## Appeal on Plan A Entered in Court By Two Villages

JEROME, Dec. 12 (AP)—An appeal from the state highway board's decision to route the new interstate highway 80 through Jerome county according to "Plan A" was filed with the district court clerk of the district court, at 9:15 a. m. Friday by attorneys for the villages of Eden and Hazelton. The district judge is requested by the two villages to issue an order reversing the decision of the highway board and further to order the board to adopt the route commonly known as "Plan C."

In the appeal the village residents claim the highway board did not follow the regulations prescribed in the Idaho code 40-321, legislation enacted in 1957 providing for public hearings on proposed highway routes, and based its decision on erroneous inaccurate information.

"The board did not give consideration to the protests and objections and the testimony, both oral and documentary, which was introduced at the hearing at Eden, Hazelton," the attorneys stated.

## Processors, Growers of Sugar Beets in Favor of 4-Plant Allotment Split

BOISE, Dec. 12 (AP)—Sugar beet processors and growers recommended yesterday that the Idaho beet acreage allotment be split among four factory districts on the basis of a four-year average history. They suggested to the state agricultural stabilization committee that the average of the years 1953 to 1956, inclusive, be used in determining the allotment for each of the four areas. The meeting was conducted by Glenn Henderson, state ASC chairman, and attended by spokesmen for the processors and presidents of all beet growers' associations in the state. The land available to sugar beets in the coming season will cover 87,000 acres, an increase of 869 over last year. Spokesmen for the four factory districts were Harry Elcock, Ogden, Utah, representing both Twin Falls and Nysaa, Ore., districts of Amalgamated Sugar Company; J. W. Cockayne, Salt Lake City, representing Utah-Idaho Sugar Company, and Don Keith, Preston, general manager of Franklin County Sugar company.

Under their acreage allotments were divided under a formula based on 80 per cent of the previous four-year average and 20 per cent of the highest year in that period.

Those attending the meeting also voted to resolve recommending that the acreage allotment be split among four factory districts on the basis of a four-year average history.

## 3 Alabama Voters Registrars Resign Following Session

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Dec. 12 (AP)—At least three Alabama voter registrars have resigned following the federal civil rights commission hearing on Negro voting complaints here this week. Two others under a federal court order to appear tomorrow next Friday said they plan to honor their commission chairman, said he resigned.

The registrars' office declined today that E. K. Cook, chairman of the board of registrars, Wilcox county, and J. W. Spivey, chairman of the board of registrars in Macon county, resigned. E. P. Livingston and Grady Rogers resigned on grounds they were being intimidated.

Two members of the Barbour county board, W. A. Stokes, Jr., and J. W. Spivey, resigned. They expect to be at the commission session next Friday.

The fifth registrar subpoenaed, M. T. Evans, Bullock county, was unavailable for comment.

Although they have resigned, the two Macon county registrars said they plan to appear at the second session of the commission next week.

But they said, "We aren't resigning. We're just not going to be in the office. We expect this may have on the investigation has not yet been determined."

Refusal to obey the orders would bring contempt citations and possible penalties of imprisonment or fines, it was said at the court's decision.

The victim had gone to a movie earlier in the evening and had returned to the home of his mother.

A physician was called but pronounced the youth dead upon his arrival.

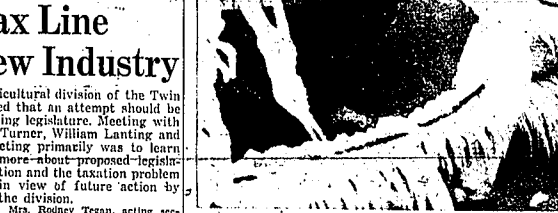
## Former Local Girl Uses Knife To "Protect" Self From Police

## Hit-Run Snowstorm Drops 10 To 15 Inches in East; Cold Hits

A hit and run snowstorm churned northward along the eastern seaboard today, unleashing falls of up to 15 inches in sections of the Carolinas and Virginia. The Atlantic storm dropped temperatures below freezing as far south as northern Florida and dumped a snow cover across parts of Alabama and Georgia. As the storm whipped northward, powered by gale winds of 40 to 50 miles per hour, weathermen issued heavy snow warnings for the mid-Atlantic region into New England. Up to six inches of snow was expected in the Northeast.

At Oswego, N. Y., a fleet of 40 snowplows and two snowcats made progress in freeing the city of six and one-half foot snow blanketed highways. Fourteen snowplows were in operation here yesterday.

