## NATO Foreign Ministers Turn Down Soviet West Berlin Plans

PARIS, Dec. 16 (AP)—The foreign ministers of the Atlantic pact countries today flatly rejected Russian pressure on Berlin but held out the possibility of high-level talks with the Soviet Union on East-West problems.

The Western leaders agreed, however, that such talks could not be successful under the threats of any Soviet ultimatum on West Berlin. U. S. Secretary of State Dulles told his colleagues in the North Atlantic pact that Soviet Premier Khrushchev will not risk war over Berlin.

### Canada Waits With Decision For More Jets

OTTAWA, Dec. 16 (AP)—The Canadian government prepared to have a defense force take over the Canadian air force's defense job in Canada. This is one of the factors the government will consider next year when it decides whether to order the purchase of new CF-100 jet fighters. Questions have been raised about the cost of pouring money into a fighter plane when missiles are coming to the fore as defensive and offensive weapons.

Cost, Estimated

Prime Minister John Diefenbaker has estimated that 100 Arrows would cost about \$90 million dollars. More than 100 per cent of this cost would be covered by the federal government. ### She Survives Cold Night in Wrecked Car

MORRIS, Ill., Dec. 16 (AP)—No one saw the auto skid, slam into a snow bank, then topple upside down into an eight-foot ditch.

And no one heard the feeble cries of Mrs. Loretta Dunn, who struggled vainly to free herself from the wreckage.

She's Not Protected

Her cloth coat offered little protection against the below-zero cold and Mrs. Dunn, 56, was wearing no shoes.

The minutes following the accident at 10 p.m. Sunday stretched into hours. Still no one came.

At dawn, Arthur Forster, 33, driving his milk delivery route, spotted the wheels of Mrs. Dunn's car in the ditch. He rushed over. Mrs. Dunn was conscious, he said, but then lapsed into a faint.

Fingers, Feet Frozen

Doctors at Morris hospital said she was suffering from shock and exposure, possible fracture of both legs and partially frozen fingers, feet and face.

Mrs. Dunn, told police that she lost control of the car when an oncoming truck splashed mud and snow on her windshield, blinding her vision.

WASHINGTON, (AP)—First business forecast for 1937 started out pretty rosy, but there's a catch. It's the threat of creeping prices and inflation.

Dr. Emerson P. Schmidt, director of economic research for the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, says a "definite recession" is predicted for 1937. It was one of the shortest of the year.

Dr. Schmidt predicts gross national product at the annual rate of \$60 billion dollars for the last quarter of 1936— a record high. It says it will fall to \$57 billion by the end of 1937 and cross the \$50 mark in 1938.

The U. S. Chamber rounded up a panel of eight business experts for its annual forecast. Gloomiest of the bunch was George B. Eaton, president of the National Association of National Tool and Die Manufacturers.

He foresees only a 1.5 per cent increase in business over 1936. This is below 1937, which was average for the previous five years.

**Supreme Court Directs Lower Court to Rule on Racial Cases**

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP)**—The supreme court yesterday directed the lower courts to rule on the validity of Tennessee's law requiring racial segregation on streetcars and buses.

In a three-judge district court in Memphis, the lower court had ruled that the law was unconstitutional. The supreme court yesterday directed the lower court to rule on the validity of the law.

In dismissing the suit brought by O. E. Evers, a Negro resident of Memphis, the lower court said there was no actual contact between the white and colored citizens in the use of the streetcars and buses.

The court said Evers boarded Memphis bus April 26, 1935, just after the law was passed. Evers was not represented by a class of colored citizens who use the streetcars as a means of transportation.

In reinstating Evers' suit, the supreme court said the fact he "must have boarded this particular bus for the purpose of instituting this litigation is not significant."

When he boarded the Memphis bus, Evers was told by the driver to sit in the rear. When he refused, two Memphis policemen ordered him to go to the rear, get off, or be arrested.

Evers left the bus and was arrested. He was held for 24 hours in the city jail. He was then released on \$1,000 bail.

The court held Evers' suit should be reinstated, it is entitled to a hearing on the question of whether there was actual contact between the white and colored citizens. The court said it will decide whether the law is unconstitutional.

**Gifts for the Child**

How blithely the words trickle off the tongue—frankincense and myrrh.

Like a great deal that surrounds Christmas, the words "frankincense and myrrh" are used to describe the gifts presented themselves to the Child bearing gold, frankincense and myrrh.

