"Northwest to Fortune," by William Steffen, is the tale of a man's search for a practical route to the Far East.

"The Klondike Fever," by Pierre Loti, relates the tale of the life and death of the last gold rush.

"Writers of America," by members of the National Writers of America, is a collection of tales of famous frontiersmen; while a direct contrast to them is "The College Years," edited by A. C. Spectorsky.

Urges to Merge Was Strong in Recession; More Are Rumored

NEW YORK, Jan. 14 (AP)—The urge of the federal government, the government acts when, as in the steel industry, it believes there is enough during the recession and the merger proposal, it believes there will be a harmful lessening of competition. Rumors of still more corporate mergers are prime factors in motivating traders in the stock market.

This decade has seen about 2,000 corporate unions so far.

During the recession there was some merging of companies seeking to survive. Some had run up enough of a loss to make them attractive to more prosperous companies who could use these losses to offset their own profits in figuring income taxes.

Both the recession and the recovery have increased the competition factor in many industries. Some mergers have grown out of a desire to get the "excellent management or skilled engineers of another company."

A leading cause for mergers is to increase total capacity, in the belief that production can be made more efficient and competitive that way.

But the Central's president says his railway still has its eye on any other merger who might be ready to fall into its lap.

A striking number of mergers have taken place in recent months. The federal trade commission says it noted more than 900 industrial mergers or acquisitions of other types in 1958.

Only a few mergers get the crowd.

Red China Is Seeking More Goods, Foods

TOKYO, Jan. 14 (UPI) — Red China's financial and trade organizations have been ordered to step up their efforts to get more consumer goods to the mainland's 650 million persons.

The New China News agency has reported that Communist party workers at a recent national conference were told "to strive with revolutionary enthusiasm" for a greater turn-over in commodities and more commodity production to meet people's needs.

They were called on to encourage light industry and to promote a more diversified economy in the rural labor peoples that have now absorbed 99 per cent of China's more than 500 million peasants.

More Goods, Food Wanted
Expanded light industry would ensure the production of more consumer goods, the party workers were told, while more varied rural economies would guarantee "greater supplies of vegetables, meat and other foodstuffs."

A four-part program for 1959 was laid out for the financial and trade organizations, and three of the points emphasized consumer goods. These are the principal points:

- Help agriculture and industry take three big leaps forward.
- Encourage light industry "for the production of consumer goods and a diversified economy in the people's communes to ensure greater supplies of vegetables, meat and other foodstuffs."
- Plan purchase and distribution carefully "so as to meet consumer demands."
- Improve financial work in the communes, emphasizing accumulation of funds and distribution of needed materials.
- Greater Incentives Sought

This program is the latest in a series of recent efforts by the Peking regime to get sorely-needed consumer goods into circulation and to provide the Chinese with greater incentives.

The efforts were prompted by severe shortages that developed toward the end of 1958—as red China rushed headlong toward the conclusion of one massive project—a 200 per cent rise in steel output—and fumbled uncertainty in the first stages of another—the peoples commune system.

Official publications admitted that the frantic rush to meet steel targets choked transportation—so hopelessly that severe shortages of foods developed in major cities.

KING HILL, Jan. 14—Jerry Heath is convalescing at his home after being released from Gooding Memorial hospital. He was injured in a tractor accident last week.

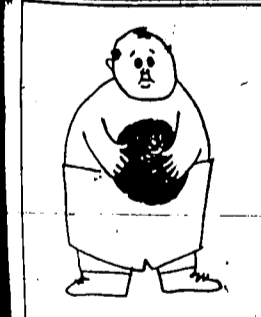

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Atomic Blasts Detection Bid Gets Support

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (AP)—Dr. Hans Bethe, a top-ranking nuclear scientist, said yesterday he believes a successful atomic test detection system can be developed despite difficulties with underground blasts.

Bethe made the comment to newsmen after testifying in secret before the senate-house atomic energy committee. The meeting was concerned with the East-West talks under way at Geneva on a suspension of nuclear tests.

Detection Said Difficult
A panel of seismologists reported recently that detection of underground atomic tests is much harder than was believed last summer when technical experts from Russia and western countries agreed in Geneva that adequate test detection was feasible.

Some members of the atomic energy committee have said they believe this makes it less desirable for the United States to enter any test ban agreement.

Improved Detection Hinted
Bethe said he is confident the 180-station network recommended last summer still could be made to detect all possible tests. He said the seismologists had some very good ideas for improved instrumentation to do this.

To a question about the possibility of the Russians conducting atomic tests in space, Bethe said a detection plan would have to be set up to meet this, too.

