WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—The National Committee for an Effective Congress praised Nelson A. Rockefeller last night as the man whose political emergency "has had a liberating effect on everybody."

The group tossed bouquets at Vice President Richard M. Nixon for what it described as his return to the "rank and claw school," and Sen. Lydon B. Johnson, D., Tex., for his advocacy of what it called a program that is only "warmed over new deal and fair deal with millions being overheard."

He is Tagged

It sought to tag President Eisenhower as a lame duck, aging, retiring executive who has withdrawn from active leadership of the country and the Republican party.

The group described itself as non-partisan and says it gives non-partisan support to congressional candidates it feels "meet its standard of quality and ability in the area of quality and ability in the field of public service." The committee, according to a spokesman, has made up of about 40 members. It aids thousands of others with similar interests make financial contributions to the organization.

\$150,000 Raised

Marjorie Rosenblatt, the committee's secretary, said the group raised more than \$150,000 during the last campaign, spending it on a directed list of 13 Democratic and 10 Republican candidates, including Sen. Joseph P. Kamp, Pennsylvania.

"We don't think the Democrats won the last elections so much as the Republicans lost them," Rosenblatt said.

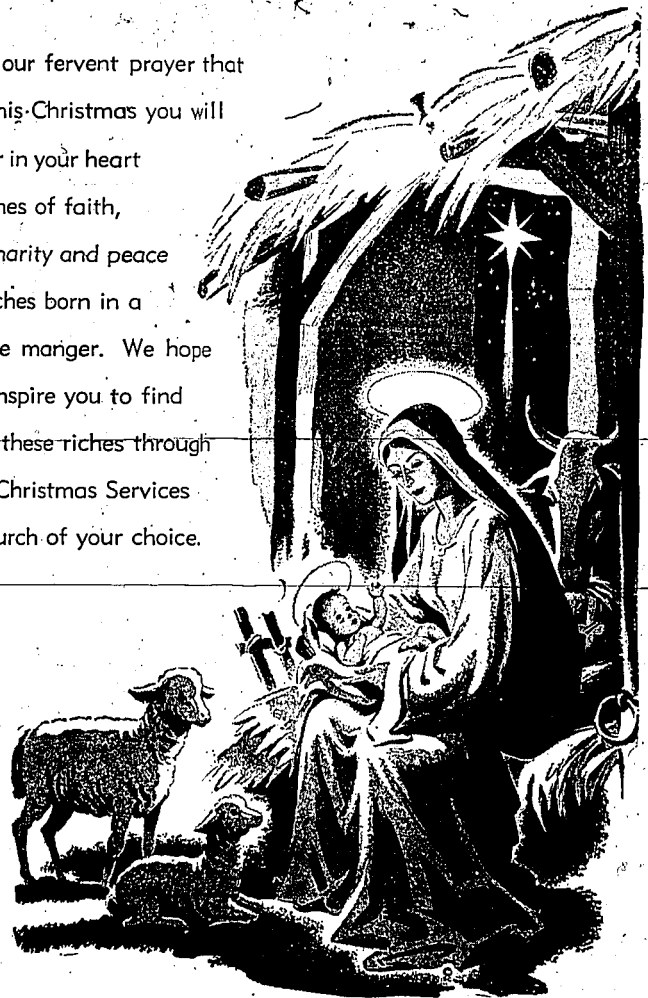

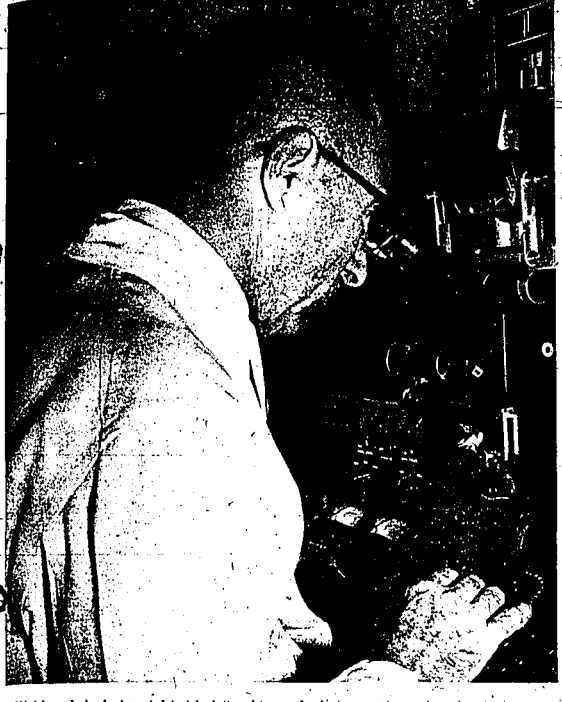

\$1,360,000,000 Are Saved by Americans in Christmas Clubs

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (UPI)—Some 12 million Americans saved up more than \$1,360,000,000 in nearly 8,000 clubs this year as members of a mutual savings system known as Christmas clubs.

