WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—The design of the new 49-star flag is expected to be announced by President Eisenhower late this month or early in January.

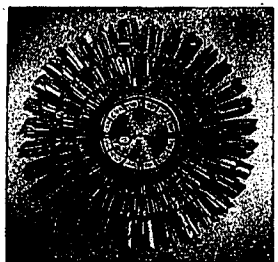

### OUR OUTLOOK FOR 1959

The Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce is ready to swing into the new year with renewed enthusiasm, six new members on the board of directors and a new secretary-manager.

With business showing general improvement throughout the country, there is every reason to believe Twin Falls will continue to hold the enviable position it has enjoyed over the years.

How much progress we make during the next 12 months will depend upon how well we work together toward a common goal.

The Chamber of Commerce should be in excellent position to arouse the cooperation and enthusiasm that are always necessary for real accomplishments.

All of the new directors—Otto Florence, Jr., Earl Haroldson, Joe McCollum, Mel Carr, Carl E. Brown and Carl Berg—have outstanding capabilities, and William (Bill) Grange has been an excellent secretary-manager.

Those not closely familiar with the local chamber's activities may not fully appreciate its achievements and the work it has been doing. It is characteristic of all such efforts that it takes a lot of time and groundwork to accomplish certain major objectives. That is particularly true in these highly competitive times of trying to bring new industries to the community. The work it has done here has been done locally, nevertheless, and considerable headway has been made in that direction.

During the last several years, nearly all the committees and divisions of the Chamber of Commerce have been exceptionally active. The agricultural and industrial divisions particularly deserve a lot of credit for all the time and effort they have spent in working for the interests they represent. The farmers and business men of this area are probably working more closely together and with a far better understanding than ever before. Largely as a result of this cooperation, two members of the Agricultural division of the chamber have been elected to the state legislature as new members in the state legislature.

It was chiefly through the efforts of the local chamber that the Idaho Citizens Committee for Good Government was organized. This organization was formed recently. It shows every indication of serving a real purpose in keeping Idaho's fiscal affairs more nearly in proper balance.

As Twin Falls and its Chamber of Commerce launch upon a new year, it might be well to reproduce in part a squib included in the "manuscript" which is mailed regularly to the chamber membership. It sets forth the following five ways in which the people of any community can best run their town:

1. Tell everyone you meet that you never buy anything at home that the merchants in a bunch of crooks, robbers and cheats.
2. Belittle all efforts for community betterment—the people trying to do these things are secretly making a lot of money, want to get rich and their way of doing things is all wrong anyway.
3. Turn down all appeals for contributions, and if it is in a nasty way you won't be bothered again, because the money collected is eventually stolen by some "higher-up" anyway.
4. Refuse to serve on all committees, have nothing to do with civic organizations—the Chamber of Commerce never does anything and is run by a bunch of dim-wits who want only to get rich before the public.
5. Knock the town, knock its businesses, knock the schools and churches, keep repeating the same old things in the same old way in other places. In any event, keep on knocking.

Of course, no one in Twin Falls would be guilty of any of these things which serve to ruin a community. But—these five points are set forth as reminders nevertheless, just in case anyone might be tempted.

In contrast to all this sort of thing, we all should realize that we are working together and enthusiastically we work together, the more we are likely to accomplish things really worth while in 1959.

So far as the Chamber of Commerce is concerned, the prospect never looked any brighter for doing a bang-up job.

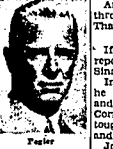

### Firm Unveils Ship Claimed "Fastest Jet"

**SAN DIEGO, Calif., Dec. 15 (UPI)**—The Convair division, General Dynamics corporation, today unveiled what it called the "fastest jet" airplane—the Convair 440. The plane could cruise the 800 miles in 4½ hours.

The gold-striped, swept-winged four-engine craft was unveiled out of its production line hangar before a group of several hundred plane officials from throughout the world and San Diego's civilian and military leaders.

Nash, Convair president, said the medium range transport, which will cruise at 610 miles per hour, will have a first line service life of more than 20 years.

Convair is to build 25 Convair 440s in a prepared address to the visiting dignitaries that the 800 mile range aircraft accommodates 120 passengers and could seat 150 passengers flying first class.

Convair officials said the plane could take off and land at most airports now designed to handle standard aircraft specifications and performance data selected by Convair said that the basic components would be able to take off in 5,200 feet and land in 5,000 feet, with a take-off speed of 150 mph.

The plane has an overall wing span of 120 feet and is powered by four General Electric J46-3 jet engines equipped with silenters and thrust reversers.

The engines used in the 800 seater versions of the jets that power the supersonic B-58 Hustler bomber, Convair says a single wing will carry the passengers to an altitude of 41,000 feet in 4½ hours or over such routes as Chicago to New York in one hour and 25 minutes.

Trans World airlines was the original purchaser of the 800 with 30 percent on order for scheduled service to begin in May, 1960.

