A burning of the mortgage ceremony was held Wednesday night by members of the Twin Falls Grange at a meeting attended by the state Grange master, other state officers and guests from other Granges. Taking part in the burning ceremony were Clifford Davis, chairman of the executive committee; Irvin Bodenstab, master of the local Grange; Terry Sullivan, treasurer, and State Grange Master W. E. Adams, Eagle.

The Twin Falls Grange in 1950 purchased the old Park Lane school and moved it to its present location southwest of Five Points east. The building was added to and remodeled by members of the Grange at many work parties. On Aug. 30, 1951, the members procured a mortgage from Grange Mutual Fire Insurance of Idaho to finish the hall. The mortgage was paid off in September, 1958.

Island Leader Tells U.S. How To Sell Ideals

MANILA, Jan. 15 (UPP)—Philippine President Carlos P. Garcia said today the United States should concentrate on selling Democracy and American ideals in the area.

"The United States should not try to transplant the American way of life in Asia," Garcia said in an exclusive interview with United Press International.

"The United States should bring its ideals of Democracy and liberty to Asia and let them take root in the Asian environment."

Change-Said-Impossible He said the United States should not try to change the Asian environment. He pointed out that the Americans actually were in the Philippines 50 years and did not change the environment. He asked how Americans could hope to change other Asian nations by briber contact or by means of various short time programs.

The president said, "Americans are not well understood" in Asia. One specific reason he mentioned was the desire on the part of some Americans to make everybody over in the image of Americans.

Interpretation Role Claimed He said his country could play an important role in properly interpreting the United States in Asia. No other country was in such a position he said.

"For this reason," Garcia said, "I want to emphasize that we are not veering away from the United States when we try to improve our relations with neighboring Asian nations. We want to help the United States to be understood in Asia."

Speaking of the present economic situation in the Philippines, President Garcia said, "we are having our difficulties."

Determination-Stressed He stressed the determination to do all he could to solve them—alone, if necessary.

However, he said there was an urgent need to stabilize the Philippine peso and called upon the United States for a 300 million dollar peso stabilization loan.

Garcia said when he visited the United States last June he was promised U. S. loans but they had not yet materialized.

"People here are beginning to get impatient," he said. "They are saying the United States is taking us for granted."

Filmland Unit Kills Rule on Oscar Award

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 15 (UPI)—The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences has repealed a controversial amendment barring communists and "fifth amendment" witnesses from the annual competition for Oscars.

The action, revealed yesterday, would allow communists and witnesses who pleaded the fifth amendment before government investigating committees to be eligible for Oscar nominations which begin next month.

Actor Complains Repeal of the amendment which had been in effect since Feb. 6, 1957, brought a blast from Actor Ward Bond, president of the Motion Picture alliance and a crusader against communists in Hollywood.

"All these fifth amendment communists are working now. We've lost the fight and that's all there is to it."

But Director George Stevens, president of the Academy's board of governors, defended the board's action which came Monday after a heated all-night session.

Awards Said Interest "This matter, this amendment," Stevens told United Press International, "has from the beginning been used only to harass the Academy. We're only interested in making awards based on merit."

The amendment, adopted two years ago when a "Robert Rich"—apparently a pseudonym—failed to claim an Oscar awarded him for writing the film story of "The Brave One," came under renewed fire this year over the eligibility of Ned Young, a screenwriter of the film "The Defiant Ones."

Young took the fifth amendment in 1953 while appearing before the house un-American activities committee and would have been ineligible for an Oscar before the board's action.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (AP)—"That guy!" gasped the veteran West coast reporter. "There was that one little kid with a big red baseball cap in the whole crowd. This Mikoyan no more gets out the door than he spots him and goes right over to pat him on the head. All the cameras went off at once."

The scene had taken place at Perino's restaurant on Wilshire boulevard, Los Angeles. Reporter Notes Walks In Detroit an exhausted reporter at the end of a long day sank into his chair at the office. "If Mickey Mantle could only have the legs this guy has got! He must have walked 10 miles today through all those auto plants. And he's 63 years old too."

At the Lincoln Electric company plant in Cleveland Mikoyan stopped to chat with a worker who spoke a bit of Russian. After a brief but cordial exchange, Mikoyan extended his hand to give a warm clasp and said, "And please do remember to give my very best wishes to your father and mother."