He said an observation satellite could be sent up under international auspices and that it could detect any such experiments in space.

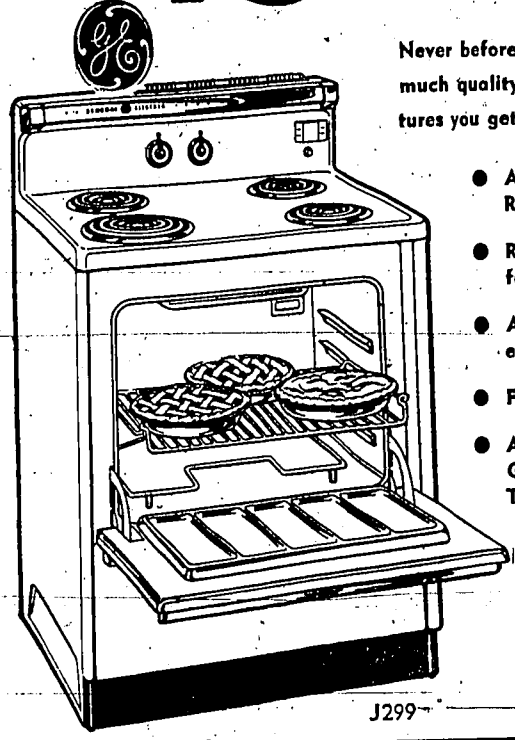

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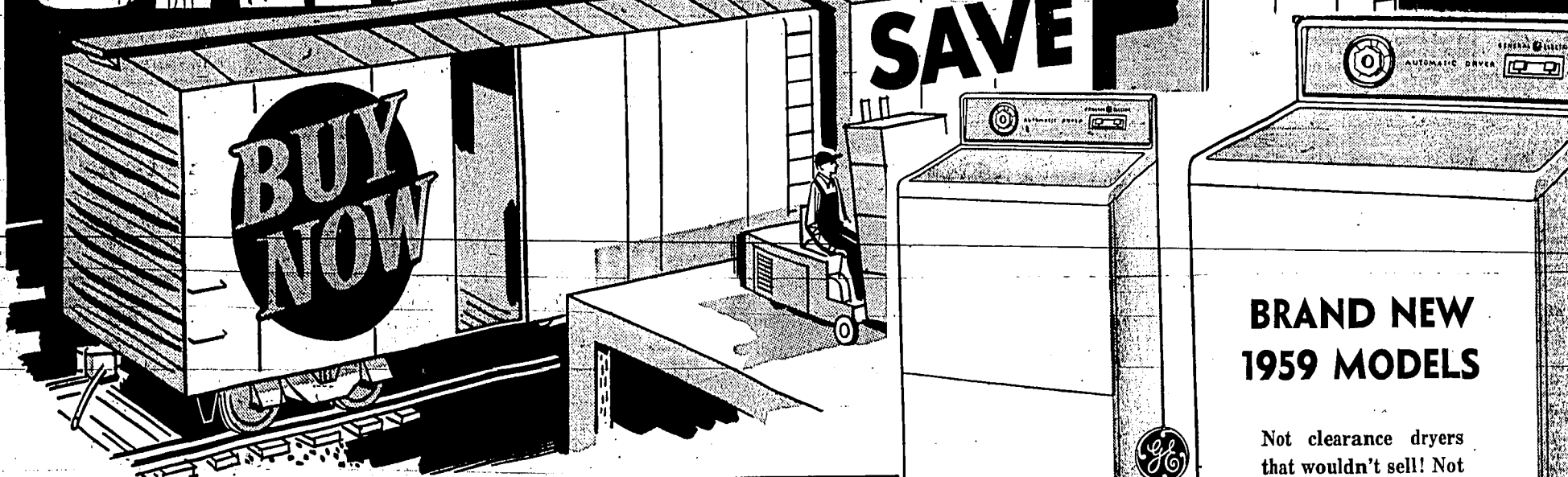

