## New Snow Brings Gloom to Eastern Snowbound Area

OSWEGO, N. Y., Dec. 11 (AP)—Hope gave way to renewed gloom today in this blizzard-stricken city as residents awoke to new snow and a forecast of more. Another four inches fell overnight, raising to about 6½ feet the thick, white blanket that has broken roofs, buildings and business. Local building contractors estimated that damage has reached \$500,000 and probably would go higher. The battle to repair damage today in zero temperatures, with drifts more than 20 feet high.

Three families were reported strangled from their homes as they slipped and fell from the roofs as they tried to get out.

So far, no injuries have been reported.

Mail roads in the area had been closed since supplies were considered adequate.

A contractor's warehouse and an empty building collapsed yesterday and roofs of at least three other buildings were damaged.

Roof cracks appeared in several of many dwellings.

Today there was some automobile travel, but it was slow.

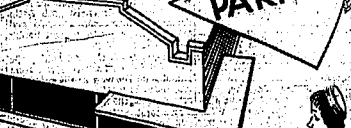

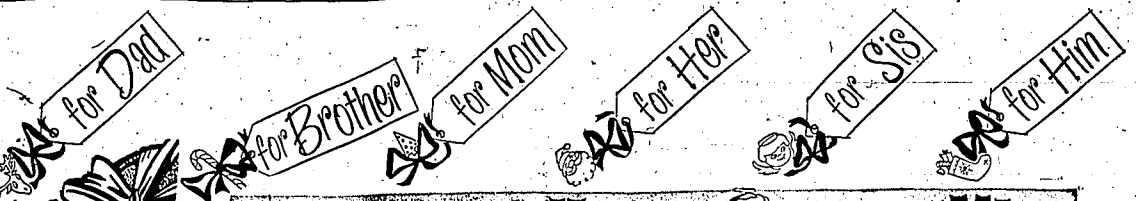

**WASHINGTON**

**WASHINGTON, (NEA)**—American officials, looking ahead to the Paris talks that take place next year, regard the prospect for the West part as strongly hopeful for the most part.

As the United States and the entire West part of the world will be facing under their new constitution, and their newly elected, rightist-oriented assembly will come face to face with a vastly strengthened president, assumed by all as sure to be Charles de Gaulle.

As this opens, the French will set out on a course that, for positive reasons, they have not matched for many decades.

In the U. S. view, one of the most significant signs of that change is the vote in the recent elections—a similar trend to that in the West part of the world. The great drop from 150 to 10 in the number of communist and left party members in the National Assembly, the fact of the story, the Reds have been losing seats for years, with rigid election procedures contributing to this result.

The big fact, as seen here, was the decline in the red popular vote from 25 per cent of the total to 20 per cent from the end of World War II until now, the communists' share had been almost a constant 25 per cent, undisturbed by party routine.

This vote never has represented hard core, card carrying communist strength in France. It reflected persistent protest from millions with a despairing economic outlook.

"This vote breaks a big log jam," said one official. "For the first time, some of these people are looking for something else, instead of voting against a condition, for a change they were voting for somebody."

De Gaulle, of course, was the somebody. His tall figure was the focus of this election. Support for him was the single binding force in the hastily formed but massively triumphant rightist party, the Union for the New Republic.

There are no regrets here at the newest indications of the general trend in France. It reflected persistent protest from millions with a despairing economic outlook.

**AUTO INSURANCE RATES**

Everyone is becoming accustomed to paying higher prices for auto insurance. In most instances it is a circumstance over which the individual has no control.

There is one exception, however, and it has to do with the ever increasing automobile insurance rates. The average driver is responsible for these increased rates because of the manner in which he is operating his automobile.

It sums up merely to a "let-the-punishment-fit-the-crime attitude."

Or in the company's own words: "If you and your community are ready for strict and impartial traffic law enforcement—a tough and continuing crackdown on all violators—and the removal of dangerous drivers from the road, traffic accidents in your community can be cut in half. Sound and continuing law enforcement has never failed."

While we all know that proper control of automobile traffic is one of our greatest problems, the whole enormity of America's traffic accident toll cannot be determined definitely. The experts know only that it exceeds 10,000,000 serious accidents annually and is rising rapidly.

Statements that automotive traffic is showing improvement all the time because more cars are traveling more miles in comparison to the number of persons killed and injured are nothing more than statistical "trick" numbers to sugarcoat the bitter truth.

