TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28—Secretary Ezra Taft Benson looks confident that the so-called "kitchen bloc" in Capitol Hill rather than the legislators from farm states for at least a partial solution of food-fiber shortages, for instance, which will cost the nation more than 7 billion dollars a year, many farmers are making more money as a result of the "kitchen bloc" than they are as "illers of the soil." Big corporation producers are collecting hundreds of thousands of dollars in subsidies for leaving their acres in an unproductive state. Benson seeks to minimize incentives for the growers by offering government price supports. They were inaugurated as an emergency measure to feed our armies and peoples, including the Russians, but they have been continued for political reasons—namely, to hold the normally Republican "farm vote."

FARMERS' PRICES SUPPORT NO POLITICAL BLOC. However, despite the improving farm income, based partially on federal subsidies, the price support system has not been a political boon to the GOP.

Farm states voted regularly for FDR, who began this formula of supports. Harry S. Truman's support of the farm program was one of the reasons in part to the farmers' defeat. And last month again, they deserted the Grand Old Party.

As a result of these politico-economic changes, Benson dares to believe that he may carry many "kitchen bloc" votes in the next election. He is a proponent of reduced payments to the farmers. He hopes that smaller incentives for major crops will lead them to take out of the government the subsidies which Eisenhower described in 1952 as a "free market place."

At the same time, Benson takes a hedge on the "kitchen bloc" and its feminine consumer constituency. They are not due entirely to the administration's giving out of subsidies. The "kitchen bloc" ladies of the kitchen must share the responsibility.

THAT "BUILT-IN MAID SERVICE"—Housewife, the media outlet of the kitchen bloc, is the woman for what he calls "built-in maid service." They are subsidizing, in effect, the middlemen processors, packers and other people who take the food from the home almost ready to serve without burdensome preparation.

He would also note that the increasing differential between what the farmer receives for his products and what they cost at the meat or grocery store.

Thus does the over optimistic Secretary Benson expect to meet his problems at next month's session of Congress. He is confident that the "kitchen bloc" of agriculture has relied on the "kitchen bloc" and their wives in the cities for support.

DE GAULLE'S VICTORY

If Charles de Gaulle would have run in an American presidential election the way he did in France, he'd have swept 48 states with their total of 53 electoral votes.

Indeed, he would have been the voting for the first president of France's new Fifth Republic but most Americans hardly realize that he had a couple of opponents.

In burying his Communist and Socialist adversaries, de Gaulle once more proved impressively great is his hold upon the French people today.

Few elected public figures in the world ever get the chance he did this year to win a sort of triple crown in politics.

First he gained unanimous endorsement of the new national constitution which he proposed. Then the French elected an assembly which, while too heavily weighted to the right for de Gaulle's taste, nevertheless is marked chiefly by support for him.

Now his success has been capped by his election for seven years to France's new, greatly strengthened presidency.

Manifestly de Gaulle today holds in his hands all the ingredients of supreme power and authority. Yet no one who knows him expects him to abuse this broad grant.

Since he returned to the French helm as premier last June, the general has shown a remarkable ability to act forcefully while staying within democratic bounds.

Widely appreciated today as a man of well-considered, but decisive action, with a resourceful, inventive mind, de Gaulle has become for France a chance no Frenchman has had in decades.

If he now fulfills even a reasonable measure of the promise his stature and power seem to portend, not only France but all the free world will be the gainer.

France's great adventure, its dramatic quest for stability and freedom from chronic problems, has entered its high phase. It hardly needs to be necessary to say we wish de Gaulle and the French the very best of good luck. For as their fortunes go, so do ours.

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

The three greatest cartoons of the year are those by Pegler. "Dropping the Pilot," published in Punch, London, John T. McChesney, and "The Big Game," which ran in the Chicago Tribune, and "The Roosevelt Review," which appeared in the Washington Post. The managing editor said "It was very good, is it? We'll try again to get a good photograph."

The news knocked me for a loop and I said he would have to get a picture of Teddy and turn the rules on the front page, could not possibly do justice to the subject. However, I said I would try.

"We had a fire in our morgue and no good picture of Teddy was available. So about five o'clock, the managing editor came back and I showed him what I had done. He said, 'You've got a horse waving farewell and headed for the long haul trail.'"

The managing editor said "It was very good, is it? We'll try again to get a good photograph."