It is logical because, contrary to all the rules of financial good sense, while the banks who run the clubs pay the people who put their money away in them make anything on the deal.

Under the plan a person deposits from 25 cents to \$50 each week for 18 weeks. At the end of the year he receives a check for the full amount pooled.

But the depositor receives no interest on his money, and in some cases has to pay the bank for the privilege of saving.

In turn, the bank makes no profit on the odd arrangement since it doesn't hold the money long enough to make investment profitable. In fact it costs banks anywhere from \$250 to \$425 just to handle a single club account for one year.

What then is behind the phenomenal success of the Christmas club? It's all psychological, said Archibald Gillies, vice president of Christmas Club corporation.

"People feel once they have joined the club they have an ironclad obligation to keep up payments, although all they have done is make a contract with themselves," Gillies theorized.

"People," he said, "also have a guilt complex about taking out their money before the end of the year, and are embarrassed to explain to the bank why they need the money right away."

Gillies, whose firm started the first successful Christmas club in 1910, said clubs around the country have increased their total volume of annual savings by approximately 30 per cent in the past 10 years. He estimates that this year's volume of savings increased three per cent over 1957 with the average member saving \$100.

The savings club executive said that banks benefit indirectly through the thrift plan. He explained that, approximately 30 per cent of the club's savings find their way

nitted fewer than 10,000 new depositors.

A year later the bank started its own Christmas club and today has 150,000 members.

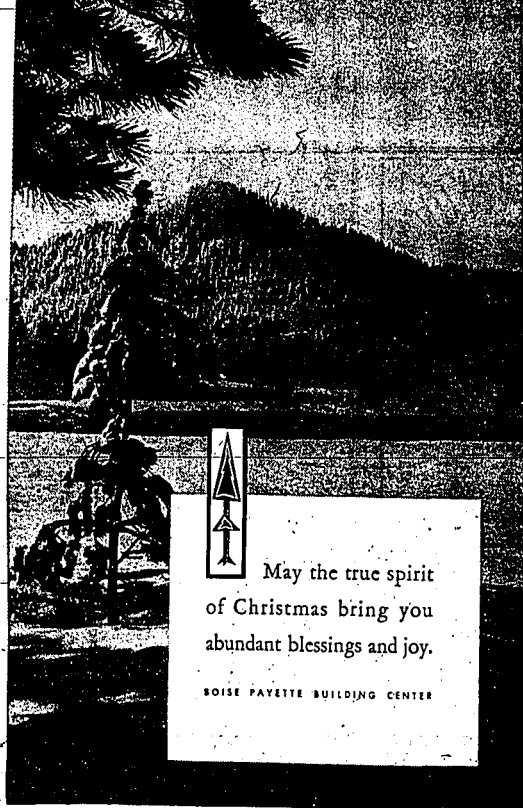

Pope Asks for 'Unity, Peace' In His Speech

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 23 (UPI)—Pope John XXIII in his first Christmas message to the world, appealed today for "unity and peace."

The commemoration of the birth of Jesus does not cease to renew each year the announcement of the same doctrine and the same tone—unity and peace," he said in his 3,000 word message.

The pope spoke in Italian over Vatican radio, which later rebroadcast the speech in 20 languages. It was beamed to nations round the world, including those behind the iron and bamboo curtains.

Persecution Decried

He decried the persecution of Christians in communist countries, specifically mentioning China. He also appealed for the return to the church of those who had left, eastern churches whose members include more than 50 million persons.

"The birth of our Lord means the announcement of unity and peace on all the Earth, a renewed plea of good will placed at the service of order, of justice, of fraternity among all Christian peoples, all together moving in a common desire of comprehension, of great respect of the sacred liberties of collective life in the triple religious, civil and social order," the pope said.