At a news conference at the Ambassador hotel, Los Angeles, a correspondent asked a ticklish question, "How is it that you have managed to survive through four governments of the Soviet Union when others have not?"

Answer Is Ready "Without a flicker of an eyelash, Mikoyan quipped in reply. "Didn't I say before that I thought I was fortunate..."

All these and dozens of other incidents illustrate one fact about Anastas I. Mikoyan. He takes to political campaigning like a duck to water.

He has a gift for doing exactly the right thing at the right time in order to win over his audience or grab the stage. He loves being in the limelight. And he doesn't mind an uphill struggle.

The Mikoyan technique includes humor, frankness, reasonableness, a warmly human approach and unperturbed stolidity in the face of open hostility.

Sun Gets Bad 'Measles' Case

PASADENA, Calif., Jan. 15 (AP)—The sun has broken out with a bad case of electromagnetic measles. The outbreak of black spots on its face was the worst since 1911.

Mt. Wilson Observatory photographed the solar disturbance last Friday. Photographs released yesterday show a cluster of spots extending 100,000 miles across the face of the sun.

A 125,000-mile cluster was observed in 1951. The spots are gigantic magnetic storms on the sun's surface and emit radiation which frequently upsets radio and telephone communications on Earth. Their cause is not known.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (AP)—A new tranquilizer drug and antacids, allows complete healing of peptic ulcers without strict diet, a New York doctor reported yesterday.

Mental sharpness and related functions are apparently unaffected by the new tranquilizer, said Dr. Louis A. Rosenblum in the current issue of "Clinical Medicine."

The treatment was given to 33 patients with duodenal ulcer, one with gastric ulcer, and one with marginal ulcer.

Thirty of the duodenal cases reported complete relief, Dr. Rosenblum said. The marginal case also reported prompt relief. The gastric ulcer did not respond and went to surgery.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—The first edition of "Who's Who of American Women" contains the names of 10,000 prominent women and one man.

Shirley Povich, sports columnist for the Washington Post has made it clear he's not mad about being included. In fact, he's rather used to that sort of thing.

Povich, whose unmistakably masculine face adorns his daily "This Morning" column, often gets mail addressed to Miss Shirley Povich.

Once he was invited to join the League of American Penwomen, and the application blank asked such questions as "How do you get along with the men in your profession?" Povich filled it in with, "I simply try to be one of the boys."

As for "Who's Who of American Women," Povich conceded he didn't try very hard to correct the mistaken impression of the publishers, adding "If it's all right with them, it's all right with me."

U.S. Air Force Plans for Big Space Project

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (UPI)—The air force has ordered a multi-million dollar development project aimed at rocket penetrations deep into space, probably as far as Mars and Venus.

This was disclosed yesterday with the announcement that Convair astronautics division, General Dynamics corporation, had received a contract to develop an "upper stage" for a modified Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile.

Atlas Fired 6,300 Miles

The Atlas has been fired 6,300 miles over the Atlantic test range from Cape Canaveral, Fla., and one of the big missiles was put into orbit around the Earth on Dec. 18. It is still circling the globe but is expected to burn up in the atmosphere soon.

Convair announced that its new contract called for a seven-million-dollar outlay in the first year but did not reveal the total expected expenditure.

Pratt and Whitney aircraft division, United Aircraft corporation, already has received an initial nine-million-dollar contract to develop a "high-speed, upper-stage, rocket engine" which, it was disclosed today, will be used in the Convair development. The engine development cost eventually will run to about 23 million dollars.

Use Isn't Told

While the announcement did not say what the two-stage Atlas would be used for, officials here said that it could boost a satellite weighing as much as five tons into a low orbit around the Earth.

It also was intended, informed sources said, for deep penetration into space. "Payload" weights for such long rocket flights were not disclosed but they would be much less than the five tons for a low-orbiting satellite.

It was not learned, however, whether the rocket would be used in U. S. Project Mercury which is aimed at putting a man into orbit.

Japanese Love Affair Official

TOKYO, Jan. 15 (AP)—A kimono-clad Japanese girl yesterday accepted gifts of sea bream, rice wine and five rolls of cloth sent by Crown Prince Akihito to officially confirm their engagement.

"I will accept," Michiko Shoda said softly as the symbols of happiness, celebration and preparation were laid before her by Akihito's emissary, Kiwuo Suzuki of the imperial household agency.

A short time later the prince, who cast aside 2,600 years of tradition to woo and win a commoner, entered the imperial palace.

