The Expected To Stay Away From Battles

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (UPI)—President Eisenhower is expected to have a hard time of it in the impending GOP vs. conservative struggle for GOP leadership of the senate, sources said today.

The President was reported hoping to name a Republican as acting senate Republican and to settle the leadership problem without an open split and present a solid front for the beginning of the new congress.

The battle was shaping up between Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, R-Ill., and the yet-to-be-named "liberal" candidate for the senate GOP leader's post being vied for by departing Sen. William F. Knowland, R-Calif.

Dirksen Rejected

The insurgent liberal bloc was described as rejecting compromise senate leadership in which Dirksen and Sen. Styles Bridges, R-N.H., chairman of the senate Republican Policy committee, are key figures.

"I still want to avoid a fight and would like to see Dirksen named as chairman of the senate Republican Policy committee," it was up to this bloc.

Dirksen has been known to the senate as an "assistant leader" for the past two years. He said yesterday he was "definitely a candidate" for the leader's post, but despite the liberal uprising.

Kuchel Will Run

Meanwhile, Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel, R-Calif., said he was not an avowed candidate for the job, but "honored" to be mentioned and would run if nominated.

One version of the compromise leaders offered the liberals would name Kuchel the senate post, and give increased representation on the powerful Policy committee plus better committee assignments.

Informed sources in the "liberal" bloc indicated that Sen. Dirksen, R-Vt., probably will be the group's nominee to challenge Dirksen for the leader's post.

Dirksen Will Fight

Dirksen left no doubt in talking with newsmen that he will fight it out to the finish with his top spot. He has the potent backing of Bridges.

The Illinois Republican said he felt his record of support for the Eisenhower program earned him a promotion.

On the basis of long service to the public and the party, I feel very modestly that I deserve the consideration of my senate colleagues," Dirksen said.

Dirksen said he had no candidate for whip, but indicated that Kuchel would be acceptable.

"Dirksen and I are the best of friends," he observed.

The "liberal" bloc plan to pick their slate Dec. 30 after two weeks of campaigning for support.

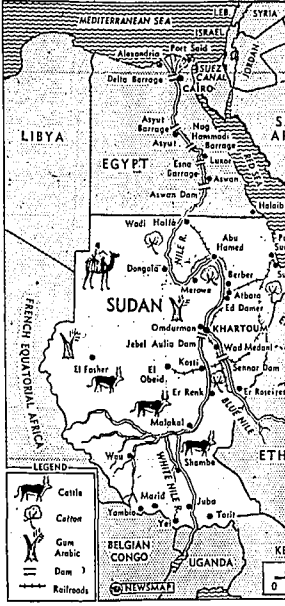

Demos Move to Push GOP on New Policies in Latin America

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Democrats are moving in to push the Eisenhower administration toward a more aggressive and perhaps more active policy in dealing with Latin America.

The move was made public last week when the administration took a public position on the subject. The shocking revelation given by the administration last week that it was planning to cut off aid to the country's relations with its southern neighbors are far from happy.

The problem is complex. Mainly, so far, the administration has been talking of studying the problem.

This week Sen. John Stennis, Massachusetts, one of the leading possibilities for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1960, gave a speech in Puerto Rico. In it, he offered to introduce a program for strengthening U.S.-Latin American relations.

While not giving Latin America a clear-cut policy, he was critical of this country's performance.

"This speech cannot help but win him national realization that this America. It can't do him any harm either among Latin Americans in this country or in the other hemisphere."

Democratic Sen. Hubert Humphrey, Minnesota, also is running for his party's presidential nomination. Introduced last week he gave a major speech on "Latin America."

Sen. George Smathers, a Florida Democrat who is known as a friend of Latin America, has said he expects to introduce in the next Congress a bill to create the post of undersecretary of state for hemisphere affairs.

On top of this, a senate subcommittee headed by Sen. Wayne Morse, Oregon Democrat, has taken the task of looking into U.S.-Latin American relations. It now is making a study and may hold hearings next year.