But in another hour he said we would use the drawing for the first edition and would I make something for the last edition?

I made an in memoriam with underlines and crepe and sadness and the cartoon of Teddy was pulled. But I forgot to cancel the shipment to the syndicate of about 125 papers. I took the train out of Des Moines and in Chicago was surprised to see "The Long, Long Trail" on page one of the Post.

"In New York the Tribune-editor didn't like 'The Trail' very much and asked me to draw another for the funeral. I drew several but finally, in desperation, they decided to use 'The Trail' for the great surprise there were hundreds of demands for the right to reprint."

"The original is in the files of the University libraries in Iowa City. Moreover, Laura Fraser sculpted a heroic bronze relief, which is now on a wall between two stories high and I stood off and drank in this beautiful view dozens of times. I came out of Minnesota and, of course, we were better stock than Roosevelt, who were mostly illegitimate pit of illiterate cabin girls and wayfaring wagoners, but we had some folklore in common."

John McCutcheon did not know he had done unusual work that day so he let the original drawing and the copy get away. Years later at his happy home on Treasure Island, off Nassau, he told me sadly that some man to whom it had been lightly given had never offered it back.

Ding, whose name is Jay N. Darling, thought he had done something poor and mawkish in his Roosevelt opus. His base was the Des Moines Register and Leader and being a stickler for tradition, he was a little behind schedule. So he locked himself in his office to turn out those political cartoons in one afternoon.

Senators Soon to Investigate Missouri River Power Issues

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28—Senators soon will investigate a potential electric power shortage along the Missouri river and a lawsuit filed by power users in upper and lower states.

A staff official of the senate indicated that the investigation is a situation which involves claims against the Eisenhower administration in Missouri and Nebraska. The states' power downstream to Republican congressional districts in Minnesota, Iowa and Nebraska.

There are claims also that administration officials have been assisting river electric cooperatives against each other in rebellion against a legal requirement that the co-ops be given priority on federal power. These claims have been denied.

Co-ops from Montana and the Dakotas and four cities, also preference power customers of the government, recently called for an inquiry.

They contend most of the power from the Missouri river is generated in the three upper states by the bulk of it is sent downstream in violation of federal law. They claim the Missouri River Commission, for use by groups in that area.

Representatives of co-ops in the Missouri states and the four North Dakota cities attended a joint session at a Dec. 9 meeting in Sioux Falls, S. D., saying:

"The full development of the electrical power resources of the Missouri basin is of the utmost importance to the preference customers of the basin area... and power allocations are now being made by officials of the federal interior department which will establish a permanent pattern of use of such power in the region."

"Therefore this group urges that proper inquiry be made to assure that the intent of the Mullikin-Mahoney amendment to the Flood Control act of 1944 is being followed in the management of the waters of the Missouri basin."

The North Dakota cities included Mandan, which has sought unsuccessfully to get federal power for a distribution system it plans to build. Mandan says it was denied an allocation on grounds it had no distribution system. Two co-ops had been told they would get allocations in anticipation of the construction of transmission lines.

The bureau of reclamation, which handles power from federal dams, has estimated customer demands for Missouri river power by 1953 will hit 1,782,000 kilowatts in Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa and Nebraska.

The bureau will be able to provide 98 per cent of the power demand it said in a report. Kilowatt distribution will include 273,700 in Minnesota, 135,010 to Iowa, 201,400 to Nebraska, 204,010 to South Dakota.

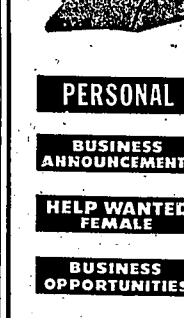

Teacher Asks New Laws for Public Work

CHICAGO, Dec. 29 (UPI)—An official of the American Federation of Teachers has urged Congress or state lawmakers in enacting laws on collective bargaining procedure for teachers and other public employees.

Charles E. Boyer, Minnesota public school president, said that the new laws should give teachers the right to pick their own representatives on school boards which "relegate teachers to second class citizenship."

Boyer spoke yesterday at the opening of the three-day mid-winter meeting of the AFT's executive committee. He said all workers except public employees can enjoy the provisions of either the National Labor Relations act or state labor-relations acts.

Minnesota, Boyer said, has a mandatory bargaining law for public employees which recently was enacted as part of the state's so-called "Education for All" law.