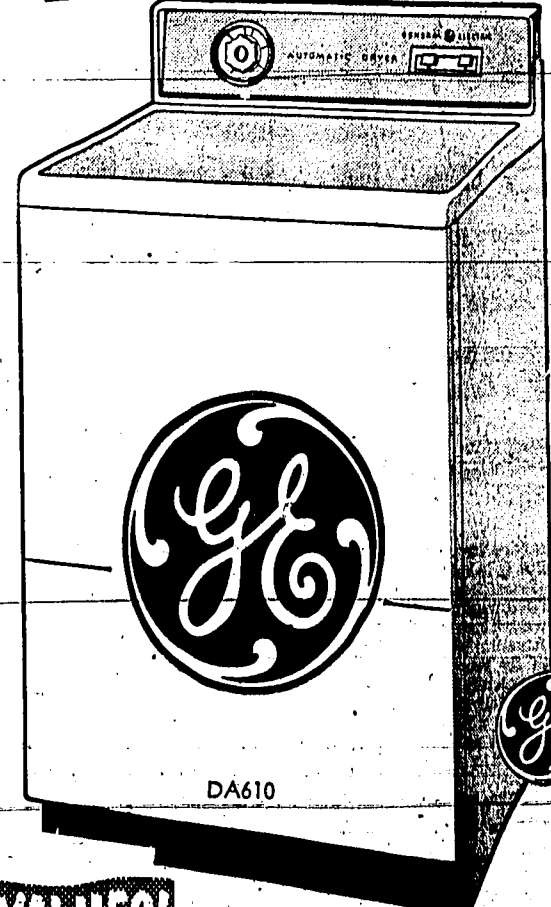

Unit Talks on Commuter and His Problems

CHICAGO, Jan. 14 (AP)—Here's a hopeful piece of news for commuters.

Many people in high places are thinking of ways to help you. It's a bad situation and the prospect is even worse. Motor vehicle traffic is approaching the saturation point in the scores of cities. And the main trend in the nation's growing population is toward the huge urban centers.

So 29 men—16 railroad presidents and 13 mayors and other city officials—got together yesterday to exchange ideas on how to solve the commuter problem. Most of the railroads contend they make no profit in operating the commuter lines.

Here are some of the suggestions: Government subsidies. New equipment to lure motorists back to the rails.

A federal agency to buy equipment and lease it to the rail lines or to lend them money to buy modern rolling stock.

Elimination of the federal tax on commutation tickets.

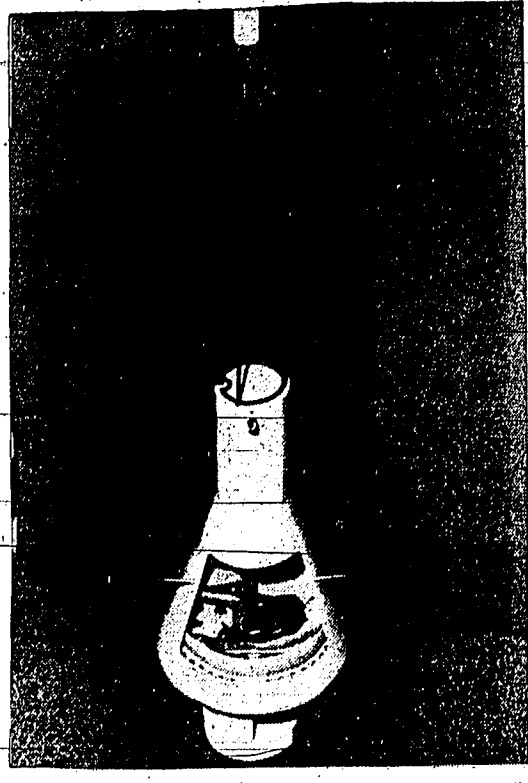
Provision for deducting commutation fares from federal income taxes.

Giving the railroads a better break on their taxes, allowing them more freedom in setting fares, adding or removing trains and closing unprofitable stations.

A new U. S. transportation policy that would encourage the growth of railroads.

A committee of 12 was appointed to meet within the next 30 days to start work on a program.

"Alcoholic Personality" Idea Gets Backing From Physician

NEW YORK, Jan. 14 (UPI)—A physician widely experienced with alcoholics disputes the growing scientific suspicion that there is no such thing as "the alcoholic personality." There is such a personality, says Dr. Robert I. Levy, but you can get confused by it, taking a number of forms.

This is no small matter. In the view of mind scientists. To them, the disease, alcoholism, is purely a disease of the mind, and if science ever gives up on efforts to blueprint "the alcoholic personality," there may never be a solution for this affliction of more and more people.

But some scientists have already given up. One said caustically that the only thing alcoholics had in common was that they all drank too much. Another remarked it was possible to find just about anything you wanted to find in any group of alcoholics.

Levy said the place to begin describing the structure of "the alcoholic personality" was at its foundation stones beneath the surface, and not with any of the weird personality patterns which could be erected on those foundation stones.

Those stones are unconscious needs, according to Levy. If those needs are of great intensity and if alcohol seems to lessen the problems which grow out of the needs.