Peace is the law that this invitation be heard everywhere. In many parts of the world, there are no stars for this invitation, namely where the most sacred nations of Christians are being either suffocated or extinguished, wherever the spiritual and divine orders are shaken and the cohesion of supernatural life has been weakened. It is said to notice the beginning of evils whose testimonies are common knowledge.

"Even if we wanted to be kind in judging the gravity of the atheistic and materialistic situation in which some nations are being engulfed, and under which they are groaning, the slavery of the individuals and the massed forces of thought and their works is undeniable," the pope said.

Tower of Babel Mentioned "The sacred Bible tells us of the tower of Babel which was built in the first centuries of history in the plain of Mesopotamia and which ended in confusion."

"In many regions of the Earth even now, and they will surely end like the first. But the illusion for which man is thus, and that is the illusion of his own power, is still present. And this is the danger of our time. Only the unity and the companionship in the strengthening of the spiritual and true human values of Christian fraternity will be able to stop the great incumbent dangers."

'Old Man and Sea' Named Best Movie

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (AP)—"The Old Man and the Sea" today was named the best American movie of 1958 by the National Board of Review of Motion Pictures.

Tracy, star of the film, was voted best actor by the 49-year-old non-profit organization. He also was cited for "The Last Hurrah."

The board named Regis Bergman as best actress for her role in "The Inn of the Sixth Happiness."

John Ford was chosen as best director for "The Last Hurrah." "Tadzia's Father Panchal" was named best foreign film.

2,000 Withdraw

BOISE, Dec. 23 (AP)—More than 2,000 teachers have withdrawn from the Idaho Teachers' Retirement system in a six-month withdrawal period which expires Dec. 31, Director H. F. Wilmore said yesterday.

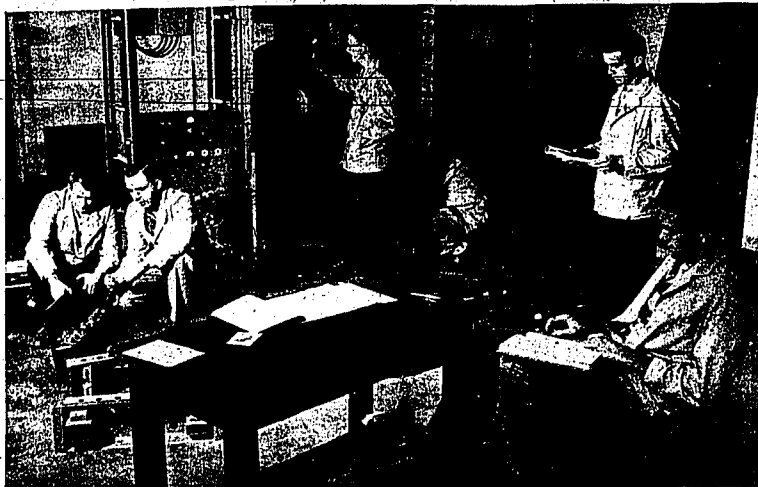
This loss between 4,000 and 5,000 who chose to stay within the system. The six-month period was set up by the 1967 statute, which made federal social security available to Idaho teachers.

Idaho State College Uses Television Transmitter Given by Station in T.F.

IDAHO STATE COLLEGE, Pocatello, Dec. 23—A TV transmitter which cost more than \$40,000 new, a gift to the college from a Twin Falls station, will be used in the school of trade and industrial education at Idaho State college to help train electronics technicians. The composite 800-watt transmitter was given to the college by Southern Idaho Broadcasting corporation, which operates KLLX-TV. Gordon Glasman, general manager, made the presentation.

William H. Shifflett, instructor in television, said the equipment is now valued at \$5,000 to \$7,000. Electronics students will rebuild the transmitter as part of their training.

Most of the equipment used in the college's television department was built by Shifflett and students. It dates back to the fall of 1941 when Shifflett and a student, working after class hours, started in broadcasting a television picture to a home three miles from the cam-

pus. World war II interrupted the experiment, but when Shifflett returned in 1946 work commenced on new TV equipment. By 1950, with two years of closed circuit broadcasting experience, the electronics classes revamped equipment, bringing it up to professional standards.