The plane that was pulled off for assembly this today will undergo ground tests for between six and eight weeks before being flight tested at high other planes are tested behind it on the assembly line, which Convair said was running about two weeks ahead of schedule.

### Rayburn Said Pondering on House Switch

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (UPI)**—Liberal Democrats claimed today Speaker Sam Rayburn is giving serious thought to the probability that conservatives would seize control of legislation in the new congress unless their own in the house rules committee is curbed.

The liberals said they have received assurances that Rayburn, despite reports to the contrary, hasn't ruled out possible need for other leaders in the congress.

They further pointed to Rayburn's membership of a weakening of its power to roadblock legislation.

They cautioned against a new Rayburn as saying that the veteran Texas Democrat hasn't made any serious thought to the possibility of a switch.

This word circulated among leaders of the liberal group in advance of their scheduled strategy huddle this afternoon. The purpose of the meeting was to seek agreement on what should be done and devise ways of selling the proposal to Rayburn before congress convenes Jan. 7.

About a dozen self-styled liberal Democrats were expected to attend the caucus.

The issue raised by the liberal bloc was a tough decision for Rayburn who apparently wants to steer a moderate course for the new congress, despite clamor for big new spending programs from the Democrats.

Some Democrats, including Democratic house whip Carl Albert, Okla., feel that the best way to accomplish that is to leave the rules committee unchanged so it will serve as a buffer against danger that the new congress will go "too far and too fast" with various new spending programs.

But liberals argued that this line of producing moderation, would produce a do-nothing congress in which progressive legislation would never get off the ground.

They said that Albert's argument overlooks the fact that the rules committee, if left unchanged, will be much more conservative in the new congress than it has been in recent years.

### Anxious Eyes in Wall Street Are on Trend for '58 Profits

**NEW YORK, Dec. 15 (AP)**—There are some anxious eyes on business profits today in Wall Street.

The stock market, always sensitive to corporate earnings, is more so just now because the bulls have had a piece of a mind that they will call for a steep climb in net income after taxes by many firms before their profits are in line with the optimism the bulls have underwritten.

The profit trend is on the upgrade at year-end after a sharp drop in the first months of 1958. With a piece of a mind that they will call for a steep climb in the trend and the chances of its continuance.

First of the annual profit and loss-reports are coming in now from those companies whose fiscal year ends before the calendar year.

Added to these are a flock of estimates by corporate executives of the 1958 earnings should be when the books are finally closed in coming weeks. And there are the many hopeful men who are saying just wait until next year.

From the early reports Wall Street is getting the least yet for 1958 profits will stack up with 1957's after all the annual reports are in. The 50 companies have reported for their fiscal years. American Motors reports profits of 25 million dollars this year against a loss the year before of 11½ million dollars.

The other 54 companies by themselves would have shown combined profits off 17 per cent from the previous year.

Predictions from businessmen believe firms will close their books on New Year's eve also show a mixed trend.

Business as a class are chinking up this year as a poor year. But the picture brightens as you go west. The western roads are profitably moving bumper crops and western business was hit only a little.

Expecting better earnings this year than last are such roads as Great Northern, Pacific and Illinois Central. Declining net income is predicted by the Louisiana and Nashville and the Norfolk and Western.

His coming has put a brand new face on the air arm of America's defense.

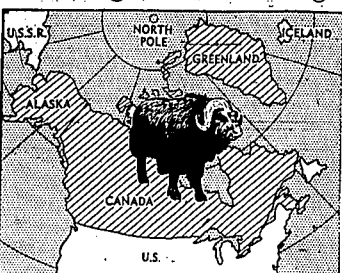

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### Navy Tells of New Camera For Satellites

**CHINA LAKE, Calif., Dec. 15 (UPI)**—Navy scientists have unveiled a new type of camera for use in photographing satellites as they soar thousands of miles above the earth.

Called the "synchronized amateur camera for satellite surveillance and detection," the new camera is a tiny man-made sphere from their stary backdrops by use of a synchronous film plane which travels at a rate proportionate with the satellite.

**Satellites Show up as Dot**

When the film is developed the stars appear as elongated smudges while the satellite shows up as a single dot.

Scientists at the U. S. navy test station said the camera, which opens its eye to the heavens for durations up to 10 minutes, would be useful in spotting both friendly and hostile artificial objects. One successful satellite portrait already has been taken, they said.

**No Radio Needed**

Photo-technologist Jack T. Leininger, who is given chief credit for the camera's development, said it can track the satellites without the aid of radio receivers.

He said previously enemy moons could come over the U. S. undetected if they were designed to hold their high frequency "beep, beep" until they passed over the continent from which they were sent. But the camera has done away with radio tracking as the only means of satellite detection, he said.

### Money Trouble Is Part Cause Of Crisis in 5 Europe Nations

**LONDON, Dec. 15 (UPI)**—An epidemic of government crises, a dominant influence.

The common factor is that a ferment of change is working on political, map of long-quiet western Europe—even outside turbulent France.

