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Mikoyan, Dulles Confer, Plan Another Parley for Later Friday Afternoon

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—Anastas I. Mikoyan and Secretary of State Dulles conferred for more than two hours today on U. S.-Soviet differences. They arranged for a meeting in the late afternoon. The deputy premier of the Soviet Union said he and Dulles were confronting each other across a table in Dulles' office—had "an exchange of views on questions of particular interest to our two countries." The only thing Mikoyan would say to reporters as he left the meeting was that the discussions would be held at 4 p.m. (EST).

'War Crimes' Trials In Cuba Postponed

HAVANA, Jan. 16 (UPI)—The revolutionary government postponed the start of "war crimes" trials for 631 Havana prisoners today, but other trials were resumed in Matanzas under new rules providing greater rights for accused Batista supporters. At the same time the regime launched a campaign to publicize the "horrors" committed by ousted President Fulgencio Batista's army and secret police. Capt. Jose Gonzales Rigueral, aide to the commandant at Cabana fortress in Havana, said the start of trials for 631 men imprisoned in the capital had been postponed for 24 to 48 hours. He could give no reason. They had been scheduled to begin today.

Jerome Senator Asks Curb on State Highway Commission, Labels Board as 'Autocratic'

BOISE, Jan. 16 (AP)—Curbing the powers of the Idaho highway board was proposed today by a state senator who described the agency as "autocratic." "Two things can be done," said Sen. Art M. Amestoy, D., Jerome. "Either we can pass laws restricting the power of the board or we can abolish it and reestablish it in a democratic way." Amestoy said the board refused to explain at a meeting with a delegation from Jerome county why it had chosen the recommended route for the interstate highway through Magic Valley.

U.S. Five-Pound Atom Generator Is Termed Major Breakthrough

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (UPI)—The White House today unveiled a five-pound atomic generator which experts of the atomic energy commission hailed as a "significant breakthrough" in producing electric power from heat. The new device was presented to President Eisenhower for a demonstration on his office desk by John A. McCone, chairman of the AEC. Later a group of experts from the AEC put the device into operation for reporters and photographers in the office of Press Secretary James C. Hagerty. The device is known formally as a "radioisotope fueled thermoelectric generator."

Franchise for Local Bus Service Refused

The possibility of public bus service for Twin Falls in the near future became remote Thursday after City Manager Joseph Latimore was notified that Lloyd V. Cox, Los Angeles, was not going to accept a franchise granted him by the city. Latimore reported he had been notified by John Cox, Twin Falls, brother of the franchise holder, that the operation was considered marginal and Cox planned to take his buses to another West Coast city. John Cox told a Times-News reporter Thursday night that he had received a call from his brother in Los Angeles notifying him of his decision. He said his brother had asked him to relay the message to the city.

Idaho Closes Hunt for Lost Plane, 2 Men

Official search for the Pacer airplane with two men aboard missing since last Sunday was reported ended Friday by State Aeronautics Director Chet Moulton. The craft, piloted by Ed Wilson, 34, Boise service station operator, with John Church, 30, Seattle, as a passenger, disappeared on the well-traveled air route between Pocatello and Boise.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—President Eisenhower today was reported ready to make forceful use of his veto power if necessary to maintain the cent surplus in the 77-billion-dollar budget he will send to congress Monday.

OAKLAND, Calif., Jan. 16 (UPI)—Lt. Cmdr. Ralph Fielding shot himself head-first through the canopy of his jet training plane at only 150 feet altitude. He accidentally had touched the ejection button. He escaped with a broken leg; no head.

Wave of Cold Brings Snow Across South

Wilcomb said, "Compared to other areas in the Columbia basin, our watershed is in comparatively good shape. The water supply forecast put out by the weather bureau as of Jan. 1, 1959, shows these percentages of normal precipitation in the areas given:

Upper Snake basin, 100 per cent; Snake river plain, 90 per cent; Boise, Fayette, Wilson and Salmon basins, 80 per cent; Clearwater, 120 per cent; southeastern Oregon, 45 per cent; northeastern Oregon, 105 per cent, and southeastern Washington, 110 per cent."

Wilcomb told of several construction projects, including replacing two radial gates in the main canal north of Sugar Loaf butte, repairing concrete wall and floor sections below Milner dam, two miles of new road into Wilson lake, plus removal of 275,000 cubic yards of silt from 186 miles of laterals and canals.

There also were a great many small structures replaced, he said.

R. P. Parry, Twin Falls, attorney for the canal company, gave a report of the legal department for the past year. He mentioned two legislative proposals affecting water rights. One is bill S3114, which the canal company has gone on record as opposing.

The second bill is S4028, known as the Wilderness Preservation bill. Both of these bills probably will be pushed strongly at this session of congress and it is imperative that every effort be made to defeat both of these proposals, Parry said.

Mason, now head of the federal housing administration, was nominated by Eisenhower to head the parent housing and home finance agency. The 62-year-old Massachusetts Republican will change offices as soon as the senate confirms his nomination.

The top FHA post is being vacated by Albert M. Cole, who made it plain to newsmen he won't be at all sad to miss this year's give and take on capitol hill.

Cole will become an aluminum company executive.

Red Magazine Article Belies Mikoyan 'Sweet Talk' of Peaceful Coexistence

By WILLIAM L. RYAN AP Foreign News Analyst
Is Anastas I. Mikoyan pulling the collective American leg? The Soviet communist party is arguing violently against the very ideas Mikoyan voices in his spectacular tour of the United States.

To Americans, the Soviet deputy premier pictures the Soviet Union as eager for cooperation with the capitalist world. For the benefit of world communists, Moscow's most important theoretical journal blasts the idea that there ever can be any compromise with world capitalism.

The Kremlin's thinking is exposed in the current issue of the magazine Kommunist. A long article makes a new and ferocious attack upon Tito's Yugoslav communists for daring to hint that the Western system might someday evolve into something with which world communism might live in peace.

Americans can ask: What are the purposes of Mikoyan's propaganda broadsides in the United States? Is he hoping to spread the notion among America's allies that Washington and Moscow might some day come to some sort of agreement independently of the other countries? Crises still lurk behind every door — the Far East, the Middle East, Berlin, to name a few. It remains in Soviet hands. Street demonstrations can turn into a bonanza at any moment.

Is Mikoyan attempting to lull American businessmen into a sense of security which can hamper the prosecution of a firm U. S. policy? "To Marxist-Leninists, the struggle for peaceful coexistence between countries with different social systems does not mean giving up ideological struggle. Lenin acted on behalf of communism, against imperialism, against the opportunists, against leaders of the Second International who had set the course of conciliation with capitalism." In a word, no matter what Mikoyan says, there can be no compromise in the long run.
