



#### DOING SOMETHING ABOUT IT President Charles de Gaulle continues to

grapple with the Algerian problem like a resourceful quarterback probing for avenues to the goal line.

Already he has given Algerian Moslems representation they never had before in French affairs and has daringly, though to no avail, invited rebel leaders to meet him

Now he is granting freedom to 7,000 rebels confined without trial to French concentration camps, is commuting up to 200 rebel death sentences, and cutting all rebel prison terms by at least one tenth.

He is freeing one top Algerian nationalist altogether, and shifting five other captive leaders to more comfortable quarters, thus giving them obvious status above that of ordinary criminals.

No one can have any sure idea whether the continuance of this conciliatory approach will in time make impact upon the rebels and induce them to talk seriously of halting their revolt. There are reports France hopes to gain a cease-fire within a week or so, through secret negotiations. Certainly de Gaulle must be rated more

impressive than ever, however, in the light of this latest effort. Of course he works in the security of a seven-year term, to which he has just been elected, and in the knowledge that he enjoys the overwhelming confidence and trust of the French people.

But everything in de Gaulle's personal history indicates that he is bold by nature and probably would be willing to take the big risk even if his personal position were far shakler than it is.

More than that, he doesn't fritter away his energies on the secondary problems. He digs right into the tough ones, as evidenced not only by his unrelenting assault on the Algerian matter but by his austere domestic

It's naturally impossible to tell how much success will crown his labors for a France crisis. Perhaps the French, unaccustomed to the rigors of such aggressive leadership, will not choose to endure them indefinitely.

Whatever the final outcome, both the French and their friends outside must appreciate that de Gaulle is most likely the best rescuer they could ever hope to have.

#### GETTING OUT AND AROUND

President Eisenhower evidently is bent upon using more fully, in his last two years, the opportunities any American President has enlarging the stature and prestige of his office.

His appearance on television before the National Press club was just the beginning. He is planning to take to the air waves fairly regularly, in an attempt to go beyond the heads of congress with his pleas for economy and a balanced federal budget. .

At the same time there are signs that he may try to carry, the influence of his office more directly to foreign capitals. Reports living. have it that he may visit Paris this April for ceremonies marking NATO's 10th anniversary, and stop off in London to repay Queen Elizabeth's 1957 White House visit.

If this and other possible foreign trips should materalize, considerable feeling exists that it would serve to dramatize our stake in friendly ties with other free nations in a

There will always be arguments over the broad vs. limited concept of the presidency. But most experts on the office agree that a man is somewhat handicapped in exercising decisive authority if he chooses not to practice the grubby political infighting that

helps put a program across. The President's plans for 1959 and beyond probably don't mean a real reversal in his thinking. But they do suggest at least a moderate change in outlook.