Italian Premier Amintore Fanfani has suffered three defeats in assembly weeks at the hands of an unruly parliament. Even members of his own party—the Christian Democrats—have turned against him on key issues.

Fanfani's defeats have come during his fight to stop the mounting cost of living in Italy.

In Holland, Premier Dr. Willem Drees has tendered his resignation because parliament refused to grant a two-year series of tax increases.

The Finnish government toppled because a Soviet boycott, that could put the border country in dire economic straits.

France was left without a government when Hermann-Jonsson resigned from the leadership because of disagreements on how to handle the mounting spiral of inflation.

The fall of Luxembourg's social

Christian-Socialist government came after a parliamentary motion of censure against socialist minister of justice, Victor Bodson. He was censured for allegedly failing to take steps against a private firm which attempted to bribe a transport ministry official.

So far, these crises have remained unswayed for times ranging from several days to several weeks. And many of them show no signs of being solved in the immediate future.

### Report Shows U. S. Has Lead In A-Scapower

**LONDON, Dec. 15 (UPI)**—The authoritative "Jane's Fighting Ships" said today the United States has a long lead over Russia in construction of atomic seapower but that Soviet technology now is concentrating on nuclear vessels.

Jane's, world's foremost authority on global naval strength, said in the 1959 issue published today that Russia is now a first class naval power, second only to America and leading it 200 to 250 in submarines actually built.

**U.S. Lead Said Cut**

In recent months it has become clear that the overall technological lead which the United States held over Russia's submarine-building is smaller than it once was.

Jane's, which singled out the atomic submarines Nautilus, Skate and Seawolf for their long distance underwater exploits this year, said the American nuclear submarine fleet is "formidable."

The Russians on the other hand do not yet have an atomic submarine although Jane's reported that three others are now under construction in Soviet dockyards.

**U.S. Has New Projects**

In addition the United States is pushing ahead with construction of nuclear-powered warships including missile frigates and a guided missile cruiser and a destroyer.

But Russian technology which produces the Soviet and intercontinental ballistic missiles now apparently is concentrating on new and more deadly warships, Jane's reported.

### Reds Call Presley Cold War Weapon

**BERLIN, Dec. 15 (UPI)**—East German communists attacked Elvis Presley as a "cold war" weapon yesterday and said Soviet new youth would not be trapped by the "modern Pied Piper of Hamelin."

The official communist party newspaper Neues Deutschland printed a picture of the rock 'n' roll singer as a teenage German girl he has been dating in Frankfurt.

The headline over the picture said "cold war weapon."

The paper denied reports in the West Berlin press that Presley, now on maneuvers with the U. S. 8th armored division in West Germany, was popular among young people behind the iron curtain.

# Clutch Field Goal Downs Browns 13-10 and Giants Force NFL Title Playoff

The New York Giants, busy proving you can go a long way with spirit, strong defense and a crippled kicker, are slim 11-10 choices to defeat the Cleveland Browns next Sunday in a playoff for the National Football league's eastern division title at Yankee stadium.

Pat Summerall, who hasn't kicked all last week because of an injured right leg, booted a 49-yard field goal with only 2:17 to go Sunday on the same field. That kick, which drove through a falling snow, provided a 13-10 victory and a playoff game for eastern honors and the right to enter the Baltimore Colts in the NFL championship game Dec. 22.

Cleveland began Sunday's contest leading New York by a game and scored a victory of a tie to win the eastern crown for the eighth time in eight years.

The Browns appeared determined to make a runaway of the game, but a clutch field goal by Lou Oza after that and New York's defense powered on three Cleveland possessions and a controversial play called by Coach Paul Brown to win and stay "alive".

The oddsmakers rated so even that the underdogs tabbed the Giants to win 11-10 favorites in the "early line" for next Sunday's game. Cleveland is playing at home. A New York manager said there would be no betting on Sunday but strictly "for betting." "If you want to bet on the Giants, you put up \$5 to the bookie \$5. 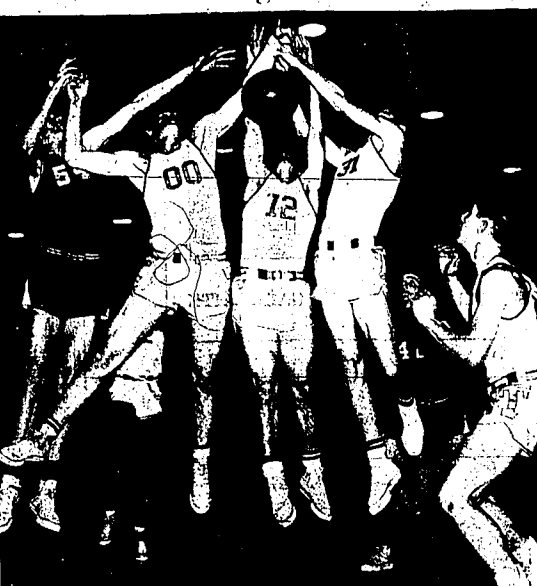