There in flowing ceremonial court dress he knelt before three Shinto shrines to report the event to his ancestors.

A date for the wedding has not been set although it is expected to be held in April when the cherry blossoms are in bloom.

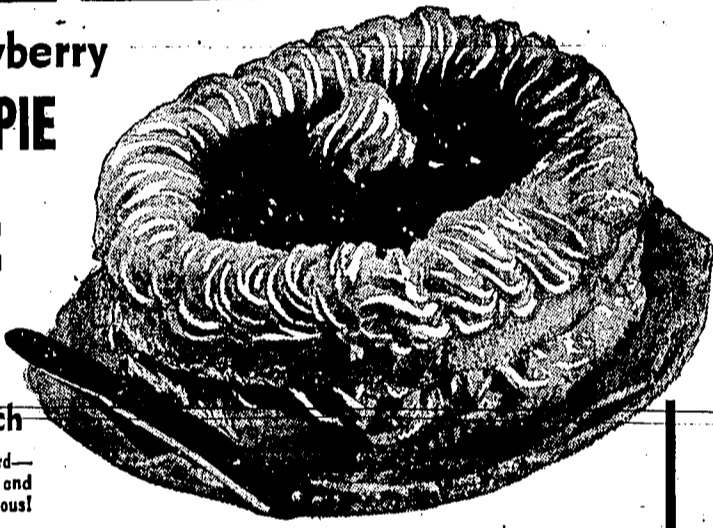

Voice of Atlas Is Now Silent

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (UPI)—America's talking satellite has gone silent.

Trackers of the Vanguard control center said the second of two transmitters aboard the Atlas moon, launched Dec. 18, went dead some time after 10:17 p.m. (EST) Sunday as the satellite passed over Quito, Ecuador.

The Atlas has made 375 circuits of the Earth and has traveled 1,908,452 miles. It is expected to burn up around Jan. 21. In its early passes the satellite broadcast a Christmas peace message from President Eisenhower.

The Atlas carried two transmitters—adequating on 107.94 and 107.97 megacycles. The first functioned only about one day.

The last tracking signal received from the second transmitter was recorded at 10:17 p.m. Sunday. It was barely detectable. The signals had been progressively weaker for several days before the pass over Quito.

Castro's Aim Was Democracy; Executions Make Many Think

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (U)—The announced purpose of Fidel Castro's revolution, which threw out the dictatorship of Fulgencio Batista, was to restore democracy to Cuba. The question now is will it?

The revolutionary government established by Castro with the Provisional President, Manuel Urrutia, handpicked by him—has dissolved the Cuban congress and announced it will rule by decree for at least 18 months.

That means no matter by what name it is called nor how benevolent it may be—Cuba will be under a dictatorship for at least another year and a half. At the end of that time, new elections are supposed to be held.

The stated reason for the 18-month delay is to let new political parties organize so they can compete in the elections.

Just because there will be a dictatorship until the new factions may arise, even among Castro's followers, because of dissatisfaction with the course it follows.

Factions mean disputes and disputes can lead to new civil war.

Castro has pledged that his country will remain a democracy. But the executions being carried out now by his followers against former lackeys and spies of Batista are not in accordance with democratic processes.

The men executed by firing squads have not been given regular trials, with full legal protections. At

best they've been given revolutionary trials. Castro justifies them on these grounds.

That "anyone who has killed 16 or 30 people has no right to live." This is Castro passing judgment. It is not a decision reached by democratic process or agreement. It's Castro deciding what's right or wrong.

He has the power to make such decisions because he has the backing of his armed forces, a situation which a political philosopher could reduce to a simple explanation: It's a case of might makes right. But it's not democratic.

At a minimum these executions will leave behind them a trail of bil-

terious—if not obsession—for vengeance—among the families of the men slain by firing squads.

They will make some, perhaps many, Cubans uneasy about the course of the revolutionary government, just as they have already dismayed many members of the congress.

Thus the Castro people, who profess to despise the undemocratic brutality of the Batista followers toward prisoners, are leaving themselves open to accusation of doing the very things they said they wanted to destroy.