According to State Law Enforcement Commissioner Earl E. Koehler, the 1958 Idaho legislature will be asked to pass a negligent driving law capable of standing up in the courts; and to strengthen the law against drivers with many minor violations.

Drivers would be given demerit points for each offense such as speeding, failure to yield right of way or improper signaling. Repeated violations would draw corrective action by the state law enforcement department.

Will the legislature face this growing problem realistically this year?

And will the people of Idaho support any action that would tend to reduce all this needless slaughter and destruction on our highways?

That remains to be seen.

### California Has Worries Over Fall's Drought

**SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 11 (UPI)**—California farmers looked with apprehension today at an autumn drought, the worst since the gold days of 1914.

The drought has proved to be a mixed blessing. On one hand, it has enabled farmers to harvest such crops as cotton, citrus, avocados, dates and almonds, and to sow and sow for next spring's crops.

On the other hand, cattlemen have been trying hard to make up for a lack of range grasses and citrus and vegetable growers have had to irrigate. It is needed soon for wheat, oats and barley seeded in dirt in anticipation of moisture.

In the Sierra Nevada mountains, only one moderate snowfall has been reported. A brand new ski lift at Mt. Shasta, which opened Nov. 15 with no snow on the slopes, is said to be losing heavily.

Runoff from the spring snowpack is the principal source of California's water supply. However, it rained so much last year that reservoirs have enough water to take care of this year's needs. It may be a different story for areas that depend on natural water.

Little Rain Falls

Only 2 1/2 inches of rain has fallen in San Francisco since July 1, Normal to date is 4.71. Last year, 6.56 inches had fallen.

The old record for a drought year was set in 1929, when only 2.01. On that date, a 1.21 inch rainfall was reported.

Adding to farmers' woes was increasing damage to crops by smog in the San Joaquin valley.

Visibility in many valley areas yesterday was less than a mile.

It has been announced that such crops as tomatoes, lettuce, spinach, celery, grapes, alfalfa and citrus.

### Toy Business Booms After Slow Start

**LOS ANGELES, Dec. 10 (UPI)**—The toy business is taking its heels through the long summer while the nation recovers from a recession.

Manufacturers who met a wave of cancellations in the second half of the production period when early Christmas ordering fell far below expectations by late summer.

Trend Reverses

The trend now has been reversed, and retail buyers have placed in orders that have emptied wholesale warehouses and caused speedups in assembly lines to meet a renewed demand for toys that began only a few weeks ago.

Fenwick and Gordon, Los Angeles, largest manufacturers representative west of Manhattan, regard the early trend as a "general slowdown."

Retail outlets played it too safe, they ordered too low, according to Al Gordon, who with Sam Fenwick, has been depending toys in the West since 1926.

Shortages Result

Gordon said the late ordering meant retail dealers possibly would have toy shortages as parents swept through their stores in last-minute shopping sprees.

He defends the dealers and explains their caution was based on the recession in business in general. However, he also feels they did not make allowances for the fact that the toy business always makes a spurt in December when nearly 75 per cent of the toys are sold for the year.

"There never has been a bad year in our business," he says.

"People buy for their kids whether times are tough or not. In hard times toy prices are down and they still buy everything they possibly can for the kids."

### 2 Americans and U. S. Visitor Get Church's Red Hat Monday

**VATICAN CITY, Dec. 11 (UPI)**—Two Americans and a foreign visitor to the United States today received the red hats of the U. S. cardinal's church at the consistorial beginning Monday. They will bring to 23 the number of cardinals who have served the church in the United States.

Scheduled to receive their red hats at the Vatican were two Americans born in the United States, Cardinal Spellman, archbishop of New York; James Francis Cardinal McIntyre, archbishop of Los Angeles; and Pietro Cardinal Pumasoni Biondi, Italian-born former apostolic delegate to the U. S., now serving in the Roman curia as head of the church's Sacred Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith.

Italians who have served as apostolic delegates in the U. S. and later become cardinals in their own countries. One Italian and one Spaniard served religious orders in America, and later became princes of the church.

Twelve other cardinals, including Archbishops Spellman and McIntyre, were U.S.-born cardinals, elevated while archbishops in American cities.

Two of the U. S. cardinals were naturalized Americans, both born in Ireland. The first "American" cardinal also was one of the first bishops in the U. S. He was Jean Cardinal de Cheverus, first bishop of Boston when the diocese was established in 1802, along with New York, Philadelphia and Maryland as the first in the newly-independent nation.