The bipartisan nature of Democrats and Republicans in Congress is hardly in areas of the world where communism is a menace, especially where it is or might become a military menace.

CHANGE IN PRIMARY LIKELY

It's good news, to say the least, that an Associated Press questionnaire indicates a majority of the members of the 1959 legislature favor a change in Idaho's primary election law.

Eighty-five per cent of the Republicans and 73 per cent of the Democrats who responded to the questionnaire said they favor some kind of a change. A run-off primary was the choice of the majority of those favoring a change.

Under such a system the top two candidates would enter a run-off primary. If the first primary failed to give a candidate a majority all votes cast.

Of course there is considerable speculation as to what action the legislature will take. Some legislators talk about a return to the old convention system. Their argument is that it would force both political parties to assume greater responsibility in the selection of candidates who would contribute to better state government.

Over the years, Idaho would have had better state government and representation in Washington with a run-off primary to weed out undesirable candidates. And in some instances the state would have been spared a lot of humiliation.

There would be another important advantage of a run-off primary. Undoubtedly, more qualified candidates would consider running for public office if they knew their qualifications would be the determining factor.

REASON FOR DEWEY DEFEAT IN 1948—Second place finish

Second place finish only were given to most of their sections—Oregon, Bricker, Ohio; Warren, California, and Nixon of the same class.

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Communists Everywhere—Are Cruel Says Priest Jailed Five Years by Red Chinese

Communist Father Joseph Patrick McCormack, a Maryland minister who was arrested in Peking, China, last week, says he was held in a Red Chinese prison for five years serving only 10 months of it. He is speaking in Chicago today.

By JOSEPH P. MCCORMACK, M.M. (Written For United Press International)

Since my release after five years in a Red Chinese prison, people are continually asking me about the Chinese communists. They say, "How can you say that all communists are men without regard to their nationality—whether they're Russian or Chinese?"

Mostly they're cruel. The communists that I mixed with during my trial and while in prison had but one thing in common: their national characteristics as well as their cruelty.

Most of the ordinary people of China are frightened to death because of the secret and the police organization which has a finger on every man, woman and child.

The four was a big thing, let me say, with high powered rifles and all kinds of official clearance. Even though we knew we were being watched with photos taken of us in clean white shirts, eating good food and smoking cigarettes—I must say it was a nice switch from prison life.

I wanted much impressed with their building program. Most of it was a sham, like a set for a Hollywood movie. The one exception was the big bridge at Hankow, which they're working on for several years.

But the leniency that all this is being accomplished by slave labor. I saw thousands of workers at the bridge site—prisoners of war, their bodies thin and worn carrying heavy loads that you would put on the backs of men.

The whole judicial system, from what I saw, is a farce. When the police pick you up, you know you don't have a chance. Arrest is synonymous with death.

If all started for me when the communists became storming through Manchuria after World War II. I was up there, then, as vicar capitular of the Maryland diocese. Peking. The wind was blowing against us, and as the communist movement grew stronger, the persecution of the church became more intense.

The crucial point, in my own mind, was the slaying of an elderly Chinese priest in January 1948. For two winter months he had been in an unheated prison, covered only by burlap rags, and half starved.

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

31 Cities in Ohio Have Income Tax

COLUMBUS, O., (UPI)—Residents in 31 Ohio cities and six villages will feel the pinch of a new income tax in 1959. The tax is estimated to raise \$52,500,000 in city income taxes from their pocketbooks this year.

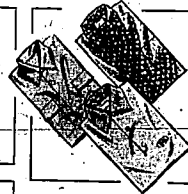

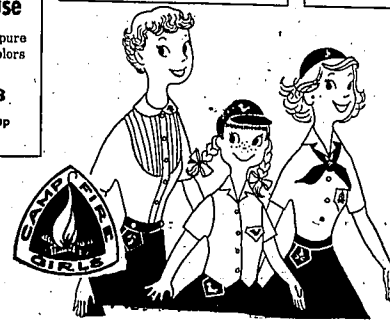

River Hearing Nets Changes In Power Bill

PORTLAND, Dec. 17 (AP)—Three major changes in the Columbia River Development corporation bill were recommended by its sponsors, Richard Neuberger, D. Ore.