Students have built four image orthicon cameras and two film cameras, plus other equipment necessary for the closed circuit operation. Equipment was moved into the new Trade and Technology building in 1959, only a short time before valued at \$200,000 but built at about a fourth that cost, was gutted by fire of undetermined origin.

"The new building included a 60 by 60 foot studio. Broadcast of educational programs to Pocatello elementary schools were made from the studio on a regular basis last year.

Primary mission of the department is training of technicians to meet a growing demand. The transmitter given by KLLX-TV will be used in this training program and has the potentiality of use as a broadcast transmitter.

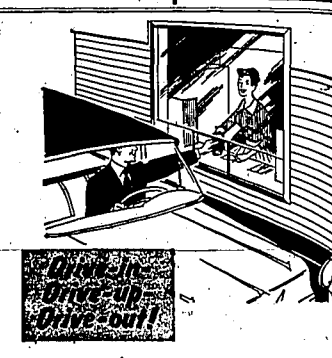

Timber Sales In State Drop By 2 Millions

BOISE, Dec. 23 (UP)—The Idaho land department disclosed yesterday its receipts during the past biennium were two million dollars less than the previous two-year period.

A drop in timber sales was blamed by State Land Commissioner Arthur Wilson on a recession in the timber business.

In his report for the 34th biennium ended June 30, Wilson said yesterday that total cash receipts for the period were \$5,302,874. For the biennium ending in mid-1956, he said, total receipts were \$7,322,947.

A comparison showed that timber sales for the biennium ending in 1958 totaled \$3,142,150. For the previous two years, timber sales were \$5,232,760.

Money from the sale of timber and of state lands goes into endowment funds of public schools and several state institutions. Only the interest from these funds may be used for the support of the institutions.

United States Is Scrapping Big Bombers

TUCSON, Ariz., Dec. 23 (AP)—An armada of the largest war planes ever built is being assembled at Davis-Monthan air force base here to fly again.

The air force is scrapping most of its mighty B-29 Superfortresses, the only aircraft capable of dropping hydrogen bombs on targets in Russia and returning to U. S. bases without refueling.

Why? The price tag has made them obsolete as the aging wood and balsam wood used by the bygone bombers.

The B-29 is capable of carrying 84,000 pounds of bombs, flying non-stop from Maine to Japan in 23 hours and carrying a camera large enough to photograph a strip of land 30 miles wide and 200 miles long.

But this dinosaur of the air age is no match for supersonic missiles. When the last of the B-29s arrives at Davis-Monthan storage yard, the furnaces will reduce them to aluminum ingots.

Davis-Monthan officials declined to say how many B-29s are to be scrapped but explained that only a few at Carswell air force base will remain in service. More than 300 were built.

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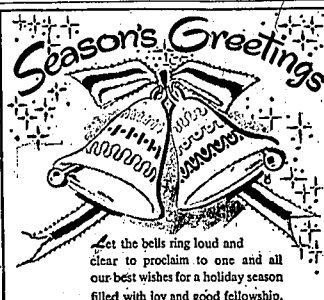

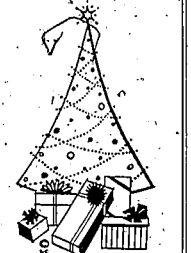

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 23 (AP)—To anyone but Dan Vison, preparing Christmas gifts for 500 children would be a big chore.

Uncle Dan's eyes light up when he talks about the new camp he is building on 320 acres of beautiful virgin timberland.

A large brick mess hall is going up now and soon work will start on the first of a large number of cottages. A large lake has been built for swimming and fishing.

Like all his other projects, this one won't cost anything.

Uncle Dan, with an enthusiastic and persuasive manner, goes straight to the business leaders and asks for what he wants—money but sup-

"These kids come from good homes and have what they need. I want to entertain the kids who haven't had anything, and those who might have been in some scrapes with the law."

"We get them out here and prove to them we don't want anything from them. They're suspicious at first, but a day or two with all their camp cat and playing among the beautiful trees, and they believe."