Bishop De Cheverus returned to his native France in 1822, was created cardinal there in 1839, but died that same year.

Italian-born Ignazio Persico, a Neapolitan, served as the fourth bishop of Savannah, from 1810 to 1812, and was made a cardinal after his return to Italy, in 1863. He died two years later.

The first American-born cardinal, made a prince of the church because of his ecclesiastical position in the U. S., was John Cardinal McCloskey, who received his red hat in 1875.

McCloskey was born in Brooklyn in 1810 and studied at the seminary of Mount St. Mary, Baltimore, Md., and in Rome. He was archbishop of New York from 1864 until his death in 1885.

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### Struggle to Mold U. S. Economy Appears Difficult for Experts

**NEW YORK, Dec. 11 (AP)**—The best struggle to mold a new federal budget in the shape of monetary policy as frustrating to many in Wall Street today as it looks difficult to the fiscal experts in Washington.

Economy is a fine goal but the odds are stacked against it, many believe.

And this discouragement, or cynicism, makes them feel that the current leap in inflationary pressure will last only a few more months at

The bulls in Wall Street seem sure of it. Consumer surveys indicate that the public expects another rise in prices, too.

Treasury deficits are only one of the inflationary pressures that from time to time send the cost of living higher. Among others are the wage-price spiral that pushes the cost of production higher; or credit inflation that comes when the rate of new investment exceeds the rate of

capital formation through savings; or too little capacity to produce goods when demand is high; or that rising life expectancy and the "last two aren't operating just now. But the first two are. And many see continuing danger from them after the conditions now putting a brake on the rise in living costs lose their force.

Serious as this fiscal year's prospective treasury deficit of 12-billion dollars is, bankers feel that the money managers so far are tackling the problem of containing its inflationary aspects with considerable success.

But the real misgivings—according to the Guaranty Trust company,

What basically causes distrust of the dollar, the bank holds, is the growing fear of deficit financing.

There are those who contend that government spending also can have a stimulative effect on the economy. This theory is that such spending stimulates the economy, causes it to come and profits to rise and that helps the treasury pay deficits.

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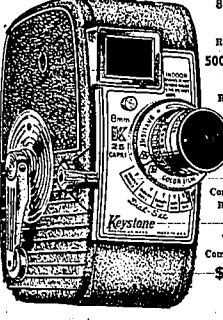

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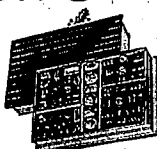
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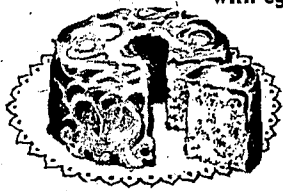
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### Survey Shows Pension Plans Faults in U. S.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (UPI)—A survey by the house veterans committee indicated today that thousands of veterans drawing non-service connected pensions on the basis of need actually enjoy, with their wives, either fair incomes or substantial holdings of stocks, bonds and cash.

One such "needy" veteran had, with his wife, a net worth of \$87,096, including \$53,200 in liquid assets and an income of \$3,318. He had drawn pension checks totaling about \$5,400 and on the basis of mortality tables could expect to draw another \$9,450. His military service totaled four months, all in the United States.

Many Are Less Fortunate  
The survey shows on the other hand, that many thousands of less fortunate veterans are supporting themselves meagerly in their old age with no income but their veterans' pensions of either \$60.15 or \$78.75 per month.

Veterans committee chairman Otto E. Reague, D. Tex., proposed to correct both conditions, at least partially. He said legislation is being drafted to pass from the pension rolls all those who don't need help and to increase payments for those who need it.

The White House has hinted it may sponsor legislation in the same spirit as part of a drive to cut government spending. Reague's proposals, at least initially, probably would increase total outlays for veterans' pensions.

Pensions Are Different  
Pensions are not to be confused with compensation. Compensation is paid, as a matter of right, to veterans with disabilities incurred in military service. Pensions are for disability incurred in civil life and are payable only where the veteran passes a test of need.

No allegation was made that the highest claims of need were made by the veteran, even in the most extreme cases turned up by the committee. The blame was fixed rather on faulty law and administration.

The law tests men on the basis of annual income. The limits are \$1,400 for single men and \$2,700 for those with wives. But the wives' income is not counted, even though she may be claimed for purposes of the higher limit. Her own assets, considered either of the veteran or his wife.