Neuberger said yesterday that, as a result of suggestions made at hearings in four states last week, he will recommend these changes:

Have the five-man board of directors, not the president, appoint the general manager.

Emphasize that the corporation is authorized to own, build or lease hydro-electric power dams.

Make terms pertaining to cooperation with non-federal power projects more flexible.

Neuberger said the hearings had increased his faith in the proposed amendment of the public power preference clause, preventing any one state from having an unreasonable percentage concentration of power sold by the regional corporation.

"If one state cannot monopolize the power, then it inevitably follows that there will be ample energy for all four states," Neuberger said.

Court Is After Reason Judge Misses Salary

BOISE, Dec. 17 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court ordered State Auditor Nelson Swensen yesterday to state by the end of next week his reasons for not paying Judge F. Tway, Idaho state judge for the Ninth district, his salary as district judge.

The action sets up a court test of a dispute arising from two laws passed by the 1957 legislature. The first created a Second Circuit judge for the Ninth district and split the district in two.

Judge Appointed

Gov. Robert E. Smylie went on the assumption the legislature meant to create one additional judge, not two. He appointed Willard Burton, Anthony, as judge of the new district. The second judgeship in the Ninth district was left vacant in the elections this fall. Burton was elected. Tway, an Idaho Hills attorney, ran and was elected as the second judge in the Ninth district. The other judge is Henry Martin. The district now consists of Bonneville county alone.

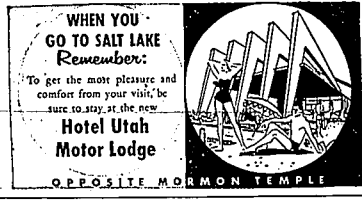

Idaho Legislature Will Again Be Considering Lobby Subject

BOISE, Dec. 17 (AP)—The Idaho legislature, which got into an uproar over lobbyists two years ago, will be asked to consider the subject again after it meets next month.

In 1937, the excitement stemmed from an article in the Idaho Challenge, a temperance paper published by the Allied Civic forces. The article dealt with the amount of liquor which the AGP said was being used in lobbying on behalf of liquor interests.

Rep. C. Robert York, R., Canyon, introduced a bill requiring that all lobbyists register, as they do in Washington, D.C. The bill was held up in the house printing committee.

York says he plans to introduce it again.

The people have a right to know, he says, "who comes up to talk with their legislators and who is paying them."

Secretary of State James H. Young, a former legislator, expresses the view of many veteran lawmakers on the subject of lobbying.

"I am always glad to talk to somebody who is well informed on a subject, a man who can't balance these arguments against other factors should not be in the legislature to begin with."

Al Beattie, who has lobbied for organized labor in some sessions, cracks for the lobbyists.

"The legislature has so little clerical help that it is absolutely impossible for a member to read every bill, let alone analyze it and reach

conclusion. His best method is to talk to people on both sides and get their information and their arguments," he said.

Idaho has no lobbyist registration law now, although one lobbyist said to have registered by mistake during the past session. The only lobbying law on the books was passed in 1897.

It says in part, "It shall be unlawful for any person, employed for a pecuniary consideration, to attempt personally and directly to influence any member of the legislature to vote for or against any measure pending therein, otherwise than by appearing before the regular committees thereof, when in session, or by newspaper publication, by public addresses or by printed or written statements, arguments, or briefs, two copies whereof shall first be deposited with the secretary of state."

The law provides a maximum penalty of six months in jail and a \$200 fine, in recent years, at any rate, nobody has been prosecuted.