21 Died in Molasses Flood as Big Tank Burst 40 Years Ago

BOSTON, Mass., Jan. 15 (AP)—It was Wednesday, Jan. 15, 1813. Clocks ticked all the noon hour in Boston's busy North End. The temperature hovered at the freezing mark. There was a hint of snow in the air. The everyday bustle of activity schooled along Commercial street, the North End's cluttered avenue of trucks, autos, bicycles and peddlers' wagons. A group of children romped beneath a huge tank—58 feet high, 98 feet wide—that towered over the Purity Distilling company. It contained almost 2 1/2 million gallons of molasses. A guard shoosed the youngsters away. The clock's hands moved on toward 12:30. Mothers beckoned children to lunch. One, Mary DiStasio, 11, ran back to take another look at the awesome molasses tank. A city laborer, Michael Sennott, sat down to lunch with five companions in the nearby public works yard. He munched on a ham sandwich. It was 12:31. A moment later, with only a muffled rumble as warning, the great molasses tank erupted. A tidal wave of sticky, black liquid spewed over two city blocks with such force it hurled trucks against buildings and crumpled houses. Little Mary DiStasio's body was found beneath four feet of molasses. The public works yard was a blanket of molasses. Sennott and his companions were dead. In all, 21 persons perished, 40 were injured and the damage ran to millions. The next day an investigation began. It ended officially six years later. Lawyers for 125 plaintiffs charged the company had constructed a faulty tank, while the company claimed it was the victim of anarchists, that a bomb had been placed in the vat. But Municipal Court Chief Justice Wilfred Bolster blamed the public for the disaster. In his inquest report he said, "There was no supervision of the construction of this gigantic steel tank. The plans went through the building department and persons passing on them were incompetent to determine structural steel construction. "As long as the public keeps one eye on the tax rate and provides itself with an administrative department only 50 per cent qualified, it has no right to complain if it does not get 100 per cent protection and production." On April 28, 1925, after a 10-month trial during which 3,000 witnesses were heard, the plaintiffs agreed to settle the case for \$1,024,000.

Pacific Coast Hotels Merge Into One Unit

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 15 (UPI)—Six of the largest hotels on the Pacific coast have merged in a \$90 million dollar transaction to form a new ownership corporation. Involved in the deal were the St. Francis and Sir Francis Drake, San Francisco, and four other hotels—the Mayfair, Los Angeles, Multnomah Portland, Benjamin Franklin, Seattle, and Oasis, Palm Springs. Under the terms of the merger, which was announced yesterday, stock in the St. Francis Hotel corporation was traded for stock in the other hotels' corporations. Included in the deal was the Fitzhugh building here, which was owned by the Sir Francis Drake corporation. All six hotels involved are members of Western Hotels, Inc., which will continue as management company. Frank A Dupar, Seattle, secretary-treasurer of Western Hotels, Inc. named president of the new corporation. Dan E. London, president of the St. Francis, appointed vice president and E. Experts Check Quake Danger For California

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (UPI)—Earthquake experts are checking the blood-pressure of California's San Andreas fault. They know something is going to snap. They don't know when—or whether the results will be as calamitous as they were in 1906 when a San Andreas quake destroyed San Francisco. It could happen tomorrow, or five, or 25 years, from now. The San Andreas fault, a rift in the Earth's crust running northwestward half the length of California from the Mexican border into the Pacific, has been spawning earthquakes for uncounted thousands of years. Earth Blocks Crawl. Vast blocks of the crust are crawling in different directions on either side of the fault. Theories differ as to why this happens. But the experts agree that these slow drifting movements, averaging about two inches a year now, create strains that kick off quakes. Measurement of these movements provides diagnostic if not prognostic clues. With them, scientists can tell when the "blood-pressure" is building up dangerously even if they cannot forecast when the stroke will come. The coast and geodetic survey has been taking blood pressure readings along the San Andreas fault for half a century. In recent decades it has been systematically checking and rechecking specific areas to measure the rate of crustal movements on either side of the fault. A party of 17 men under Lieut. Jack E. Golt is now re-examining sections of the fault, last surveyed in 1938 and 1940, south of Maricopa and north of Taft. A similar survey will be conducted next year in the vicinity of Petaluma, north of San Francisco, and at Monterey bay in 1961. Rebound Must Happen. The Earth's rocky crust has a certain amount of elasticity. But it can't be stretched indefinitely. The time must come when there occurs what the scientists call "an elastic rebound." When that happens, rock formations pulled too far in one direction snap back in the other. An elastic rebound is an earthquake. It is what happened to San Francisco on April 18 and 19, 1906, when 453 persons were killed and 350 million dollars worth of property was destroyed. How to forecast just when a rebound will occur in any given area has not yet been figured out. But it can be determined when one is building up.