### State Warden Says Youth 14 Are Adult Enough for Driving

BOISE, Dec. 11—If you raise the legal driving age from 14 to 16 you are only taking away needed responsibility of teen-agers, L. A. Clapp, warden of the Idaho state penitentiary, told members of the Presbyterian Supper club Tuesday night.

Addressing the group on current problems of juvenile delinquency and the increasing number of inmates in the penitentiary, Clapp stressed that parents are not giving their children enough responsibility. He has been warden for the past 14 years.

If properly trained, children of 14 years are old enough to accept responsibility of driving, the speaker said, noting that today's children are unfamiliar with the old symbols of toll, the spade and the hoe.

He pointed out that more accidents occur among drivers in the 14 to 16 age bracket than among 14-year-olds, adding there are statistics to prove the statement.

Discussing reasons for the increase in delinquency, Clapp said parents are mostly at fault because they are coddling their children.

"Most children don't know the meaning of responsibility today," he declared.

He also spoke on the rehabilitation program conducted at the penitentiary and showed slides illustrating the work. At present there are 597 inmates in the prison and

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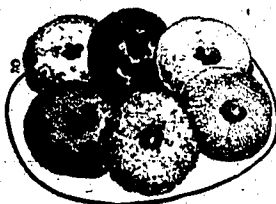

### CAA Changeover to New Unit Will Not Affect Most Workers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (UPI)—Civil aeronautics administrators of 25,000 workers get a new employer Jan. 1. But for most of them, the changeover will be strictly on paper. They will be working then for the bureau of air traffic management for the new federal aviation agency (FAA) headed by Elwood R. Quesada, former air force lieutenant general and a pioneer of military aviation.

But most bureau employees stationed at airports and air traffic control centers across the nation will be doing the same jobs at the same rate of pay. All CAA personnel will be carried over into FAA unless they choose to resign. There may be a reduction in status (but not in salary) for some in top CAA jobs.

FAA also will absorb about 300 employees of the always modernizing Civil Aeronautics Board, now on the civil aeronautics board (payroll, and about 60 military personnel.

### New Talks for Berlin's Crisis Are Predicted

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—A big four foreign ministers conference next spring is being mentioned by many diplomats as a means of easing East-West tensions over Berlin.

Some officials are predicting, however, the three western allies will propose that such a meeting deal with the entire problem of Germany's future as well as Berlin.

How considered American, British and French diplomats are reported giving increasing thought to the advantage of a new round of talks with the Russians. This prospect has been weighed carefully in considering a reply to Premier Nikita Khrushchev's demand that West Berlin be turned into a free city.

The feeling that such new talks would be desirable appears to be gaining ground among Western diplomats. But a decision is being delayed until after the 15-nation Atlantic Pact council meeting which starts in Paris next Tuesday.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, now hospitalized with an intestinal ailment, is planning to attend the Paris conference. The state department reported that Dulles is doing some work in hospital while in preparation for the meeting.

Allies Aren't Rushing Allied authorities are in no hurry to reach an answer to Khrushchev's Berlin proposal.

The Atlantic pact foreign ministers will discuss the reply generally. Informants said, but will not seek to draft a reply. This conference will draw up a guide lines which diplomats would follow in drafting a formal note a few weeks later.

### Clerk Honored

BURLEY, Dec. 11 — Mrs. Bert Wright was presented a "service performance" award—a \$150 check—at an informal gathering of office employees of the bureau of district manager Tuesday afternoon.

District Manager Jack Wilson made the announcement from Neal D. Nelson, area administrator, Salt Lake City, who is on a district-wide tour and is in Burley today.

Mrs. Wright has given outstanding and efficient service as district clerk for four and one-half years, Wilson said.

### Experts Hope Some Time to "Spy" on Sun

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (UPI)—Space scientists hope some day to launch an artificial planet whose mission would be to spy on the sun and send reports to Earth.

This was disclosed by Dr. Homer Smith, national associate director and space administration (NASA) in a briefing for newsmen on "celestial mechanics."

An artificial planet would circumnavigate both sun and Earth in a way which would require millions of miles in diameter. If properly launched it would soar near the sun and sweep on until it curved around the Earth on the return trip.

Dr. Smith is in charge of "advanced" scientific planning for NASA. He was talking about something the space agency expects to do in the immediate future, because moon probes, reconnaissance and manned satellites, and perhaps probes of Mars and Venus have higher priority.

The sun already has nine major and uncounted thousands of minor planets orbiting around it, and one more wouldn't strain its gravitational powerhouse.

