, Mont., Dec. 10 (U-P)—Discovery of magnetite iron ore in southwestern Montana which engineers claim shows proved reserves of over 100 million tons, has Canadian and French industrialists interested.

A speculation is of the possibility of a steel mill built in the area near the bluffs of Letbridge, Alta., and using the Montana ore was reported yesterday in a special report from Letbridge.

The industrialists named are Marc de Rougemont, Montreal, president of Canadian American Utilities corporation; J. A. Brasset, Calgary, president of West Canadian Magnetic Ore, Ltd.; and Albert DeBorja, Paris, France, chairman of the board of Schidlers Trading firm.

They and others visited the area near Dillon, Mont., Oct. 9 and investigated the ore claims.

Minerals Engineering company, Grand Junction, Colo., reported the ore contained 20 per cent or more magnetite for pure iron. The company has shipped 4,000 tons of ore for further testing.

The discovery site is in the Carter Creek drainage, east of Dillon, where geologists had been probing for similar deposits containing iron and other minerals. Magnetite and iron ores are being developed in the Rocky mountains near Crown Point, Mont. in Alberta and West Canadian Magnetic Ore.

Some points are 13 miles wide at some points and 30 miles wide at others.

Navy Reveals New Plan for Sea Test Area

POINT MUGU, Calif., Dec. 10 (UPI)—The navy has revealed plans for a proposed 15-year expansion which would turn an area of one million square nautical miles of the Pacific ocean into a gigantic test region for the launching and recovery of American missiles and space vehicles.

Chief Joseph Pace, resources and facilities officer at the Pacific missile range here, outlined the program yesterday. He said it already has been presented to the department of defense for approval.

The huge space testing area would border on Johnston, Darwin and Christmas Islands in the South Pacific.

Area Called Ideal

Pace said the vast section would be ideal for use as the recovery area for project Dinosaur, in which a man is to be orbited around the Earth and then returned.

Manus Island in the large area was described in the navy plan as the best location for launching an equatorial orbit satellite which could lead to a complete worldwide communications network.

Another use of the area would be as impact location for intercontinental ballistic missiles lobbed from 5,000 or 6,000 miles away on the California coast.

Area Divided

The navy divided the huge area into sections including the "polar orbiting range," the "polar recovery area," and the "ballistic missile range."



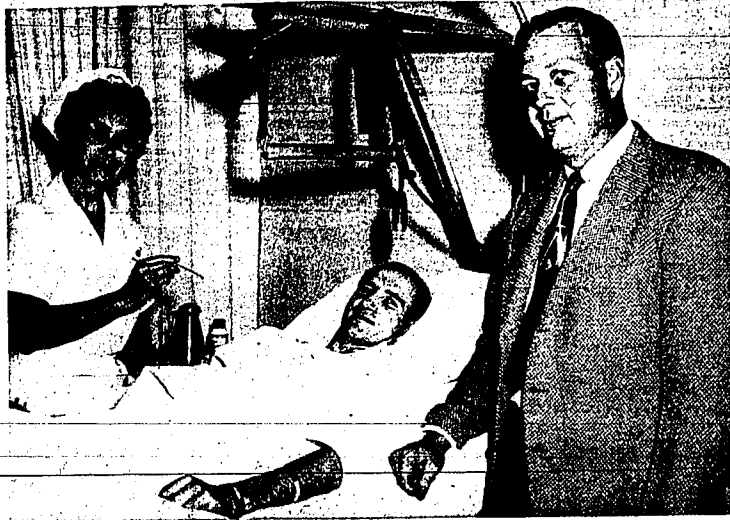

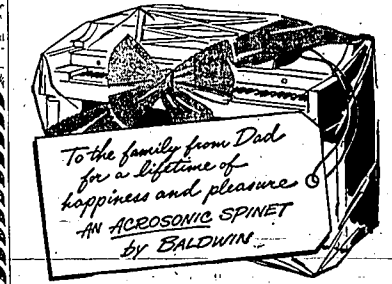

Idaho's Primary Law Appears Headed for Change Next Year

BOISE, Dec. 10—Idaho's primary election law appears headed for a change at the 1959 session of the legislature. But the change is not quite too certain.

An Associated Press survey shows that 53 per cent of the Democrats and 73 per cent of the Republicans who responded to a questionnaire are in favor of a change in the present primary law.

Only four per cent of those replying said they were against any change. A number of others gave qualified answers.

Leaders of both parties have expressed belief some change in the Idaho law is necessary. They say the present plan has a tendency to break down party responsibility.

Idaho uses a perforated primary election ballot. Names of Democratic candidates are printed on one half and those of Republicans on the other. The voter tears the ballot in two, votes on one-half and puts the other half in a discard box.

There is no party registration in Idaho and the voter does not disclose which half of the ballot he votes. There have been frequent claims by both Republicans and Democrats that members of the opposition have invaded their ranks at times in an effort to nominate candidates they feel would be easier to beat in the general election.

Of the members of the 1959 legislature who said they favored the primary law change, 55 per cent chose a run-off primary.

In this plan if one candidate fails to get a majority of the vote cast in the primary, then the top two candidates in the race would go into a runoff, probably within about a month after the primary. An argument against the proposal is the cost of the additional election, including campaigning by the candidates involved.

Nine per cent of those replying said they favored a combination of the run-off and primary systems. A convention would reduce the field of candidates to no more than twice the number of seats to be filled and the final nomination would be determined in the primary voting.

The same per cent said they favored a return to the old convention system and 11 per cent voted for either a convention or a runoff or a combination of the two.

Nine per cent said they felt registration of voters by party affiliation would solve the problem. The remaining seven per cent who said they felt a change is needed did not specify the method.

Stake Discusses Building Plans

SIOUXHOLE, Dec. 10—A study of the proposed \$450,000 building program for the Plains state LDS church was made by priesthood members of the local ward Sunday morning.

President Valdo Benson and President Ward Rawson were present to lead the discussion. Bishop Lloyd Smith conducted.

Plans are under way to begin work in the spring on a stake building at Richfield and a new chapel at Hatley with remodeling and additions scheduled to follow for the local LDS church. The estimated cost of the stake building is \$250,000 and the estimate on the Hatley building is set at about \$200,000.

The Shoshone ward's share of the stake fund is \$7,500, or about \$70 a family.

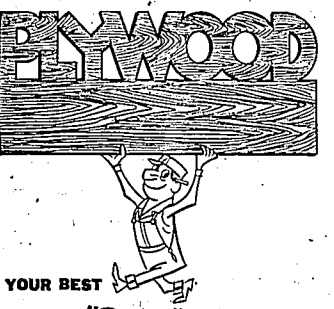

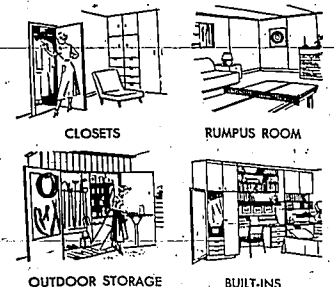