Another need at the base of the "alcoholic personality" is a need to

return to the infant's way of experiencing life. Alcohol makes it seem (unconsciously) that "there is an available bountiful mother floating somewhere just out of sight," he said.

This is "a symbolic function" of alcohol, he said, and it is closely connected with another symbolic function. The first feeling of alcoholic stimulation gives "the alcoholic personality" this impression: "I feel pleasure. That is because I am lovable." Or it may go this way: "I feel pleasure. I have been forgiven."

"Feeling lovable leads to increased self-esteem, an increased sense of the integrity and usefulness of the body, and an increased readiness to receive love (drink) from others, as well as to give," he said.

Levy works with alcoholics in an alcoholism study clinic maintained by the San Francisco department of public health. His views on "the alcoholic personality" were a contribution to the Yale university center of studies on alcohol.

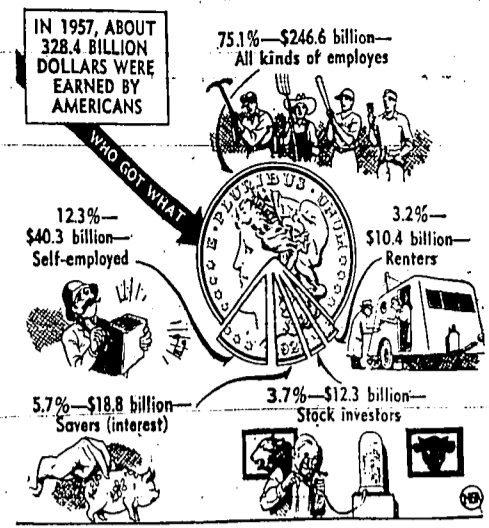

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Capital Owners Widespread CUTTING UP THE NATION'S FINANCIAL PIE



Nowhere in the world is the ownership of capital as widespread as in the United States. Preliminary figures show that in 1957 some 328.4 billion dollars in income (not including social security and pensions) was shared by Americans. As sketches illustrate, bulk of this money went to employees or the self-employed. Added together, this was 286.9 billion, or 87.4 per cent of the total. Payment for the use of savings (interest, dividends or rent) amounted to 41.5 billion, or 12.6 per cent. This latter group was made up, in large part, of the same people in the working category.