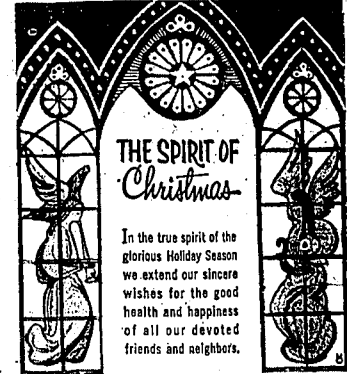

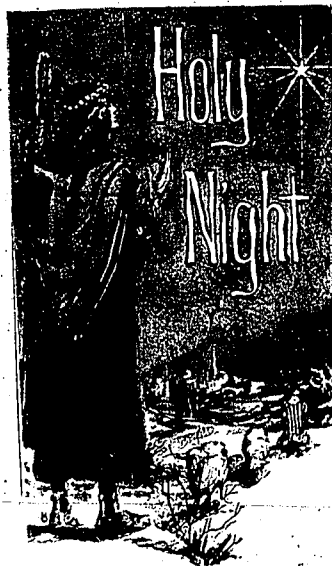

Top U. S. Clergymen Tell How to Rescue Christmas Story From Commercialization

By United Press International

For several years churches have been imploring Americans to "keep Christmas." Many Christmas families are ready to cooperate. But how? What can one family do to rescue the birthday anniversary of Christ from commercialization... to make its real significance clear to children?

United Press International put the question to 10 of the nation's leading clergymen. Their answers, as could be expected, varied widely. But there were several common themes.

Virtually all of them emphasized the importance of worship—not only attendance at church services, but worship in the home, with the whole family taking part.

"Read the Christmas story from the Bible on Christmas eve," counseled The Very Rev. Francis G. Sayre, dean of Washington cathedral.

"Let the father of the family explain to the children in simple words the meaning of Christmas," said the Rt. Rev. James A. Pike, Episcopal bishop of California.

Catholic Archbishop Joseph P. Rummel, New Orleans, recommended "recitation of the rosary every evening in the family circle, and the preparation of a beautiful

and companionship." Bishop Christopher J. Wetton, Catholic diocese of Springfield, Mass., offered this suggestion about gifts:

"Get those to whom you are giving gifts to know that these gifts are being given to honor the birthday of the Christ child, and do imitate his example of opening the heart to others."

The Rt. Rev. Thomas K. Gorman, Catholic bishop, Dallas-Fort Worth, said care should be taken that Christmas cards, as well as gifts, have "true Christian significance. Greeting cards that have no religious theme—and especially the so-called 'comic' cards that have shown up in recent years—are entirely inappropriate," he said.

Several ministers urged that Santa Claus be de-emphasized. The Rev. John T. Tavarides, Greek Orthodox cathedral, St. Sophia,

Wash., said Santa Claus has been so thoroughly "identified with commercialism" that his symbolic value has been lost.

"The secular society of our time is constantly tempted to build up Santa at the expense of Christmas," said Dean Sayer. "This is because Santa is non-controversial and lends himself readily to commercial exploitation. The result is the virtual destruction of Christmas as a religious festival. I advocate playing Santa down."

Mrs. Irving A. Deblane, director of the family life bureau of the National Catholic Welfare conference, suggested that Santa Claus be gently replaced by the real-life Saint Nicholas (whose name pronounced "Smiler Klaas" by early Dutch immigrants to America, gradually evolved into the modern Santa Claus).

Saint Nicholas was a Christian bishop who lived in Asia minor during the fourth century A.D. He distributed gifts to children and the poor, at Christmas. His gifts, always anonymous, were intended as birthday gifts to the Christ child who,





He's Been in Jail 63 Years

when he became too old to work all day long he sits beside his bed, staring at nothing. Besides him is his pipe and a can of tobacco. He still looks healthy. His skin is smooth and pink and his hair and eyes gleam. He is seldom sick and his appetite is good. He does not seem to remember much. To all questions about old friends he says only, "Yes, yes, very fine man."

He does everything by instinct. It is a thunderstorm darkens his cell, he undresses and goes to bed—darkness means bedtime. If he becomes hungry, at whatever hour, he walks the few steps to the table and sits awaiting to be served—hunger means mealtime.

In his youth before he came to prison, Dalton had a reputation as a good fighter. He was the son of the superintendent of a large firm; his mother was a mental patient. As a young man, he had a police record for minor misdemeanors. According to records of his trial, Dalton and an older man named Dan Sullivan planned to rob a Cranton real estate man of a gold watch and a roll of bills the realtor loved to flash in local bars.

The records say they lured him to the outskirts of town. The victim was beaten and jumped on in the fight for the money and died the next day, after identifying his assailants.