Riley, Oran, Mo.; two sisters, Mrs. Molly Birdwell, McLeansboro; Mrs. Letha Nabery, Cape Girardeau, Mo.; 12 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. Funeral services will be announced by McGoldrick funeral home, Shoshone.

He Seeks U.S. Wealth, Lauds Socialist Way

HONOLULU, Jan. 15 (UPI)—Korean-war turncoat, Richard C. Corden, told reporters yesterday he is glad to be returning to "the high standard of living of America," but that he still feels socialism "is the most advanced system in the world." The dapper-looking Corden, formerly of Providence, R. I., is coming home after almost nine years in China. He has been identified by other prisoners as the ringleader and spokesman for the 23 Americans who chose to go to red China after they were captured. He had his first view of American soil in nine years yesterday when the liner President Cleveland arrived here from Hong Kong. He was interviewed on deck after he told reporters that he had been told by the American consul office in Hong Kong not to disembark until the liner reached San Francisco next Monday. The mustachioed Corden, 31, answered questions dispassionately, although they dealt with such subjects as treason and charges of informing. He said he "had never intended to remain in China." "I like a good standard of living," he explained. He called socialism "the most advanced system in the world," but added that he considered it only a step towards communism. He did admit Chinese methods "may be a little extreme." When the term "brainwashing" was mentioned, Corden corrected it to "political indoctrination." He answered charges of informing on his fellow charges by stating that his duties as "squad leader, monitor and club officer" naturally included reporting the comments and opinions of his fellow prisoners to the Chinese officials. He called the American soldier "soft." "He lives good so when he runs up against a tough situation he just gives up."

People Having Heart Trouble See New Hope

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 15 (AP)—Researchers say rugged men have heart attacks. Studies generally escape. Why? Search for an answer to this paradox led to a report yesterday of a new treatment and new hope for 10 million Americans who have heart trouble. Tiny daily doses of female sex hormones, a woman professor told the Los Angeles County Heart Association, will reduce fatty substances in the blood believed to be the basic cause of many heart and artery diseases. 193 Men Studied. Dr. Jessie Marmorston, clinical professor of medicine at the University of Southern California, reported on a study of 193 men who had had a heart attack known as myocardial infarction. This is a condition in which fatty deposits in an artery keep blood from reaching the heart muscle. Of the 193 men, 106 were treated with a hormone known as estrogen. "It worked in all of them," Dr. Marmorston said, "even in those patients who continued to eat a high-fat diet." Some Become Feminine. There was only one trouble—the treatment tended to turn some men feminine. "We have to watch for any femininity appearing in the patient," she said. "If it does we cut down the estrogen doses for several months." Continuation at a lower dosage permits the undesirable symptoms to disappear, but does not affect the drop in cholesterol and other fats. It is indicated we can keep the level of fatty substances down to normal the rest of the patient's life—and also prevent femininity. Trend Starts Study. The research was begun after long study indicated that slay-type men and prime-of-life women have fewer heart attacks. Dr. Marmorston reasoned that estrogens which protect women during their child-bearing years also could help men. Whether the hormones can be used to prevent heart attacks altogether will be determined in future research.