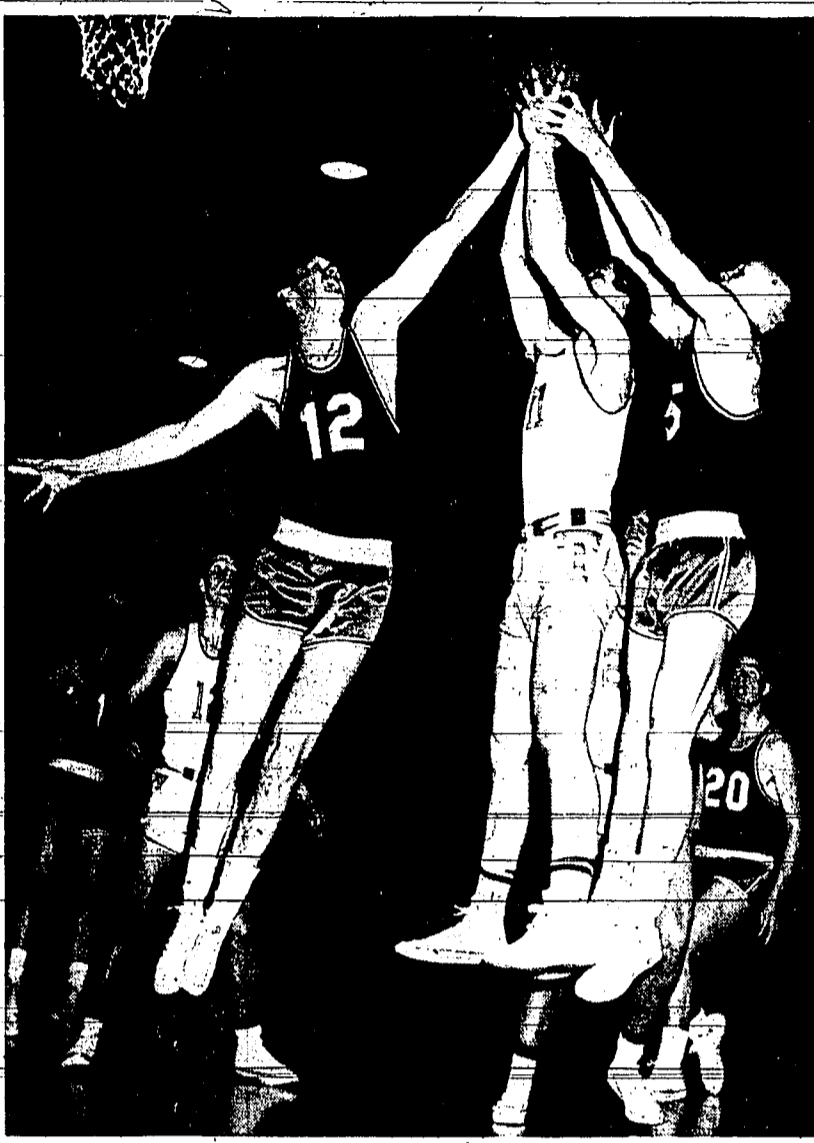

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Atomic Death Report Might Take Months

LOS ALAMOS, N. M., Jan. 14 (AP)—A spokesman for Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory says it may be weeks, or even months, before a complete medical report can be made on a radiation death Jan. 1.

Cecil W. Kelley, laboratory technician who attended high school in Halley and Caldwell, died of a massive dose of radiation received in an accident Dec. 30. Physicians said he received 10,000 roentgens of radiation. A lethal dose is about 600.

Operation Was Started
Kelley was starting an operation in a metal tank of 225-gallons capacity to recover plutonium. There was an overhead electric motor to drive a paddle to stir the mixture.

Another workman in an adjoining room said he saw a blue flash and heard a small explosion. He and a third workman took Kelley to a hospital.

The head of the plutonium recovery section said the accident apparently took place when the paddle motor was switched on.

Damage Done at Flash
Another spokesman for the laboratory said Kelley could not have saved himself by moving quickly after the flash, because the flash indicated the moment the damage was done.

Kelley went to high school in Halley and Caldwell.

Grandmother Kidnaps Baby



Mrs. Jean Iavarone, 43-year-old grandmother and mother of eight children of her own, has been charged with kidnaping baby Lisa Chlonchia from a New York hospital two and one-half hours after birth. Despite positive identification of the Chlonchia baby, Mrs. Iavarone continued to claim her; the younger ones are in foster homes and orphanages, apparently because she could not support them on her \$45-a-week salary as a department store clerk. She is now being held in a New York jail on charges of kidnaping. (NEA telephoto.)

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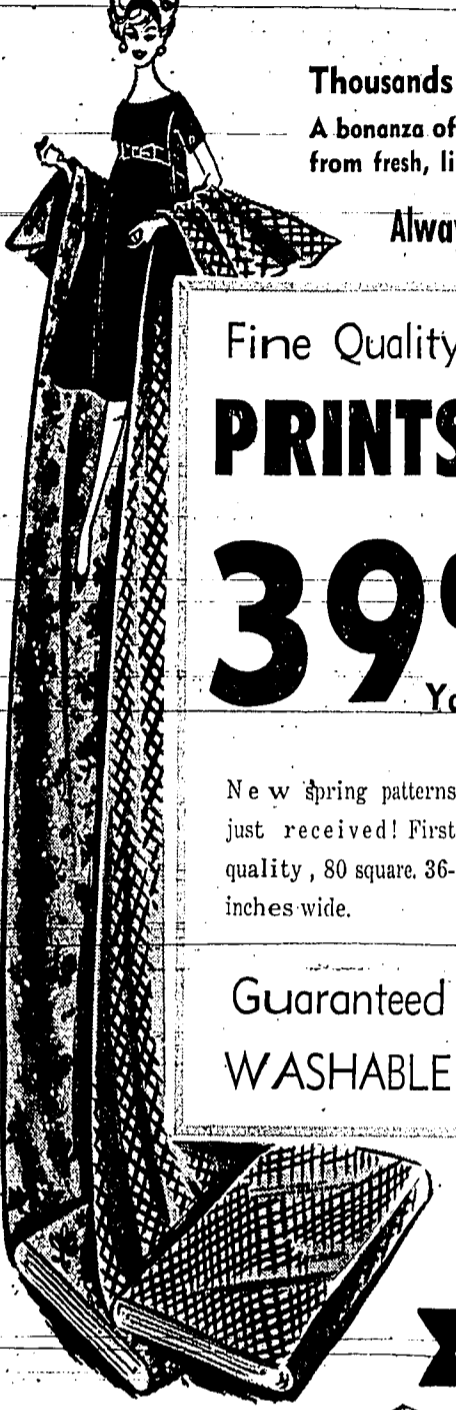