Sullivan was arrested a few days later in New York. Dalton was caught three years later in Atlanta, Ga., where he had been managing a prize fighter. He was tried and

convicted of murder during a robbery. From the first, Dalton was a docile prisoner. His behavior record at the prison is absolutely clean. He worked in the machine shop, then the prison laundry. After he had established a reliable reputation, he was allowed outside the prison walls to work on the prison farm.

His last letter was from an unidentified woman, mailed from Atlanta in 1928. Since then he has received an occasional envelope containing a coin from someone who has heard about him, or infrequent gifts of cigars or tobacco.

Martin sits all day in the sun at the windows by his bed. For him, words are dead. But through the dull days—each identical and stretching into years in the prison he has built for himself—he smiles, apparently pleased by the parade of imaginary pictures in his head.

Man Who'll Be 90 Christmas Eve Has Spent 63 in Prison

CRANSTON, R. I., Dec. 23 (AP)—In 1895, a horse-drawn wagon rolled through the gates of Rhode Island state prison and came to a busy hall. Martin Dalton—handsome, blue-eyed and 26—climbed down to start sentence for murder. Now, more than a half-century later, he's still in jail. On Christmas eve he will be told he is 90 years old. It will be his 63th birthday anniversary he has observed behind bars.

Dalton was eligible for parole 30 years ago in 1923. But he was frightened by a previous visit to the "outside." His family and friends were gone. Clothes were different. Automobiles

scared him. He had no job, no money, no place to go. Prison, on the other hand, was home. It provided food, shelter, medical care, accommodations, entertainment of a sort and tobacco. He refused to accept freedom.

Now he sits vegetating in the prison hospital, where he was moved

Despite Growing Inflation, Food Cost In U.S. Expected to Be Lower in 1959

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (NEA)—There's good news ahead for the housewife—and the man of the house, too—in 1959.

Despite signs of growing inflation, food prices will be down, even coffee, should hold around its present low figure.

There'll be a number of new easier-to-cook foods on the market. For one, potato flakes (flakes) should be just pour in a pan, stir, heat—and presto, mashed potatoes.

Fruits, vegetables, poultry, eggs, turkeys, ham and pork should be more plentiful.

The cost of suits, socks, dresses and stockings should stay about the same, or go up only a little. So should prices of washers, dryers, vacuum cleaners and other household goods.

Only flies in the ointment: medical bills and house rent probably will continue steadily upward. Shoes will cost more in 1959.

These are the combined views of several scores of economists scattered throughout the nation. They have brought or sent in reports to the department of labor, commerce and agriculture in the past few weeks in an attempt to piece together what's in line for 1959.

NEA Services met and talked with a dozen of these men and women in order to give housewives and husbands this rundown on what's in the price cards for next year.

The price of ham and pork is expected to drop sharply early in 1959. Poultry, fresh vegetables and eggs should be cheaper. Beef prices may be about the same as this year, but there should be a larger supply of the better grades. Milk and other dairy products will continue plentiful; prices are likely to be about the same as in 1958.

There'll be an even larger supply of potatoes. They'll be cheap. After Jan. 1, there will be more fresh oranges and grapefruit, the way things look now. Prices should be considerably lower than they've been since last winter's Florida cold snap cut down citrus output sharply.

Increasing costs of marketing and processing will force cereal food products a little higher next year.

Despite increased labor costs, there are no signs of appreciable increases in women's clothing prices. Experts say the increased simplicity in women's fashions makes this hold-the-price-line possible. But prices could jump if 1959 styles should turn more elaborate. And who can forget that now?

Sweaters and knitwear will cost a little more next year. Underwear prices will remain about the same. Men will fare as well as their wives. There's a hint, too, toward lower prices in the outfitting for men's wool suits. Wholesale prices are down a little. There's no feeling, of course, whether these mild savings will be passed on to the consumer.

There'll be a lot more meat, women's and children's wash and wear in the stores in 1959. It will be of better quality. It will look better after washing without ironing.

Heavy demand will tend to push these wash and wear prices up, but strong competition between manufacturers is expected to keep these price rises small.