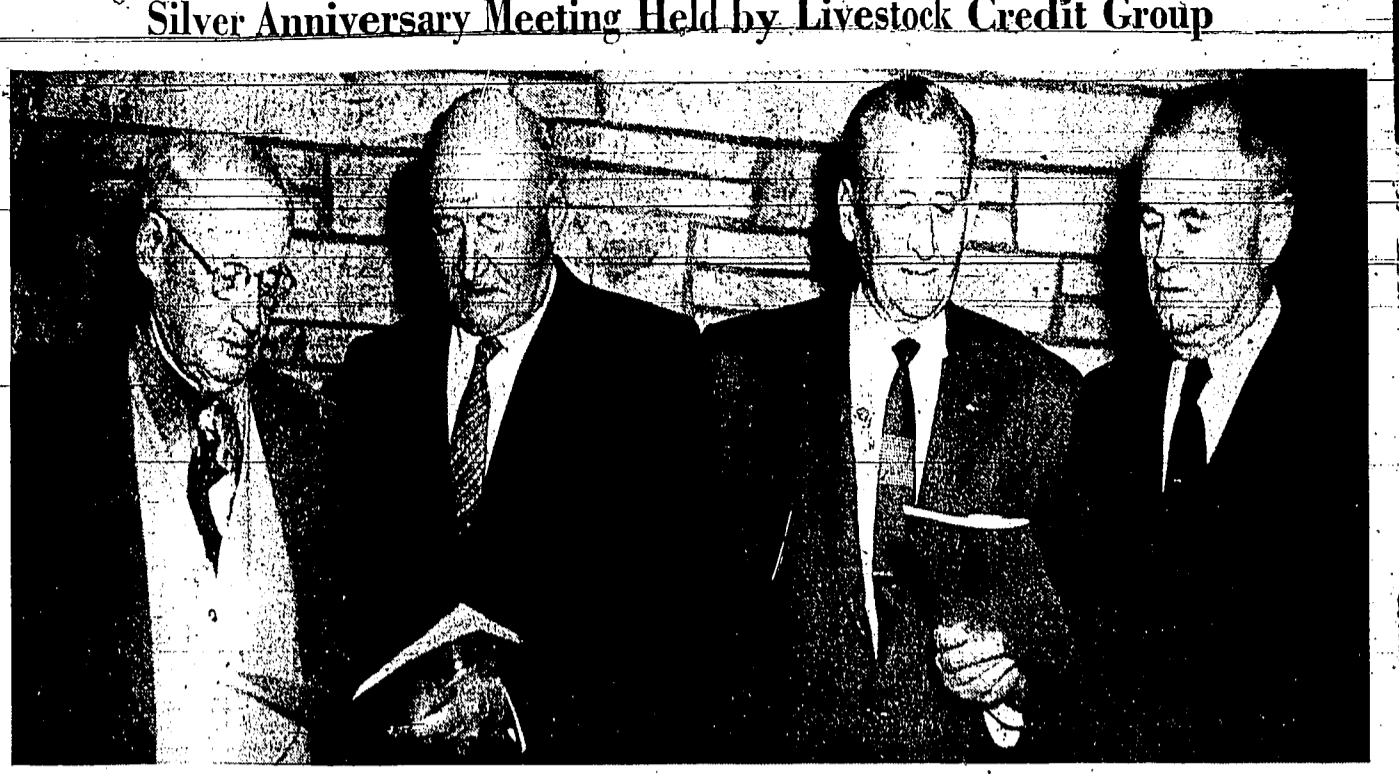

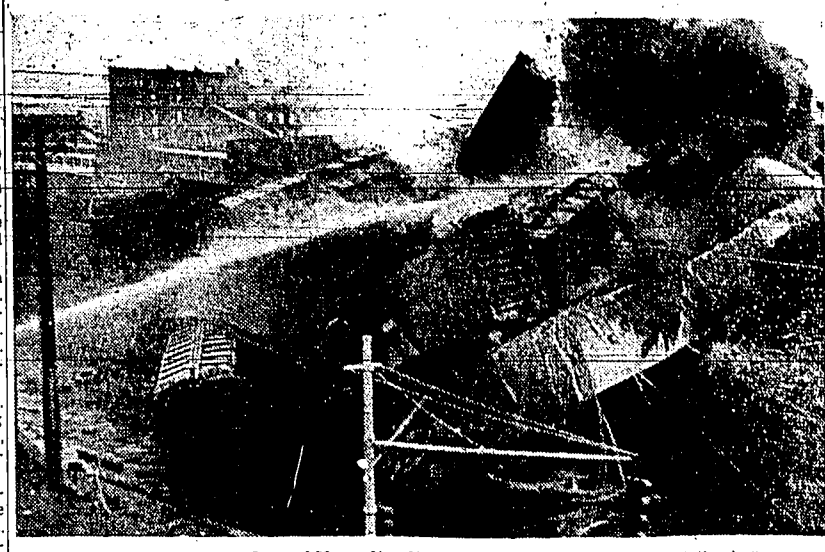

Liberals in Senate Look Like Amateurs in Filibuster Move

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15—Senate liberals looked amateurish compared with the professionalism of Sen. Lyndon Johnson, Texas, who outmaneuvered their efforts to make it much easier to smash a filibuster.

To make a long story short: When the showdown came they didn't have the votes, Johnson did.

Knowing the thoroughness of Johnson, it seems safe to say he had his votes lined up beforehand and the liberals didn't.