No snow was expected today.

A week long series of winter storms, which have ranged from the continental divide to the Atlantic coast, have blanketed the United States, 10 to 15 inches yesterday.

Traffic incidents on snow and ice slicked highways claimed a mounting toll, including a woman killed yesterday at Atlanta, Ga., in a collision blamed on icy roads.

Only a few miles from Trenton, a blaze swept through a home last Wednesday night, killing Harry O. Graham, 28, and his sister, Constance, 8.

Orphaned brothers were hospitalized in St. Paul, Minn., Thursday when fumes from a faulty gas heater spread through a home.

In Grandville, Wis., Sherry Ouson, 4, and her brother, Dennis, 2, died of smoke inhalation when an oil heater exploded in their home a few moments after their mother left to go to the store.

Mrs. Pauline Davis, 17, died in the bedroom of her home in Culbertson, Neb., when a kerosene stove exploded.

Five persons were killed in two fires in Norfolk, Va.

### Tape Reveals Plans of Fatal Cult Bombing

VENTURA, Calif., Dec. 12 (AP)—"Dear God, give us this night freedom or death."

It is now 1:30 o'clock and within the next three or four hours we will get into the pickup truck, drive to Box Canyon, see Krishna — either alone or together — and demand a right adjustment be made.

"We have dedicated our lives to this mission and whatever may come, this may be our last night in the world. We are making this tape so people may know our motives."

It is the voice of a dead man, recorded on tape just before he and another man apparently blew up themselves and eight others.

The speaker was Ralph J. Muller.

### Visited Here

Twin Falls residents had an opportunity to see the self-styled Messiah, Krishna Venkateswara, for three or four days with an entourage following him while sporting a flowing white robe and walking barefoot through the city and surrounding area. Venka, caused quite a stir in the community. Heads turned as he passed by the area with two or three expensive neckties.

During his stay, Venka staged a meeting in the city park band shell.

### 33 Recordings made by him and by Peter Kamenoff, 42, showed the depth of the hatred they bore against the leader of the cult whose headquarters they dynamited Wednesday — barefoot, bearded Krishna Venka.

Called Hypocrite

"He isn't what he claims to be. He doesn't preach what he preaches," Muller's recorded voice said. At this point he told of two incidents which he said were committed by Venka.

"All members of the cult are alike of the manner," Muller said. "All the money had to go to the master. He kept books and no one knew what was going on."

Then Muller said: "If anything happens to me, I'm not buried heavily. All I can leave is love a my wife and my good intentions."

Muller's wife, Patricia, teaches near San Bernardino, Calif.

One Carries Dynamite

Muller and Kamenoff were seen arguing with Venka shortly before a mighty blast leveled the headquarters building and a ritzy dormitory about a 2 1/2 mile distance, say one man carried 20 sticks of dynamite and a detonator in a canvas bag. The deed included five adult cult members and two children.

Venka founded the 23-member cult in 1948. It lives on donations and does charitable work. Venka, 41, was really Francis Pennington. He started the Fountain of the World cult after roaming the world and holding a variety of jobs. He had a long police record. He claimed he was Christ. His followers called him "The Master."

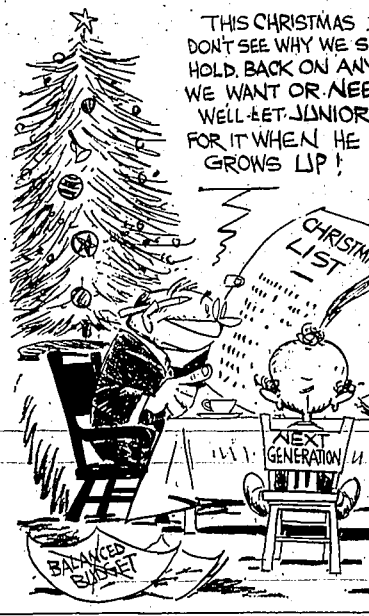

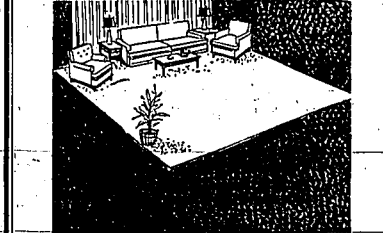

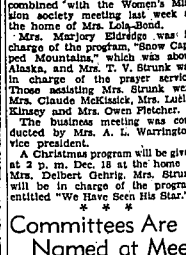