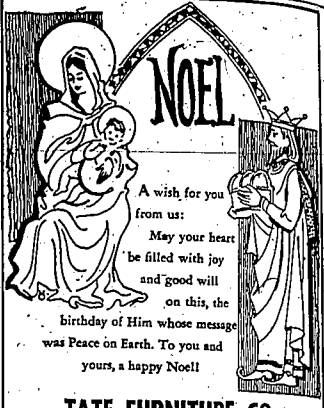

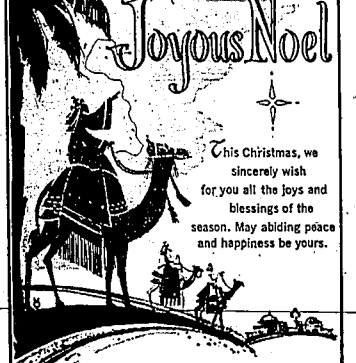

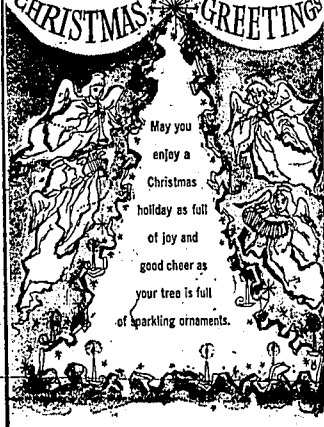

28 Times-Ago, Arizona Editor Was Cause of 'Santa's Death'

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 23 (UPI)—You know, of course, about the New York Sun editorial "Yes, Virginia, There is a Santa Claus." Well, this is the story of the editor who killed Santa Claus.

For 28 years, John McPhee has been trying to live down his innocent little lie.

This story is as well known to Arizonians as it is "Yes, Virginia," but it is more poignant.

It's Revived Again

Columnist Don DeSoto, Arizona Republic, revived it again, to tell it to 100,000 new Arizona residents who have moved here since the last time it was published.

In 1936, McPhee was editor of the Mesa Journal-Tribune. Mesa was a sleepy little town of 2,000 residents then.

McPhee was asked by civic leaders to use the power of his paper to stimulate interest in the pre-Christmas parade.

The editor was a man of ideas. He came up with a novel one—hire a barnstorming aerial circus man, dress him as Santa Claus, and have him parachute into the middle of Mesa's main drag during the parade.

Word Goes Out

The word went up—Santa was coming to town in a parachute.

But on the day of the parade, when the streets were packed, McPhee went to the airport and found his barnstormer loaded on baggage-corn. This was a horrible state of affairs for a man about to play Santa Claus to children in a town of strong religious faith.

But the show had to go on. McPhee, as stated, was a man of ideas. He hustled back to town, got a store dummy, put it in the Santa Claus suit. He held the pilot to crotch the town, prop the Santa Claus in the door of the plane so the crowd could see, then push it out, pull the rip-cord and let it parachute into a designated field.

Switch Planned

There, McPhee himself could hurriedly take the dummy out of the Santa suit, get into it himself and come into town for the grand moment of the Christmas parading.

The pilot made three low passes over the parade route. Santa was ready to "jump." The eager eyes of little children strained skyward. Came the moment—out of the plane came Santa Claus. A cheer rose from the crowd.

Then it happened. Down, down, down, plunged Santa. Thud, into a muddy lettuce field. The parachute failed to open.

Children Cry

"Heart-stick," McPhee returned to town to try to explain. The streets had become deserted. Children cried behind closed doors. Angry faces of men, shocked faces of women, stared at him.

That was 28 years ago. McPhee now is coordinator for a Navaho Indian public works program.

But, to those people in Mesa on that day 28 years ago, McPhee became the man who killed Santa Claus.

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
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

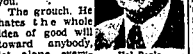

New Research To End Atomic Mishap Opens

HELENA FALLS, Dec. 23 (UPI)—A \$200,000 research facility to prevent atomic accidents at the national laboratory at Idaho, the Atomic Energy Commission has announced.

The special power excursion reactor No. 3, commonly known as the AEC reactor, is one of a series of reactors in the AEC program to find out the reasons for atomic accidents and to develop ways to prevent them.

The reactor is highly enriched uranium and is to provide a wide range of conditions, temperature, pressure and neutron flux rate.

It is expected to be used to conduct significant tests to better understand the reasons for atomic accidents and to develop ways to prevent them.

Potatoes Top List Potatoes head a fat-sized list of vegetables on the best buy list, wearn fields, spinach and cooking greens such as collard and kale. Good buys also are on top in endive, escarole, radishes, cabbage, lettuce, onion, sweet potatoes, peppers, eggplant and broccoli.