What happened would indicate one of two things about the fight they made:

1. Either they were overly optimistic on the support they'd get from the rest of the senate and didn't make a nose count, or—
2. They knew their chance was slim but decided to go ahead and fight anyway for the sake of the record and to get at least some concessions.

Under the old senate rule No. 22 a filibuster could be stopped only by a two-thirds vote of all the senators, or 66 of the 98 senators. A filibuster is a prolonged talking spree whose sole purpose is to prevent some bill or measure from coming to a vote.

Such a two-thirds vote is tremendously difficult to get in the senate, where so many members traditionally cherish the right—which any one of them might want to use someday—to block a distasteful measure.

In addition, the rule provided no means at all—not even that big two-thirds vote—for stopping a filibuster against a motion to change the rule.

The liberals set out to get the rule changed right at the start of this session of congress last Wednesday. They wanted it changed to

overwhelming adoption of Johnson's proposal.

There's no doubt the liberals did a lot of homework. Research on the history of rule No. 22 and the important field of practical politics votes—whatever they did wasn't enough.

'59 May Show Whether or Not Chinese Reds Will Succeed in Commune System

TOKYO, Jan. 15 (UPI)—The year 1959 may be the most important in the history of the Chinese communist regime since it came into power.

It could give an answer, or the first signs of an answer, to the big question: Is communist China destined to be the most communized nation in the world and the most powerful nation in Asia, or is she headed for increasingly serious trouble and perhaps extensive revolt?

Despite the accomplishments of the Chinese communist regime, there is evidence that some serious mistakes may have been made and she may have sown the seeds of her ultimate fall.

Nobody is predicting that communist China will crumble immediately. Communist mistakes have accumulated slowly. The erosion of power, if it comes, will be slow. Rebellion on a large scale, if it comes, must wait until a number of factors coincide.

Most experts agree that the answer to China's immediate future—one way or another—depends on the success or failure of the people's commune system. This is a system of government-enforced collectivization which even the Russians abandoned as impractical.

The communes have swallowed up a half-billion peasants.

They mean the end of virtually all private property. Husbands and wives have private meetings only once every two weeks.

The communes have changed the whole nature of Chinese culture.

Chairman Mao Tse-tung has got to prove to the peasants that their personal economic benefits and the country's benefits make up for the personal hardships and the tremendous loss of personal rights and freedom.

Mao thus far has been able to push his program fairly successfully. But there has been opposition, and it has been strong enough to be admitted in the controlled press of communist China.

In the past, red papers have admitted numerous cases of peasant uprisings. Now this and new troubles have been confirmed by the powerful Central committee of the communist party.

Official Chinese communist reports have described the red soldiers on the Fukien front, opposite Quemoy, as undergoing ideological re-training after they expressed anger and bitterness following the receipt of letters from their parents who wrote to complain about the commune program.

The most recent "revolt" against the communes came in the commune opposite the Portuguese colony of Macao and in full view of persons who could watch the execution of those Chinese who were creating unrest in Lappa's Wanchai commune.

Moscow radio reported the liquidation of what it called an "American-Chiang Kai-shek" spy and sabotage ring in Kwangtung province, which includes Lappa island.

There have been revolts in Tibet and other outbreaks have been reported in the Szechuan autonomous region.

The communists openly admitted they fired the governor and hundreds of high ranking cadres in the important east coast provinces of Shantung and Liaoning, both industrial provinces.

In the middle of the Quemoy crisis, the Chinese communists changed the chief of staff of their armed forces. Removed was General Su Yu, once called "the ever victorious general." In his place went much younger General Huang Ke-chang who formerly was secret police boss within the army.

McLemore Softens up Some to 'Kindness' Mikoyan Expresses

By HENRY McLEMORE — Some observers believe that the prime purpose of Mikoyan's visit to the United States is to "soften us up," show us what really delightful fellows the Bolsheviks really are.

Has his charm worked on you so far? The man has been here more than a week now, and, speaking strictly for myself, I don't believe I have succumbed very much.

A little bit, maybe. There is no denying the wit and graciousness and half-fellow-well-met-spirit of a man whose first question in a strange land is whether or not hotel guests have to make up their own beds.

What an inspired question! Fal-

staff would have been hard put to phrase a better one. Can you think of a more subtle way to make Americans forget Mikoyan's part in, say, the Hungarian massacre, than a question of bed-making?

Thinking of the comfort of his fellow humans, that Mikoyan did over. When he visits the concentration camps in Siberia, he probably asks the same question of the slave laborers.