The first gift—gold—has come down through the years with all its original meaning. It was gold it was worthy of the Babe in the manger.

What about the other two?

They have quaint names which represent something precious and a perhaps that's enough.

But an enterprising reporter went out during the height of the Christmas rush and tried to buy some frankincense and myrrh in the stores.

He didn't get very far. The harried clerks through his desperate pleas. One asked, "What color is it?" and another, "Who makes it?"

He couldn't buy any.

The frankincense and myrrh brought by the kings evidently consisted of suitable gifts because in those ancient days they were rare, had considerable beauty for the senses and had religious backgrounds.

They were probably compounds of fragrant resins scraped from trees and shrubs in far-off Africa and southern Arabia.

Frankincense contains a volatile oil and burns with a bright white flame. It was used by ancient Egyptians in religious rites and was one-fourth part of the Jewish incense used in the sanctuary.

Myrrh was somewhat similar and also had been used by earlier people in the temple incense. It was valuable also as an unguent and perfume.

Both were believed to have medical properties and were applied for a wide range of ailments.

Just like the first gift of the kings—gold—the other two are still with us, though many may not know it.

Myrrh's principal use is in dentrifices and perfumes. Its medical heritage comes down through its use as an ingredient in tonics.

Frankincense is still harvested in the same way it was in those long-gone days and is imported from the country. Its commercial name now is obblanium. It is still the most important incense resin.

If the great star today summoned us to the lowly manger what would we bear which would compare with these treasures of old?

Our gifts of life and the things which are precious to us have changed so greatly that it would be hard to conjecture.

Probably there is nothing in material things which could be laid in the straw by the child. Rather it would be something of the spirit.

Perhaps, our own celebration of His birthday is the most appropriate gift. We may be giving it each year when this blessed day arrives. In Christmas we embody our aspiration to perfect the better things in our nature—generosity, consideration for the less fortunate, reverence, peace, good cheer and thankfulness.

Those gifts, during this age, are far more to be treasured than the gold, frankincense and myrrh of old.

**SEVERE HANDICAP OF FRONT RUNNER**

Should all of these claimants show up at the 1940 convention as favorite sons, and be able to control that convention, it would be a severe handicap for Kennedy to run.

SHELLEY, Dec. 16 (UP)—The occupants of Shelley home will be able to ignore any atomic bomb blast that might come along because the first bomb-proof house is nearing completion in Shelley, 20 miles east of the atomic energy commission's reactor test area.

### Stricken Girl Is Dead After Weeks' Ordeal

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 16 (AP)—A 16-year-old girl who was devotedly cared for by her family and friends for several weeks died Sunday.

Wanda Sue Hardy, Vine Grove, was born in this city. She was only 14 when she was stricken with a severe ailment which she had for several months. She was blind in one eye and by the time she was 13 she could barely see. She stopped gaining weight.

Her mother never lost her delight in her daughter and in the big old house her father built for her in the back yard.

"It's a rarely seen situation," a physician who attempted to restore her sight through surgery said.

"She could have a congenital defect in the growth process, or a blood vessel may have burst in her brain when she had whooping cough."

Many Gifts Received

Newspapers reported her story in the past few days and poured in to the girl's family. But the struggle was not only physical but also financial.

Wanda Sue was in hospitals several times. Her mother had a nervous breakdown. Her father, James Hardy, sold the family home to provide for her care and was ready to sell his second car when his coworkers at Ft. Knox made up a fund to provide for her expenses.

I tried to read myself to sleep the other night by reading an article written by a sleep authority, and ever since I have been rolling and tossing like a freighter in a typhoon.

My usual 10 hours have been cut to eight, and I am beginning to show it in the face. I'm getting thin, in my double chin, and my eyes are losing their attractive puffiness.

The sleep authority's method had me in its clutches, and I can't resist trying it every time I go to bed. It consists of four or five steps, and each step gets me wider awake.

The first thing to do, the authority advises, is to think of the prettiest thing you have ever seen—a sunset, a painting, or a rippling brook.

Right off when I try this, I recall the striking finish of the fifth race at Saratoga in the late 1930s. Every night I had, including train fare back to New York, was riding on a horse named Blue, and at the 16th pole he was fourth, but coming on.

The memory of Blue's stretch run, which got him up to win in a photo-finish, not only wakes me up, but puts me on my feet, yanking and screaming. And just thinking of that interminable wait for the picture to come down from the judge's stand, gets me so keyed up I'm lucky to get to sleep by 4:30. Blue's number on the tote board was far

and away the prettiest thing I have ever seen.

