





BIG AND SMALL INDUSTRY

Twin-Falls, it must be admitted, has not been towsuccessful in its search for new industry to round the city's economy. But that is not because of any lack of effort.

The industrial committee of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce has put forth a lot of effort, explored a good many possibilities and developed a number of "leads" which may yet bear fruit. But up to now, the results of all effort have been a little discouraging.

One thing has been accomplished by all this promotional work, however. It is quite generally agreed that it would be much more to the advantage of a community such as ours, to get a number of smaller industries employing from 25 to 100 personnel, than to concentrate on getting some major industry.

In the first place, it is no easy matter to et a major industry to locate here unless there is some primary reason for its doing so -an ample supply of a raw material for the manufactured product, an adequate labor supply, favorable transportation facilities, etc.

Then there also is the disadvantage of depending too heavily on any such major inlustry. When such an industry is forced to shutdown for any reason, even temporarily, it disrupts a community's entire economy.

With a number of smaller industries turning out different products, there is little like lihood that all of them will be closed down at once, which in itself makes for greater stability. There also is less likelihood of seasona slumps with a number of small industries, than might be the case with one or two larger concerns.

Quite often the point is raised that Twin Falls has lost out in the location of the socalled defense industries. Idaho Falls is cited as one Idaho city which has grown by leaps and bounds as a result of the government's atomic energy development in that vicinity.

Pocatello, on the other hand has had an unfortunate experience with a government installation which has played an important part in the city's economy.

Ever since the government's big naval ordnance plant was built in Pocatello as a wartime emergency, there has been the threat of its being closed down permanently. Now the navy finally announced that the plant is to be "disestablished" shortly, which means that nearly 400 employed will have to find work

Obviously this will come as a blow to Pocatello's economy—a development which would be even worse were it not for the fact that several other large private industries have located in that city in the meantime.

Previously, Pocatello had experienced the loss of a government-airport.

It may sound like sour grapes to point out there's an element of risk for any community depend too heavily on any government installation. But it's a serious risk, nevertheless, because there is no way of knowing when the government will close one or more of its major plants or dismantle them entirely.

During 1959 and the years to come, it would seem our safest bet is to concentrate on getting as many small industries as possible to locate in Twin Falls. That would give us far greater assurance of a rounded out economy, than might result from setting our sights too