But why would man want to put an artificial planet in the sky? Generally speaking, it would be for the sun, which he wanted to put up satellites and moon rockets—to learn things.

The planet would carry instruments to measure solar radiations up close and get information on processes taking place on the sun's surface. This information would be magnetically recorded.

Then, when the artificial planet reached the Earth end of its long orbit, upon radio command it would broadcast the data stored in its magnetic memory.

Greenwich would have to be taken to fire the planet in an orbit which would not take it close enough to the sun to be burned up but would get it sufficiently near for information-gathering purposes.

Scientists believe the information obtained would provide vital clues on the process of harnessing hydrogen for power. Man's hydrogen research, involving the complex reaction of gases at extremely high temperatures, has opened a new scientific frontier, called "hydrogenation" it is extremely puzzling.

The sun is a hydrogen power plant, and it radiates surface energy and hot coronal atmosphere constitute a gigantic hydromagnetic laboratory.

An intimate view of their operations might solve a lot of puzzles now standing between man and his dream of inexhaustible power.

### Senator Feud Is Blamed on Cancer Illness

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (UPI)—Sen. Wayne Morse suggested last night that the cancer suffered by his colleague, Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, accounts—at least in part—for the souring of their once personal friendship.

"It is my judgment that his illness explains psychologically, even more than he may know, his conduct towards me," Morse said in a statement, commenting on a national news magazine report (Newsweek) on the bitter feud between the two Oregon Democrats.

Morse said he was happy to hear that Neuberger is "well on his way to full recovery" from an operation for the removal of a malignant growth. Neuberger had announced the illness and has curtailed his activity during his convalescence.

Hope is Valet

"Although Sen. Neuberger and I have suffered great damage to our mutual friendship, it is my hope that the therapeutic values of the passage of time will restore at least some of our former respect for each other," the Morse statement said.

The magazine article quoted from correspondence between Morse and Neuberger to illustrate the bitter feelings between them. Neuberger understood the well-known fact that Morse and Neuberger, once political allies, had suffered a falling out.

The split began to take shape in 1937 when the two senators, who were once called the "Morse-Neuberger" because of the similarity of their views, took opposite sides on the administration's civil rights bill.

Neuberger voted for the bill, Morse opposed it as futile.

Differ on Postal Rates

The two senators also differed on a bill to raise postal rates, with Neuberger supporting the administration's request and Morse opposing it. At one point during the debate, Morse called a Neuberger argument the "mad rant" he never forgot.

The feud reached a climax in the final days of the session when a blocked senate passage of a Neuberger bill involving the city of Portland was followed.

The sharp exchange of letters followed.

In the statements, Morse said he was not aware of the time that Neuberger was seriously ill. Morse said he did not learn of Neuberger's malady until the last day of August when he returned to Oregon. He said he promptly sent Neuberger a telegram voicing his concern and offering any possible assistance.

People familiar with Chinese character and Chinese traditions are convinced that Mao Tse-tung will not make his new commune system stick indefinitely.

Stalin tried it with the Soviet peasants who were accustomed to being ground down by their landlords and the royal overlords, and the result was a disaster.

There is no reason to believe that Mao will fare any better with highly individualistic people who for centuries have let the world revolve around the family and its garden plot rather than vice versa.

Mao is trying to take millions of people away from their homes and villages and resettle them in barracks on the job. Wives work at assigned tasks, teams do the house-keeping and there are no more private gardens.

"Individuality has absolutely no place," says the People's Daily, communist party mouthpiece.

"No longer does one find the phenomenon in which workers are members of the working class only when they are working and free people when they are off duty. Now there is all-round party leadership over the production, living and education of the worker masses."

"That does not sound like the end of individualism in China, but the beginning of the end of Mao and the communists."

Chinese nationalists believe that building the communists could have done would have built up so much resentment and eventually so much revolution.

Stalin and his successors had to yield in the matter of garden plot ownership and turn progressively toward more "capitalistic" practices.