If step No. 1 doesn't put you to sleep, step No. 2 is in order. This requires the recall of the best taste one ever had. As soon as I start this sleep goes straight out the window, headfirst.

Memoirs of food gallop through my head. Wild strawberries and clover cream, in Ireland. A fish chowder in the galley of a fishing boat after a day of trolling for sail and tarpon.

Deer liver, pan-fried, early in the morning. Lefse, left out for a day of hunting. Crisp littlemouth black bass and hot biscuits after a day of fishing. Just good, black coffee in the morning. Swedish pan-cakes in Stockholm.

By the time I have recalled a dozen or so tastes, there is nothing left to do but get up and raise the ice box, if only for a bite or two of cold steak and a glass of milk.

Usually I am so awake at an odd hour at midnight when I get to step No. 3, which calls for recalling the most pleasant thing one ever touched.

That's a hard one, and makes a fellow sit up and think.

There's that folded dollar bill, tucked away in your watch pocket. That's what you don't know you had. That's a mighty good feeling when you're stony.

The bottom feels mighty good to your feet, too, when you have been swimming out too far, and your legs and arms are just about to quit. When your toes touch ground, you wouldn't swap the feeling for anything else.

I never have gotten around to step No. 4, which is to recall the most pleasant smell you have ever smelled.

By that time I am up and shaving, and ready to start the day's work. Sleep, of course, but up!

### Eisenhower Talk of Economy Is Looking Thin, Says Writer

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (U-P)—How high is up? Or, what's President Eisenhower's idea of big spending? That's the question that's been asked the day after the Republicans' election disaster—his projected against what he called big spenders among the Democrats.

He told the newsmen his last two years in the White House would be devoted to economy.

But government spending under his administration has been going up steadily since 1953 and this year is running at a record pace—nearly high of nearly 90 billion dollars.

And the deficit—the difference between what the government gets in revenue and its expenses—will be about 12 billion dollars, according to official estimates.

One of the main reasons for the deficit, of course, was the recession, which reduced individual and corporate income and thus meant a drop in tax revenues.

But yesterday, after a White House conference with Eisenhower on his programs for next year, Republicans congratulating him for going away figuring that spending next year will be around 80 billion again, but they said Eisenhower's determination to balance the budget—meaning to make spending no greater than revenue—possible and may do so, it's quite an act, especially with no indication of any move to boost taxes.

But the GOP leaders challenged heavy spending in congress to go along with the balance.

This repeated Republican tactic—of referring to big spenders in congress while Eisenhower's administration keeps spending at a peace-time high—is beginning to look thin and sound monotonous.

It's just a hope and a guess that Eisenhower can spend 80 billion and balance the budget too.

If the economy continues its upward movement next year, the government could get more revenue than this year. But, even so, will it be enough to match the outgo?

Twelve days ago the No. one tax man in congress—Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D. Ark., chairman of the House ways and means committee, where all tax changes start—said he expected government revenue next year to be around 78 billion dollars.

That would mean two billion less in revenues—and therefore a continuing deficit—below the 80 billion spending Republicans said Eisenhower is planning for next year.

Sen. Styles Bridges, New Hampshire, chairman of the Senate Republican Policy committee, said after yesterday's meeting with the President, "I think they (the Eisenhower administration) will submit a balanced budget."

He added that if a balance is up or a deficit increased, it will be on the "shoulders of the wild spenders in congress, and there are plenty of them."

### "Solar Sail" to Propel Space Vehicles Is Claimed Possible

LOS ALAMOS, N. M., Dec. 16 (AP)—Los Alamos scientists say that if they were turned loose they could rig a "solar sail" to propel space vehicles with power from the sun. Such a vehicle, they say, could probe the region between the Earth and Jupiter or cut the mile or more trail now in stock and completed in 18 months.

They say it could be propelled into space by existing, tested rockets. Once launched into the vacuum of space it would spread its sail to the sun's rays and travel indefinitely under solar power.

The subject is a result of what is called "pure research." Theodore Cotter, a scientist leading the group considering the problem, has been working on the idea for a considerable time, even though the laboratory is primarily concerned with atomic energy development.

What's needed is a go-ahead from either the atomic energy commission in Washington or another federal agency concerned with development in space exploration.

Cotter said a trip to Mars and back again, for example, could be made in 2½ years and there would be virtually nothing that could go wrong to disturb the sail's trip.