DUBLIN, Dec. 23 (UPI)—The children of Ireland began celebrating Christmas the last week of November when they welcomed Santa Claus to Dublin.

The white tile walls and ceiling of the Lincoln tunnel under the Hudson river are washed down every two days.

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

Cole, founder of London's Victoria and Albert museum, had so many friends and relatives that it was like an annual chore. Then one gray December day in 1843, he had a bright idea — he got an artist friend to design a greeting card to replace the letters. The Christmas card was born. It is big business.

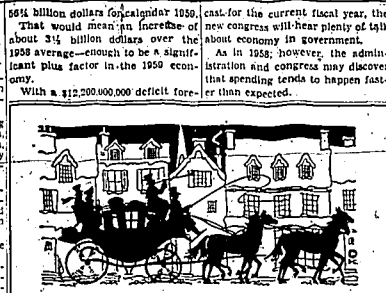

Experts Tell Uncle Sam He's Spending More Than Slated

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP) — Spending has a way of happening whether you like it or not. Ask Uncle Sam. His budget is deeper in the red than ever before in peacetime. Yet even as he plans to economize, experts tell him he's spending more than his budget indicates. For the first time since last summer, government economists have increased their estimates of future federal outlays for goods and services. These are the estimates that give an advance clue to the government's contribution to national output. The fact that they have again been raised indicates federal spending will continue to add zip to the business recovery for at least the next six months. Beyond next July the outlook is clouded because it will be several weeks before President Eisenhower sends congress his new budget for the 1950 fiscal year that begins July 1. A lot depends too on what congress does to that budget. The odds are, however, that federal spending will remain a significant prop under the economy throughout 1949. In the current fiscal year, the government is spending roughly 80 billion dollars. This compares with about 72 billions in the last book-keeping year. About two-thirds of this spending is for goods and services—military, trucks, office machines, buildings, pay for federal employees, etc. Money spent in this fashion moves directly into the economy. Six months ago, government economists estimated that federal purchases of goods and services would reach an annual rate of 55 billion dollars by next June. Now they say it probably will be closer to 50 1/2 billions by June. Even if congress and the administration hold the line on spending in fiscal 1950, a mere continuation of the projected April-June level would produce an average of 56 1/2 billion dollars for calendar 1950. That would mean an increase of about 3 1/2 billion dollars over the 1948 average—enough to be a significant plus factor in the 1950 economy. With a \$12,200,000,000 deficit forecast for the current fiscal year, the new congress will bear plenty of talk about economy in government. As in 1948, however, the administration and congress may discover that spending tends to happen faster than expected.

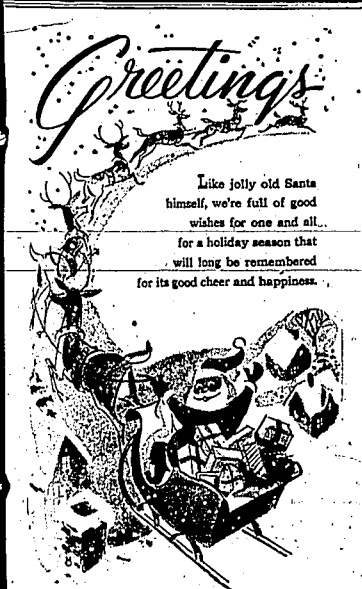

Unless Dec. 25 happened to fall on a Sunday, Puritan families went about their daily chores as usual. Schools and stores remained open. There were no stockings hung by the chimneys, no feasting, no gift giving.

Children of this stern and unsmiling period were not without toys, however. While they were expected to be "seen, not heard" and required to do their share of the chores, toys were not unknown.

But they didn't come from a department store. The father in a century and a half ago had the



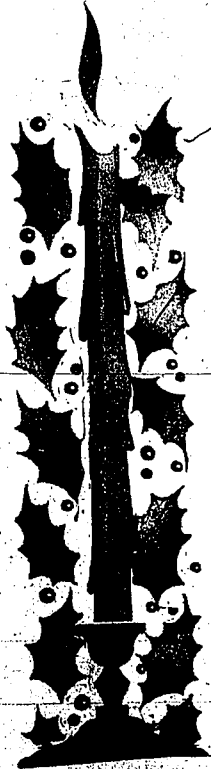