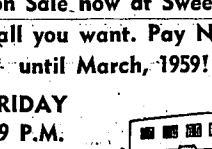

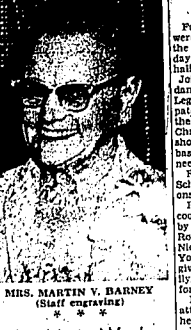

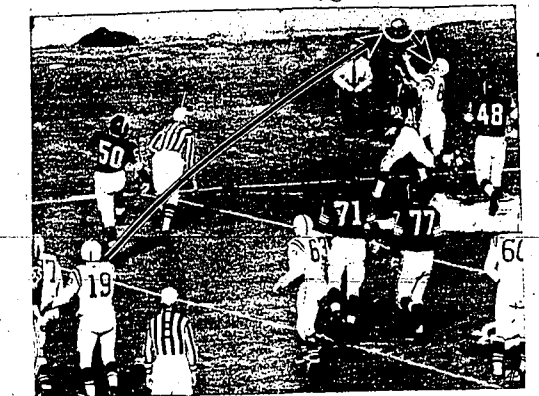

### Efforts to Rid Area of Smog Are Increased

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 11 (UPI)—Los Angeles air pollution officials, confronted with the worst December smog since on record, stepped up their efforts today to rid the area of aerial contamination.

Two smog alerts already have been declared this month, marking the first outbreak of warning-level pollution ever to be recorded in the Los Angeles basin during December.

The alerts increased to seven the number called so far this year as compared with only one for the entire year of 1957. In 1956 10 alerts were declared, while 15 were necessary in 1955.

"The automobile is now the No. 1 source of pollution," according to S. Smith Citrowick, chief of the county air pollution control district. "We are waging an all-out effort to control exhaust fumes."

Refiners cleaned up Citrowick said earlier efforts had resulted in the "cleaning up" of oil refineries and other industries. Elimination of backyard trash burners halted pollution from that source.

"Refiners now emit approximately 334 tons of pollutants a day as compared with approximately 1,100 before controls were installed," he said. "Automobiles and other vehicles contribute 1,000 tons daily."

The smog chief conceded curbing industrial pollution was an easier task than controlling contaminants from the nearly three million vehicles used in the Los Angeles area daily.

"We are testing mufflers and afterburners for automobile exhaust systems, but so far haven't found any answers," he said. "We also are working on gasolines in hope of finding cleaner burning brands."

**Alerts Come in Fog**

"This month's alerts occurred during foggy weather and provoked complaints from hundreds of motorists suffering eye or respiratory irritation from acid fumes. The murky air cut visibility to less than a mile in some cases."

A sulphuric acid mist—similar to that present in the "killer fog" at London and Donora, Pa.—was suspended in the dirty pall along with other pollutants.

The report attributed the incidence of smog alerts this year to "too much good weather." He pointed out a frequent number of days during which conditions were ideal for smog.

"In addition to the weather," he said, "more and more families—each with an automobile—are moving in to the Los Angeles area. The largest population boom, the more serious our problem is."

### Missile Flight of Navy Is Praised

POINT MUGU, Calif., Dec. 11 (UPI)—The navy today labeled highly successful a 400-mile flight of the Regulus II guided missile.

The potent Regulus II, capable of carrying an atomic warhead, yesterday spanned the width of California and successfully landed at an isolated desert area near Tonopah, Nev.

The supersonic missile, designed for operational use from atomic-powered submarines was launched for the first time from a deck of a surface ship, the LST King County, off the California coast.

Flight of the 11-ton, 57-foot missile, which differs from a ballistic missile in that it can be controlled during flight with a ballistic missile is largely beyond directional control after launching, lasted nearly an hour.

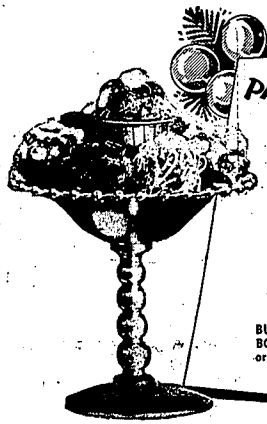

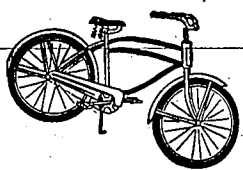

### Various Pork Features Top Buys in Store

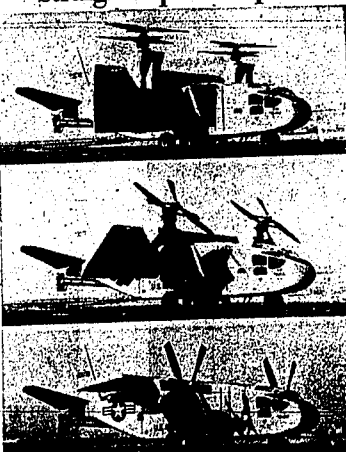
